If this information is well-founded, the Dominion Government has reconsidered the question of holding an early election, which was at one time fully expected, and have determined to postpone a general appeal to the people till as late a date as possible. only fair that the incompleted voters' lists, which have been lying unrevised for over a year should be made ascorrect as, under the circumstances, is possible. The Liberals extracted the pledge from the Government, at last session of Parliament, that a new election would not be held till the much-neglected and ex-pen-ive lists were revised, but Conservative organs have represented that this promise would not be respected if it suited the convenience of the Administration. If these newspapapers represented Sir John Mac-donald correctly, the reason for delaying the general election lies in the fact that he is not yet prepared to trust his case to the electorate

But even though that is the condition of the Conservative leader there is no reason why the members of the Dominion Parliament should be inconvenienced by the late assembly of Parliament. Most of the M.P.s are dependent upon their everyday vocation for a living for their families. Probably a majority of them are engaged in agriculture or kindred pursuits, and the longer the imeeting of Parliament is delayed the greater will be their loss. It is an easy thing for some members to go to Ottawa at any season, of the year, but from the protests which we hear by Western members, we should imagine that by far the most convenient time for Parliament to meet is as soon as possible after the New Year. Then business men could reasonably expect to get back to their everyday duties before spring had far advanced. With the meeting delayed till March that would be a

clear impossibility.

-A few days ago, the cable reported that a peasant in Glogan, Silesia, had dis-covered a c cc for diphtheria which had been very successful, and had been commended by an expert sent by the Emperor of Germany to investigate it. Later particulars are to the effect that the cure is believed to be a mixture of extracts from two or three common weeds and an oil. The salve resulting from the mixture is liquefied, and applied with a brush to the interior of the throat. The remedy was first discovered by the peasant's father, a shepherd. It was applied by him only to external wounds. Once, when his youthful son's whole herd was dying of diphtheria, he, in despair of all other means began treating their throats with the salve. The favorable effect was apparent almost immediately, and in a few days every head of cattle was well again. Shortly afterward diphtheria became epidemic in the village. The peasant doctor was invariably called to give his remedy in the most severe cases, and almost without exception it was followed by recovery. Gradually its fame spread, till to-day he is receiving calls to cure persons of diphtheria all over Germany. The cures that have contributed most to his reputation were effected a few weeks ago in the family of the Freihers von Falkenhausen, in Bielau.





Christmas at the Asylum.

As usual a large amount of Christmas decoration is being done at this institution; in fact, almost completed. The spacious amusement hall is festooned with hundreds of yards of evergreen, woven together into wreaths for the purpose, swinging from beam to beam and draped from the gables at either end of the walls. This, with the addition of a number of flags, give the room a very lively and festive appearance. 
