CANADA'S DEBT WILL TOTAL \$1,950,000,000

O'ITAWA, June 6 .- Canada's debt when expenditures authorized for the current year are made will aggregate \$1,950,000,000 or \$220 per capita, Sir Thomas White minister of finance, announced in his discussion of the dominion budget in the house of commons

The interest burden would be \$115,000,100 a year he said, this expenditure being exclusive of pensions amounting to \$35,000,-000 to \$45,000,000 annually.

A large increase in the income tax will be authorized. New tariff proposals include free importation of wheat wheat flour and pota toes from countries extending a like courtesy to Canada and a reduction on duties on agricultural implements.

> PAY INCOME TAX UPON INDEMNITY

OTTAWA, June 6.-Mem bers of Parliament must pay Fedreal income tax on their indemnity the same as other people on their income from whatever source. This tax will, in fact, under a clarifying clause, apply to members of Parliament and officers thereof, members of Provincial Legislatures and Municipal Councils, and all other persons paid by his Majesty in respect of the Government of Canada or of any Province, excepting only the income of the Governor-General. When the clause came up to-day in the Budget speech, Sir Thomas White said:

"Some question has been raised as to whether the income tax is payable on indemnities. I believe nearly all the members have conceded htat it is so payable. However, it is desirable that it should be made perfectly plain."



warning fruit growers with regard to application of a lubricating agent. The lubricant consists of minute balls or globules. These readily insinuate themselves between the faces sufficient sustaining powers to be used as efficient lubricants. Some cannot be retained between the metals; others do not cling together persistently enough. To resist the tendency of the metal to tear the lubricating film apart, these globules must have a good deal of strength, and must stick together well. They must also cling well to the metal, or they will be squeezed

out of the bearing. The oils and the fats are the principal lubricants. The mineral oils low and rape are thick. Nothing is better for high speed bearings and light spindles or shafts than sperm oil, but it is costly; for heavy bearings castor oil is superior to this, but t is also expensive

Neither can a steer make rapid growth and fatten on a food that does not furnish a large amount of the food constituents essential for growth. These of having stolen a five dollar bill cannot be supplied in the largest and best quantities except by the use of the concentrates. The coarser feeds to the effect that the lady purchased or roughage are necessary to give a pair of shoes from Katzman on the bulk to the ration, but there must be an abundance of easily-digestible materials if the best results are to be obtained and this is the place of concentrates in the ration. We want some coarse feeds, even if they are poorly digested, but we also want ncentrates to supply the materials for growth and production.
