The McKinley Bill STRIKES

A Strike is a declaration of Industrial War, and as such cannot but embody a certain amount of evil. If it could be traced to its true source that source would prove to be evil. But we are told by a sage, who has discerned the constitution of things for all time, that "there is a soul of good in things evil." The truth of that saying is verified in human experience. If there were no evil to combat me share to evil to combat, no abuse to reform and no higher development to attain, goodness would have no opposite, and therefore could not be known through contrast or compari-

son,
Strikes entail bitter suffering and loss. Anything of the nature of war is certain to do that to both sides. The lessons are deep and practical to both parties, not easily to be forgotten. Experience teaches there are faults on either side, wrongs inflicted, extravagant demands and violations of the moral and individual right of freedom.

reedom. As a nation the United States is going from bad to worse. The condition of the working-man is being made harsher by The condition of the workingman is being made harsher by that monstrous wrong known as the McKinley Bill, it will intensify the struggle for existence and will make the workingman's life more miserable. It is simply a strike in favor of further prohibition of trade. If there is any merit or virtue in such a war against trade the strike should be for absolute or total prohibition of trade with the outside word. In that case "the soul of good in the evil" would be the more quickly realized, because the evil would be the immediate cause of its own destruction. Talk as we may about the extravagant demands of workingmen in their strikes they are insignificant as compared with the Infamous and ruinous strikes of protective governments. A keen British statesman observed upon the passage of the Reform Bill of 1867, "Now we must educate our masters."

Germany did not triumph over France in 1870 because of the genius of one Moltke, but because every soldier in the German Army was a type of Moltke in the system. Every individual in that army is a factor in the unity of the Fatherland; so likewise is every workingman—not a drone—but a factor in the recreation of the world. Let him, therefore, be educated in the sphere of sympathy, kindness, justice and freedom and then his manhood will be on a par with his brotherhood. But that nation or people are ripe for slavery or revolution But that nation or people are ripe for slavery or revolution who permit their government to roll up a surplus of \$700,000,000, and who, instead of demanding a remission of taxation, submit to McKinley bills, greater taxation and heavier burdens. The McKinley Bill, however, may prove the last straw, or the darkest incident before the dawn of a brighter day. If industrial war brings about an economy that will embrace mankind in one grand monopoly, then must it be regarded as the most powerful agent of human progress in this our day and generation.

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
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
