Anglo-American Treaty May Cause a General Election

General Pershing is Retired --- General Currie Criticises Canada's War Administration---2630 Deaths From Meningitis

RUSSIAN TREATY MAY CAUSE A GENERAL ELECTION.
 QUEBEC, Sept. 12. That the Russian Trade Treaty may cause a general election in England as a result of the strenuous opposition it is bound to meet in the House of Commons, was the opinion expressed by G. G. Dawson, editor of the London Times, in an interview here this morning.

QUEBEC SUFFERING FROM HEAVY RAIN.
 QUEBEC, Sept. 12. It is claimed by responsible authorities that hundreds of thousands of dollars have been lost through damage caused by heavy rain which has been pouring down since last Friday.

MENINGITIS EPIDEMIC SWEEPING JAPAN.
 TOKIO, Sept. 12. The meningitis epidemic now sweeping Japan has resulted in 2630 deaths out of a total of 4888 cases reported, according to Government reports made public today, which placed the death rate at 54 per cent. The epidemic is subsiding, reports show.

GENERAL CURRIE'S STARTLING CHARGE.
 MONTREAL, Sept. 12. That charges of expert advice and Government waste had resulted during the war in the loss of one hundred and fifty million dollars, while the Government had sent to England one hundred and fifty thousand men who were unfit for service and were a dead loss to Canada, was the startling pronouncement of Sir Arthur Currie, late commander of the Canadian Corps in France, in an address here last evening. Many of the men who were unfit were now in hospitals, a considerable proportion of them never having reached France.

MAY SIGN WITH RESERVATION.
 GENEVA, Sept. 12. Great Britain's right to sign the compulsory arbitration clause of the world court of justice with reservations was upheld today by the subcommittee of the League of Nations Assembly which will report its findings to the full judicial commission of the assembly. The decision means that not only Great Britain, but any other State, which subscribed to the obligatory arbitration clause has a perfect right to make whatever reservations it chooses. The jurists frankly admitted to-night that this decision in principle at least will open the way to a general weakening of the world court status.

THE ONTARIO PLEBISCITE.
 TORONTO, Sept. 12. Premier Ferguson, of Ontario, today announced the questions which will be submitted to the people at the Plebiscite on October 23rd, as follows: "Are you in favor of the continuance of the Ontario Temperance Act? Are you in favor of the sale as a beverage of beer and spirituous liquors in sealed packages under Government control?"

U.S. DEFENCE MACHINERY TRIALS.
 WASHINGTON, Sept. 2. The nation's defence machinery, intended for actual use only in the event of war emergency, was given its first test today, accompanied by patriotic demonstrations throughout the United States and its possessions. It was a limited test, the actual operation of the War Department being

from active service to-night at midnight by orders issued and signed personally by President Coolidge as commander in chief of the army and navy of the United States. The order, issued only in cases of retirement of military officers who hold rank of full General, will take the form of a general announcement to the army that General Pershing has passed to the retired list.

BURNED TO DEATH.
 MONTREAL, Sept. 12. A 77 year old promanac set fire to his bed at Hotel Dieu, St. Hyacinthe, early yesterday morning, bringing death to himself and another resident of the institution, aged 94, who was sleeping in the same room. The fire itself caused almost no damage.

MANCHURIAN FORCES HELD IN READINESS.
 SHANGHAI, Sept. 12. Chang Tso Lin's main forces comprising three divisions, about 37,000 men, and twenty mixed brigades about 107,600 men, are being held in readiness to move against Chih Li, according to seemingly reliable reports from Mukden, Manchuria, received today.

ROUNDING UP STRIKERS.
 LIHU, Island of Kaulai, Sept. 12. Police, aided by national guardsmen with fixed bayonets and machine guns, continued their round up today of the Filipino strikers involved in the riot last Tuesday at the McBride plantation, near Honopou, in which 18 Filipinos and four police were killed. One hundred and thirty alleged strikers are held in jail here on charges in connection with the disturbances.

POSTAL INSPECTOR CHARGED AS BRIGAND LEADER.
 CHICAGO Ill., Sept. 12. Assistant District Attorney John Eliot Byrnes here today to seek indictment of William M. Fahy, Postal Inspector, as leader of the Roundout, Illinois, \$2,000,000 mail robbery. At about the same time Attorney C. D. Rich Chicago, will be pleading with the Leavenworth Parole Board for the release of "Big Tim" Murphy, sent to prison by Fahy for the \$250,000 Dearborn Street robbery.

 Film Feature Which Fearlessly Deals With Divorce Laws.

