THE compiler of this, the first publication of the LOWER CANADA ALMANACK, presents it to the public under the assurance that it will furnish a desideratum which had become the more requisite from the rapidly increasing commercial importance of these Provinces, and the late removal of the seat of government, and of most of the public departments, from Quebec to Montreal. Its contents are more ample, and he ventures to hope more useful and accurate than are to be found in any similar work lately published in Lower Canada. He is, however, sensible that notwithstanding the most sedulous care with which the materials for it have been prepared, it is far from being, in every respect, perfect.

The plan of the work is not new; on the contrary, the compiler has availed himself of the mode of arrangement, (as it seemed to him the best that could be devised,) and of much of the information contained in the MONTREAL ALMANACK, published a few years back by MESSRS. ARMOUR.

The DIRECTORY, which is added to the ALMANACK, although he believes that it contains the names of nearly all the principal merchants, traders, &c., yet is not so complete as the public may require or the compiler himself would wish to make it; but should the present undertaking meet with encouragement commensurate with the labour and expense attending it, hereafter it will be made more worthy of their patronage.

As no expense has been spared, and unwearied pains have been bestowed on the work, it is committed to the public with much confidence that it will be received with indulgence and favour.

The compiler cannot conclude without offering his sincere acknowledgments to the numerous public officers, and other gentlemen, who have kindly rendered him assistance.

ECLIPSES.

There will this year be two Eclipses of the sun and two of the moon.

I. On the 17th February, at 8h. 59m. in the morning, there will be a partial eclipse of the moon, invisible.

II. On the 3rd March, at 11h. 11m. in the evening, there will be an eclipse of the sun, invisible in America.—This eclipse will be visible almost all over Asia, and in some of the eastern portions of Europe and Africa. It will be central and annular on the meridian in longitude 113° 39' E. from Greenwich, and latitude 43° 40' N.

III. On the morning of the 13th August, there will be an eclipse of the moon, visible, as follows:—

Beginning, - - -	1h. 4m.	} Mean Time.
Middle, - - -	2h. 29m.	
End, - - -	3h. 54m.	

Duration, 2h. 50m. Magnitude, 7½ digits on the Moon's Northern limb.

IV. On the 27th of August, at 1h 50m. in the morning, there will be an eclipse of the sun, which will be likewise invisible in America. This eclipse will be visible at our antipodes, and in most parts of the Indian Ocean, together with the adjacent regions of the Southern Ocean, and a large portion of Africa on the south east. From some of the southern parts of Arabia, and of New Holland, a small eclipse may be seen on the sun's southern limb; but from the Cape of Good Hope the eclipse will be seen on the northern limb; 6.3 digits at the greatest. The sun will rise centrally and totally eclipsed in Lower Guinea, in Africa, in longitude 14° 14' east from Greenwich, and latitude 11° 41' south. Thence the total eclipse will pursue an easterly direction. The sun will pass the meridian centrally, and totally eclipsed in long. 72° 30' east from Greenwich, and lat. 34° 44' south; and will set in like manner at some distance to the south of New Holland.

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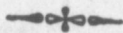

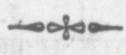

Pilots are at liberty to leave vessels forty-eight hours after they arrive at the place of their destination.

The regulations which affect the commanders of vessels, or persons in charge of the same, within the ports and harbours of Quebec and Montreal, and the branch pilots,—imposed by provincial enactments or by-laws of the Trinity House,—are given at full length in pamphlets, with a copy of which the Harbour Masters are obliged by law to furnish them, and for which the Harbour Master of Quebec is allowed to charge 7s. 6d., and that of Montreal, 2s. 6d.

LIGHT HOUSES.

LIGHT HOUSE ON GREEN ISLAND.

Keeper,—Robert N. Lindsay.

The Lantern of the Light-house on Green Island, in the River St. Lawrence, shows a light every evening, from sun-set to sun-rise the next morning, from the 15th April to the 10th December, inclusive, and the following are the bearings of it, by compass, from the respective places hereunder mentioned, viz. :—

LIGHT HOUSE AT POINTE DES MONTS.

Keeper,—James Wallace.

The Lantern of the Light-house on Pointe des Monts (or Cape Mont Pelé) on the north side of the River St. Lawrence, nearly opposite to Cape Chat, stands one hundred feet above the water.

