



### **Bullet Wounds**

(Philadelphia Public Ledger.) In a leading Philadelphia hospita last year there were performed 1,800 surgical operations. Only twelve of the persons operated upon died.

My authority for these figures is Dr. Morris Booth Miller. He assured me that these operations included many of what are termed the most dangerous major cases. We were talking about Sir William Osler's remarks that only one soldier had died in an English hospital out of 700 wounded who had been treated there.

"Modern army rifle wounds." said Dr. Miller, "are not dangerous unless the bullet happens to strike in a very limited area of the human frame. It is even possible for a shot to go through some parts of the heart and not kill. These small bullets not only make a clean wound owing to the rapidity of their flight, but they often partially cauterize the wound, and so







ON MODERN FICTION. The lecture given by Rev. D. Hemmeon at the Grenfell Hall last night, was well attended, and proved one of the most interesting of the series held under the auspices of the Institute Literary Committee. The subject of the discourse was "Modern Fiction" which was dealt with in a manner which showed that the speaker was an authority on literature. After being introduced by Mr. W. F. Lloyd, Chairman of the Institute Literary Committee, the rev. lecturer began Committee, the rev. lecturer began his discourse with a definit tion. The story, he said, is the oldest form of literature, and literature is gossip plus art, while fiction is a product of literature fostered by im-agination, which is truly the mother of good fiction. Some twenty years ago, there arose a class of writers who styled themselves realistic fiction writers, and who prophesied that the days of idealistic fiction were gone. Realistic fiction is a contra-dictory term, and as advanced by these writers was a paradox, and was utterly impossible, as the events of everyday life cannot be told in an interesting manner unless aided by the imaginative faculty. It is imagination that gives joy to the past and anticipates the pleasures of the fu-ture. Fiction is the oldest form of iterature and may be truly said to be the cradle of science, philosophy, history and theology. The earliest

of education was folk lore,

which with the increase of reading

and writing, found its way into books.

During the sixteenth and seventeenth

centuries, the principal form off fic-

tion was the drama because of the few who were able to read. progressed with the knowledge of reading, and the nineteenth century essentials of good fiction are popularty, permanence, art and knowledge. Shakespeare is easily pre-eminent as a writer of fiction, as his works pos-sess all these qualifications. Matthew Arnold's works are lacking in popularity, while Ralph Connors' writings are deficient in art. Marie Corelli possesses a wide knowledge of human nature, her works are popular but they are so weak in art that they are not likely to become permanent literature. The recent novel dissects motives more than the more remote modern novel, and in some cases probes so deeply into human nature as to become sometimes hideous. The question then arises as to whether the progress of civilization has a tendency to make man's mind grosser. The only reason apparent for this novel of sex mania, is that it is a rebound from some fifty or sixty years ago when women were more prudish. Happily there is a tendency amongst the more modern writers to eliminate the obnoxious element of otherwise good stories. The lecturer then dealt with the fiction of Arnold Bennett, H. G. Wells, Edith Horton, William de Morgan, Robert Louis Stevenson, Bret Harte, Irving, Kipling, Marion Crawford, J. M. Barrie, Conan Doyle, Ian McLaren and others briefly dis and demerits. Turning back to Scott and Dickens, he said that they had written at an age when readers were
