Many valuable discoveries have already been made through the exertions of this company.

The Disceopie. By the aid of the disceopie, an ingenious instrument he sought to public notice during the Parisian Electrical Congress, persons of the drama will henceforth be able to see as well as hear their favorite comic and historic artists without moving a yard from home. The apparatus consists of a small 'objective' lens fixed in a position commanding the stage at some theatre, and connected by an electric wire with a diminutive white plate which may be framed and ever distant from the play-house in question. Total darkness having been obtained in the room furnished with a disceopie, a perfect picture of the stage, its scenery, actors, and so forth, faithful in color and absolutely reproducing the whole performance, will become visible upon the surface of the glass plate. Supplementing by a telephone communicating with the theatre, the disceopie will therefore enable its owner to spend his evenings at the opera in dressing gown and slippers, seated at home in any chair.

Brides' Veils and Orange Blossoms. It is a common superstition, especially in Ireland, that a marriage lacks vitality unless solemnized with a gold ring. A person who at the southeast wedding-ring ceremony failed to purchase a ring, and was too poor to purchase a ring of the necessary precious metal, was about to be married, they obtained the loan of one, and paid a small fee for the same, the ring being returned to the owner immediately after the ceremony. In some places it is still customary for the same ring to be used for many marriages, for which purpose it remains in the custody of the priest.

Origin of the Names in the Week. In the museum at Berlin, in the hall devoted to Northern antiquities, they have the representations of the idols from which the names of the days of our week are derived. From the idol of the Sun comes Sunday. This idol is represented with his face like the sun, holding a burning wheel, with both hands on his breast, signifying his course round the world. The idol of the Moon, from which comes Monday, is habited in a short coat, like a man, but holding the same bowl in the hand, that is why comes Tuesday. It is one of the most ancient and popular gods of the Germans, and represented in his garments of skin, according to their peculiar manner of clothing at his worship. The week was dedicated to his worship, Woden, from which comes Wednesday. His image was prayed to Thursday. He seated in a bed, with twelve stars over his head, holding a sceptre in his hand. Friga, from whence we have Friday, is represented with a drawn sword in his right hand, and a bow in his left. Sater, from which is Saturday, has the appearance of perfect wretchedness; he is thin-visaged, long-haired, with a long beard. He carries a gail of water in his right hand, and a bunch of fruits and flowers in his left.

Signature of the Cross-Mark. The mark which persons who are unable to write are required to make instead of their signature, is in the form of a cross, and has long been in use. It has been followed by king and noble, is constantly referred to as an instance of the deplorable ignorance of ancient times. The signature is not, however, invariably of such ignominious origin. Antiquity has required to be attached to the signatures of those who could write, as well as to stand in the place of the signatures of those who could not write. In those times, if a man could write or even read, his knowledge was considered proof positive presumptive that he was in his proper orders. The word clericus, or clerk, was synonymous with penman, and the lay or people who were not clerks did not feel any urgent necessity for the use of letters. The ancient use of the cross was, therefore, universal alike by those who could and by those who could not write. It was, indeed, the symbol of an oath, for its holy associations, and generally the mark. On this account Mr. Charles Knight, in his notes to the 'Pictorial Shakespeare,' explains the expression of 'God save the mark' as a form of ejaculation approaching to the character of an oath.