The Light-house lays with the outermost part of Carribou Point, N. 52° east and S. 52° west, by compass, and can be seen over that point, and to the eastward of it.

Ships approaching the light from the eastward, as they draw towards Carribou Point, must bring it to bear W. by S. they will then be in a good fair way, and if necessary they can near the land by their lead.

After passing Carribou Point, and as they draw towards the Light-house they must come no nearer than twelve fathoms water to avoid two ledges of rocks :—one of which lays E. S. E. from the

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Light-house, with only twelve feet water on it; the other lays S. W. from the Light-house, and E. S. E. from the western extremity of Pointe des Monts, with sixteen feet water on it; but these rocks do not lay further from the shore than half a mile at low water.

The Light-house lays with the western extremity of Pointe des Monts, N. 64° east and S. 64° west, and distant about one mile; and when ships are to the westward of the Pointe, the Light-house is in one with the outermost rocks off the Pointe—and in the day time it forms a bold distinct land-mark—and on this line of bearing, ships are in the best possible fair way for the general purposes of navigation, whether bound up or down.

For any particular purpose of navigation, ships may safely stand to the northward, until the light bears E. by N.; they will then be drawing near the north land; and when it bears E. $\frac{1}{2}$ N. it is time to tack; for when it bears east it will shut in with the high land and cannot be seen to the southward of east, and then they will be only one mile from the land, and if they are off Godbout River, Pointe des Monts will bear from them E. by S. two leagues distant.

When ships are off St. Nicolas harbour, and the light bearing E. by N. they are in a good fair way from the north land. The S. E. spitt of Manicougan great shoal, the ship, and the Light-house, are all in one line of bearing.

LIGHT HOUSE ON S. W. POINT OF ANTICOSTI.

Keeper, — William Hall.

The Lantern of the Light-house on the S. W. Point of Anticosti shows a Revolving Light, on the Argand principle, every evening, from sun-set to sun-rise the next morning, from the 1st April to the 15th December, inclusive.

When ships are to the eastward of the Light-house, they may safely stand towards the Island until it bears N. N. W. by compass—they will then be in a good fair way, and if they wish to make more free with the land, they can do so by their lead. The land trends from the Light-house S. E. by S. or nearly so.

When ships are to the Westward of the Light-house, they may safely stand towards the Island until the Light bears S. S. E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E., they will then be in a good fair way from the land, and as before mentioned, they can make more free by their lead.

Nearly east and west with the Light-house, and about three-fourths of a mile from it, is the outermost part of a Reef of Rocks which joins the S. W. Point. These are dry at low water, and are the only dangers near the Light-house; therefore a berth of a mile from the Point, is a good fair way.

Sixteen leagues to the eastward of the Light-house, at Snallop Creek, and sixteen leagues to the westward of the Light-house, at Grand Bay, and at the Light-house itself, are depôts of provisions for the use of mariners in distress, or other shipwrecked persons.

FLOATING LIGHT IN THE TRAVERSE.

The Lantern of the Light-vessel stationed in the Traverse of the River St. Lawrence, shows a Light every evening, from sun-set to sun-rise the next morning, from the commencement to the close of the navigation.

LIGHT HOUSE ON HEATH POINT.

A Light-house has been built on Heath Point, at the east end of the Island of Anticosti, but has not yet been put in operation for want of sufficient funds vested in the Corporation of the Trinity House.

BUOYS.

A Black Buoy has been laid on the West End of Beaujeu's Bank, in three fathoms at low water, spring tides, with the following marks and bearings, viz.:—M'Pherson's house, N. N. W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W.; Cape St. Ignace S. S. E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E.; Onion Island just open to the Eastward of the high water mark at the N. E. end of Crane Island, and the South point of the Stone Pillar just open to the Southward of Goose Island Reef.

A Black Buoy has also been laid on a shoal called the Channel Patch, in the South Traverse, in three fathoms at low water, spring tides, with the north side of Goose Island Reef and the north side of the Stone Pillar, in one bearing S. W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W., the latter being distant two miles and three quarters to the north side of Goose Island, including the small Islands close off it, and the south side of the Woody Pillar, in one bearing S. W. by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. and St. John's Church bearing S. E. $\frac{1}{2}$ S. two miles and three quarters distant.

