**War News.**

**Messages Received Previous to 9 A.M.**

**FRENCH OFFICIAL.**  
PARIS, March 25. The French official statement says that the past night was quiet in Verdun. Artillery duels were in progress in Woivre region.  
**BERLIN SAYS VERDUN IN FLAMES.**  
BERLIN, March 25. According to an official statement made by the German army headquarters.  
**ST. PIERRE BULLETIN.**  
PARIS, March 25. (Official.) We have bombarded the enemy's trenches of Basinghe and near Het in the Argonne artillery actions were quite violent, also in the Bois de Paris, and the sectors of Chartres, Chausses and Huatech. Artillery was quite active in the sector of the second line of Cotes de Meuse on the 26th. We were in Cotes de Meuse sector there was no new action during the day. Calm on the front.

**VERDUN STRUGGLE CONTINUED.**  
LONDON, March 25. Verdun struggle is continued. Verdun actions yesterday, says French official statement. The Channel steamer was torpedoed and passengers from the Sussex are feared.  
Reports from the front advance. Reports from the front advance. The bear gained ground in the sector of Dvinsk district. Station in Galicia is unchanged. In gunboats have destroyed sailing vessels in the Black Sea. Italian artillery attacks Terragole Valley.

**W. SEA ENGAGEMENT.**  
LONDON, March 25. The following official statement was issued: An engagement occurred on February 23rd in the North Sea between the armed German raider Grief, disguised as a Norwegian merchant vessel, and the British merchant cruiser Alcantara, capt. T. R. Wordle; it resulted in the sinking of both vessels, the German raider being sunk by gun fire and the Alcantara apparently by a torpedo.  
The German officers and 115 men were picked up and taken prisoners. The total complement believed to have been over 300. The British losses amounted to five officers and 20 men. It should be noted that during the whole engagement the enemy's colors painted on the side of the ship. This news is published as it is made clear by receipt of a German wireless message that the enemy has learned that the Alcantara was destroyed before she succeeded in passing our line of patrols.

**BRITISH OFFICIAL.**  
LONDON, March 26. Last night the enemy sprang a trap near the Hohenzollern redoubt. They opened one trench, but was driven out again by our bombers. Today we bombarded enemy trenches near Bois Blancs and badly damaged about one hundred yards of the parapet. The reply was feeble. Enemy artillery was active to-day near Nerve, Champagne, Ypres and Wietje. Our artillery retaliated.  
**THREE BRITISH AIRSHIPS MISSING.**  
LONDON, March 26. Three British aeroplanes, which took part in a raid on the German airship sheds at Schleswig-Holstein yesterday, are missing. Two German patrol vessels have been sunk and a British destroyer is believed to have been lost.  
**NAVAL BATTLE REPORTED.**  
LONDON, March 26. Despatches from Esbjerg, Denmark to Berlin, says Reuter's Copenhagen correspondent report a great naval battle between German and British fleets some three miles off the Graded lightship, at midday today. The despatch adds that Tondern, in Schleswig-Holstein, has been bombarded by five aeroplanes.  
**THE SUSSEX PASSENGERS.**  
LONDON, March 25. Last night's despatches said there were 286 passengers on the Sussex and a crew of about 50, indicating that 78 or more persons have not been accounted for. According to official information from the Admiralty this morning, between 90 and 100 passengers have been landed at Dover and about 250 passengers and members of the crew in France.

**MORAN DEFEATED.**

NEW YORK, March 26. Jesse Willard, champion heavy-weight of the world, easily outpointed Frank Moran in ten rounds here last night. Willard had better points in every round except the third, which went to Moran by a narrow margin. The conqueror of Jack Johnson claimed to have broken all the bones on the back of the right hand during a slashing rally in the third round. It was noticeable that he did not use his right hand to any extent in the later rounds. The chief feature of Moran's battle was his gameness. Although he could make no impression on Willard with his hardest swings, he fought steadily and courageously under a fusillade of left jabs and hooks which battered his face and almost closed his left eye toward the end of the bout. The champion never was in danger from Moran's blows, although a number landed with crashing force on his jaw and body. Most of them either were blocked or avoided by the Kansas cowboy, who took full advantage of his great height and extraordinary reach.
