OP THE WAR OF 1812-14.

CHAPTER IX.

Ridiculous as the movements on Lake Ontario with well found and manned squadrons may have been, the results must not be accepted as a fair criterion of the capacity or conduct of the subordinate officers, the action on Lake Erie which is now to be desribed, proves that there were fighting men and good seamen in the respective services which produced Yeo and Chauncey.

Early in May, 1814, Captain R. H. Barclay was appointed to the command of the British flotilla on Lake Erie, an equivocal honor which had been declined by Capt. W. H. Mulcaster, on account of the bad equipment of the vessels, these, owing to the loss of the Detroit, consisted of only five vessels, the whole not being equal in aggregate tonnage or force to a British 20 gun ship. With a lieutenant and 19 seamen Captain Barclay joined his enviable command and forthwith laid down the timbers of a ship at Amherstburg intended to measure 300 tons and mount 18 guns.

Since March Captain O. H. Perry, of the United States Navy. had been constructing at Fort Erie a flotilla which was affoat early in June, and consisted of one brig, six fine schooners and one sloop mounting 15 heavy long guns, all on traversing carriages; two brigs of 460 tons each to mount 18 carronades, 32-pounders and two long twelves, had also been laid down at Presqu'isle and were in a state of forwardness. ajor General Procter, the British commanding officer at Amherstburg, who was eminent for planning expeditions but totally and invariably failed in carrying them out, reported to Sir George Prevost the facility with which these vessels might be destroyed provided he would send a reinforcement of troops and about one hundred seamen, with a well appointed military force at his disposal, supported by a far abler man than himself, the great Indian Chief Tecumseth, with a body of brave Indian allies, General Procter would have been far

himself than writing despatches to the Governor General on the subject. Placed of necessity in an isolated command his duty would only be performed by taking the initiative in all cases, but he as well as Sir George Prevost was smitten with the cacothes scribendi and employed the time which should have been spent in action in penning despatches-both illustrating what a curse to the public service soldiers or sailors afflicted with that disease are -- in fact they were both incapables. Procter must have known that no such re-inforcements could by possibility arrive-that his only safety consisted in striking an effective blow at his enemy, and he had quite as many men under his command as the gallant and lamented Brock when he captured Hull's army at Detroit in 1812.

The American brigs were launched, and although they had to pass a bar with guns and stores out and almost on their beams ends, the Niagara and Lawrence by the end of August were fully armed and equipped, and this too in the face of the British squadron who had been obliged to retire to Am herstburg for provisions. Procter's supineness and incapacity allowed the Americans to assemble troops on all his communications with Michigan, and capture all his provision depots without resistance, so that the flotilla and troops were on short allowance and the final catastrophe was precipitated by this cause.

In narrating the action which followed, the Naval historian does the Indians great injustice by supposing that one of the reasons which impelled Barclay to this unequal encounter was a "not improbable dread of Indian treachery"--a far better reason was that " his people were on half allowance of food, not another day's flour in store." After the disastrous issue of the action on Lake, Erie those very Indians fought like true was 580 men. The relative forces were as soldiers, while the British troops laid down; follows:their arms to a foe numerically inferior and! their General sought safety in flight having first sacrificed his comman I to his total incapacity. How different was the conduct of "Tecumseth," after the regular soldiers laid better employed in effecting this service down their arms with hardly a show of resis-

tance he continued the action and would have defeated the Americans if an acciden tal shot had not closed his career, and even after his fall his gallant followers made their enemies dearly purchase their victory.

By the latter end of August the Detroit, as the new ship built at Amherstburg was named, was launched, and now the difficulty was to equip her-the fort at Amherstburg was stripped and 19 guns of four different calibers obtained. Some idea may be formed of the difficulty and expense of fitting out vessels at that remote corner of Canada in the year 1813, by stating that every round of shot cost 25 cents per pound for carriage from Quebec to Lake Erie, and all other things in proportion.

Early in September Capt. Barclay received a draught of seamen from the Dover troop ship, many of whom would not have rated as "ordinaries" on board a ship of war. There were now fifty British seamen to man two ships, two schooners, a brig and a sloop, armed altogether with 63 carriage guns-the remainder of crews consisted of eighty Canadian militia soldiers, 240 soldiers of the Newfoundland and 41st regiment, making a grand total of 370 men. So badly equipped were the vessels of the flotilla that neither friction, fusee, or port-fires were on board the Detroit, and the men were obliged to discharge a pistol at the touch hole of the great guns before they could fire a broadside.