The Red Buoy in the Traverse has been moved lower down on the S. W. point of the shoal off St. Roch's, in about three fathoms at low water, with St. John's Church bearing S. $\frac{1}{2}$ W., St. Roch's Church bearing E. $\frac{1}{2}$ N. and the high Rock at the S. W. extreme of the Goose Island Reef, open one or two degrees to the northward of the Stone Pillar, and about four miles from the Floating Light, they bearing from each other N. E. $\frac{1}{2}$ N.

PROVISION POSTS ON ANTICOSTI.

On the outermost extremity of the west end of Anticosti stands a Direction Board. From the board to the house of Gamache, where there is a Depôt of Provisions, at the upper part of Grand Bay, by crossing the isthmus formed by Point Henry, the distance is six miles; but from this board round Point Henry, and up the Bay to the house, it is double the distance.

Six leagues to the eastward of Grand Bay is Duck River, at the mouth of which, on the east side, stands the Direction Board.

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Four leagues to the eastward of Duck River is Otter River : close to its entrance stands the Direction Board.

Four leagues to the eastward of Otter River is Seal River, on the east side of which is a Direction Board, nailed to the house, used only in summer by Gamache's Salmon and Seal Fishers; at this house there are no Provisions.

Two leagues from the River is the S. W. point of the Island—on both the extreme east and west ends of which stands a Direction Board, about one mile from each other, and about one mile from the easternmost, stands another Direction Board, in the Bay, to the eastward of the Point.

Seven leagues to the eastward of the S. W. point is Heath River, on the east side of its entrance stands the Direction Board.

Three leagues to the eastward of Heath River is Pavilion or Flag River, and two miles to the eastward of it stands the Direction Board, on a point on the east side of the Bay.

Six leagues to the eastward of Flag River is Hamell's Post, at Jupiter River, where there is a Depôt of Provisions.

Seven leagues to the eastward of Mr. Hamell, and on the south side of the east end of the Island is a Direction Board, and on the north side of the east end is another Direction Board.

Four leagues from this Board, on the north side of the Island, is the Post of Bell.

It may be remarked that all these Rivers are merely Creeks, there not being water in any of them for a Boat at low water, except Jupiter River, at Hamel's Post.

All letters for Baie des Chaleurs, Berthier, (*en bas*), Bin, Cacona, Gaspé, Isle Verte, Kamouraska, Rimouski, Rivière du Loup, (*en bas*), Rivière Ouelle, St. André, St. Anne de la Pocatière, St. Jean Port Joli, St. Roc des Aulnets, St. Thomas and Trois Pistoles, which are to the eastward of Quebec, are despatched from that office only.

Unless attention is paid to the above notice, any letters put into the offices will remain there and be lost to all concerned.

Stanstead and Montreal, in Lower Canada, Prescott, Kingston, Queenston, Brockville and Niagara, in Upper Canada, and St. Andrews and Woodstock, in New Brunswick, are in direct official communication with the Post Offices in the United States; and letters for the United States can be sent through either of the 3 Offices, upon payment of the provincial postage. REGULATIONS RELATIVE TO THE DISCHARGE OF
CARGOES AND THE DELIVERY OF GOODS AT THE
PORT OF MONTREAL,

FRAMED BY THE COMMITTEE OF TRADE, AT THE REQUEST OF A
PUBLIC MEETING OF MERCHANTS AND FORWARDERS.

*Regulations respecting the delivery and receipt of Goods from on
board of Vessels from sea.*

1. The Consignees of all vessels arriving from sea, in the port of Montreal, are required to notify in writing the various Consignees of the cargo, of the ship being entered inwards at the Custom House; and it shall be incumbent on the said Consignees, to pass their entries at the Custom House, within at least forty-eight hours after such notice, in default of which, the Consignee or master of the ship shall have liberty to send the goods to the public store.

2. The Consignees of sea-going vessels are recommended to place on board a clerk or other competent person, to superintend the discharge of the cargo, so as to avoid as much as possible, the frequent mistakes and losses which now occur in the delivery of goods to their respective Consignees.

3. Consignees are not bound to receive goods on holidays, (*fêtes d'obligation.*)

*Regulations for Steam Vessels and their Barges in the delivery of
their cargoes.*

1. The Masters or Agents of steam vessels and their attending barges, having on board merchandize of any description, shall give notice in writing of their arrival in port, to the Consignee or Consignees of such merchandize, at his or their office or usual place of business, one hour before beginning to unload; and in case of being loaded with grain, salt in bulk, or coals, six hours notice shall be given.

