Wesleyan Academy, Branch Institution for Females.

MR. EDITOR.—As we have at length advanced towards the work of preparation for the right education of females upon Christian principles, it seems proper that a brief report of our progress should be made for the consideration of the friends of our paper.

At the Annual Meeting of the Board of Trustees, held in this place in June last, after the subject of the establishment of an Academy for females had again been made matter for grave consideration, and the plan upon which it had been previously determined and slightly modified, it was unanimously resolved to test, without further delay, the practicability of the measures proposed for securing the additional amount considered indispensable for the accomplishment of the design.

It will be remembered that the excellent Founder of the Institution already in operation, had generously engaged to give a donation of One Thousand Pounds, and that other friends in this neighbourhood had promised liberal donations to aid in the establishment of the proposed Branch Institution.

But it was estimated that not less than Five Thousand Pounds more would be needed to make proper provision for its establishment and maintenance.

It was supposed that about one-half this amount would be required in order to pay for the suitable buildings, furniture, &c., and that the remaining moiety would, being invested, insure a small endowment requisite to guard against future embarrassment.

To secure this amount it was resolved to call upon our friends in Halifax, Saint John, and Charlottetown, in the first place for subscription, and afterwards, if these should give a favourable consideration to our plan, upon those in other places throughout the three provinces.

It was understood that the responsibility of the establishment should be called into existence in the way proposed, should rest with the friends in the three places named. That is to say, it was resolved to employ means to place the whole matter before them for their consideration, consideration, and approval, with the understanding that if they should give expression to their opinions in the form of subscriptions amounting to one-half the amount above named, then the Trustees would feel authorized to bound to make immediate arrangements for the erection of a suitable building, and to call upon the friends in other places to make provision for the required endowment.

We have but space for the following extracts from the address to Her Majesty.

In the present case, the possession to be surrendered, is no offering of artificial arrangements, falling with a complicated policy of which formed a part.

No, may it please your Majesty, your loyal subjects in Nova Scotia, raise their voice against the injury of an inheritance, conferred upon the North American subjects by nature—connected with their soil by the laws and usages of nations—confirmed and upheld by solemn compact, and which practically enjoyed by their pecuniary, and by other their Majesty's subjects cannot enjoy them, can be surrendered only at their extreme injury and loss.

Surely, may it please your Majesty, your loyal Colonial subjects have a right to ask for some better reason for the sacrifice of their peculiar right and interest than the demand of a foreign power—the aggrandizement of a foreign power.

It is reported that the American Government, with characteristic diplomatic skill, have offered to concede a similar privilege on their own coast in return for that they seek on the Coast of British North America.

The proffered boon is valueless to the Colonists—they want not, and would derive no benefit from it. The offer may excite to derision, and it may afford an excuse to pervert the sacrifice of our Colonial subjects' rights—it may have been made by our sagacious neighbors with the object—to those who will suffer by the loss of it, but the intention of insult to the Colonists, and the intention of injury to the Colonists, is as clear as the sun.

For, let it not be urged upon your Majesty, that the Americans are certain evidence to the contrary. It is, may it please your Majesty, of value, of great value, in itself, perhaps, greater value still, as the best—the only safe guard against violation of the restriction which prohibits the exportation of the Colonies and the carrying on of the American fisheries within three miles from the shore.

Your memorialists deprecate all negotiations, all compromise on the subject. The Americans will not—probably they cannot—grant an equivalent for the privileges they seek, and the only alternative is the entire abandonment of the present negotiations.

Your memorialists most earnestly entreat your Majesty that the existing fishery restrictions may be preserved in their letter, and that your Majesty's power may be put forth to prevent their violation.

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General Intelligence. DOMESTIC. THE FISHERY QUESTION. PUBLIC MEETING.—Pursuant to a requisition to His Worship the Mayor, a large gathering of the citizens of Halifax, representing all classes and interests, was convened in the Province Building on Thursday last, to petition Her Majesty in regard to the renowned surker of fishery. The meeting was marked by unanimity and energy of feeling and expression, several resolutions and an address to the Lieut. Governor passed unanimously, while the memorial to Her Majesty was read with acclamations. We hope this strong representation of our claims and interests may yet induce the British Government to weigh the serious consequences involved in the waver policy contemplated.

Canada. Now sets to class in the answer of the House to the Speech from the throne, he admitted that the ministry did not think it expedient to express regret at the course of the Imperial Government, which they did not think it expedient to put in the mouth of His Excellency. This arose from a difference in the position of the Colony and the Empire, which must always prevent the exact following of British practice. The Governor General was the servant of the Crown, bound to obey the injunctions of the Imperial ministry, and he did not, therefore, think it proper to put into the mouth of the Governor General, expressions of regret at the conduct of that ministry. But the case was different with the Canadian ministry, who were not responsible to the British ministry, and might, therefore, properly express their views. (Laughter.)

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
