WIPED OFF THE MAP

Montana Villages Swept Away by the Bursting of a Dam.

Helena, Montana, April 15. - The Black Eagle dam across the Missouri at Great Falls was today blown up with dynamite in order to prevent the destruction of the Boston and Montana smelter. This materially helped. A melting workman, name unknown, was drowned when the dam was dynamited, he being the second man to lose his life as a result of the flood.

The breaking of the first dam last night caused heavy damage. Craig. Montana, probably has been viped off the map although as far as s known, all of the 400 inhabitant. escaped. Cascade, a town of 400 pc ulation 69 miles from Helena and 21 miles south of Craig, is now under water, and in danger of being swept away. The river is thickly strewn with debris of ranch houses. Many animals are battling for their lives in the flood.







Dr. Merchant spoke on "Attention," pointing out that the teacher must fulfill conditions in which he is placed. The mind of the average child is naturally receptive. A Great Mistake. One of the greatest mistakes teach ers make is trying to substitute some process of their own for the natural They depend on what might be call-

ed the "cram" book, and the student goes away with his head filled with ome pages of words and definitions all of which he learns off by heart, often like a mere machine. When asked regarding them, he frequently mistakes one for the other, howing that he has a mistaken coneption of the subject.

A Danger. A teacher is liable to stop the growth of a child's mind by giving im a set idea of any one thing. Once he gets this set idea, he ease to investigate for new facts, having formed his conception of what the thing is. This is particularly likely to occur in grammar classes. Teachers frequently give a set definitions to a student.

The next teacher who takes the pupil has an entirely different set of definitions, and so on, as he progresses through the school. In the end the student's mind is a jumble of them all, and he knows his subject most imperfectly. Instead of doing all this, the teacher
