Two Points of View.

"The minute I get to New York I always feel shabby, no matter how well dressed I felt before," said a woman from a less metropolitan city who goes to New York. "I declare it spoils my pleasure. I feel as if everybody was staring at my clothes."

"Why, I never felt like that," answered another woman. "There are so many wonderful things to look at in New York that it never occurred to me that anyone would look at me." Shy and self-conscious people sometimes write me to ask how they can overcome their misfortune. I hereby recommend them to these two women. Let them avoid the point of view of the first and try to get that of the second, and they will be on the high road to recovery.

Each of us, for himself, the center of the universe. That is a law of psychology. Even the most unselfish person cannot think of the world in any other way than that. Although he may wear himself out in the service of others, he must still think of this universe of service as built around himself. As I go through a railway station, or look about a trolley car, it interests me to realize this, and to think how each commonplace person I see before me is the center of a little universe of his own.

And yet there are people like the woman I first quoted who are always fancying that they are the center of other people's universes. Don't worry about receiving too much attention from others. Unless you are signally beautiful or signally disfigured, you are in no such danger. Half the time when you think people are staring at you, they are only looking at you as they look at the trees, or the houses they pass, with entirely indifferent half-seeing eyes.

I often think with amusement, of a conversation I heard between two girls. One was a rather pretty girl with a vanity out of all proportion to her pretensions to beauty. Said this girl with a simper: "My dear, is my hat on crooked, or is there anything the matter?" I've seen so many people staring at me that I know there must be something wrong. I am sure it would have been evident to a babe in arms that she expected to be told that it was "her charm" which made her the synonym of "so many eyes."

But the second young woman, who has a reputation for her frankness, ignored this bait "and" answered: "What made you think they were staring at you?" "Why, I saw them of course," explained the pretty one indignantly. "They were staring at them just as much," triumphantly pointed out the blunt young person. "And there wasn't anything wrong or remarkable about them, was there? People have to look at something. They can't walk along with their eyes closed. That's all it meant. I wouldn't worry if I were you."

But the pretty young woman looked much less relieved than she should have.

Financing Railway Building

Yesterday we pointed out certain grave discrepancies in the speech of the Minister of Finance, delivered in the House of Assembly, in introducing Resolutions for the raising of a loan of £400,000 sterling for payment of railway building.

The Finance Minister's amended estimate of mileage was 350. He also said:—"I think if we get them for \$18,000, or \$19,000, or \$20,000 a mile, we will be doing very well."

In other words the Finance Minister thinks we shall be doing very well if the branches contracted for in 1910 cost no more than \$7,000,000.

Put another way, it means that the Finance Minister is highly sceptical about getting them for \$7,000,000.

As the £800,000 loan of 1910 realized a little over \$3,700,000, the best that can be expected for this supplemental loan is about half of this amount.

The Finance Minister will thus have about \$5,500,000 to meet a bill which he hopes may not come to more than \$7,000,000.

Why then did he make the grossly inaccurate statement that this loan of £400,000 was "TO COMPLETE THE BRANCHES"?

It he knew what he was talking about then he was attempting to deceive the country; if he did not know, he does not know his business as Finance Minister.

This leads us to another piece of gross deception. This was the deception practised two years ago, when the Railway branches and Loan were under discussion. It is well known that the cost of the branch lines then projected a great issue between the Government and the Opposition. The Opposition roundly contended that the loan of £800,000 would not cover the cost of the lines under reference.

In 1910 the Prime Minister estimated the annual interest charge on the loan of £800,000 which he was about to raise at \$140,000 a year.

He took this amount of \$140,000 to be the total interest charge on the railway building contracted for, saying:—"In other words when all these are built the interest on the cost which we will have to pay will be \$140,000 a year."

Again, in the course of an argument he said that in 1915, when the branch lines would be completed, "the outlay for interest on the branch railway construction will only be \$140,000 a year."

It is, therefore, abundantly clear that the Government did their best to make the country believe that the total interest charges for the work under

Gin Cargo Worth 7,000,000 Dollars.

Canada Will Benefit by \$750,000 in Duties From Shipment.

Montreal, May 13.—The steamer Ansilk is moored at Windmill Point, and longshoremen are carefully removing thousands of boxes of gin. There were on board 145,000 packages consigned from Rotterdam, and when duty and cost is taken into consideration, a round seven million dollars will represent the value of the cargo laid down in Canada. Of this amount an approximate total of \$750,000 will be collected by the Government in customs duties.

Superb Private Ballroom.

One of the most remarkable private ballrooms in the world is the one to be found in Lord Iveagh's house in Dublin. This room, which is 70 feet long and 40 feet wide, possesses walls paneled with alabaster, which are draped with rich rose-colored silk and dark velvet hangings. The music gallery and the gallery that faces it are made of aluminium, out of which metal the great fender before the fireplace, which can be lifted in the hand, was cast. This beautiful saloon naturally cost a very considerable sum; indeed, the amount spent upon it—\$150,000, which works out at about \$50 a square foot—renders it one of the most expensive rooms in existence.

