Church Services and Stated Meetings.

Sabbath Services, morning at 11 a.m.; evening at 7 p. m. Sabbath School and Bible Class at at 3 p.m; quarterly Sermon to the young at 3 p.m. on the last Sabbath of March, June, September and December.

Weekly Prayer Meeting every Wednesday at 7.30 p.m., in winter, and 8 o'clock p.m in summer.

Communicant's Class every Monday at 8 o'clock p.m.

Sabbath School Teachers' Meeting every Thursday, at 8 o'clock, p.m

Stated Meetings of Session are held in the Session Room, on the first Tuesday of every month, at 7.30 p.m.

The Ordinance of Baptism is dispensed on the first Sabbath of every month, at the commencement of the morning service, and on the first Wednesday of every month, at the commencement of the prayer meeting.

The Ordinance of the Lord's Supper is dispensed on the first Sabbath of January, April, July and October.

A Preparatory Service on the Friday immediately preceding each of the said Sabbaths, at 7.30 p, m.

Special Collections for the poor are taken up on the FRIDAY EVENING and SABBATH MORNING, on every sacramental occasion, separate from, and unconnected with the envelope system.

The Executive Committee of the Missionary Association meets in Session Room, on the last Wednesday of every month at 7 p.m.

The Regular Meetings of the Sabbath School Association are held on the last Thursday of March, June, September and December at 7.30 p.m.

Stated Meetings of the Managers are held in their room on the second Monday of every month at 8 p. m. and in the church on the same evening at 7.30, for the purpose of allocating pews.

Knox Church Total Abstinence Society, Adult Branch, meets on the first Monday, and the Juvenile Branch every Monday afternoon.

Women's Missionary Society meets on the last Saturday of every month at 3 p.m.

The Annual Meeting of the congregation is held on the third Wednesday of January.

Members and Adherents leaving the church are requested to give notice to the managers, in order that their seats may be again allocated.

When members change their residence they should give notice either to the Pastor or the Elder of the district, otherwise they cannot reasonably expect to be visited or have their communion cards delivered.

FORTIETH ANNUAL REPORT
—OF THE—
Managing Committee of Knox Church.

In submitting their Annual Report the Committee of Management desire to return thanks to God for the measure of success that has attended their efforts in administering the temporal affairs of the Congregation during the past year.

Commencing the year with Floating Liabilities amounting to \$464.14 and an estimated expenditure of from \$800 \$1000 for repairs, reshingling the roof of the church and painting the outside woodwork, your Managers called for a special collection to pay off the Floating Liabilities, and received the sum of \$177.65 and in the month of October they again called for a special subscription to pay off the above mentioned repairs, and after calling upon each individual member they received the sum of \$254.25 which did not cover the cost of repairs done (which amounts to \$655.00, namely: reshingling, \$365, painting, \$290.00) by \$401.75.

The Managers are pleased to report that in the matter of repairs they have succeeded in getting sufficient work done to meet present wants and to render the church and manse property secure and respectable in appearance at a much smaller cost than was at first anticipated.

The Floating Debt this year amounts to \$252.98.

Your Managers have to note a reduction in the revenue of \$136.57 as compared with last year, though they had hoped for a different result from the number of subscribers, 283. We receive an average collection of 27 cents per Sabbath. The subscription per Sabbath for 1882 was \$77.07, while in 1883 it was \$76.43, being .54 less than in 1882. From these statements your Managers hope to receive a more hearty and

FORTY-SEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT

—OF—

Knox Church Sabbath School Association.

The Sabbath School Association have pleasure in presenting their Report for the past year as follows :

Number on the roll, boys, 167, girls, 211, total 378. Male teachers, 10, female teachers, 19. Office bearers, 7. Grand Total, 414. Average attendance, 309. The lowest attendance any day of the year was on December 23rd, 212 ; the highest, April 8th, 339.

Acting on the suggestion made in last year's report, the Library Committee early set about the duty of securing a new library for the school and on the 18th of February a collection of new and carefully selected books was opened for circulation, at a cost of one hundred and seventy dollars. It was also found necessary to procure a new library case, as the old one was no longer fit for use, and through the kindness of Mr. Wm. Gilespie, Mr. Edward McMenemy, and the Librarians, who performed the work gratuitously, the case was obtained for the bare cost of the material, \$6.55.

The Librarian reports that an average of 150 books are exchanged every Sabbath, which shows that they are much used ; and that in order to maintain the freshness and usefulness of the Library it will be necessary to make an addition to it of from 50 to 100 new volumes annually.

The quarterly services for the children have been of a varied character. The first in the year consisted of a very interesting address by the Rev. Mr. Tibb, on mission life and work in Manitoba and the North-west ; the second was a sermon by the Rev. Dr. James ; third, a general review of the quarter's lessons by Dr. James, Mr. Given and Mr. Riach ; fourth, a review by the teachers in their own classes.

The service of song continues to be led with much acceptance by Mr. James Johnson, but as many of the best hymns and tunes in our book are yet unknown to the children, arrangements have been made for a weekly practice, led by Mr. Johnson, part of the time to be occupied in giving elementary instruction in music and part in teaching the new

hymns and tunes, which, we believe, will greatly enhance the interest and profit of this most important part of Sabbath-school exercises.

The collections for both mission and general purposes show a gratifying increase over previous years as will be seen by the Treasurer's statement, and, encouraged by this, the Association has, after mature deliberation, resolved to use the means placed at its disposal for the benefit alike of both scholars and teachers and accordingly two papers have been selected from a large number of samples examined and one hundred and fifty copies of each ordered for next year, at a cost of \$52.50. The "Children's Messenger" for the younger children and the "Forward" for the older. It is confidently expected that the circulation of these excellent papers through the families connected with the school will be productive of the very best results and fully justify the action of the Association in spending so much on them.