2. Steam vessels and their barges as aforesaid, arriving during the night, or early in the morning, shall not begin to discharge their cargoes before seven o'clock, A. M. from the opening of the navigation to the first day of October, nor before eight o'clock, A. M. from the first day of October to the close of the navigation; and no merchandize of any description shall be landed after seven o'clock, P. M. from the opening of the navigation to the first day of October, nor after five o'clock, P. M. from the first day of October to the close of the navigation; unless with the consent of the Consignee or Consignees.

3. Steam vessels and their barges arriving late in the morning, and partly unloaded during the day, may recommence delivering on the following morning, at six o'clock, from the opening of the navigation till the first day of October, and at seven o'clock from the

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first day of October to the close of the navigation; and those which arrive in the evening, and give the prescribed notice, may commence delivering on the following morning, at the same hours as last mentioned.

4. The Proprietors or Agents of steam vessels and their barges, shall provide suitable storage for such merchandize, as may be consigned to persons not resident in Montreal, or which may not be called for by the Consignees in due time, at the risk and expense of such Consignees. They shall take particular care of small packages and parcels, as being most liable to be lost or mislaid; and for all merchandize thus stored, they shall be entitled to the usual charges for receiving, delivering and storage.

5. Dry goods and other merchandize, subject to be damaged by water, shall not be discharged during rain, or at any time laid down in the mud.

6. The Masters and Pursers of steam vessels and their barges shall be particularly careful of all letters and parcels addressed to Consignees of goods on board, and cause them to be delivered on arrival; and their delivery shall be accompanied by an intimation of the hour at which the landing of the cargo is to commence.

7. The Consignees of goods on board of steam vessels and their barges, shall not be obliged to receive their goods on holidays, otherwise called *fêtes d'obligation*.

8. In case of any dispute as to the quantity or number of articles shipped on board of steam vessels or their barges, a person may be put on board by the Shippers, who shall be allowed one dollar for each day, and the party in error shall pay the same, together with his passage money, including board.

9. No damage shall be recovered on perishable articles, contained in crates or slight packages, unless the description of the goods be set forth in the bill of lading.

10. No parcels of specie, notes, or bullion, shall be at the risk of the Proprietors or Agents, unless the freight be paid for them when put in charge.

Regulations relative to Durham Boats, Bateaux, and other small craft, arriving by internal navigation at the port of Montreal, with merchandize from the interior.

1. The freight of goods brought from the interior to the port of Montreal, is payable at the current rates, when no agreement exists to the contrary, on delivery of property in good order.

2. Package goods are to be delivered in good order, or to be put into that state at the expense of the Carrier.

3. Goods brought from the interior to the port of Montreal, are delivered on the wharves in fine weather only, between the hours of six, A. M. and seven, P. M. from the opening of the navigation to the thirty-first day of August inclusive, and between the hours of seven, A. M. and six, P. M. from the first day of September to the

close of the navigation. And it is incumbent on the Carrier to notify the Consignee of the arrival of the goods, and to cause to be left at his usual place of business, letters of advice accompanying the property or particulars thereof. In the case of wheat in bulk or in bags, a sample thereof to be left with the notice of its arrival.

4. The Consignee is bound to attend in person or by his agent, to receive his goods at the beach; and if he neglect to do so for three hours after notice of their arrival in port, *provided the notice be given at or before three o'clock in the afternoon*, it will be optional with the Carrier to land and store the goods, subject to the expense actually incurred, or to retain them at the rates of demurrage hereafter provided for; in either case the property will be liable to the Carrier for the charges so incurred; but no delivery of the goods sooner than three hours after notice given to the Consignee of the actual arrival thereof in port, or without the limits of the port, unless authorised by the Consignees, shall exonerate the Carrier; neither shall the Consignees be required to receive goods arriving in port after three o'clock of the afternoon, until the following morning at nine o'clock, and ten o'clock for grain in bulk, and the expense of storage and cartage, in the case of goods landed by the Carrier, shall not exceed the tariff rates.

5. The rates of demurrage referred to in the preceding article shall not exceed seven shillings and sixpence per hour, between the hours of six, A. M. and seven, A. M. and twenty shillings for the whole time between seven, P. M. and six, A. M. in the case of a Durham-boat, nor three shillings and ninepence per hour between the hours of six, A. M. and seven, P. M. or ten shillings for the whole period between the hours of seven, P. M. and six, A. M. in the case of a Batteau or Barge; provided that no boat arriving after twelve o'clock shall be entitled to demurrage for the first night, but only for the business hours after the expiration of the usual notice.