How He Was Drowned.

By yesterday's express there arrived here Mr. Abbott, a cousin of Hedley Abbott, who was drowned on Tuesday afternoon last in coming from the Wadham Islands accompanied by his two brothers, Willis and Stanley. How the whole three were not drowned is wonderful, and the lives of the other two brothers were preserved almost by a miracle. The three men in their boat were beating across from the Wadham to Musgrave Harbor, their home. Everything went well until they were within one mile of Muddy Hole Point, when a sudden squall hit the boat, she was taken aback and being insufficiently ballasted, turned over. A high sea ran and but for a peculiar happening the three men would have drowned quickly. As the boat went over Stanley had one of his feet jammed under the side deck and could not get it clear. He however managed to keep his head above water and hold on to the stern of the overturned boat. This accident was the means of saving but also his own life but that of Willis, who clung to Stanley. Had Stanley's foot become disengaged from the side deck where it was caught, both would have drowned. Shortly after the boat went over, Willis found Hedley near him, and as he struggled cried to him to grasp him (Willis), but he evidently became exhausted quickly and putting his hand up to his head the horrified brothers saw him disappear into the depths. Jabez Abbott saw the accident from the shore and hastened with other men to the rescue. When they reached the scene both Willis and Stan were unconscious, with their heads just above water and almost drowned. Their boat was upright and both men taken on board the rescuing boat and hurriedly brought ashore. They had taken in so much water that it was feared they would never revive, but after hours of careful treatment they came to. Both men have since been

very ill. Almost daily since the accident occurred men have been fishing for the body of Hedley, but without success.

Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram.
LONDON, May 20.

That the inquiry into the Titanic disaster has taken more the character of a society function than the investigation into the circumstances of the great catastrophe should be now evident. To-day those who did not possess special tickets stood on chairs, craning their necks to obtain a view of the chief actors connected with the incident with the party who filled the lifeboat which saved Sir Cosmo and Lady Duff-Gordon and Secretary, who, according to the evidence of two of the crew, protested against going to the rescue of those struggling in the water and crying for help. The Attorney General asked a few questions about the failure of the boat to go back.

Sir Rufus Isaacs, questioning Sir Cosmo, said: "In order to make matters clear, did you promise the crew five pounds each before or after the lifeboat went back to the rescue?" Sir Cosmo made a reply which Sir Rufus was unable to get from him last week: "I never knew the boat went back."

The Attorney appearing on behalf of the British third class passengers asked Gordon if he had suggested the boat should go back, and received a negative reply. He then asked: "You saved your life and left others to drown?"

Lord Mersey here interfered, and said witness had been asked enough, and asked if it were fair to ask such questions. This brought applause from the women, many of whom repeated it time and again without a word of order from Mersey.

Asked with whom Ismay had dined on Sunday evening, a few hours previous to the sinking of the Titanic, Gordon replied, "Ismay and the ship's doctor dined together."

Lady Gordon was next called to give evidence, and was kept on the stand for fifteen minutes. It was her appearance that called for the overcrowding of the court, which so many women attended. Lady Gordon repeated the story told by her husband almost without variation. She denied everything about going back to the scene of the wreck while in the lifeboat. When examined with regard to the articles which appeared in the American papers, she said the description of the night of the disaster credited to her had not been written by her. Three members of the lifeboat crew confirmed the assertion that nothing had been said about going back. One varied from the usual story, saying the boat's crew refused to return.

LONDON, May 20.

The Canadian railroads, which own, operate or in any way exercise control over a steamship, will be dealt a severe blow if the Adamson Panama Canal Bill to be passed by the House this week is not amended before it becomes law. In the opinion of the Republican and Democrat members of the House, the Inter-state and Foreign Commerce Committee, who drafted the measure, and the members of the Inter-state Commerce Commission who favor it, no Canadian steamship operated by any railroad is permitted by the terms of the Bill to use any waterway of the United States, including the Great Lakes and the Panama Canal. This far-reaching effect of the Adamson Bill has only come to light within the last few days. By mutual agreement ships of the United States and Canada could use the Great Lakes and border waters indiscriminately, and by the terms of the day-Panaceforte Treaty with Britain equal terms must be granted to all nations using the Panama Canal. The Adamson Bill unsettles all these agreements, and it is believed may result in grave international complications. With regard to the States opposing the provision with might and main, if they are beaten in the House they will carry the fight to the Senate. It is believed when Canada understands the import of the proposed legislation against Canadian railroads the Canadian Government will get busy too.

LONDON, May 20.

A. J. Balfour, former Premier, speaking to-day at the Victoria League of Empire, said he believed that at no distant date a scheme for an Imperial Parliament would be matured, by which Britain and her self-governing colonies would be united into one. The whole trend of recent events, he said, was bringing closer the widely scattered parts of the Empire. He was a profound believer in the truth that local patriotism, properly understood, would be no obstacle to larger patriotism.

