





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HOW SUFFRAGETTES ARE TREATED IN JAIL

Physicians Declare Stomach Pump Treatment is Injurious to Health.

London, Oct. 28.—Queer things are eaking out concerning the treatment of the suffragettes undergoing terms of imprisonment in English jails for attempting to force the government into according them the franchise on equal terms with men.

Of the suffragette workers there are always a number in prison in London, Liverpool, Manchester, Birmingham other important cities. 


