Chairman Philip Pocock, of the hydro-electric commission, frankly stated this morning that the option held by the M. C. R. was unknown to him until published in The Advertiser; that other plans for terminals must be made; that he thought it would be best to have terminals on Dundas street. In effect, his admission was that the whole electrification scheme must be altered and the cost greatly increased, and that for the present at any rate the whole thing was up in the air.

"I had no knowledge that the Michigan Central had an option on the London and Southeastern Railway. I had no reasons for going into gatter whatever, so I did not both I about it. DAVIES WAS FOUND GUILTY OF ASSAULT AND ROBBERY

Prisoner Was Remanded Until Tomorrow for Sentence-Evidence Appeared Conclusive That Davies Was the Man Who Robbed and Beat Wm. Wilkinson.

After being out for over an hour the jury in the case of the King against Joseph H. Davies returned a verdict of guilty on the charge of robbing, with assault. William Wilkinson, of \$180, on Nov. 16, on a farm near Crumlin. The prisoner was remanded for

sentence until morrow morning. The case was opened at nine o'clock this morning, and the jury did not retire until after twelve o'clock. The witnesses for the crown, eleven in number, were the tick. The complaint at the pre-Wilkinson, related the happenings of the day, which culminated in his being robbed of \$175. He stated that he was positive that the prisoner was his assailant, as he recognized the voice.

The Evidence. John B. Broughton, Wm. Young, and Mrs. Louisa Clipperton testified to the effect that they had seen Davis riding east on the Governor's road in the afternoon of the robbery. George A. Wenige stated that the prisoner had rented a bicycle from him on Nov. 15 with the express purpose of going to Crumlin, and stated that he, the prisoner, might not return un-

Monday following. J. E. Black swore that the prisoner had entered a store in East London late in the evening of the robbery, and had made some purchases. His clothes were torn and dirty, and when he left the store he proceeded in a westerly direction and had a bicycle.

Thomas Fox, a local pawnbroker, related how Davies had redeemed an overcoat and suit of clothes on the night of the robbery, and had also purchased a fur overcoat for \$22. The Monday following he had also made an exchange of watches and gave \$5 to boot. William Jefferson, at whose house Davies and his wife roomed, stated that the accused had not arrived home until late

in the evening.
Miss Besste Gillies and Sarah Sweet stated that Davies accomgoods from them the Monday tollowing the robbery.

John Hughes, the high constable of the county, gave evidence to the manner in which he had obtained the goods purchased by Davies and \$71 from Mrs. Davies.

No Defence Offered.

Mr. George S. Gibbons, for the defence, stated that the defence would not offer any witnesses, as he did not think the crown had presented a case on which his client could be found guilty. When the verdict was returned Judge Macbeth stated that the jury had brought in the only one possible. Court was then adjourned until 2 o'clock.

BORDEN'S IDEA IS WRONG STATES LORD BERESFORD; UNITS THE RIGHT PLAN

Famous British Admiral Says Scheme Leaves the Trade Routes Unprotected and Places British Isles in Danger of Starvation.

LAURIER CRUISER PLAN WITH STRONG BASES RIGHT IDEA

London Daily News Doubts Urgency Intimated in Borden's Speech, and Says Situation Is a Hazardous One-Fears Maintenance of Fleet in Canadian Waters Will Prove Very Costly.

New York, Dec. 6 .- A London cable says: Lord Charles Beresford apparently has foreseen grave dangers in the Borden idea, and says in the Daily Express this morning:

"What I recommended that the dominions do was to defend their end of the trade routes with strong naval bases, mines, torpedo boat destroyers and light cruisers. The trade routes are unprotected, and now our danger is starvation, not invasion. The country was deceived and fooled by statements regarding the Dreadnoughts of other nations. We were insulted by being told a Dreadnought could sink their whole fleets. The people speak of nothing but Dreadnoughts, quite forgetting that a fleet is composed of a variety of units, any one of which being defective or short, jeopardizes the whole."

DOUBTS THE URGENCY. Commenting on Premier Borden's naval speech, the Daily News doubts whether the urgency is so extreme, and fears that the political consequence will be very grave. It says:
"Unless there is a corresponding reduction in the British program of naval construction, Canada's gift will get to be a burden for the maintenance of the



"We are really masters of the situation. There is no cause for panic or alarm. In 1916 the proportion of our vessels will slightly increase. There is no possible development that can affect the situation in 1914, and as to any development that may arise 1915 or 1916 we shall be able to face it when we know what it is,"

No doubt Mr. Churchill and the other members of the British Government will profess to welcome the Canadian Government's gift-it would be impolitic not to make a show of gratitude; but Mr. Churchill cannot, unless he confesses that he deceived the Imperial Parliament five months ago, pretend that three new Dreadnoughts are anything but superfluous at the present time. Nothing has happened in the interval to call for an increase in the program laid down. The German "men-British Prime Minister says the relations between Great Britain and Germany are "excellent." The German Chancellor, only three days ago, declared that the two nations were working together in the Balkan situation with "mutual trust" and "most gratifying intimacy." As a matter of fact, the very memorandum of the admiralty read by Mr. Borden destroys the legend of a emergency or a crisis. The admiralty declares that "WITHOUT COURT-ING DANGER AT HOME, GREAT BRITAIN IS STILL ABLE TO SEND AN EFFECTIVE FLEET OF BAT-TLESHIPS AND CRUISERS TO THE PROTUCTION OF THE DOMIN-