The ships of the American flotilla were equipped in the most complete manner, large draughts of seamen had repeatedly marched to Lake Eric from the scaboard. The watchfulness of the British cruisers and the destruction of the prestige of their Navy by the capture of the Chesapeak decided their Government to disarm most of their large vessels and send the picked crews to reinforce their fleets on the Lakes. number on board Captain Perry's squadron

On the 10th September soon after daylight the American squadron was discovered at anchor in Put-in-bay, the British squadron immediately bore up with the wind from the South-west to bring the enemy to action. Captain Perry thereupon got under way to meet the British who at 10 a.m. by a sudden shift of wind to the South-east were thrown to leeward of their opponents. Capt. Barclay who carried his broad pendant on board the Detroit, so stationed his vessels that those who were the nearest to an equality of force in the two squadrons might be opposed to each other. The line was thus formed:

At 11 h. 45 m. the Detroit commenced the action with the Lawrence carrying Captain Perry's broad pendant and supported by the schooners Ariel and Scorpion, and altho the matches and tubes were so defective that pistots were obliged to be fired at the touch holes of the guns as before stated, yet so well were they fought by the Canadian militia soldiers and seamen, that after an engagement of two hours the Lawrence was knocked almost to pieces. Commodore Perry being obliged to leave her, she struck her colors but could not be taken possess ion of as the Detroit having sailed with only one boat had that knocked to pieces by a round shot and the American brig as soon as she dropped out of gun shot re hoisted her colors.

Captain Perry repaired on board the

Captain Perry repaired on board the Niagara which was then warily engaged with the Queen Ch whotte using his long guns being supported by two heavy schooners, she inflicted severe loss on that vessel killing her captain and disabling his lieutenant, she was fought for some time by the officer next in command, provincial Lieutenant Irvine, but she could not succeed in getting the American vessels within range of her 24 pounder carronades and after suffering heavy loss was obliged to strike her colors.

The Detroit had been disabled by the severe action with the Lawrence, the Niagara was now laid athwart her bows while some of the schooners lay on her quarters, a fierce contest ensued which continued till Captain Barclay was most dangerously wounded, his lieutenant and eight out of the ten seamen on board killed, her colors were then struck; the Hunter and Lady Prevost surrendered at the same time as did the Chippawa and Little Belt soon afterwards.

In this well contested action the British lost 3 officers and 38 men killed, 9 officers and 55 men wounded, total 41 killed and 94 wounded. On the American side there were 27 men killed and 96 wounded, of

which 22 was killed and 61 wounded on board the Lawrence alone.

Captain Barclay with his surviving officers and seamen was tried in 1814 for the loss of the squadron and most honorably acquitted with a very flattering testimonial to his gallantry and professional skill, but although this brave officer had lost his right arm many years before and his loft rendered useless by a wound in the action on Lake Eric, he was not promoted to Post rank till 1824.

There can be very little doubt that the loss of the weather guage decided the fate of this action, badly found as the British squadron undoubtedly was, it had decidedly the best of the engagement up to the time when Captain Perry took command of the Niagara which he prudently kept out of the range of the 24 pounder carronades of the Queen Charlotte.

The immediate result of the action was the disgraceful retreat of Proctor from Amherstburgh, his dilatory proceedings and final rout at Moraviantown with the surrender of nearly the whole of the 41st regi ment, the death of Tecumseth, and the last great battle of the Indians with their white

On the 3rd of June 1813 two American armed sloops appeared in sight of the British garrison at Isle aux Noix, in the river Richelieu the effluent of Lake Champlain. As the river is very narrow and it was impossible to manœuvre it is hard to conceive their object in thus tempting fate. Three gun boats got under way to attack them, and the crews of ten row boats and two batteaux were landed to annoy them in the rear. After a contest of two hours and a half the two sloops surrendered, they proved to be the Growler and Eagle sloop of 11 guns and 50 men each. The British of 11 guns and 50 men each. had three men wounded, the Americans one killed and eight severely wounded. capture was accomplished by a detachment of the 100th Regiment and some of the Royal Artillery under the command of Major Taylor.

