A new treaty having reference to ne natralization of German emigration to the United States has lately been ratified, between the latter coun-try and the North German Confeder-ation. By it the German States agree to recognize as American citizens, and treat as such, all Germans who shall have resided for an uninterrupted period of five years beneath the stars and stripes. This much is very satisfactory, but there are some provisions which are not likely to meet with such general approbation; as for instance that "the declaration of an intention to become a citizen of the one or the other country has not for either party seen is to leave the German emigrant without protection from the United States laws for a period of five years after he first sets foct on American soil. All that time he must be a German, the foregoing restriction rendering it impossible for him to change his nationality until five summers and winters have passed over him after he has become a naturalized citizen he continues amenable to the laws of Germany for any crime he may have committed before emigration. Now, one of the chief crimes which it is anticipated he mey have committed is non-compliance with the law which renders it imperative for every German to serve a number of years under the flag as a soldier, a number in the landstrum, nothing in the shape of exemption from military duties being allowed him until he arrives at the mature age of thirty-two, and absolute exemption coming to him only when he is far advanced in life. The North German Confederation has no intention of consulting the ease and welfare of its citizens in preterence to the magnitude and efficiency of its armies, and consequently we find that under this treaty Germans returning to their native land, even though they should have served the probationary term necessary to their becoming naturalized Americans will be liable to thave renounced their naturalization when they have resided, for a second time, longer than two years in Germany. THE SILVER QUESTION:—The Board of Trade of Ottawa has issued a circular, in which the action of the Board is set forth on the silver question, and the suggestion offered to the Government, viz., that the silver should be called in and purchased by the Government, at current rates, to be paid for in legal tender notes, and that if necessary a further issue of Canadian silver currency, should be made. The same circular contains three propositions; which are commended to the consideration of "other Boards of Trade in the Province," viz., that the Government, in fixing the standard of value, "should be requested to recognise the fact that the English sovereign is likely to become a standard of value for international circulation throughout, Europe;" that there should be a mint established for the Dominion of Canada, and that "a Board of Trade should be organised the Dominion of Canada, and that "a Board of Trade should be organised for the Dominion, consisting of two delegates from every Board of Trade in the Province, who would watch over the interests of commerce, manufactures, navigation, the currency laws and fiscal regulations."

The supply of wheat for the past week has been very light. During the last three days there has been no fall wheat with the exception of a single load, and the deliveries of spring wheat for the same period have not amounted to more than 300 bushels. Of other grains the receipts have been small, merely nominal, only about thirty bushels of barley having been brought in since Monday and a proportionately small quantity of peas and oats. We have no change in prices to note since last week except in the article of spring wheat, which has advanted considerably. It is now bought freely at \$1.65 per bushel, in bills, and a load sold to-day for \$1.67. All other grains remain unchanged. The deliveries of pork are very light, and we cannot see that there is any alteration to be recorded. Hogs of medium weight and fatness sell at about \$6, but some of very superior size and quality will fetch a price much higher.
