

By Their Leaders. New York, May 18.-The trainmen and conductors of the Erie road have voted to stand by their leaders in the demand for increased wages. The recent canvass of the trainmen and conductors was made known today at a conference bevice-president of the railway; A. B. Garretson, president of the Order of Railway Conductors; W. G. ## CONDITIONS OF NEW ANTI-GAMBLING LAW

Poolselling and Bookmaking Expressly Prohibited Outside Tracks.

Secretary McDermid, of the London Temperance League, has prepared the following statement as to the law which was recently passed with reference to gambling at races.

Running Race Meets-May last for seven week days. Only two such meets in a year, and at least 20 days must elapse between them. Trotting and Pacing Meets-May

be held on three days in any calendar than fourteen days of racing in any calendar year. The new law now prohibits:

by handbook men, on street, or any reception. other public places, or on race tracks. 2. The publication of tips and the offer to give tips on racing events. 3. The publication and distribution by newspapers, special racing sheets,

gambling or betting. 4. Telegraphing information from race tracks during racing meets, to poolrooms, etc., all over the country or the continent, intended for use in betting and gambling.

It permits the selling of bookmaking privileges. It permits poolselling and bookmaking on the race track during the racing meet on races actually in prog-

In effect, pool-selling and bookmaking are now expressly prohibited, anywhere but on the race track during a racing meet, and then only on races actually being run.

## SCORE KILLED AS SEVEN BOILERS EXPLODE

to Atoms, and Bodies of the Victims Are Thrown

Many Feet. Canton, O., May 17.-With a roar that was heard three miles away, a battery of seven boilers at the plant of the American Sheet and Tin Plate Company exploded this afternoon, killing from 20 to 30 men and injuring on the lake so terrific that the dredge about 50. Among the injured are a No. 2 of the Breyman Bros. and dredge half dozen who will probably die be- No. 9, belonging to C. H. Starke, were fore morning. Others, physicians say, cannot recover from their injuries.

The cause of the explosion is unknown. The fireman and engineer, who were in the boiler-room, are dead. No one else about the plant who survived the accident can give an explanation. The force of the concussion was terrific. The big plant is in such a state as to be practically a total loss. Identification of the men was diffi-

cult, because many of them were so mutilated that even the most intimate crew got into a yawl and were later friends of the dead could not recognize the features. Heads Blown From Bodies. Heads were blown from several bodles. Arms and legs were torn from the trunks. Fragments of bodies were

blown several squares from the scene and bits of human flesh have been picked up on porches and roofs of houses and in trees. There were one hundred men at labor in the plant at the time of the accident. But a dozen or so escaped some injury. These and others who rushed to the plant as soon as the disaster

was known worked heroically to rescue the injured from the ruins, which soon took fire, but the fire department extinguished the flames. The superintendent of the plant toight put men at work trying to make a list of the dead, injured and missing. The task proved difficult, because the injured had been rushed to the







## SUICIDES AT NEW YORK

Mrs. Grace Hartenstein Swallows Contents of a Bottle of Poison.

[Special to The Advertiser.] New York, May 18 .- Leaving no explanation, Mrs. Grace Hartenstein, retty and young wife of Frederick Hartenstein, superintendent of the Long Island Railroad Company, comnitted suicide Monday night by swallowing carbolic acid in apartments she

Mrs. Hartenstein, who had been separated from her husband for two years, went to the Thirty-eighth street house three weeks ago. She was very reticent, remaining in her fooms on the secand floor of the house most of the time, and passing only the necessary amenities with the landlady. Mrs. Anna O. Hagstedt. Monday afternoon friends called and took Mrs. Hartenstein for an automobile ride. She returned at 4 o'clock and ran lightly up

to her rooms. Two hours later Edward A. Torbert. another lodger in the house, was passing Mrs. Hartenstein's apartments when he heard a thud as though a ardson, with very satisfactory results.

"It is no use having a dog that will not bite," says Major Richardson, "and within, he saw Mrs. Hartenstein prone on the floor, her lips burnt black and broken bottle lying under a dresser.

Poison Bottle Found.

A search of the dead woman's apartments revealed only the broken bottle which had evidently contained two ounces of carbolic acid. On the bottle was labelled, 'Carbolic Acid, Dr. Henry E. "I don't know why she did this." said Hartenstein, a big, smooth-shaven man of 40. "Although she was suing me for divorce, I loved her dearly, and would have given up my life for her. We had not been living together for two years, but I have ben making her an allowance of \$100 a month since we separated."

The Hartensteins were married thirteen years ago in Delmonico's, and Mrs. Hartenstein was 32 years old. Her parents are prominent in Chatham, Canada. With the permission of Coroner Feinberg, the body was shiped to Bav City, Mich.



Simply as any that served him, he served, and he

The poet in an envol bids him: "Who in the realm today has choice of the easy road or the hard to tread," and "would sell his soul to remain in the sun," to depart, "nor look on our dead."

Controversy Over Treaty Coast Fishing To Be Settled.

## THE QUESTION SUBMITTED

One of Most Important Legal Battles Between Britain and United States the World Has Ever Witnessed.

Washington, May 17.-One of the most important legal battles the world has ever witnessed will be begun next month at The Hague. The powerful nations, Great Britain and the United States, will be the contestants. The future of the New England fishing industry will be at stake. The most eminent lawyers of both countries will participate in the arguments before the highest international tribunal in the world.

The question in dispute is the right of the Americans to take fish Newfoundland waters and the condition under which the right may be exercised.

The fisheries controversy is the first case to be referred to the permanent court at The Hague for arbitration under the general arbitration treaty between the United States and Great Britain. The court will consist of the following members of the permanent court at The Hague: Dr. Heinrich Lammasch, of Austria, umpire, who will act as president of the tribunal: His Excellency Louis M. Drago, of the Argentine Republic; Jonheer A. F. De Savornin Lohman, of the Netherlands; Hon.