On the 1st of August, some officers and seamen having arrived from Quebec an expedition was fitted out consisting of the two sloops, three gunboats and several batteaux containing about 1000 troops under the command of Colonel Murray, the flotilla commanded by Capt. Thos. Everard, late of the 18 year brig—Sloop Wasp.

late of the 18 gun brig—Sloop Wasp.

This little armament entered the American port at Plattsburg, where the soldiers were landed, the American Militia driven away, all the arsenals, block-houses, I rracks and stores of every description, together with the extensive barracks at Saranac were destroyed. They then proceeded off Burlington and Swinton in Vermont where tney seized and destroyed several sloops laden with provisions and did considerable injury. All this time the United States troops 4,000 strong lay at Burlington, only 24 miles distant, under the commmand of Major General Hampton.

The American naval force on the Lake at this time consisted of the President of 12 guns, the Commodore Preble and Montgomery of 11 guns each, the Francis of 6 guns, two gun boats of one 18 pounder each, and six scows of one 12 pounder each.

It is evident that the British could not lay claim to all the imbecility which characterized the conduct of nearly all the principal officers engaged in this contest rendered memorable by its blunders.

. While the actic.: on Lake Erie laid the western frontier open to invasion, and Proctor's deleat at Moraviantown removed the only obstacle between the invaders and Burlington heights, the indomitable spirit of the Canadian Militia not only provented them reaping any advantage from this circum stance, but actually inflicted a severe defeat upon a detachment of over 400 men entrenched at a place called Battle Creek, six miles east of Wardsville, in the County of Middlesex, and with: 21 miles of Proctor's defeat ten months after.

The circumstances which contributed to Barclay's defeat have been narrated, the principal being the loss of the weather guage, the others merely aggravated that accident: in those days of steam it may seem strange to say that a shift of wind should be attended with such momentuous consequences, but when it alone was the only motive power, the great business of a seaman's life was the study of the laws by which it is governed and its application to the purposes he had in view, this involved a practical knowledge of natural philosophy and mechanical science unknown at the time outside the profession, and no doubt had its effect in shaping the peculiar character of the mariner's of Old England.

Taught from early boyhood to confront danger without fear to deal with the most subtle of all elements, to controul and render it obedient, to be prompt and self reliant in action, the extraordinary deeds of daring and enterprise which the history of this war unfolds will lose much of its marvellous character if the cause by which such efforts were produced is closely studied.

Barclay has been blamed for going into action with an ill found squadron the command of which had been refused by another officer, but it is evident he simply did his duty as a scaman by refusing no task assigned in the service of his Country however desperate, and although Capt. Mulcaster, may have saved his professional reputation whatever that might be yet it was done at the expense of his Country's interest.

the expense of his Country's interest.

If victory had crowned Barclay's action the case of the formers reputation would not have saved him from the imputation of less respectable motives, and would have amply illustrated the axiom ".hat the "path of duty is the path of honor and "safety." Had the wind continued in the south-oast for 20 minutes after the action commenced so as to enable the Queen Charlotto to clese with the Niagara the American Squadron would have been an chored at Amherstburg as prizes before nightfall.

By way of celebrating the tenth anniversary of his birthdily in a manner befitting his rank, "Prince Friedrick Wilhelm Victor Albert of Prussia" (the son of the Princess Royal of England) "has been appointed second lieutenant in the 1st Regiment of Foot Guards, and been placed à la suite of the 1st battalion (the Berlin battalion) of the 2nd Regiment of Landwehr Guards." On the morning of the eventful day he Royal grandfather and Commander-in-Chuf presented the young Prince, who is a fine boy for his age, with his first uniform and the insignia of the Order of the Black Eagle. The Prince, having duly equipped himself with the appurtenances of his new dignity, in accordance with military etiquette reported himself to the King, who was graciously pleased to express his satisfaction with the military bearing of the new officer. A child's party at the Crown Prince's Palace concluded the day.

The new iron clad "Hercules" has joined the channel fleet at Lisbon. She has on board all her 600 pounder Armstrong guns. CANADA.


