* WORK OF REMOVING BODIES OF MINE VICTIMS ATTENDED BY PITIFUL SCENES.

Cherry, Ills., Nov. 20-The charred and blackened bodies of the victims of the disaster are being removed from the St. Paul mine today and placed in rows to await identification. Decomposition has added its horrors to those of fire and suffocation, recognition in

many instances being impossible.

Only the presence of the militia prevents the grief-stricken widows and relatives hurling themselves headlong down the shaft. Their grief and moans are terrific and heartbreaking.

Preparations are being made to remove the bodies as fast as dentified, place them in caskets and turn them over to relatives. Many firemen and miners employed in the work of bringing the



The hose spun about in the shaft and damaged the signal device to such an extent that the men were unable to inform those above of the tuation.
