### CURRENT TRADE CONDITIONS.

ONTARIO.

IT seems reasonable to charge the present duliness in the lumber trade to the holidayseason, though there are lumbermen who, whilst willing to accept this view of the situation, are not sure but that other causes explain the depression. measure of competition that is entering into transactions is not viewed as healthful. A large manufacturer and wholesaler remarked to the writer a day or two since, that though they were offering bill stuff, with considerable long stuff in it, at from \$3 to \$5 less than the same price a year ago, they were yet unable to secure any large volume of trade, others cutting below these figures. A good deal of long stuff is going into building operations in Toronto, but at the unprofitable prices named. In western Ontario, travellers, who are out, are picking up some business, but the orders are small. Reports that come to the LUMBERMAN from different parts of the province indicate that stocks on hand are heavy, and it will require a strong revival in trade in the fall to move these freely. Despite the duliness, however, the belief is that this improvement is coming.

### QUEBEC AND NEW BRUNSWICK.

A weakening of freight rates is a feature of the situation in Quebec. Fair activity in shipments continues. In New Brunswick there is a slackening off of business, compared with the very general activity that has prevailed throughout the season,

which will make the total shipments for the year exceed those of a corresponding period a year ago. The spruce situation is somewhat demoralized, and a coming meeting of the Northeastern Lumbermen's Association is looked forward to with some interest.

### BRITISH COLUMBIA AND MANITOBA.

The advance in prices of lumber in British Columbia, noted a week ago, is proving inspiriting to trade, and the view is entertained that a revival is near at hand. movement at the Puget Sound mills to increase prices will strengthen the case of British Columbia lumbermen. R. P. Rithet & Co., Ltd., in their monthly shipping report, say that the late activity in lumber has not been very well maintained, and with the exception of Australia consuming markets seem to be satisfied for the present. Rates are easier in spite of the fact that suitable vessels continue scarce. A good local trade is being done in Manitoba, especially in Whinipeg, where there is considerable activity in building. Brandon lumbermen continue to follow the senseless policy of cutting prices, which is simply disastrous to trade at that point.

### UNITED STATES.

A visit to any district just now results one finding many lumbermen holidaying, and no one in particular to talk business. As a consequence, no doubt, of this holiday turn, nothing more than a fair volume of business in doing at any point, whilst in some cases things are altegether slow, there being practically no demand for stocks. In some of the eastern states, complaint comes to us, not only of keen competition, but as someone has said, senseless competition, among lumbermen, resulting in some selling lumber barren of any profit, and compelling those who would act on the business plan of getting a profit from doing anything. In the States, as in Canada, the impression is strong that business will be all right in the fall.

### FOREIGN.

Of English trade, Denny, Mott & Dickson, in their monthly wood report, summarize the situation for the first six months of the year as follows: "The first half of the year has been one of steady cautious trading. Very few branches of the timber trade have shown any marked improvement, and profits have been small. Cheap money, however, has helped weak holders to steadily reduce their stocks to safe dimensions, and the gradually increasing buying power of America and other foreign customers is giving backbone to English trade generally, which the timber trade is gradually benefiting

by; confidence in the sound character of the trade being actually done, and the growing recognition that the wreckage which has hindered the progress of trade recovery has now been fairly left behind, once more giving sound trade free course." Canadian pine, we are told by the Timber Trades Journal, is moving very slowly, the main demand being for 4th quality, of which considerable sales have been made recently at firm prices. Spruce has been in more demand lately, and offers are in hand within the trifle of the best prices yet made. The quarterly statement from Glasgow of stocks in Clyde ports are less on the whole than at the corresponding date last year. Quebec and Michigan deals while showing an increase in 1st quality pine taking all kinds together about 600 standards under last year's amount. Business at Liverpool, act ording to the last reports, is brisk, and with the arrival of large imports, considerable quantities are to be found on the quays. In London business is quiet. Trade is, beyond any doubt, improving in Australia; this, however, not being the case with other foreign fields.

### HARDWOODS.

It cannot be said that the past week or two tells of any important transactions in hardwoods. Some stocks are moving, but no sales of any moment can be recorded.

### STOCKS AND PRICES.

J. W. Howiy & Sons, Fenelon Falls, Ont., are placing on sale in the Toronto market a stock of box shooks.

The Whaley Lumber Co., Huntsville, Ont., have sold their season's output to R. Laidlaw & Co., Toronto, at good prices.