A hitherto untold story of Marriage Divorce and the laws with a tense revealing narrative ending in a thrilling climax, is the feature now running at the Majestic Theatre. Starting out as a lively comedy drama, the picture has an unusually melodramatic ending, which astonishes the call for something decidedly new in pictures. Amid picturesque shots of the natural wonders of Yellowstone Park are introduced dramatically thrilling scenes of a fight between the two husbands of the same woman, ending in the one being thrown into the boiling pool of a geyser, and then the body tossed high into the air by the force of the spouting geyser and crushed upon the rocks below.

 Editor Evening Telegram.

The article is one of fair length so, in order to save space, I will be content to quote only one or two passages for the edification of those of your readers who did not read it.

"WEMBLEY EXHIBITION."
 "We publish the following interesting description from the 'Chemist & Druggist,' one of the principal trade journals in England. It shows what a rooted prejudice ALL Britishers have against Colonial Manufactures."
 "We all expected that the Wembley Exhibition was to foster a preferential trade with the Empire, but the Chemist & Druggist has no such intention."


In my opinion these two or three sentences comprise a most despicable and vile attack on the sentiment of the Old Country towards her Colonials. Were it not for the insignificance of the journal in which it appears, this futile "coup de plume" might have caused damage to that happy fellowship that every sane thinking man knows in his heart exists between the Briton and the Newfoundlander.

The report which is criticized by the Trade Review bears nothing but praise and sympathy with the Newfoundland cod liver oil trade, viz.:—"Mr. Munn, who has made genuine non-freezing cod liver oil for over forty years, has a table display of the finest medicinal quality of a bright and yellow colour in a number of graduated elegant vases and pound bottles. . . . The whole forms an attractive exhibit. . . . Therefore, given equality of price, Newfoundland deserves more support from England, as the quality is quite on a level with that of the Norwegian medicinal oil. . . ."

"We may add that Newfoundland cod liver oil is all manufactured under Government control, and no factory is allowed to make oil until a license has been granted. Any refiner who attempted to use the liver of any other fish than cod for making cod liver oil would have his license cancelled immediately. . . ."

It is somewhat difficult to realize what a tremendous effort of mental contortion must have been necessary to distort the favourable meaning of these statements into showing what a rooted prejudice all Britishers have against Colonial manufactures.

If their statement is correct why on earth should the Home Government expend so much energy in the organization of the Wembley Exhibition? It is a gigantic effort to bring into closer contact the business houses of Great Britain and the Empire and to establish between them an esprit de corps which will enable them to hold their own against the balance of the entire world. The writer of the Trade Review article evidently does not wish to participate in this happy sentiment, and I have no doubt that there are a few others who share his views but, thank God, they are in a hopeless minority. One would almost be led to believe by your contemporary that the Old Country was not doing her share to patronize the Colony. To rout this disillusion it is not necessary even to dwell upon the amount of British capital working among us but simply to refer to the table of imports and exports. Take the year 1922-23, we find that we have bought five million dollars worth of imports from Canada and four million dollars worth from U.S.A. more than we have bought from Great Britain. In 1921-22 our imports from the United Kingdom amounted to \$2,036,218, compared with our exports to her amounting to \$4,866,821. Surely these statistics prove that our buying in the United Kingdom is more than reciprocated? From the same reference, it will be noticed that the Old Country is our best customer by a margin, is 1921-22, of \$2,000,000 over Portugal, the

"Plastigrams"
 Latest Marvel of the Screen at The Nickel Next Week.

Everybody knows that the motion picture is an optical illusion and that it is not a steady picture that appears on the screen but a succession of rapidly changing images which follow each other so quickly that the eye is not conscious of the change. Up to now also there have been only two dimensions apparent on the screen, that of height and breadth. Depth, the elusive third dimension has been regarded as impossible to obtain, because depth is only perceptible to the vision because the object looked at is seen simultaneously from two different angles, one by each eye, and with the ordinary straight picture it is impossible to get these angles.

At the Nickel Theatre, Thursday next, however, there will be shown a picture entitled "Plastigrams," which, with the aid of special spectacles, that will be provided every patron, will enable them to get this third dimension, in a manner that will create an entirely new sensation for picture patrons. Through the Ives-Leventhal process, based on known methods of stereoscopic reproduction, and the use of red and blue colors on the screen and in the glasses, pictures taken simultaneously by two cameras of the same object from angles corresponding exactly to the angles at which the human eyes view any object, will be combined into one picture and the onlookers will apparently see the characters move out of the screen towards them until they feel they can stretch out their hands and touch them. A wild automobile ride is so realistic that the audience will experience all its sensations, while a monkey on a trapeze will seemingly swing right out into the theatre, and other striking effects will be shown, but which will only be a blur of colors unless the glasses are used. Such a novelty in connection with motion pictures has never been seen in St. John's before—its realism is so great that the public need to be prepared for the phenomenon.

