





Field Marshall Sir George Stuart White, governor of Chelsea Hospital, London's home for aged soldiers, and one of the most distinguished soldiers in the British army, died on June 24th in his 77th year. Sir George White, who was an Irishman, having been born in County Antrim in 1835, passed through a strenuous life as a soldier, fighting Britain's battles in all parts of the world. He went through the terrible hardships of the Indian Mutiny in 1857, as a young officer, taking part in many engagements with the Sepoys. 
