modest edifice, its tall and graceful spire  
raising its fair outlines hundreds of feet  
into the azure blue of the heavens above.  
The Church and cemetery attached is sur-  
rounded by a neat iron railing, and within  
this sacred and consecrated ground, many of  
the illustrious dead are sleeping their last sleep,  
in the long and gloomy night of the cold  
and silent tomb. The church in question  
is situated in one of the busiest portions  
of New York, nearly opposite Wall street,

markets of trade and commerce that abound  
in that portion of the city. We have  
reached the extreme end of the street at  
last, wiping the perspiration from our  
brow, we seek the refreshing shade of a  
friendly elm in "Castle Garden," watching  
the leads and vessels of every mould  
either in motion or riding gently and  
securely at anchor on the calm, unrippled  
surface of the water. The cars and less-  
notives of the "Elevated Railway"  
thundering above our heads, but amid all  
this bustle and excitement the thought of  
what these grounds were and what they  
are at the present time, forces itself upon  
us, and our weak imagination cannot avoid  
conjuring up many probable scenes that  
have so often transpired in the days gone  
by on this little tract of ground, with its  
well swept walks, its carefully tended  
towers, and the green sward around it; it  
will certainly impress the visitor with the  
fact that a great deal of care and attention is  
devoted to it by those in power. For  
there it was that so many emigrants first

**A RAMBLE AFTER THE FIRE.**  
BY NOW AND THEN.

The Bollandists and the Library.  
In 1607 a Jesuit of Antwerp, Hieronymus  
Bollandus, says the *Illustre Catholicum*  
Annuaire for 1878, conceived the design  
of collecting and publishing the lives of all  
the saints in the Roman calendar. The  
design being approved of by the ecclesiasti-  
cal authorities, John Bolland (for Bol-  
landus), a learned Jesuit, born in Lin-  
burg, or Brabant, in 1565, was selected  
to carry it out. The plan proposed was  
to take up the saints in the chronological  
order of the calendar, and the work was  
entitled *Acta Sanctorum*. The first two  
volumes, treating of the January saints,  
were published in 1643, and the February  
saints, in three volumes, in 1651. Bolland  
did not live to finish the March saints,  
dying September 12th, 1665. Other  
writers (designated as Bollandists) have  
been appointed from time to time to con-  
tinue the work, there having been sixty-  
four volumes issued to the present time  
(the new edition is published by Victor  
Palmyre of Paris; each volume being  
five copies only of each volume being  
printed). The following account of a visit  
to the library of the Bollandists in Brus-  
sels will interest our readers:  
Early in the morning I walked into the  
College and asked to see a Bollandist. I  
had the satisfaction of conversing with  
one of the latest of the long line of liter-  
ary men who have perpetuated for two  
centuries and a half the name and the  
immense work of Bolland, their founder.  
Pere Jean de Buck, with engaging politeness,  
permitted me to put a hundred  
questions to him, and replied to them with  
patience and ample knowledge. Finding  
Pere de Buck so accessible, I made bold  
to ask permission to walk through the li-  
brary. We traversed one or two inner  
corridors, and, mounting a staircase, were  
at the door. The hall we entered estimat-  
ed, at rough guess, at about 50 or 60  
feet long, 20 feet in width, and some 12  
in height, is filled from top to bottom, as I  
round, with printed lives of saints, in  
volumes of many various sizes, bindings,  
and languages. The volume, or calli-  
graph, so familiar in foreign collections of  
books, decidedly predominated in the  
bindings. Here I was shown, among other  
possessions, the handsome quarto volume  
of Scotch saints, lives edited by the Bishop  
of Brechin. In the whole library there  
is a very few Yocka, indeed, that  
belonging to the establishment in its  
anti-Revolutionary days. The present collec-  
tion is nearly altogether the work of the  
New Bollandists, as they are called, formed  
in 1817 by purchase, and in many in-  
stances partly also by gift, from authors  
and editors who decline to assist so dis-  
tinguished an undertaking. The present  
collection can not amount to fewer than  
20,000 volumes. As regular manuscripts  
of the early Bollandists were rich indeed,  
when their "mass" was broken up in  
1794, the papers of Longlet concealed a  
number of these invaluable treasures.  
They were purchased many years after-  
wards by the Government of Holland,  
and the best of them are now preserved  
in the Royal Library at Brussels. These  
manuscripts are the models of which the  
lives of the saints remaining in the  
last two months of the year of Bollandus  
were constructed. The same may be said  
of Bollandists have still before them may  
be estimated from this fact, that at the re-  
sumption of their work in 1828 they printed  
a catalogue of saints still outstanding,  
amounting in round numbers to six or seven  
of 4,000. It may be doubted, even if the  
work now advances without interruption,  
whether the year A. D. 2000 will witness  
the completion. Indeed, it is difficult to  
see how it can ever be entirely finished.  
Every new century lays claim to new  
saints in the Latin Communities. The  
Bollandists have not been able to regard  
as a institution destined to be perma-  
nent as the Latin Communities, itself. But  
I must describe the other portions of the  
library. A second hall, at right angles to  
the first, and of similar dimensions, is,  
in like manner, filled with printed vol-  
umes of ecclesiastical and civil history,  
local works illustrating diocesan, parochial,  
and liturgical works in many lan-  
guages. These are arranged according to their  
nationality. Germany, Spain, and Italy have  
each a vast extent of wall-space. Great  
Britain makes no inconsiderable figure.  
Here I was shown the Rolls Series of  
State Papers, presented to the library by  
the British Government. A list of the  
late Pere Matagne informs this hall. A  
smaller wing of the building contains a  
collection of theological works of reference,  
and another chamber is filled with  
lexicons, miscellanea, martyrologies,  
and liturgical works in many lan-  
guages, several of them Oriental. It will  
be readily understood from the character  
of the library, that the lives published here  
are something more than mere biographies  
of good men. They often involve dis-  
cussion regarding points in history, in  
chronology, in local nomenclature, in  
genealogy, in the manners and customs  
of various periods and centuries. Hence  
the strong claims of the undertaking on  
general interest. The philosopher and the  
archaeologist alike have many subjects in  
common with it. Its collection are a  
teeming storehouse of facts for the histo-  
rian. To the ordinary reader, devoid of a  
taste for Latin fables in double columns,  
they are a sea of words, and a mass of  
conspicuous facts, but of this kind is long.  
It is here filled his place with another  
component part, illustrating the power of  
systematic and orderly combination. Life