Market News

(Trade Review.)

Common Cod Oil—The local situation lacks new features of any kind. The removal of the Export Tax created a corresponding advance to the fishermen, for which they are thankful, but are now looking forward to an increased demand with still higher prices. The season is advancing and the demand is certainly very slow of coming.

Cod Liver Oil—Encouraging reports still come from the scientists but these reports are not backed up by dollars and cents such as our refiners are looking for, but they believe that there is a good time coming. There is no difficulty to sell any quantity of oil that can be manufactured here, but the trouble is to get a paying price, and in accordance with a sound, workable plan. Gradually we in this country, are struggling towards a proper plan of operation, but the process is slow. The blame is not easy to place. Economic conditions, insufficient data, over-enthusiastic forecasters, and a number of other causes, contribute to the chaos. Another troublesome problem is the relation of forest areas to arable land areas, and the lack of proper classification. This in turn leads to our greatest problem, fire.

If we can only concentrate sensibly enough upon this problem of eliminating fire, I am quite certain that we can more than double our present output of pulp and paper without danger of eventually running out of forest supplies. On the other hand, if we don't control the fire hazard we will see a decline in our pulp and paper production beginning about fifteen or twenty years hence, with the industry ending in disaster within forty years.

But I believe we can, and shall, control forest fires. Governments that never move on a national problem until kicked into it are now awakening and are showing a sincere desire to solve the problem, but there is a lack of experienced men who can understand the fundamental causes of this serious menace, and, in consequence, the application of remedies is sometimes, or, indeed, too often, ludicrous. Our technical and popular bodies in forestry matters have been loud in denunciation of forest waste, but they have offered little, if any, sound advice on methods of control. If a little more attention were paid to the promiscuous burning of slash by settlers, these same settlers, who are our log operators and woodsmen, would learn right at their own doorstep that they must be careful with fire in or near the forest.

I regret to say that in spite of all the noise, both Quebec and Ontario forest rangers are even at this moment far too lax in permitting the burning of slash.

Either Protect Forests or See Our Paper Industry Dwindle

(By R. O. SWEETZKY.)

The pulp and paper industry in Canada uses up about 4,000,000 four million cords of pulpwood yearly. In addition to this, one million cords yearly are exported to the United States.

The forests of Quebec and Ontario together contain about four hundred million cords of spruce and balsam pulpwood. It is quite safe to say that nature replenishes its forest wealth at the rate of two and one half per cent. yearly in Ontario and Quebec. This natural replenishment of course is dependent upon the ripened forest crop being removed continuously, and in accordance with a sound, workable plan. Gradually we in this country, are struggling towards a proper plan of operation, but the process is slow. The blame is not easy to place. Economic conditions, insufficient data, over-enthusiastic forecasters, and a number of other causes, contribute to the chaos. Another troublesome problem is the relation of forest areas to arable land areas, and the lack of proper classification. This in turn leads to our greatest problem, fire.

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Cure for Mouth and Foot Disease

SASKATOON, Sask., Sept. 11—Said to have been a family secret for generations, a cure for foot and mouth disease has been announced in Scotland, by an Annandale woman who, according to a letter received by Adam Henderson, Durban district farmer, has been successful in applying the treatment successfully to a herd of 150 infected cattle. The woman is Mrs. Henderson's mother-in-law.

The treatment has created widespread comment in Scottish newspapers and the question of public recognition of the woman, whose name is Mrs. Thompson, by the Ministry of Agriculture has been mooted. According to the information received in the letter, Mrs. Thompson's attention was brought to the condition of a pedigree herd of cattle belonging to Thomas C. Lindsay of Aitkenbrae Moncton, Ayrshire. The valuable herd became infected with the deadly disease which necessitated isolation. He was offered compensation and urged to destroy the animals. This he declined and consulted Mrs. Thompson.

He began to treat the animals with her cure and an immediate improvement was noticeable, and within 10 days the whole herd was free of the disease.

No British Loan

DISAPPROVAL BY LONDON CHAMBER OF COMMERCE.

The Council of the London Chamber of Commerce, at its meeting yesterday afternoon, unanimously adopted the following resolutions:—That the Council of the London Chamber of Commerce records its strong disapproval of the proposed treaty between His Majesty's Government and the Union of Soviet Republics in Russia.

It desires to reiterate the view it has expressed on many occasions that no agreement with Soviet Russia can be satisfactory to this country, which does not provide for a settlement of the trade debts due by Russian nationals to British subjects, and that the claims of the Governments against one another should be kept separate and distinct from the claims of the nationals of the two countries.



London Letter

(By PANTON HOUSE, for the Canadian Press.)