6. In all cases it is incumbent on the Carrier to deliver property from the port on the beach or wharves, and in the instance of wheat, he is bound to weigh or measure the same, according as the same may have been originally shipped by weight or measure, for the purpose of verifying the account.

7. Consignees are not bound to receive goods on holidays, (*fêtes d'obligation*).

1st. The said Rates are for the whole distance from Lachine to Montreal (9 miles,) and so in proportion for each mile of the distance that Goods, &c. may be transported on the Canal, but all Boats, Scows, Vessels or Rafts, loading or unloading, below Lock No. 4, whether in ascending or descending, shall pay the same as if they pass through all the Locks. A fraction of a mile shall be deemed a whole mile. A fraction of a ton in the measurement of a boat or vessel, shall be taken according to the number of quarters of a ton therein. A fraction of a quarter of a ton shall be deemed a whole quarter. Timber, Boards, Plank and Scantling in Rafts, to be calculated by the quantity of feet; no quantity under 25 feet shall pay less than for 25. Boats and Scows laden solely with Firewood or other Timber, having passed down the Canal and paid the rates, are exempted from toll in ascending, if unladen and empty. Boats, &c. having descended by the River are subject in ascending the Canal to pay one-third more than the above rates of toll. Square-rigged or other Vessels from sea, Schooners, Sloops, Steamers, Barges, Boats, Scows or Vessels of any kind, and Rafts and Cribbs, not using the Canal, are prohibited from entering that part of the Canal below Lock No. 7, or using the Canal Wharf below the said Lock, in order to leave the same free for the use of such Vessels, &c. as navigate upon the Canal.

2d. Conductors must be provided with a manifest or list of the packages or pieces comprising the cargo of each Boat, Vessel or Scow under their charge, distinguishing the species thereof; and also

the measurement, if the toll thereon be so payable. The toll on Merchandize being fixed by the ton, the weight must be marked on each package, whereof the rate is not specifically provided for in the Tariff.

3d. If the Collector sees good reason to doubt the correctness of the manifest or list, the cargo may be unloaded and examined; if found incorrect, the expense shall be paid by the owner or conductor of the Boat, Vessel or Scow; if correct to be reloaded at the expense of the Canal.

4th. Boats, &c. shall be detained until the tolls are paid, and the same power of detention is given, if any damage is done by persons navigating Boats, &c. or being passengers therein.

5th. Horses employed in towing must not be driven at any pace but a walk. Boats, Vessels and Scows meeting others in the Canal, those coming down shall keep the side next the tow-path, and those going up give way so as to allow of the others passing over the tow-rope.

6th. Cribs, Boats, Scows or Vessels of any kind meeting under any Bridge shall pass in succession, the first that reaches the Bridge passing first, and they shall pass through the Locks in the same order and agreeably to the directions of the Lock-keeper.

7th. Cribs or Timber, when overtaken by Boats, Scows or other vessels, must give way thereto, and sheer off to the side opposite to the towing path, so that such Boats, Scows, or other vessels may pass; and there shall be with all Cribs, Timber, Boats, Scows or other vessels, a sufficient number of men for the due management thereof.

8th. No Timber of any kind whatever shall be allowed to be drawn up the banks of the Canal, or to lie over the sides thereof.

9th. No Cribs of Timber, Boats, Scows or other vessels shall be admitted into the Canal unless they are in good order, and they must proceed immediately to their place of destination without stopping.

10th. The entrances of the Canal at Lachine and Montreal must not be obstructed under any pretence whatever; and all Boats, Scows or other vessels therein, must be ranged in conformity to the directions of the Commissioners, or the Superintendant or Overseer, whom they may appoint.

11th. Boats, Scows or other vessels, or Cribs of Timber, waiting either above or below the locks at the Windmills (Nos. 5, 6 and 7,) must remain on the south-east side of the Canal, so as to leave the other side free for the convenience of loading and unloading.

12th. No Cribs of Timber or Boats, Scows or vessels of any kind shall remain in the Canal, except during the time of loading and unloading, or passing up and down; if detained, however, by unavoidable circumstances, they shall not remain along the wharves without the special permission of the Commissioners or their Superintendant, and they must be placed in conformity to their or his directions.

