



Owe Much To Artists.

"We owe a great deal to the artists," concluded Prof. McMurrich. "There was a development in anatomy as soon as the artists began to turn to nature for models, and to study the muscles which changed the body contour in different attitudes."

Leonard De Cinci, according to the speaker, was one of the first artists to dissect the human body in search of an explanation for muscular activity. Autotopsies were conducted in the thirteenth century, and 100 years later anatomists.

The conference of representatives of the three governments, which was called by the British government, adjourned at 9:30 o'clock tonight after reaching the agreement, which was described as most satisfactory. Winston Spencer Churchill, secretary of state for the colonies, was expected to make a statement on the agreement to the House of Commons late tonight.

The terms of the Irish agreement as announced by Winston Churchill are as follows:

First—Peace is today declared.
Second—From today the two governments undertake to co-operate in every way in their power with a view to the restoration of peaceful conditions in the unsettled areas.





Pullets Forced To Lay by Electric Light During Winter Now Discontinue.

PROTEST

OF NATURE

Authorities Agree That Such Birds Are No Good in Breeding Pen.

PULLETS that have been laying heavily all winter under electric lights, forced feeding, or both, are now beginning to drop off. Whole flocks that have been yielding their spring production in December, January and Febru ary, instead of at the natural time will

without any special feeding wnatever have been unable to lay fertile ergs when hatching time came around.

For the egg flock that begins to slow down in March it is best to try and prolong production. If they stop laying entirely it will take too long to bring them up again, and they must be marketed at the best price they will bring, whatever it is, else they will consume feed and lower the profit they have provided earlier with their high priced eggs. Therefore on the first indication that they are falling off with their laying they must be induced to eat more mash, and less grain. Experienced commercial poultry breeders and fanciers agree pretty well that to prolong the laying period it is necessary to keep the birds from losing weight, and yet the prevent them from putting on an excess of fat. The flock that has been laying well will stand in greater danger of losing flesh and condition than of becoming obese.

Feeding More Mash.

Where the dry mash has been before them at all times, and grain has been feed by hand, one wet mash a day, and

Where the dry mash has been before them at all times, and grain has been fed by hand, one wet mash a day, and a lessening of the supply of grain, should give them a further inducement, should give them a turther inducement, if brought about gradually, a little less grain and a little wet mash, increasing the one and lessening the other until a full meal of wet mash is being fed. In cases where wet mash has been fed. grain, and the balance made in extra mash. Some feeders just reduce the grain, and allow the birds to make up the difference out of the hoppers. Wet mash, especially if wet with buttermilk, will be found to be more forcing. Of course, a flock of females thus treated must not be used as breeders. If it is desired to reproduce a family of high record layers, select those that have made the best trap-nest record and put them off by themselves at this season, and allow them to loaf and recuperate until next winter, giving them plenty of range and enough good food to keep them in good health without forcing them. They can then go into next year's breeding pens and be fed for natural egg production, and good chicks should be forthcoming.

devices knows that immediately upon turning on the water the engine speeds up, though it is necessary to have the engine hot before turning on the water, otherwise it will slow down or stop. In some types there is a line leading to the radiator filler neck so that moist air can be sucked into the carburetor.

At any rate, regardless of the type of device, all of those designed to feed water or steam have a beneftcial effect upon the engine and their use is justified both as a power increaser and carbon preventer. How can the action as a power increaser be explained? Briefly stated, the use of water results in a gain in thermal or heat efficiency by preventing the isual loss of heat through the water jackets at the beginning of the explosion stroke and giving back the heat later on in the stroke when the

power on the piston is not so great, The automobile engine is a notorious heat waster, though it is strictly speaking a heat engine and therebetter, as little as possible. Yet fully one-third of the heat generated (and the heat is power) is lost by being passed to the cooling water. Now when water is sent into the cylinders upon the intake stroke the charge is naturally cooled. On compression it is heated and upon explosion it is turned into steam, thereby taking away some of the heat which would ordinarily be wasted by passing through the water jacket into the water. Later on in the power stroke, when the power on the piston is reduced the steam gives up its heat in greater part and thus helps put some more power where it is needed. In other words during the early part of the explosion stroke the water prevents a heat loss by taking some of the heat into the mixture only to give it up later when the heat is needed in the cylinder. This explanation may be taken as being correct with the theory as to water

This theory assumes that water present during the explosion is decomposed into its elements, oxy gen and hydrogen, and that the pres-

CALLED HAUNTED GALLERY

Shakespeare's Company Used Stairway After Rehearsals in Watching Chamber.

LONDON, England, March 30 .- (By LONDON, England, March 30.—(By Canadian Press.)—After being closed for 187 years, the original doorway between Henry VIII.'s great Watching Chamber and the gallery leading to the chapel commonly called the Haunted Gallery, in Hampton Court Palace, has been reopened. It was through this doorway that Shakespeare's company, after their rehearsals, which took place in the Watching Chamber, and their in the Watching Chamber, and their performances, which were given in the Great Hall, passed down the stairs to foregather with other "grooms of the chamber" and the king's musicians and draws out the poisonous erudations

In addition to its associations with Shakespeare's company, this old door-way has many other historic links with the Tudor and Stuart periods. It was through it that Prince Edward, afterwards Edward VI., was carried from his nursery on Oct. 15, 1537, three days nis nursery on Oct. 15, 1537, three days after his birth, along the gallery into the Watching Chamber, through the Great Hall, down into the Clock Court and so to the chapel, there to be baptised.—Advt. The procession was very pic-

tized. The procession was very pro-turesque, including many scores of high dignitaries and great nobles, the am-bassadors and their suites, all the offi-cers of state and the whole royal house-hold, numbering altogether several hunhold, numbering altogether several hundreds, all carrying waxen to:ches.

Sixteen days later, the funeral precession of Prince Edward's mother, Jane Seymour, passed through the same doorway, in the reverse direction, to the chapel, where the body lay in state for many days. Three years after, another queen. Catherine Howard, passed through the doorway under arrest, on her way to the Tower and the scaffold;

Another victim of the Tower headsman, the ex-Protector Somerset, was hustled along through the doorway by the guards, after his sudden and treacherous arrest in the council chamway by the guards, after his sudden and treacherous arrest in the council chamber, in the corner of the Haunted Gallery, on his way to the block—an event which his nephew, who remained at Hampton Court, callously recorded in his diary thus: "Uncle Somerset had his head cut off this morning."

It was in 1584 that Leopold von Wedel, a Prussian nobleman, saw Queen Elizabeth passing through this doorway, going in splendid state to the chapel, with her bodyguard, several score of them, with their red coats and their gilt halberds, and all the great nobles of the court and the queen s

nobles of the court and the queen council. He tells how the people stand-ing in the gallery—the general public seem to have been admitted—feel on

seem to have been admitted—feil on their knees as the queen's glance turned toward them, exclaiming "Long live Queen Elizabeth," which she answered graciously with "I thank you, my good people, with all my heart."

In 1735 the doorway was definitely closed and the gallery turned into a habitable room. So it remained until some fifteen years ago. Then, in fulfillment of a decision of Queen Victoria, reached in 1886, that hereafter it should no longer be used for private occupation, with a view to the gallery being ultimately opened to the public and the old way through reopened, the suite of private apartments which included it was abolished. 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
