BRITISH AIRMEN WIN BATTLE ABOVE LONDON BORDEN DROPS CIVIL SERVICE REFORM AND RAISES STORM:

MONTREAL COLLECTOR CASE BOLD BREACH OF GOOD FAITH

Borden Organ Hammers Union Ministry for Failure to Keep Pre-Election Promises as to Patronage—Finds Time to Look After Friends, But None for Subjects Vital to Nation.

Ottawa, Jan. 30.—The announcement by Sir Robert Borden that long-promised reform of the civil service has again been shelved comes in for strong condemnation by advocates of reform at the capital Ital.

The Ottawa Citizen, which rejoiced over the original announcement to the effect that patronage was to be abolished and the outside service placed without the pale of politics, now comes out flat-footed against what it terms "another breach of faith" on the part of the Government.

CONSCRIPT PACT WITH THE STATES

Washington, D. C., Jan. 30.—
Agreement between the United States and Great Britain and Canada on the terms of the separate conscription conventions, which only await the signatures of the representatives of the governments concerned, was announced today by Secretary Lansing, in a letter to Chairman Dent of the House military committee. The conventions give to the citizens of each country the option of returning to their own country for military service within a fixed period, after which they would be subject to military duty under the laws and regulations of the country in which they reside. They would also permit éach country to exempt nationals from military service, if deemed necessary.

REGISTRAR MUST SAFEGUARD THE FOOD CHANNELS,

Instructed to Appoint Farm Expert to Pass on Tribunal Appeals.

Ottawa, Jan. 30.-Explicit instructions have been, issued to registrars under the Military Service Act and to under the Military Service Act and to "public representatives" that production of foodstuffs must be safeguarded. "It will be the duty of registrars and public representatives," the instructions read, "to guard the national interest in connection with the production of foodstuffs and otherwise and to cause appeals to be entered from decision of any tribunal at which due weight has not been given to any national interest.

Up to Registrar,

Up to Registrar. "If," the instructions continue, "after an order to report for duty has "after an order to report for duty has been issued to any man it appears that the facts are such that if they had been known before such order was issued an appeal from the decision of the tribunal should have been lodged, the registrars shall notify such facts to the general or other officer commanding the military, who shall cause inquiry to be made, and shall advise the registrar of the result of such inquiry and whether or not leave of ab-

the registrar of the result of such inquiry and whether or not leave of absence without pay has been granted to the men concerned."

Public Representatives.
Under the reorganized scheme registrars will take over the duties formerly performed by military representatives and agricultural representatives. Registrars, in turn, will select a new officer, to be known as the "public representative." Steps are being taken by the minister of agriculture to terminate the employment of agricultural representatives. Arrangements will be made by him to put the registrar directly into touch with some person, whom he will select, who is person, whom he will select, who is fully conversant with the agricultural situation and upon whose advice in respect of matters connected with the exemption of agricultural laborers registrars will be able to depend.

The new scheme comes into effect on February 4.

TO ANSWER CALL **NOW DESERTERS**

Those Rounded Up in Military Dragnet Face This Charge.

MILITARY TAKES CHARGE

Aid of Civil Courts To Be Invoked Only in Exceptionally Serious Cases.

As a result of the activities of the civil and military police Tuesday in rounding up defaulters, four men charged with evading the call of the Military Service Act were lodged in the "corral" at the end of the day.

The men were taken to the 1st Depot Battalion, W. O. Regiment, at Queen's Park, where their cases were deait with today.

Under the new method adopted Tuesday in handling the men they were charged on being brought in with desertion, as has been done with men arrested for desertion before the M. S. A. went into effect.

Were Difficult to Punish, Up until Tuesday the men brought in for evading the provisions of the M. S. A. were not charged with desertion, and on this account it was difficult to punish them, when no charge had heen laid, against them

sertion, and on this account it was aifficult to punish them, when no charge had been laid against them. From now on they will be charged with desertion, and they will then be brought up in "orderly room" next morning and punished without being handed over to the civil authorities. The civil courts will only deal with exceptionally serious cases, which will be handed over to them from the battalion orderly room.

Authorities at milita headquarters state today that the names of defaulters arrested under the Military Service Act will not be published so far as it known at present. This announcement was made this afternoon by Provincial Treasurer Mitatell. Mr. Mitchell says that Sir Thos. White, minister of finance, has arranged to advance money to the various provinces in a limited aggregate amount, but sufficient to meet the essential and pressing capital expenditures of the provinces requiring such assistance.

The board will repair the house owned by the city at 518 Maitland street to the amount of \$130, provided the tenant in question will take a yearly lease at \$14 a month.
