



Rushing in and seeing what he had intended to be his masterpiece ruined, as he thought, angered to madness, he siew the boy on the spot. When the metal had cooled and the mould was opened, the bell was found to be an exquisite work, perfect in finish and of marvelous sweetness of tone. Coming to his senses, he recognized the bloody work, and straightway gave himself up to the magistrates. "Blood for blood" was the law; he was condemned to die, and he went to his doom while his beautiful bell pealed an invitation to all to pray for "the poor sinner," whence its name. W. 