LONDON, Aug. 22.—Yesterday the British Empire Exhibition received its eleven-millionth visitor, the last millions having arrived within eight days. The Queen's Doll's House in the Palace of Arts, which is being shown at a charge of 5d. a head, earned its millionth entrance a few days ago, and has therefore collected for the charities in which Her Majesty is specially interested the substantial sum of \$125,000.

Taking one day with another, about 70,000 people a day patronise the restaurants at Wembley, and it appears that they are a somewhat better-fingered crowd. Every six days they contrive to break five tons of crockery, or 30,000 pieces, including 9,132 cups, 4,140 saucers, 5,664 plates and 9,288 oddments. To these must be added glasses at the rate of about 40,000 a week.

"NORMAN INVASION"

On Sept. 1 a large party is to arrive at Wembley from Guernsey in the Channel Islands. It will bring with it banners inscribed "The Second Norman Invasion, from Glorious Guernsey; first invasion 1066, second invasion 1924." The Channel Islands, owned by Dukes of Normandy in the 10th century have been united with the English Crown since William I. came over; the inhabitants consider that England belongs to them rather than they to England and are accustomed to give the royal toast as "The Duke of Normandy His Majesty King George."

TESTING A BRIDGE.

Within the next few days Westminster Bridge (the handsome bridge that spans the Thames from the Houses of Parliament to the County Hall) is to be tested for signs of strain due to the passage of heavy traffic. It will be closed for a quarter of an hour—which means that over 510 tramcars, 150 motor buses and 300 other vehicles will be held up or have to find another way around. Among the instruments to be used is an optical-stress-recorder fitted with a cinematographic apparatus for photographing changes in the material caused by strain.

CHAIRM OF DOWNING STREET.

"Number 10," the Prime Minister's house in Downing Street, has a powerful attraction for the visitors from all parts of England, Scotland and Wales, who are flocking to London this August at the rate of 350,000 a week. Canadians usually like to inspect this narrow 17th-century house, but it is not they who have started the custom of touching the Ministerial door-knocker. This is the practice of many pilgrims nowadays. They do not, like bad boys, knock and run away, but simply finger the lion's head in a way that can disturb nobody.

Another new custom is the photographing of small boys, standing as near as possible to the doorstep of "Number 10." The explanation given by the fond mamma with the camera is that if Tommy or George eventually becomes Prime Minister, the picture will be of historical interest.

ZOO'S RECORD BREAKING.

The Zoological Gardens—undoubtedly London's favorite summer resort—have been breaking all their gate records, this August. In the first sixteen days of the month they had 288,788 visitors, an increase of 32 per cent over the corresponding period of 1923.

The present holder of the record for escapes is an eel, who has been discovered on no less than fifteen occasions, two tanks away from his proper home in the great new aquarium. He has not been caught in the act, but it is clear that he wriggles up to the rockwork, does a tightrope act along narrow ledges, and then slithers down into the compartment he prefers; "the reason assigned for the rash act" being that he is bullied by a big brother. He is now to be allowed to stay in the new tank, in the peaceful society of a number of sea-worms.

INNS OF COURT.

Canadian lawyers and their families who took part in the recent London gathering of the English, Canadian and American Bar Association, will be interested in a recently published book, "The Story of the Inns of Court," by Sir D. Finlaid Barton, K.C. and Messrs. Charles Benham and Francis Watt. The records of the Inner and Middle Temple begin early in the 16th Century, their traditional history in 1847, when certain lawyers and students leased what had once been the property of the Knights Templars from their successors, the Knights Hospitallers. The Temple's Headquarters had been confiscated in 1307, when their Order came to grief on charges of treason, sorcery and black magic.

The title of the Inner and Middle Temples was regularized by royal grant in the reign of James I., conditional on a rent of 20 pounds per annum, and after the presentation to the King of a golden cup, valued at 666 pounds—about \$16,500 in modern money. The yearly value of the property to-day is probably over \$500,000.

Fog Cable From
Paris to Boulogne

In addition to the proposals for equipping French Channel ports with the Loth cable (a system by which vessels equipped with the necessary apparatus can in a fog guide themselves electrically by means of a submarine cable showing the way into port), it is also intended to equip the Paris-London airway with this system, so that in foggy and cloudy weather there will be no danger of aeroplanes straying from the direct route and so missing the prepared landing-places.

It has been decided to equip a large number of French aeroplanes with the Loth apparatus, and to construct a cable from Paris to Boulogne erected on tall posts, in the same manner as a telegraph wire, and a submarine cable from Boulogne to the English coast.

Sturgeon Fry
Successfully Hatched

Winnipeg, Mann.—For the first time in the history of North America, sturgeon fry have been hatched successfully. The feat was performed at Pigeon River, which empties into Lake Winnipeg, by officials of the federal department of marine and fisheries.

