

ANTI-PROHIBITIONISTS MAKE BIG GAINS IN MAINE

Governor Cobb, Standing Almost Exclusively on Prohibition Platform, Elected by Plurality of Less than 8,000--Democratic Candidate Put Up Great Fight.

PORTLAND, Me., Sept. 10.—Governor Wm. T. Cobb, of Rockland, standing on a platform devoted almost exclusively to a continuance of the prohibition laws of the state, was re-elected today by a plurality of less than 8,000, with but few exceptions the smallest margin of votes ever given a Republican governor in the state of Maine.

More interesting from a national point of view was the re-election of Congressman Chas. E. Littlefield of the second district, by a greatly reduced plurality. Congressman Littlefield's candidacy was the subject of bitter opposition as the part of Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, who asked for his defeat on the ground that he voted against certain labor measures at the last session of congress.

Portland, Me., Sept. 10.—A tremendous vote throughout the state, heavy increases in the Democratic vote and the transfer of strongly Republican strongholds into the Democratic column characterized election day in this state today, and served for a time to give an impression of unexpected returns to the Democratic result of the gubernatorial contest.

Early in the day it became apparent that an unusually big vote was being cast in every city, town and plantation in the state, when the first returns were received in this city it was evident that surprises would be in store rather than the exception.

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FIRST EVIDENCE IN COLLINS CASE

Preliminary Examination Begun at Hopewell Cape Prisoner Detained by J. C. Sherren of Moncton—Is in Good Spirits and Does Not Seem Excited

(Special to the Sun.) HOPWELL CAPE, Sept. 10.—The preliminary examination of Thomas P. Collins, accused of the murder of Mary Ann McAulley, opened here at eleven o'clock this forenoon before Stipendiary Magistrate Daniel W. Stuart.

The prisoner was brought from the jail to the office of the clerk of the peace, M. B. Dixon, who appeared for the crown, and remained till one o'clock until the arrival of Premier Tweedie, who will conduct the examination.

The prisoner is defended by James C. Sherren of Moncton. The presence of counsel appeared to depress the prisoner with confidence, his lawyer and demeanor as he threaded his way through the crowd showing far more unconcern than when he first faced the magistrate a week ago.

There was scarcely a trace of embarrassment in his countenance, and he seemed perfectly self-possessed, smiling at the whispered remarks of his counsel in a matter which he had no information against the prisoner was read.

At half-past three Premier Tweedie arrived and the proceedings were resumed in the court house, which was filled with a large crowd, who manifested the greatest interest.

PROVINCIAL PREMIERS WILL MEET OCTOBER 8

Invitation Only Mentions Re-arrangement of the Provincial Subsidies as Matter for Discussion—Number of Other Matters Will Undoubtedly be Taken Up

(Special to the Sun.) OTTAWA, Ont., Sept. 10.—The invitation to the provincial premiers to meet the federal authorities at Ottawa, on October 8 only mentions the re-arrangement of the provincial subsidies as a matter for discussion. It is probable, however, that a number of other matters will be taken up at the conference.

There is, for instance, the question of agreeing to make no further reductions in the representation of Prince Edward Island, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick. Then there is the question of apportioning the seats of the Northwest Territories about Hudson and James Bay between Ontario, Manitoba and Saskatchewan so as to give each of these provinces access to salt water.

At the trial, the prisoner was coming out of Mrs. Leeman's house when I saw him. I told him I had seen no horse. We were talking some while between fifteen minutes and half an hour. It was the prisoner who detained me, and not me him. He walked off at an ordinary pace.

KELLOGG IS NOW UNDER ARREST. Charged With Getting Money Under False Pretenses. Claimed to be Agent of Canadian Government and Was Selling Wheat Lands at \$3 per Acre.

