St. Petersburg, March 2.-According to a special dispatch from Port Arthur 20 Chinese have been arrested there for signaling to the Japanese ships from the shore with flashlights and lanterns. A warning has been issued that similar offenders will hereafter be treated as spies and shot.

London, March 2. - The corespondent of the Times at Vienna says: A dispatch from St. Petersburg says that Far East will consist of 123,000 infan-16,000 Cossacks, 5,000 artillery, 8,-000 engineers and 25,000 railway guards, a total force of 177,000. These figures are probably based upon the assumption that no hitch will occur in the transport arrangements during the next three weeks. They are held to be approximately accurate, as it is calculated the railway cannot feed and supply more than 180,000 men.





Under the amendment now asked for by the company, the Government undertakes to guarantee the bonds of the mountain section up to 75 per cent of the cost of construction, without any limitation as to the amount. The limitation of \$13,000 per mile for the prairie section is retained.

But the country would not relish an increase in the oil duties. The other method is to lower the duty on crude which is now equal to the duty on refined.