These officials sent specially to Pigeon River, spread their nets. The result was the capture of a pair of sturgeon, one five feet long and weighing more than 100 pounds while the other was slightly smaller. Large rents in the nets showed where other powerful sturgeon had been caught, but had torn themselves loose.

From the two fish, the officials were successful in hatching 8,000 eggs, but new sturgeon in large numbers were released into Lake Winnipeg a few days ago.

The sturgeon, according to department officials, is the fish without peer for sale on the market. Much larger than salmon, sometimes reaching a weight of 300 pounds, the sturgeon is the much sought prize of all the fish companies. In former times there was considerable sturgeon in the Lake of the Woods and the Manitoba Lakes but the constant shrinkage caused by large scale operations of fish companies practically made this variety unobtainable for many years.

Both the Canadian and United States governments have spent thousands of dollars endeavouring to hatch sturgeon, but hitherto without success.

Until the season's operations on the Pigeon River, it was thought impossible. The department of fisheries has announced that these operations will be carried out on a much larger scale next year and thereafter.

Noted Northern
Missionary

RETURNS TO CIVILIZATION.
EDMONTON, Alta.—Bishop J. O. Stringer, of the Yukon, resident of the North for more than thirty-two years, friend of the Eskimo and the Louchoux, and a man to whom the Arctic trail is an open book has returned to civilization. His wife, who has also many years to her credit as one of the pioneer white women serving in the frozen North.

Questioned as to the progress made with the Christianizing of the Eskimos, the Bishop stated that they were accepting the doctrines of the church in a remarkable manner, while he emphasized that once an Eskimo accepted the faith, he remained a convert. The Church of England Missions are making substantial progress in the North, he said, and practically all the Eskimos that can be reached from the missions at the mouth of the Mackenzie River have accepted the doctrines of the Church of England.

Contrasting the days of long ago with those of the present, the Bishop related how the Eskimos were treacherous savages when the church first commenced to minister to them and in the early days of his regime they were not to be trusted and were of a very low moral fibre. Every effort was made to bring them to a different mode of life and the remarkable change effected was brought home to him forcibly on his last visit among the natives.

Now the Eskimos are peaceable and hard workers. Most of them were well to do with the acceptance and understanding of the Christian faith. They had completely thrust aside their former methods of living, while their manners and morals now compared very favorably with many other races.

Speaking of her experiences with the Eskimos, Mrs. Stringer asserted that when she first reached the north country there were no books among the natives. Many hours, she said, were spent in translating from English to the Eskimo language according to sound, about twenty hymns, some texts of scripture, the Ten Commandments and the Creed. They were typed, mimeographed, pages cut and sewed together into book form. In this manner, the work of education began on Herschel Island.

"Eskimo parents are very fond of their children," said Mrs. Stringer, and they never punish them, which does not seem to hinder them from growing up respectful and obedient. Eskimo mothers, instead of kissing their babies as we do, touch noses. Should they see us punish our children they would think we were very cruel mothers."

Continuing, Mrs. Stringer referred to the progress made by the Eskimo women in domestic life. "Eskimo women are ingenious in the art of fashioning and sewing fur garments," she said. Mrs. Stringer further remarked that the women never allowed their clothing to get ragged or unneeded, while the children were always neatly dressed.

Bishop Stringer, with his wife, will attend the triennial meeting of the Women's Missionary Society, to be held in Hamilton, Ont., on October 1. They will return to the north country about November and will proceed to Dawson City by way of Vancouver, Skagway and White Horse. The last 800 miles of the journey will be made in sleighs driven by dogs.

Flappers' Rash Said
to be on Increase

New York, Sept. 5.—Flappers' rash, a skin disease prevalent among bobbed haired girls, is on the increase because of the fad for new styles in bobs, according to Dr. Charles F. Pabst, of Brooklyn, medical examiner for the Civil Service Commission and a specialist in skin disease.

The rash appeared along with bobbed hair and the patients gave it its non-medical name. Dr. Pabst investigated and found it was plain folliculitis, in other words inflammation of follicle or depression of the skin from which the hair grows. Blondes, because of their tender skins were found to be more susceptible than brunettes. The rash is caused by close shaving of the neck or, the use of dull clippers which pull out the hair instead of cutting it.

Dr. Pabst says frequent trips to the barber to have a straight bob turned into a shingle, and then into a boyish and finally into a pine-apple is causing the number of rash victims to increase daily.

Explains Last Color
of Sunset Displays

Toronto, August 7, 1924.—When the sun sets under certain favorable conditions it may be noticed that just as it disappears below the horizon a brilliant green color flashes up.