Supporters of the Canadian Government who reply that the new Dreadneughts will be available for a Canadian navy, merely emphasize the insincere, illogical, makeshift nature of the arrangement. The creation of a Canadian navy would fall within the Government's definition of a "permanent policy," which it is pledged to submit to the people. If it contemplates such a policy it is evading its pledge by spending \$35,000,000 for this object without asking the country's consent. In order to avoid an appeal to the people it throws honor to the winds-or the waves. It trumps up an "emergency" on the other side of the Atlantic as a pretext for its cowardly refusal to do its duty at home. The Prime Minister who now sends Dreadnoughts, built with Canadian money, to the North Sea, is the man who three years ago at a Dominion Day dinner in old London

uttered these words: "Some feeling was created in the British Isles owing to the fact that Canada did not, by resolutio nr by speech from the Prime Minister, vouchsafe the offer of one, two or three Dreadnoughts. The resolution, in the form in which it was passed, while its terms might not upon the surface seem as significant at the moment as the offer of one or two Dreadnoughts would have been, laid down a permanent policy for the Dominion of Canada which would serve a more practical purpose than any such offer of Dreadnoughts."

Mr. Borden cannot reconcile that statement with his position today. The contrast between his utterance in 1909 and his action today is the measure of his perfidy in the interval. He boxed the compass and frimmed his sails to the gale of Nationalism, which swept over Quebec. Now he has driven on the shoals and rocks.

HOCKINS' METHODS WERE VIOLENT, SAYS GOVT.

Charged With Managing \$45,-000 Dynamiting "Job" at Springfield, Ohio.

[Canadian Press.]

Indianapolis, Ind., Dec. 6. — Violent methods of fighting non-union work, n which Herbert S. Hockin acted as an "advance agent" of McNamara's "dy-namiting squad," were charged by the Government in the cross-examination of Murray L. Pennell, Springfield, Ill., a defendant at the trial of the accused bomb plotters' today.

In connection with letters which Pennell, an official of the Iron Workers' Union at Springfield, wrote to John J. McNamara, the national secretary, the Government alleged that the inability of the local union officials to unionize a job was followed by an appeal for aid, and that a visit of Hockin to a

particular locality was followed by an xplosion. Pennell testified after he failed to mionize jobs in Springfield he wrote o McNamara: "Send Hockin as soon as possible," but he asserted he wanted Hockin as a national organizer, and not for dynamiting purposes. He said Hockin failed to appear, and on Feb. 15, 1911, he again appealed for Hockin McNamara replied to 'hope and wait, cautioning Pennell "to be more careful what you write to headquarters, f the Lord only knows who reads th mail that comes into this office!"



MARRIAGE LAWS IN FEDERAL TERRITORIES

Ministers of Justice Says Except Where Modified Law of England Rules.

of England Rules.

[Canadian Press.]
Ottawa, Dec. 5.—The Minister of Justice today gave his answers to the questions asked by J. H. Burnham, M. P. for West Peterboro, as to marriage laws in federal territory. Mr. Burnham asked:

"1. What portions of the Dominion of Canada are solely under federal control and jurisdiction?

"2. What are the laws with respect to marriage in these districts?"
Hon. Mr. Doherty replied:

"1. The territory which remains subject to the legislation of the Dominion, and not subject to any provincial powers, is comprised in the Northwest Territories and the Yukon Territory, being all that part of the Dominion not included within the boundaries of any province.

"2. The law affecting marriage in the Northwest Territories is the law of England as the same existed on July 15th, is 70, in so far as applicable and in so far as not repealed, altered, varied, modified or affected by any act of parliament of the United Kingdom or of the parliament of Canada, applicable to the territories or by any ordinance of the Northwest Territories.

"The law affecting marriage in the Yukon Territory is that which was in force in the Northwest Territories on June 13, 1898, in so far as applicable, and in so far as not repealed, abolished or altered by the parliament of Canada, or by any ordinance of the governor-incouncil or the commissioner-in-council under the provisions of the Yukon act."

HOUSE OF REFUGE REPORT ACCEPTED

Chairman Munro Freed of Any Charge of Overcharging or the Like.

THE HOSPITAL ACCOUNT

Matter Held Over For Further Information-A New Bridge at Miggiesex.

At the meeting of the county council yesteruay afternoon the itemized state-ment prepared by Chairman Munro, of the house of Refuge Committee, was accepted by the county, and thus Mr. Muhro was Heed from any charge of overcharging or useless expenditure.

Mr. M. Accougan presented the annual statement of the nouse of Kefuge from Nov. 15, 1911, to the same time this year, and it stated that during the year there had been by dinerent inmaies, who had remained for 20,370 days. At the beginning of the year had been 9 patients, and more had been admitted during the last twelve months. During the year 14 of the inmates had d.ed, 7 discharged, and 14 had left without notice, with the result that there are 50 inmates at the institution at present. The total cost of maintenance was \$11,604.77, which was 38.43 cents per day per member, without attendance, and 02.9 cents per days with attendance. The report also stated that 43 of the inmates were there on account of being without homes, 17 because of weak intellect, 15 through intemperance, 3 were suffering from paralvsis, 3 were cripples, 2 were blind, I was deaf and dumb, and the remaining one is a sufferer from rheumatism. Victoria Hospital Account.

The account of Victoria Hospital was presented, but was laid on the table until the advice of the county solicitor was obtained as to wether the county had to pay for some of the patients or not. The account for the year amounted to \$3,468, and the balance due is


