### JOHN LEE TELLS KENT LIBERALS HE DIFFERS FROM ROSS GOV'T

Opposed to their Stand on the School Board Ouestion, the Extension of Railroad Property and Referendum.

### ADMIRES MR. WHITNEY

Says the Conservative Chieftain Has the Courage of His Convictions--A High Tribute.

John Lee, M. P. P., of Highgate, has been again selected as Liberal candidate to contest the riding of East Kent in the coming provincial elections

This was the decision arrived at by the Liberal convention held in Thamesville yesterday afternoon. It is understood, however, that considerable difficulty was experienced in settling upon the candidate. As is generally the case in an event of this character there were scores of aspirants for the position and a considerable amount of diplomatic work was necessary on the part of the chief workers of the Liberal party in the riding to pacify those who were not generally desired for the position and who were soon to be classed in the

"also ran" list of candidates. The delicate work of the day's proeedings was done secretly in the morning. Among those who were mentioned for the position were Geo. Johns, M. Campbell, ex-Warden C. L. VonGunten, James Rutherford, Angus Gillander, Jonas Gosnell, and E. E. Parrott. Mr. Lee, the present member for the riding, was generally looked upon as the first choice, but until noon yesterday Mr. Lee positively refused to say whether he would run or not and his supporters were under the impression that he by Mr. Lee himself. This left some of the "would-like-to-be" candidates in a very peculiar position, as they did not wish to oppose Mr. Lee in the race for the candidatecy, yet were anxious to have their names go before the meeting if Mr. Lee would not accept. Mr. Parrott was strongly sup-ported by the prohibition element and Mr. Rutherford's supporters from Blenheim and Harwich were doing all in their power to put forth the claims

of their candidate. Finally, before the convention was called, Mr. Lee stated that the only condition under which he would accept the nomination was that it be the unanimous choice of the meeting. At this Mr. Johns quietly dropped out from the contest and a number of others also withdrew their names. Mr. Lee announced his intentions too late for Mr. Rutherford to withdraw his name, however, as he had evident-ly pledged himself to his supporters that he would make an effort to secure the position. He had under-stood until yesterday that Mr. Lee would not be in the contest and other-wise, he said, he would not have en-tered the field. Mr. Lee held that he did not want to prevent anyone else from obtaining the nomination, but if it were offered to him by the free will of the convention he would

accept it.

The convention opened at two o'clock in the Opera House with about 200 delegates present from Camden, Orford, Howard, Harwich, Zone, Dresden, Thamesville, Ridgetown, and Blenheim. Among those present were the following from Chatham: O. L. Lewis, E. E. Parrott, J. G. Kerr, W. A. Hadley, and John A. Walker. M. W. Rowell, a prominent barrister and Liberal, of Toronto, was also present and delivered an address after the candidate had been chosen. "Sparring for time," best describes the preent status of the negotiations, neither side being willing to risk a decision which would break off the present conference. An agreement may be reached at any moment, but this is more likely to be the result of semiindependent action by Lord Milner and Lord Kitchener at Pretoria than the rather involved conditional de-cisions at London. The broad lines of Great Britain's terms are now known to the government representa-

tives at Pretoria. Upon there repre-sentatives the cabinet is apparently shifting the responsibility of taking advantage of all opportunities, provided no cardinal principles be sacrificed The government has ordered that the cable and telegraph lines between London and Pretorial be kept clear to insure the most prompt transmission of Lord Kitchener's messages.

There is good reason to believe that the Boers are vigorously demanding a representative government, and that this demand is opposed with equal vigor by the British representatives. It is understood that the Boers strongly object to the long delay proposed by great Britain, before a representative government be granted the former republics, and that they also insist that the number of Boer seats i the council be specified. It is expected that the cabinet will reassemble to-morrow to discuss the matter fur-







lvory Carving the ivory carvers of this country do ittle of nothing in the East Indian or Japanese manner, nor do they occupy emselves with figure work. Their chief employment is in producing decorative toilet and stationery articles. The carvers of ivory use much the same tools as the wood carvers, but of

lighter and more delicate make. The work is extremely tedious and laborious. The carving is usually done in low relief, and the subjects are such as are suitable to this treatment-Persian designs in delicate curves, the cactus, with some varieties of palms, and hints caught from those marvelously simple but artistic carvings of the Alaskan Indians. Ine ivory is stained slightly so as to bring out the design and is permitted to absorb moisture, which it readily does, in order to give it that fresh look common in newly manufactured articles of ivory. The art of staining ivory is a secret guard-

ed well by the carvers. Some idea of the cost of ivory carving may be had from the fact that, while a hand mirror framed in plain ivory may be had for \$10 or \$12, a hirror in carved ivory may cost \$100 or more. The small articles in carved ivory cost from \$5 to \$25, and a toilet set in that material may bring as much as \$500.

A little machine which threads one thousand needles a minute is at work in St. Gall, Switzerland.