A generally accepted theory explains the phenomenon as due to the simultaneous absorption and dispersion of the light before it reaches the eyes of the observer.

At the British Association, Mr. F. J. Whipple, Superintendent of Climatology at the Meteorological Office of the Air Ministry reproduced the Green Flash experimentally under conditions which confirmed the reliability of theoretical explanation.

MCINTYRE WILL PAY 30 P.C. RATE
REPORT BEST YET.

Net Profits Over \$570,000 Ahead Of Last Year—Surplus Of \$3,137,000—WHH Ore Reserves Of \$11,318,000—Increase Of 50 p.c. in Ore Handled.

(From Financial Times, Aug. 29.)
The annual statement of the McIntyre-Porcupine Mines for the year ending June 30 is the strongest in the history of the Company. The production of the bullion was \$3,291,178, an increase of over \$1,000,000, while the cost of operations increased only \$460,000. Operating profits were \$1,502,846 as compared with \$915,224 the previous year, and net profits before depreciation were \$1,488,468 as compared with \$916,166. Moreover, it was announced by the President, J. C. Bickell, that starting with the dividend payment due on September 1 McIntyre will go on a basis of 5 per cent. quarterly instead of three times a year, representing a dividend increase from 15 to 30 percent.

Surplus of \$3,137,488.
The surplus account shows a balance carried forward of \$3,137,488, against one brought forward of only \$1,795,433, despite the fact that depreciation provision is slightly higher than in the previous year. The amount, however, was swelled by \$915,272, the premium realized on sale of 60,000 shares of capital stock and by \$125,239, the cost of Planarium shares hitherto carried in surplus account, and now transferred to fixed assets, the company having acquired no less than 98 per cent. of the stock outstanding. McIntyre now carries the 98 per cent. interest in Planarium, and a 75 per cent. interest in the Platt Venture claims at \$710,583 among its fixed assets.

Treated 50 Per Cent. More Ore.
Ore treated totalled 360,140 tons, averaging \$9.59, as against 240,615 tons averaging \$9.96 in 1923. The slight decline in value is due to the fact that no less than 54,864 tons of development ore were handled at a varying content. Ore hoisted aggregated 360,356 tons, averaging \$9.70 and the mill runs came within one cent of this average.

During the year over 18,000 feet of development work was done, and 223 feet of shaft sinking. The main shaft is now down to 2,331 feet, and a main haulage level equipped with electric locomotives has been established at 2,375 feet. President Bickell announces again that work will be begun immediately on the new shaft on the east claim of the Jupiter property, with an immediate objective of 4,000 feet.

Ore Reserves \$11,318,516.
Despite the large amount of development work done, operating costs have been cut from \$5.54 to \$4.2667 per ton.

Ore reserves are now estimated at \$11,318,516 in 1,167,064 tons of ore of an average value of \$9.92, against \$8,514,800 in 858,504 tons of \$9.70 for last year, customary allowance for dilution having been made.

Undertow Claimed In Earth's Crust.

Further confirmation for the theory of a plastic substructure for the earth's crust was offered to geologists at the British Association recently by Reginald A. Daly, professor of geology at Harvard University, who delivered a paper in which he related the degree of plasticity of the earth's crust to the depth below the surface. During the glacial period, it seems vast masses of ice accumulated in the northern part of North America, two of the areas badly frozen being Keewatin and Labrador. The crust of the earth at these points tended to yield under the load, and to sink below the normal level, until the load-part of the crust was brought into equilibrium with the unloaded portions adjacent. When the ice was removed, the ground which it covered was at an abnormally low level, and proceeded to restore itself gradually to the horizontal.

"These regions have now readjusted themselves completely," the geologist said. "There is sufficient evidence to support the theory that an equally complete and perfect response to the gravitational forces took place, when the continent was weighted

down with huge masses of ice." Dr. Daly pointed out that the subsidence under the ice load as accompanied by an elevation of the neighboring crust in a ring surrounding the loaded down area. To explain this phenomenon, he proposed the theory that the strength of the earth's crust decreases in zones, becoming less with increasing depth. This gave rise to an undertow below the depressed territories, which pushed out the substructure from beneath the sinking lands, and accordingly elevated the surface just beyond the edge of the glaciated region.

"This viscous flow had greatest effect at great depths," Prof. Daly stated. The downward pressure of the piled up ice was communicated through the soft layers of the earth to the country beyond, in the light of this theory, according to the principle of the mechanism used to control the steering engines of large steamers from the pilot house, in which the motion is transmitted by oil enclosed in steel pipes.