The Moiles Bros. mill on John's Island, at Georgian Bay, has started on a cut of 10,000,000 feet of lumber for the Spanish River Co.

The Balloch Mines, now loading in the Louise Basin, will take a million and a half feet of timber to Australia. The wood is being brought from the Roberval saw mills over the line of the Quebec and Lake St. John Railway.

Graham, Home & Co., of Fort William, Ont., have made sales of two lots of lumber amounting to 2,000,000 ft. for shipment to the United States. One lot goes to Chicago, the other to Oswego. These mark the first shipment of lumber exported from this district to the United States.

Shipments of lumber from St. John, N. B., for the past week were represented by 2,000,000 feet of long lumber for United States ports, and about 8,000,000 lath, 2,250,000 shingles, and 445 cords

wood. For British ports, 4,160,000 feet of long lumber clear in two cargoes, one of these being the Liverpools with its large cargo shipped by Alex. Gibson.

The following lumber shipments from the port of Montreal were made for the week ending July 22: SS. Laurentian, W & J Sharpless, 10,146 deals and ends, to Liverpool; ss Alcides, R. Reford & Co., 21 logs, 11,993 deals, to Glasgow; ss Lake Huron, Watson & Todd, 407 deals, R Cox & Co., 4,593 deals, 890 boards, J. Burstall & Co., 3,710 deals, 2,-022 ends, to Liverpool; ss Escalona, R. Cox & Co., 5,748 deals, McArthur Bros., 4,290 deals, Dobell, Beckett & Co., 1,509 ends.

One of the largest sales of the year was effected in Ottawa a few days ago, when Messrs. Hale & Booth sold their entire winter's cut to the Minnesota Lumber Co., of Palo, Ill. The cut consisted of about 165,000 logs, or about 20,000,000 feet, and the amount involved is something over \$200,000. The logs were taken from the Spanish river district. They are to be towed to Bay City, Mich., where they will be sawed by F. E. Bradley. This same concern have also closed a sale for a large raft of timber to a Quebec firm.

### RETALIATION IN LUMBER DUTIES.

In the Dominton Parliament, on Friday 19th, Mr. Foster, Minister of Finance, moved an amendment to the Customs Act by adding the following items to schedule A of the Act: "Sawed boards, planks and deals planed or dressed on one or both sides when the edges thereof are joined or tongued and grooved 25% ad, valorem, provided that such lumber may be imported free of duty upon proclamation of the Governor-in-Council, which may be issued whenever it appears te his satisfaction that similar lumber from Canada may be imported into the United States free of duty."

Mr. Edwards, the well-known Rockland lumberman, opposed the amendment on the ground that it was in the interest of the people of the Northwest that this kind of lumber should be admitted free of duty.

Mr. Speaker White, one of the veteran lumbermen of Canada, drew attention to the fact that although in the tariff of the United States dressed lumber appeared to be free of the duty the Board of Appraisers of the United States had considered lumber dressed upon the edges or tongued and grooved as a manufactured article, and subject to a duty of 25%. He did not see why the manufacturer of the

United States should be put in any better position than the manufacturer in this country with regard to this matter, and he approved of the government's action.

Mr. Foster said that in the preparation of the tariff last year, the Canadian government had the idea of reciprocity in respect to all articles on which this could be done, and more especially in regard to lumber. For many years all had agreed that if it were possible to have reciprocity in lumber it was advisable to have it. It was unfair that the lumber merchant of the United States should be able to bring his wares into this country on a much better basis than did his Canadian competitor when sending goods into the neighboring Republic, and the government were now putting on exactly the same amount as was exacted in the United States on undressed lumber jointed, tongued or grooved. Notification would be sent to Washington of the action taken here with a statement that as soon as this lumber was made free in the United States it would be made free here. That would tend to prepare a friendly consideration of the case and he thought a friendly settlement. The resolution was car-

### LUMBER CONDITIONS IN GREAT BRITAIN.

Farnworth & Jardine, of Liverpool, Eng., in their July wood circular say: The arrivals from British North America during the past month have been 22 vessels, 20,117 tons, against 33 vessels, 30,-975 tons during the corresponding month last year, and the aggregate tonnage to this date from all places during the years 1893, 1894 and 1895 have been 108,337, 119,056 and 118,869 tons respectively.

Imports during the month have been moderate, the consumption on the whole being fair, and stocks, with a few exceptions, cannot be considered excessive; generally there is more enquiry, and values of most of the leading articles, although still very low, are steady.

