Affairs in France. The restless ambition of politi-ans and public men in France, com. bined with the strange medley of ofitical creeds held by its people, eeps that country in a continual arment. Scarcely had the excitement attending a ministerial crisis bated, when a new sensation springs up in the shape of an appeal from Count de Chambord in behalf of Monarchy. A descendant of the once powerful but now despised Bourbons, he still dreams of the re-establishment of monarchy in establishment of monarchy in France, and as he has the best right to be King—if such a functionary is to be again recognized—he has is-sued a manifesto, which appeals to the loyalty of the people, and in which he asserts his right to reign. He repudiates the charge brought against him that he wishes to override the laws, and would prefer a government based on absolutism and arbitrary ideas. He favours a limited monarchy, which would give to the King the nomination of members to one branch of the Legislature, leaving to the people the right to elect members to the other. He says he has no desire to domineer over the people, nor should the people contend against the King,

limited monarchy. But it is questionable whether it will have that mfluence over the people which the Count in promulgating it desires. There is no doubt it will secure the sympathies of those who earnestly wish to see a permanent form of Government established, and who are indifferent whether that is accomplished under a perpetual republic or limited monarchy. But outside of this class there are the extreme Republicans — restless spirits, whose visionary schemes are impracticable, but who are ever seeking to carry them into effect.