Britain's Giant Aeroplane

London, Sept. (By Canadian Press).—The first official flight of an aeroplane of 1,000 horsepower, the largest single-engined machine yet devised, took place recently at Brough. The machine and its initial flight are thus described in the Times by the aeronautical correspondent of the Thunderer:

"The Blackburn-Napier Cubaroo, the largest single-engined aeroplane in the world, built specially to utilize the full power of the 1,000-horsepower Napier Cub engine, in itself the highest-powered aero engine in existence, is designed to be either a torpedo or bomb carrier of exceptionally long range in point of duration, and may fairly be said to represent a notable achievement in British aviation."

"It is the result of the aircraft skill of the Blackburn Aeroplane Co., whose works are situated here on the edge of the Humber, and the long experience of internal combustion engines possessed by Messrs. D. Napier & Son, and its flight has been awaited with considerable interest, not only in British air circles, but in many foreign countries. As the machine has been built to the order of the Air Ministry for service purposes, it is not permissible to refer in detail either to the performance of the machine, which in itself is noteworthy, or to all the interesting features of all the internal arrangements, but it may be stated that the gross weight the Napier Cub has to take through the air is over nine tons, and that the carrying capacity is approximately three tons.

"The span of the machine, which positively towers above one when standing on the ground, is 88 ft. and despite its size, the wings are so arranged that they can be folded back for storage. The length is 54 ft. and the overall height is slightly more than 19 ft.

"The machine is the product of Major Bumpus, the chief designer of the Blackburn Aeroplane Company, who has already an exceedingly useful deck landing torpedo plane (now in, extensive use in the Service) to his credit, and it utilizes the special triangular form of steel fuselage construction which is a feature of Blackburn productions.

"If the machine were impressive, its actual flight was even more so, and despite its size it obviously was handled as easily as a scout. Its pilot, Flight-Lieut. W. S. Bulman, certainly did many of the things one associates with a small machine, such as: throttling down close to the ground, flying directly toward a group of cinema operators on a mound, and then opening out on a climbing turn over their heads.

"At one time it looked as if low clouds and heavy rain would prevent the flight, but at 4 o'clock a watery sun broke through the clouds and the internal self-starter was at once set to work to charge up the big engine. Once the Cub got going it genially grumbled to itself in a deep-throated rumble during the preliminary warming-up process, and then the pilot, a tiny figure it seemed, perched high up in the fuselage, 'taxied' over to the far side of the aerodrome, turned, and at once opened up the engine.

"With a powerful roar the Napier Cub lifted the machine into the air after a run of less than 200 yards. Then followed over 20 minutes' delightful flying, and though one never lost the impression of the size of the machine, or the spread of its silver-colored wings, the ease with which it turned, banked and climbed over and around the sheds on the aerodrome, and the smallness of the circle in which it manoeuvred, suggested more the control of a single-seater sport than that of a machine weighing tons.

"The landing as the most perfect it has been one's pleasure to see for a long time; the huge machine glided slowly down to earth, and without any perceptible moment of contact with the ground sank on to the oleo gear of its double undercarriage and came to rest in a very short run."

Members of Parliament

ENGAGED IN TREASURE QUEST.

London, Sept.—(Canadian Press).—The British House of Commons is engaged in a treasure quest. It is believed that somewhere there are to be found, perhaps on the Continent or in America, if not in this country, three ivory statuettes of the 17th century, which open and display beautifully carved scenes of striking incidents in British history.

There have already been discovered two of Charles the First and one of Oliver Cromwell, which are now in the possession of the House; but the original set, it is thought, consisted of six. A fourth, in fact, has already been traced. It is a Mary Queen of Scots, the skirt opening back to reveal a carved scene of the death of Rizzio. Though it has been stated that it was bought for £30 in Meran by an American some time ago, there is reason to believe it is in this country, and that there is a prospect of the House having an opportunity to acquire it.

Of the subjects of the others of the set there is no very definite information, but so novel is the idea in the carving—the historic scene within the body of the figure—that members of the House who are devoting their holidays a little time to the quest cannot fail to identify the little treasures if by some lucky chance they should come across them.

The first was found some six years ago by Sir Clive Morrison-Bell in a shop at Geneva. It was a Charles the First, standing in full Cavalier costume, with the left hand resting on the belt which holds the sword. The whole of the body of the figure opens in the centre and reveals in three parts what is described on the tablet that rests on the thighs, "Disolution of Parliament by Oliver Cromwell."

The central scene, with its 10 or a dozen little figures, depicts the moment when Cromwell is thundering "Take away that Bauble." In the left hand panel are soldiers entering the House, and in the right hand members being expelled. The head of Charles, like a rock above a climber, overhangs the opened scene.

Another Charles and an Oliver Cromwell with a scene of the Battle of Naseby have been presented more recently by Sir William Bull and W. R. Rea. They have not yet been shown, but will shortly be placed in glass cases with the first Charles in the library.