CANADIAN WOODS.-Of both waney and square pine the armals have been light, chiefly on contract, going direct into consumption; waney maintains its value, but square is difficult of sale; stocks are moderate. Red pine is seldom enquired for, and prices rule low. Oak. 1st class wood for railway requirement continues in fair request and maintains its value, but inferior quality is most unsaleable; the stock is quite sufficient. Ash has been imported too freely; the demand has been fair, but the stock is heavy, and prices are easier. Elm moves off fairly well, and values are steady. Pine deals continue to arrive too freely both on contract and consignment; the deliveries have been fair, but the stock is still much too heavy; latest sales have been at easier rates, and notwithstanding the present low freights, it is difficult to realize cost of importation.

NEW BRUNSWICK AND NOVA SCOTIA DEALS.-The import has been moderate, viz., 3,584 standards, against 6,256 standards same month last year, and 4,459 standards in 1893; the deliveries have been satisfactory, viz., 5,551 standards, against 4,510 standards last year, and the stock is now in a more favorable position; no advance in value can be reported, but prices are steady, and with moderate imports prospects are fair. There have been no arrivals of pine deals.

BIRCH.—Of logs, the arrivals have been heavy; the demand, however, continues good. Fresh wood of good quality maintains its value but inferior quality such as have recently been sold by auction, depressed the market. Of planks, the import has been light; there is more enquiry, and a slight advance in prices has taken place.

UNITED STATES OAK. -Of logs, several parcels have arrived, chiefly by steamers from Mobile; the quality generally has been unsatisfactory, and sales have been made at exceptional low rates. Of planks, the import has been fairly moderate, and although stocks are not excessive, the demand is very dull; sales difficult and prices rule low. The total stocks amount to 275,000 cubic feet.

PITCH PINE.-The arrivals during the past month have been 7 vessels, 7,811 tons, against 7 vessels, 5,699 tons during the same period last year. Of hewn, there have been two parcels from Mobile sisting of 37 logs; the consumption has been good, and though stocks are somewhat lighter, values are unchanged. Of sawn, the attivals have been 9,189 logs from various ports; the consumption has been on a moderate scale, stocks are a little heavier, and prices show no im-provement. Planks and boards have come forward freely, and though the con-sumption has been good stocks have accumulated, and are too heavy.

SEQUOIA (CALIFORNIA REDWOOD.)-The stock is ample, and recent sales have been of a retail character; the demand is small.

BRITISH COLUMBIA AND OREGON -There have been no arrivals; there has been more enquiry, but prices are easier and the stock is still too heavy.

UNITED STATES STAVES. - The rivals have again been on a large scale

LUMBER freight rates for pine on the Grand Trunk Railway have been made a fixture, as below. Of any mended change due notice will be given lumbermen. General instructions in shipping by Grand Trunk are embodied in these words in the tariff schedule: On lumber in carloads, mainimm weight, 30,000 lbs. per corunless the marked capacity of the car be less, in which case the marked capacity (but not less than 24,000 lbs.) will be charged, and must not be exceeded. Should it be impracticable to load certain descriptions of light umber up to 30,000 lbs. to the car, then the actual weight only will be charged for, but not less than 24,000 lbs. The rates on lumber in the tariff will not less than 24,000 lbs. The rates on lumber in the straight runthan from the first named point beyond, to the same destination. For instance, the rates from Tara or Heisenth to Guelph, Brampton, Weston or Toronto, wealton to the same points. The rates from Cargill and Southampton to points east of Listowel and south and west of Strafferd will be the same as from Kincardine, but in no case are higher rates to be charged than as per mileage table published on page 9 of tariff.

"After careful Consideration we have come to the conclusion that, on and after Jan. 1st, 1893, a modification will be made in the present arrangements for hardwood lumber, to the effect that the rate will be 7/3c, per too lbs, from our Northern and Northwestern branches to Toronto and Hamilton. This rate, he xever, will not apply from main line points and the straight run be tween Toronto, Sarnia and Windisor; also that so far as rates on common lumber to points like Guelph, Galt, London, Woodstock, Ingersoll, etc., from all lumber shipping stations the rate will be the same on hardwood as on pine. On the old principle, we suppose, that half the loaf is better than none, hardwood men have something, possibly, to be thankful for, though three

is no good reason why the rates generally on hard wood should not be as low as on pine. It is understood that the C. P. R. rate will be made uniform at 7½c, from same points.