OTTAWA, Ont., Sept. 10.—The Canadian immigration authorities have secured the arrest in Indiana of a man named Kellogg, who has been using the reputation of Canadian lands for the purpose of obtaining money illegally. He posed as the agent of the Canadian Government and declared he had authority to sell Canadian wheat lands for three dollars and a half an acre. He said he would take parties of not more than thirty from town to town to see the lands and required \$50 in advance from each person to pay the expenses of the trip.

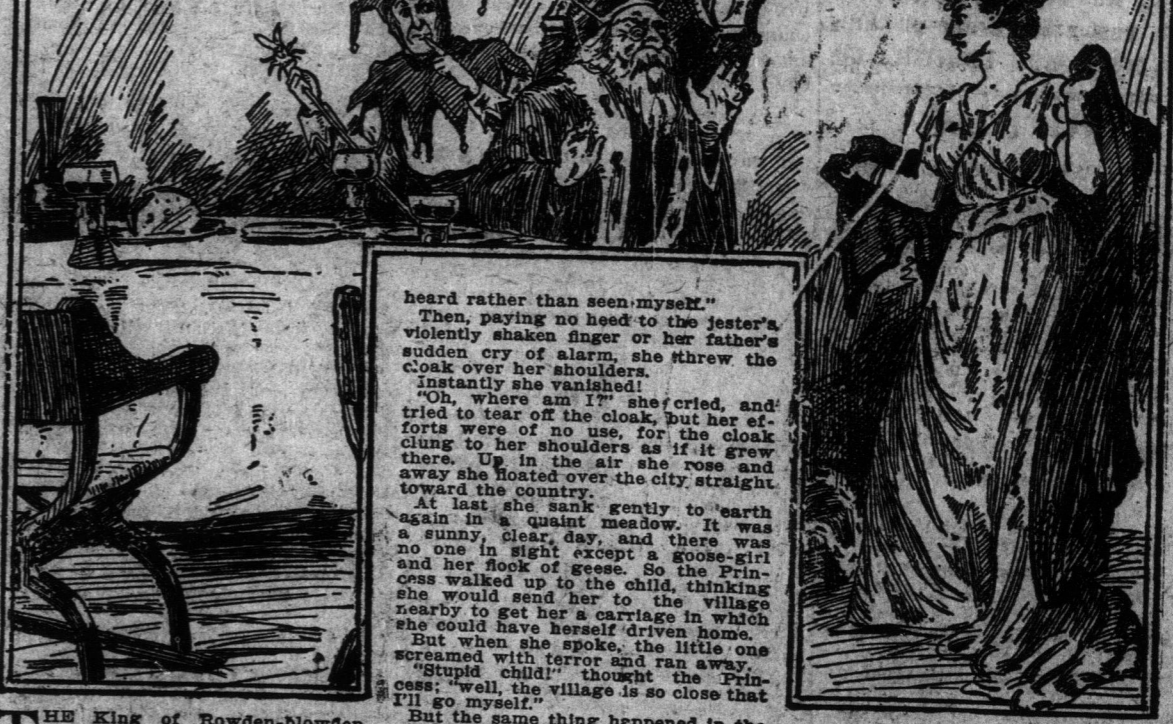

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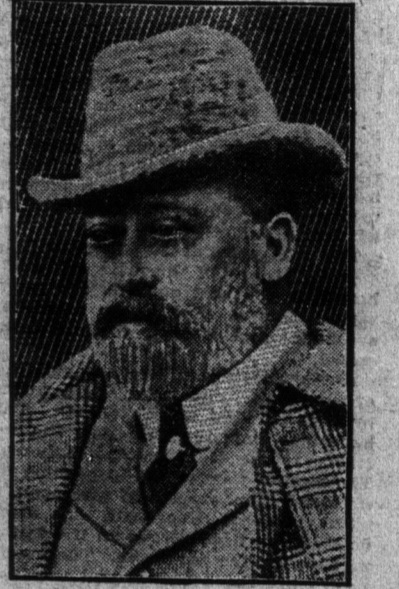
