A DARING OUTLAW. markable Career of a Man Just Shot by

[From the Philadelphia Times.] Few criminals have passed a more advenurous life than John Cannon, alias Davis, who was shot by detective Gray several nights ago in attempting to escape, after eing arrested on the charge of robbing hotel rooms at Harrisburg during the convention. His real name is neither Cannon nor Davis, but he is a Canadian by birth and a man of great daring and remarkable resources. His line of operations has always been the robbery of hotel rooms. He was heard of before the outbreak of the war, when the Mississippi steamers, which were patronized by wealthy planters going to and returning from New Orleans, and the high-toned gamblers who fleeced them alike became victims for the arile "community". Care victims for the agile "room worker." Can-non, Dave Cummings, and Billy Forrester are said to have begun their life of crime on are said to have begun their life of crime on the floating palaces of the Mississippi, and each at times had narrow escapes from the vengeance of the plundered gamblers. Can-non was the object of at least one daring

confederates visited the jail, and by the argument of the revolver compelled the sheriff and jailer to liberate Cannon.

He was afterward in prison at Richmond, He was afterward in prison at Richmond, Va., and then went south again in company with George Dubois, alias Henry Burton, who was afterward captured here, four years ago, while breaking fnto a silk store on South Eleventh street, on a Sunday. They committed a heavy robbery of a jewelry salesman at the Planter's hotel in St Louis in 1872, and, after another heavy job at New Orleans, Cannon, becoming hard pushed by the detectives, fled to the west, where he became associated with a band of the most desperate train.

to the west, where he became associated with a band of the most desperate train-wreckers who harrassed the traveling community, Having amassed a large fortune he retired from train-robbing and settled at St. Catharines, Ont, as a grain merchant. Speculation devoured his ill-gotten wealth, but he saw an opportunity to recuperate and came to Philadelphia during the centennial. Tillie Miller, alias Mrs. Robert Howland a notorious New York thief, ob-Howland, a notorious New York thief, obtained the trunks of a lady who was staying at the same hotel where Cannon had his family, and this circumstance and his inexplicable identification by a gentleman whom he visited alarmed him lest he might be suspected of having a hand in Mrs. Miller's work, and he shook the dust of Philadelphia precipitately from his feet, finding the sands of Cape May a far more agreeable footing. A few more years of criminal adventure, and Caunon's career had a three years blank introduced into it, when he went to Trenton for a jewelry robbery at Newark. If she does not suit the lady she can secure another place by the end of that time.