CAMBRIDGE, May 20.

Roosevelt served notice to-day that he would resist any compromise at the Republican National Convention. "There can be no compromise," he said. "Some of our opponents are saying neither Taft nor myself should be nominated. I'll name the compromise candidate—I will be he."

**Beri-Beri
Outbreak Serious**

Dr. Brehm, who had been on a short visit to Bonavista Bay investigating the outbreak of beri-beri, returned by the express last evening. He visited King's Cove, Keel's, Plate Cove and Indian Arm, where the disease has shown itself. In all these places there are about a dozen grown-up people who have developed the ailment. Two of them are seriously ill and the situation has grown to an alarming stage. The outbreak was first heard of in March at Indian Arm. Dr. Levisconte was in attendance, but the disease continued spreading. Questioned as to the origin of the sickness, Dr. Brehm said it was difficult to state definitely. He believed, however, it was caused by diet. The disease, the Health Officer continued, is partly contagious, and the only place it is prevalent at present is in Bonavista in the East. Dr. Brehm further stated that quarantining patients or other precautionary steps for infectious diseases will not serve to stamp out beri-beri.

We understand that the doctor on the Pomeranian stated to one of the passengers that he had seen a good deal of beri-beri in the East, and that it was due usually to eating bad flour or bad rice. We are told that the food supply in places where this outbreak it has been scanty during the past few months. It is a matter which the Government should attend to.

**Will Inquire Into
Adamson Bill.**

OTTAWA, To-day.

The Adamson Bill referred to in the Canadian Press despatches will form the subject of inquiry. "If the effect or intent of the measure is such as is represented, it would have a vital effect upon the Canadian Pacific, Grand Trunk and Canadian Northern steamship lines, all of which ply to American ports. Apart from the international discourtesy which is involved, it is quite plain the proposed enactment is an abrogation of Treaty in so far as the Panama Canal is concerned. The Adamson Bill will doubtless now be considered not only by the Government and a protest at Washington seems highly probable.

**Baron Held on
Murder Charge.**

Italian Who Killed Lady in Waiting to Queen Helena Brought Before Court.
Rome, May 17.—A living wreck, his face absolutely unrecognizable, Baron Vincenzo Patrona, a former cavalry lieutenant in the Italian Army, who on March 2, 1911, murdered Princess Giulia Trigona di Sant Eills, lady in waiting to Queen Helena, and afterwards attempted to commit suicide, appeared in court this morning to face trial. The trial will be conducted behind closed doors, but there was an enormous crowd outside.

The lawyers for the defence are endeavoring to obtain a postponement of the trial so that the accused may be examined by experts and his mental condition established. They also insist in the calling of the Duke of Aosta, the Count of Turin, the Minister of War, and the Under-Secretary for Foreign Affairs as witnesses. The presiding judge has refused the latter demand.

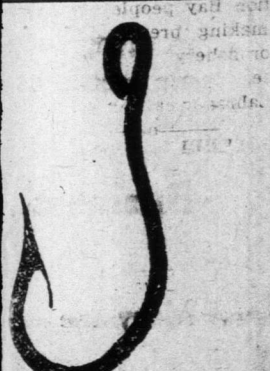

He appeared first as the splendid "Young Tribune," vanished quietly, reappeared again, some say betrayed the party with whom he was associated, and later settled down to a life of contemplative study. He studied so hard that he evolved from the recesses of a great brain several works which in themselves will immortalize him. He codified politics with the accent always on the cod, and from these his great brain evolved what is known as Makinson cod, and since then he has been codifying everything and everybody in sight. His zeal for the good of the people made him sigh for "new worlds to conquer," like Alexander the Great, and unkempt and unshorn, and they say almost barefoot, he travels hundreds of miles to another continent to bring the great tidings to the people of the world. At that time there existed a great country many leagues from his birthplace, and he went there as a peacemaker. Hear his words—"I will tell my people." Sublime, grand, magnificent! There was danger of war between the great nation he represented and the other nation to whom he spoke. Immediately peace was proclaimed. Now since then this great man has been missing and none know whether he has gone. During these years a company of play actors strolled into the birthplace of this man and gave a delineation of the capture of two great provinces—Al case Lorraine. The orchestra frequently played "Oh where, oh where is my little dog gone?" Many think that this will bring back the peacemaker. He has cropped up in many places and, as remarked before, his acts are wonderful. He visited the League in the interest of peace and only charged \$12,000 on account. He established jam factories, collar factories, buterine mills, railway loans, two blade grass, cold storage (with an eye to the future for himself—he'll want it), sheep raising (he whittened the South Side Hills), and so lowly was he that he went into a small shack on Circular Road instead of dwelling in the palatial residences of the West End, where there was nothing but feasting and high living. He was the first to start the philanthropic system known as "picnics"—at somebody else's expense. Poems could be written about this great king, but I'll promise you more later. As a sign to all men I will conclude by again quoting the text of this great man's promise, "I will tell my people," and am,