The landing was made without mishap on the aviation grounds at the Hudson's Bay reserve here.

"Wop" May and his plane were at Vikings when the idea occurred to Mr. Brown to eject something new into marriage ceremonies. A deal was quickly made with the aviator and the bride-to-be was phoned at her home in Vegreville to be ready in a field outside the town with the minister, Rev. A. K. Schrag. Upon landing the ceremony was performed before a large number of citizens.


THE GREATEST LONG DISTANCE RUNNER.

The greatest Long Distance Runner of all time they called Paavo Nurmi

at the Olympic Games. This wiry marvel from Finland performed the amazing feat of winning the 1,500 and 5,000 meter runs on the same day with only fifty minutes of rest between the events, breaking Olympic records both times. Subsequently he won the 10,000 meter cross-country and 3,000 meter team races, setting a new Olympic record in the latter.

His Previous Record.

Paavo Nurmi is fairly heavily built, quite tall enough for a distance runner, and covers close on 9ft. at every stride. He was under twenty years of age when he first came into prominence, just prior to the VIII Olympiad, and at that time was far short of his best form. He is an athlete of dogged perseverance and the most amazing versatility. Although he won the Finnish Championships at 1,500 and 5,000 Metres in July, 1920, and has since broken world's record record at both 1,500 metres and one mile, it was at that time thought that



the longer distance would suit him best. This idea was further fostered at Antwerp last that same July. At the VIII Olympiad he did not compete in the 1,500 Metres, was beaten by Guillemot at 5,000 Metres, but turned the tables upon the Frenchman at 10,000 Metres. In their first race the Frenchman out-generated the Finn and beat him by a long-sustained burst of speed in the last lap of the 5,000 Metres. The time was 14min. 55 3-5 sec. In the 10,000 metres Nurmi left no margin for a second mistake, and the pace was such that Guillemot had not the vestige of a sprint left in him at the end of the longer race, which Nurmi won in 31 min. 45 4-5 sec.

In 1922 Nurmi came to England and won the Four Miles A.A.A. Championship in 19min. 52 1-5 sec. The following afternoon he beat the best of our steeplechase runners how he liked a two-mile course in 13 min. 11 1-5 sec. The time is not, however, as good as that shown by Great Britain's Olympic record holder, Percy Hodge, at Antwerp in 1920.

With Willie Ritola to relieve him in the 10,000 Metres and possibly the 5,000 Metres also, it is certain that Nurmi will compete in the Olympic 1,500 Metres, at which distance he is now pre-eminent, and it is quite possible that he may prefer the Steeplechase to the 5,000 Metres. His versatility is well shown by the world's records he holds, which are given below:—

1921 One Mile, 4min. 13 9-10 sec. Six Miles, 29min. 41 1-5 sec. 10,000 Mts. (6 miles 3764 yards) 30min. 40 1-5 sec.

1922 2,000 Mts. (2,187.4 yards) 5 min. 26 3-5 sec. 5,000 Mts. (5,468.11 yards) 14 min. 26 3-1 sec. Three miles 14min. 8 4-5 sec.

1923 1,500 Mts. (1,640.43 yards) 3 min. 53 sec. One Mile 4min. 10 2-5 sec. 3,000 Mts. (1 mile, 1,520 yards) 8min. 27 4-5 sec.

Nurmi's 1,500 metres form will no doubt have the greatest interest for British people; since, to us, the one mile is the classic athletic distance. His time for 1,500 metres is 3 4-5 sec. better than the Olympic record, set up by the great Oxonian, A. N. S. Jackson, at Stockholm, in 1912, and, moreover, when Nurmi broke the world's one mile record he did so by the very comfortable margin of 2 1-5 sec.

Despite Nurmi's wonderful records Great Britain, America, and Sweden all have hopes of gaining a gold medal for the 15,000 Metres at Paris. H. B. Stallard, of Cambridge University, was but narrowly beaten in the English Mile Championship of 1921, when A. G. Hill reduced the British record to 4min. 13 4-5 sec. On that occasion Stallard's time was 4min. 14 1-5 sec. America's hope will be little Jolie Ray, whose stride measures no more than 7ft. He has held the One Mile American Championship title for eight out of the last nine years, and has 4min. 13 4-5 sec. to his credit. E. Wide, who represents Sweden, is a recent discovery; big, blonde, and 8½ feet strider, he has already run 1,500 metres in 3 min. 56 7-10 sec. which is just a fraction inside Strode Jackson's Olympic record.

When Wide was beaten by Nurmi in world's record time for one mile last year the Swede returned 4min. 13 1-10 sec. but none of these performances need alarm us, for times are notoriously fast in Sweden on account of the rarefied air and the very fast track at Stockholm.






