There is startling news from Lagos.—
The British fleet on the coast had bombarded and captured Porto Novo, killing 700 natives in the fight. It appears that some time since Mr. Foote, the British Consul, at Lagos, proceeded to Porto Novo in her Majesty's ship Brune, to demand of the King of that place, permission for the English to trade there. To this request the King ave a direct negative, and also consumenced to fire upon the vessel. He like-wise gave a Mr. Foote to understand that as a King he would extend his protection only to the Portuguese, (who are the life and sould of the save trade. Foreign Crops.—The Mark Lane Express of 10th inst, says:—Although the temperature of the past week has been much reduced, and some periods were rough and stormy, the showers that have fallen have been very serviceably to vegeta-tion. There is now a much better prospect of a good hay crop, and the quality of the grass is far beyond that of last year. More heat would have been well for the wheat, but it continued to improve; and all spring corn is much benefitted, especially beans and peas. The "general improvement, couaverage have given way fully 1s. per quarter, without, for the present, much prospect of reaction. Favourable reports prevail as to the crops in northern Europe, southern Russia, Spain and America; but France and Italy are exceptions, from the long absence of rain in sufficient quantities, Algeria, with its corn ready for the sickle, is suffering severely from heavy and continued showers. It now matters little, whether a man has been called in the past, a Liberal Conservative or a Protestant Reformer,but it matters much whether he be sincerely and frankly in favor of honest Governme and liberal measures, such as this great Province now stands in need of.

I shall refer briefly to a few points of present practical interest, and the course I would take in regard to these:

I am opposed to any further aid or subsidy to the Grand Trunk Railway. Such aid is sought, but it must be sternly refused and the connection that now subsists be tween the Government and the Road must

be terminated. The position of the Finances of the Country, is such as to cause the most serious aprehension to every right thinking man .-The public expenditure is most lavish, and rapidity. I advocate economy and retrenchnent. I am opposed in principle to the expenditure of public money, without the consent of the people expressed through their epresentatives in Parliament. I will support no administration that is not heartily in favor of the principles I enunciate, and that loes not conform their practice, to their pro fessions, in this regard.

I have always been in favor of Ottawa as the seat of Government, and I will resist to the utmost any attempt at rescinding what I regard as the wise decision of our Queen, in placing it there, because I believe that as well with a view to the present as the future Ottawa is the right place for the Capitol. I advocate a reduction of the present high

duties on Imports. These operate as a heavy tax on the consumer and afford Minstries the means of reckless expenditure.-I need not say that I stand by our union with Great Britain; enjoying self-government to the fullest extent. Protected by the power of Britain, our country possesses unequalled advantages.

I am in favor of the maintenance of the union between Upper and Lower Canada Separation now would be ruinous in its consequences, but the union must be made to work more pleasantly and means must be devised to secure this and to maintain the

rights of Upper Canada. The next four years will be eventful one in the history of Canada, we are passing through a crisis, and many exciting questions will arise and be disposed of ere you are again called to elect a representative. Should I be your choice I will endeavour to take an honest, independent course with regard to these-supporting those measures which l believe to be for the good of the county and opposing those which I consider dangerou

I am opposed to separate schools, because I believe them to be inimical to the true interests of the country, I am also opposed for the same reason to the locking up of Land in the hands of Lay or Ecclesiastical Corporations, a power which has already been grant

ed to a very large extent. In fine, one of yourselves-an Upper Ca nadian by birth and sentiment, born and ored in the County, attached to it by many ties, both of material interest, and persons friendship I regard it as home-ground.