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13th. No Crib, Boats, Scows or other vessels, not in immediate employ, shall be allowed to remain in the Canal, or in any basin of the Canal, without the special permission of the Commissioners.

14th. No Boats, Scows or vessels of any kind, shall be allowed to be drawn up the banks or slips of the Canal, without the special permission of the Commissioners being first obtained.

15th. No Crib, Boats, Scows or vessels of any kind, shall be left in the Canal, either afloat, sunk or otherwise; and in the fall of the year, at the close of the navigation, none shall remain in the Canal, without the special permission of the Commissioners.

16th. Persons employing Boats, Scows or vessels of any kind, are prohibited, in cleaning them, from throwing chips, dirt, rubbish or filth, into the Canal, and from allowing any timber or firewood to remain in the Canal, either sunk or afloat.

17th. No Merchandize or effects, or wood of any kind, and particularly Cordwood, shall remain on the barks or wharves of the Canal, longer than forty-eight hours; and at the wharf below the river lock, near the Windmills, no Cordwood shall, on any account, be landed between the said lock, and a distance of about forty feet below the second crane.

18th. No Crib, Boats, Scows or vessels of any kind, which have passed through the Canal, shall remain near the wharf, below the river lock, longer than a sufficient time to unload, and to take in their loading at the same place.

19th. The regular hours for the working of the locks, shall be as follows:—From the first of May to the first of September, from four o'clock, A. M. to eight o'clock, P. M.; and at the seasons preceding or succeeding those dates respectively, from day-light until dusk of evening.

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REGULATIONS

RESPECTING THE TOWAGE OF VESSELS.

Any vessel taking the boat at any intermediate distance between Quebec and the church at Batiscan, will pay the full towage, as if towed from Quebec. If taken in tow between Batiscan church and the wharf at Three-Rivers, to pay three-fourths of the full towage. If taken in tow between the wharf at Three-Rivers and Sorel, to pay two-thirds of the full towage. If taken in tow between Sorel and the Church at Pointe-aux-Trembles, to pay one half of the full towage; and from the church at Pointe-aux-Trembles, or any intermediate place above the said Pointe, to Montreal, to pay one-third the full towage. It being understood that when towage is engaged for vessels at Quebec, as they have a preference over others, the full towage to be paid for, whether the whole, or part, or none of the towing is performed,—the deduction made, referring only to vessels for which towage has not been previously engaged at Quebec.

Passengers on board vessels taken in tow, to pay one half the steamboat Steerage rates.

Masters of vessels to furnish tow lines and hawsers.

Not less than nine feet to be charged as draft water.

The greatest draft of water to be taken as measurement.

Should the masters of the boats, from any just reason, deem it necessary to cast off a vessel, no deduction to be made on the towage, provided they are retaken by the first opportunity.

Vessels towed from Montreal; or any place above Sorel, to Three Rivers, to be charged three-fourths of the towage to Quebec, and from Three-Rivers, and above Port-Neuf, to be charged half towage.

All pilotage to be paid by the masters or consignees.

In the event of any vessel grounding, when in tow, in consequence of being too deeply laden, or from the fault of the ship's pilot, the detention to be paid for, also the tariff rate for freight taken out.

The proprietors will not hold themselves liable for any damage that may be done to vessels or their warps, either in taking in tow, towing, or casting them off.

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REGULATIONS RESPECTING CARTERS,

FOR THE CITY OF MONTREAL,

As agreed to by the Magistrates, in Quarter Sessions, on the 19th July, 1822, and amended on the 29th October, 1831.

1.—No person whatever shall transport from one part of the town or suburbs to another, for any reward or sum of money, without being duly licenced to that effect, under a penalty of twenty shillings for each offence.

2.—Every person who may wish to be a Carter, shall apply to a Weekly or Special Sessions of the Peace, held in Montreal, and shall produce a written recommendation of his moral and good conduct, as well as his ability to exercise such trade, and the sitting Magistrates, if they deem it proper, shall then grant him a licence to exercise the said trade. This licence to be made out and signed by the Clerk of the Peace, who shall be held, on the delivery of such licence to each Carter, to furnish him with a certified copy of all the regulations in force and regarding Carters, and all such Carters refusing or neglecting to take such copy, shall incur a penalty of twenty shillings. All persons having licences as Carters, or who may obtain them at any further period, shall be held to make their application before the first of May, to a Weekly or Special Court of Session to obtain a renewal of their licence; and then and there an enquiry into their capacity and moral conduct shall be made by the said Court, having power to reject or grant the said application according as it shall think proper. No licence granted prior to the first of May shall have effect after the first day of May following.

