



shown at a charge of 6d. a head, earned its millionth sixpence a few days ago, and has therefore collected for the charities in which Her Majesty is specially interested the substantial sum of \$125,000. Taking one day with another,

about 70,000 people a day patronize the restaurants at Wembley, and it appears that they are a somewhat butterfingered crowd. Every six days they contrive to break five tons of crockery, or 30,000 pieces, including 9,132 cups, 4,140 saucers, 5,664 plates and 9,288 oddments. To these must be added glasses at the rate of about 40,000 a week.

"NORMAN INVASION" On Sept. 1 a large party is to arrive at Wembley from Guernsey in the Channel Islands. It will bring with it banners inscribed "The Second Norman Invasion, from Glorious Guernsey; first invasion 1066, second invasion 1924." The Channel Islands, owned by Dukes of Normandy in the 10th century have been united with the English Crown since William I. came over; the inhabitants consider that England belongs to them rather than they to England and are accus-

comed to give the royal toast as "The Duke of Normandy His Majesty King George."


TESTING A BRIDGE.

Within the next few days Westminster Bridge (the handsome bridge that spans the Thames from the Houses of Parliament to the County Hall) is to be tested for signs of strain due to the passage of heavy traffic. It will be closed for a quarter of an hour-which means that over 510 tramcars 150 motor buses and 300 other vehicles will be held up or have to find another way around. Among the instruments to be used is an optical-stress-recorder fitted with a kinemetographic apparatus for photographing changes in the material caused by strain.