A copy of the "Westminster Teacher," issued by the Presbyterian Board of Publication, Philadelphia, has also been ordered for each teacher, price, 50 cents.

The propriety of this step will, we are sure, commend itself to every reflecting mind as it must be apparent that whatever tends to increase the efficiency of the teachers must necessarily promote the best interests of the children committed to their care. No apology is therefore deemed necessary for appropriating the funds of the school for this purpose.

As an incentive to the more thorough and general study of the Shorter Catechism in the school, one of the teachers very generously placed at the disposal of the Association the sum of twenty-dollars, to be offered in prizes on such conditions as might be deemed best, a copy of "Patterson on the Shorter Catechism" to accompany each prize. Accordingly, a plan was laid before the school in the month of September and as a result six presented themselves for examination, all of whom have recited correctly the whole catechism, consisting of 107 questions and answers and have gained first prizes of three dollars each. The magnitude of this performance, we think, fairly entitles the youthful competitors to honorable mention and we therefore give their names: Bella Mitchell, Helen Gvin, Robert Herron; Alex. Dingwall, Edward Patterson and

John M. Givin. Prizes of bibles have also been offered by the same gentleman to the infant class for repeating correctly the ten commandments and twelve of the little ones have bravely earned and been rewarded with handsome copies of the Scriptures. The thanks of the Association are heartily tendered to our kind friend for the very practical manner in which he seeks to promote the welfare of the school.

During the year but one death has taken place in the school, that of Edwin Malcolmson, from Miss Alice Riach's class. The bereaved parents have our truest sympathies for their loss.

The school has suffered severely during the year by the removal, from various causes, of many of our most experienced teachers, for some of whom no substitutes could be found. A number of classes have, in consequence, been broken up and it is feared some of their members have left the school rather than be separated from their companions and united with other classes. The Association feels called upon to refer specially to the removal by death early in the year of Miss Annie Johnston, a most faithful and devoted teacher, whose memory will long be cherished both by her attached class and fellow-teachers; also to the removal from the city of Miss Annie McMenemy and Mr. James Riach, two of the oldest (in point of service) and most valued teachers in the school. Their labors in connection with their respective classes have borne good and abundant fruit and they may rest assured that they will carry to their new homes the grateful acknowledgments and the loving regards of their classes and co-laborers in the school.

The other teachers who have left during the year are Miss Johnston, Miss Fannie Moffat, Miss Lawson, Miss Minnie and Miss Hattie Riach, Mr. Wm. Thompson and Mr. John Gillespie, Librarian.

The following have been added: Miss Lizzie Doherty, Miss Annie Riddle, Miss Minnie McKean, Miss Morrison, Miss Mary Hyndman, Miss C. Smith, Miss Agnes Young, Mr. Andrew MacPherson and Mr. F. H. Ross; also Mr. Joseph Will and Mr. John Greig as Assistant Librarians.

The Association acknowledges with devout thankfulness to God the outward indications of prosperity in the school but would rejoice especially in the more important proofs of

spiritual blessing; ten of the advanced pupils having made a public profession of their faith in the Lord Jesus Christ by uniting with the church. For this object we have labored and prayed and with the tokens of our Divine Master's approval already received would feel encouraged to go forward in the work with increased zeal and activity, looking to Him for needed supplies of wisdom and grace and leaving to His all-wise disposal the results of our efforts for the salvation of those whom he tenderly loves and earnestly desires to have brought into His fold.

First Annual Report of the Women's Mission Society.

This society was organized in September, 1882. There are 28 members, 3 of whom are honorary. The Society meets on the first Tuesday of each month, when reports of the various mission schemes are read.

In connection with this society a “children's meeting” is held every Saturday afternoon, the children sewing or doing some useful work while some one of the ladies reads interesting accounts of work being done in the mission field.

“Mite boxes” were placed in the hands of many of the children, and in December a “Sale of Work” was held. The Society is pleased to report that the proceeds from these two sources amount to \$78.81. Of this \$75 was voted to the General Mission Fund of the church, but it is the intention of the Society to endeavor to support a native missionary in Formosa.

Knox Church Total Abstinence Society.

The Society, during the past year, has been carrying on its work in an energetic and, it is believed, profitable manner.

It was thought desirable, in order to make more of the members active workers, to depend on the talent in the Society for instruction and entertainment at the regular monthly meetings, and accordingly, very little outside help was sought during the year for that purpose. This has had a beneficial effect and greater interest is now taken by the members in general.

A request having been received from some of the prominent temperance men of the city that we send two delegates to a meeting called for the purpose of organizing a representative Temperance Association, Messrs. James Riach and Peter Foreman were chosen to represent the Society and have reported that the Association was duly organized and work begun.

The finances of the Society are in a good state, the balance as shown by the Treasurer's statement being \$5.93.

There are now enrolled 95 members, 46 males and 49 females.

The Society has, in the removal of Miss Annie McMenemy from the city, lost one of its most active workers, and desires to place on record its appreciation of the valuable assistance rendered by this lady during the past year.

Annual Report of the Juvenile Branch.

The interest taken by the children in their part of the Society's work has not abated.

The regular monthly meetings have been well attended, the entertainment being furnished by the children to a great extent, active workers being numerous amongs them; while instruction was given by the senior members in addresses, etc.

The Committee of Management thought it desirable, at their last meeting, to change the manner of conducting the meetings and passed a resolution to hold them in the afternoon instead of evening, and to mingle instruction with entertainment by means of temperance literature. This idea, it is hoped, if properly carried out, will impress on the minds of the children more effectually the meaning and benefit of the pledge they have signed.

The numbers on the roll have increased slightly, there being now 167 members, 85 boys and 82 girls.
