

A TELL-TALE TIMEPIECE.

HOW THE STORY OF A MYSTERIOUS TRAGEDY WAS UNRAVELLED.

An Incident of Over Three Years Ago—The Accessory to a Murder Found Guilty of Only Assault and Robbery.

HAMILTON, Jan. 16.—At the assize to-day Timothy Dewey was put on trial for assault and robbery. In August, 1881, an engineer on the Hamilton and North-western railway, named McGreggor, was thought to have run over on the Great West. He lived at the Falls, and when he left home he had a watch and chain, but when the body was found they were gone.

It is this watch and chain Dewey is charged with stealing. Timothy Dewey, a carpenter, Wynne and Gates of this city arrested him at a revel meeting in Blenheim and brought him to this city. At the first trial the jury disagreed, and the prisoner was not brought up until now, being detained in jail meantime. Crown Attorney Henry prothonotary, Mr. Carleton, defended Dewey. Mr. Carleton in his defence stated that McGreggor was returned from South America to take up the watch was not on the body when the dead man was discovered; that Dewey and another tailor named Charles Woods, both of that time belonging to the schooner Undine, were drinking in company with McGreggor that night; they did not go to the vessel, though part of their wages was due; that McGreggor was killed by Dewey and Woods went to Hagersville with two women from Glanville; at Hagersville Woods left the party and they went to Canfield; at Canfield Dewey sold a watch and chain to a farmer named Hancy; the watch was again stolen from Hancy before the discovery of the body; the circumstances and only the chain could be produced at the trial; it was recognized by McGreggor by a mark he had put on the chain; the women were put in the box and told the story of their journey to Canfield and thence to Buffalo. Mrs. Hale, or White, said that she was in the boat with Woods walking on the track with a man who was pretty full, and Woods struck the man on the head and took his watch. Woods continued sailing, and before it was discovered that he had been in McGreggor's company he was lost with the schooner Express in the Georgian bay. The evidence for the defence rather confirmed the testimony on the other side and the jury after being out thirteen minutes brought in a verdict of guilty and Dewey was remanded back for sentence.

Relative to the foregoing case considerable comment is passed upon the fact that the Hamilton police treated McGreggor's death as an accident and did not see that an inquest was held. Some trouble, however, was taken to get the body to the city. Detectives Rogers and Wynne discovered that Hancy, the man who bought it from Dewey, had his pocket picked by a man formerly a child of his place. He was 3 feet 3 inches tall. Mrs. Roberts, who is now 33 years old, is not expected to recover.