3.—Every Carter, as soon as he has obtained a licence, shall present it to the Clerks of the Markets, and he shall not exercise his trade and make use of any carriage without having received from them a number for each of his carriages; and until such number shall have been affixed by such Clerks of the Markets upon each carriage, and upon such part of the carriage as they shall deem best and most easily seen, under a penalty of twenty shillings. The Clerks of the Markets shall be held to mention in their return to the Clerk of the Peace in conformity to Article 4, the kind of carriage to which they have affixed each number.

4.—Upon the exhibition of a Carter's licence, the Clerks of the Markets shall insert the Carter's name in a book kept for that purpose, shall give him a number for each of his carriages, and also insert these numbers in the same book, and the kind of carriage on which such number shall have been fixed, and shall transmit a certified copy of every entry therein, to the office of the Clerk of the Peace, within twenty-four hours after it has been made, for the inspection of every individual, access thereto being *gratis*; it shall also be the duty of the Clerk of the Peace to keep a Register containing the names of the licenced Carters, their residence, and the numbers they have obtained for each of their carriages, according to the report from the Clerks of the Markets.

5.—No Carter shall make use of any tumbrel that shall contain

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less than two hogsheads; and that shall not have been measured by one of the Clerks of the Markets, and who shall not have obtained a certificate of such measurement, under a penalty of twenty shillings for each offence. The Clerks of the Markets shall be held to furnish such certificate without delay, and shall make an entry thereof in their book.

6.—Any Carter, not then employed, shall be held to accommodate the first person who may offer him employment, under a penalty of twenty shillings; and from the 1st of June until the 1st of December of each year, the Carters shall have their stand on the *Greve*, or in any other place marked out by the Magistrates at a Special Session, under the aforesaid penalty; and if any hired servant incur any of the aforesaid penalties, such penalty shall be paid by the owner of the horse and carriage.

7.—Any load, delivered on St. Paul's Street, shall be delivered, if it is required, in the yard, cellar, or store within the depth of any house situated on the said street, although such yard, cellar, or store may be in any of the streets which run to St. Paul's Street beyond the same, provided that the carriage so loaded can go to such yard, cellar, or shop. The same rate or charge shall be exacted for the carriage of all merchandize or other effects taken from all parts of the city or suburbs and placed at the water's edge. And whereas there have arisen differences concerning the charges to be made for articles of considerable weight, it is ordered that the rate of cartage for such articles that may weigh more than ten hundred weight, and that shall not exceed fifteen hundred weight, shall be charged as two loads; above fifteen hundred weight and not exceeding eighteen, as much as for three loads; above eighteen hundred weight, and not exceeding one ton, as much as for four loads.

8.—Every Carter who, having only one horse upon his carriage, shall take from the *Greve* or shore of the River in one load more than two barrels of ashes, or four barrels of pork, or five barrels of flour, shall not demand a higher rate than that allowed by the Tariff for one of two barrels of ashes, of four barrels of pork, or five barrels of flour.

9.—The Carters and those employed by them for cartage, shall be able-bodied men, and each capable of loading and unloading their carriage; they shall be provided with good horses as well as substantial carriages and harnesses; they shall not ride their horses, nor stand in their carts when loaded, except when carting grain of all kinds and salt; but when carting any other articles and goods, the Carters shall lead their horses with care, making them walk only, and holding the reins in their hands, under the penalty of twenty shillings.

10.—It is ordered, that no Carter shall stand, at any time, upon the Markets or in the Streets, with their carriages when not employed, under a penalty of twenty shillings.

11.—Any Carter, who shall refuse to transport anything at the rate laid down in the Tariff, or who shall ask more than is allowed him therein, shall incur a penalty of twenty shillings for each offence; and there shall be affixed by the Clerks of the Markets a copy, in English and French, of the Tariff in each of the Houses for weighing, and upon each of the Markets, for general inspection.

