

Of all the trails, the mountain ones are most alluring and each year Alpine Club of Canada who held their annual camp this season at Lake O'Hern. The Camp, known as the "O'Hern Meadows Camp" was an open Alpine Meadow at an altitude of 6,600 feet above sea level, gav with mountain blooms.

SHALL OUR RAIL-**WAYS BE USED TO DEVELOP U. S. PORTS**

When introducing in the House of Commons in the bill providing for the construction of the National Transcontinental Railway, the late Sir Wilfred Laurier, then leader of the government declared:-

"A railway to extend from the shores of the Atlantic Ocean to the shore of the Pacific Ocean, and to be, every inch of it on Canadian soil, is a national as well as commercial necessity.

"We consider that it is a duty of all those who sit within these walls by the will of the people to provide immediate means whereby the products of those new settlers may find an exit to the ocean at the least possible cost, and where-by, like-wise, a market may be found in this new region for those who toil in the forests, in the fields, in the mines, and in the shops of the older provinces. Such is our duty; it is immediate and imperative. It is not for to-morrow, but of this day, of this year and of this minute Heaven grant that it be not already too late; Heaven grant that whilst we tarry and dispute the trade of Canada is not divested to other channels, and that the ever vigilant competitor does not take to himself the trade that properly belongs to those who acknowledge Canada as their native or their adopted land."

In 1911, the then Governor of Massachusetts, the Hon, Eugene Foss, was one of President Taft's Chief Lieutenants in the Reciprocity campaign. Governor Foss was particularly anxious that the Canadian people should agree to the Reciprocity proposals, declaring to the American public that it would stop the influx into Canada of American manufacturing plants, and would transfer Canadian railway traffic f.o.n east to west, public meeting in Boston:-

The selfishness of such an argument is surely sufficiently obvious.

In 1911 the Canadian people did not uccumb to the blandishments of Uncle Sam. They declared in no uncertain voice their determination to work out their own commercial independence and to develope their own national character. Again the issue faces the people of own border rather than beyond.