Coin, Bullion, Diamonds, Horses, Mules, Asses, Neat Cattle, and all other live stock, Tallow, Raw Hides, Rice, Corn, Grain unground, Biscuit or Bread, Meal or Flour, Fresh Meat, Fresh Fish, Carriages of travellers, Wheat Flour, Beef, Pork, Hams, Bacon, Wood and Lumber, Hay and Straw, Fruit and Vegetables, fresh; Salt, Cotton Wool, Goods, the produce of places within the British Dominions, imported from those places, or from the United Kingdom; Herrings, taken and cured by the inhabitants of the Isle of Man, and imported from thence; Lumber, the produce of, and imported from any British possession on the west coast of Africa; any sort of Craft, Food and Victuals, except Spirits, and any sort of Clothing and Implements and Mate-

rials, fit and necessary for the British Fisheries in America, imported into the place at or from whence such Fishery is carried on; Drugs, Gums or Resins, Dyewood and Hardwood, Cabinet-makers' Wood, Tortoise-shell, Hemp, Flax and Tow.

And if imported direct from the warehouse in the United Kingdom.

Seeds, Wheat Flour, Fruits, Pickles, Woods of all sorts, Oakum, Pitch, Tar, Turpentine, Ochres, Brimstone, Sulphur, Vegetable Oils, Burrstones, Dog Stones, Hops, Cork, Sago, Tapioca, Wax, Sponge, Sausages, Cheese, Cider, Spices, Tallow; and all goods imported from the United Kingdom, after having there paid the duties of consumption, and being exported from thence without drawback.

TABLE OF PROHIBITIONS AND RESTRICTIONS.

Gunpowder, Arms, Amunitions or Utensils of War, prohibited to be imported, except from the United Kingdom, or from some other British possession.

Fish, dried or salted, Oil, Blubber, Fins, or Skins, the produce of creatures living in the sea, prohibited to be imported, except from the United Kingdom, or from some other British possession, or unless taken by British ships fitted out from the United Kingdom, or from some British possession, and brought in from the fishery, and except herrings from the Isle of Man, taken and cured by the inhabitants thereof.

Coffee, Sugar, Molasses, Rum, being of foreign production, prohibited to be imported into any of the British possessions on the continent of South America or in the West Indies, (the Bahama and Bermuda Islands not included,) except to be warehoused for exportation only; and may also be prohibited to be imported into the Bahama and Bermuda Islands, by Her Majesty's Order in Council.

Base or Counterfeit Coin, Books, such as are prohibited to be imported into the United Kingdom—prohibited to be imported.

And if any goods shall be imported or brought into any of the British possessions in America, contrary to any of the prohibitions or restrictions mentioned in such table in respect of such goods, the same shall be forfeited; and if the ship or vessel in which such goods shall be imported be of less burden than seventy tons, such ship or vessel shall also be forfeited.

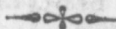

NEW LIGHTS ON SCATARIE AND ST. PAUL'S ISLANDS,

From late surveys by Capt. Nott, of H. M. Steamer Medea.

The Light House upon Scatarie is placed on the north eastern extreme of the Island, and can be seen from a southward or seaward position, and without interruption from any high land, until the compass bearing becomes to the eastward of N. E. by N. when it will be speedily obscured, and any vessel so placed on that side of the island, is in danger of the rocks of Scatarie, or the southern shores of Cape Breton Island.

From any position to the northward, or in the Gulf of St. Lawrence, the light can be seen while the distance admits, but when it bears to the eastward of S. E. a ship is in danger of the N. E. shores of Cape Breton—therefore, as a present rule, whereby due warning may be obtained, the light house should never be brought to bear to the eastward of N. N. E. or S. E. by S. by compass, nor yet to approach nearer than one and a half to two miles.

There are two light houses on the Island of St. Paul, one on the extreme northern, the other on the extreme southern points of the island, and one of which will be always open until a ship is on the rocks near the centre.

The northern light can be seen to the southward on any bearing, except between N. by E. and E. by N. when it is obscured by the hills to the southward of it.

The southern light can be seen from the northward on any bearing, except between S. S. E. and W. when that is obscured by hills to the northward of it, and, when clear, either light can be seen for six leagues.

The chosen positions of these two light-houses appear to be admirably calculated for the purpose of facilitating the navigation of the St. Lawrence, as one light will be always open, and either can be passed within a mile.

The bearings are only such an approximation as could be obtained without the aid of lights, but they are quite sufficient, if attended to, to guide a ship clear of danger.
