JOURNAL OF THE TWENTY-FOURTH SESSION OF THE SYNOD OF THE DIOCESE OF TORONTO, 1876.

Toronto, Tuesday, June 20, 1876.

Pursuant to notice the Synod met this day at St. James's Cathedral, at 10 o'clock, a.m. Morning Prayer was sung by the Precentor of the Synod, (Rev. J. D. Cayley, M.A., Rector of St. George's, Toronto), the Lessons being read by the Rev. Canon Osler, and the Rev. W. R. Forster.

The Ante-Communion Service was said by the Ven Archdeacon of Peterborough; the Epistle being read by the Rev. Canon Givins. The Sermon was preached by the Ven. the Archdeacon of York, from the text, Ephes. iv. 4 (first clause).

The Bishop celebrated the Holy Communion, and was assisted in the distribution of the Elements by the Very Rev. the Dean and other Clergymen.

At 2.30. p.m., the Synod re-assembled in St. George's School House, for the transaction of business, the Lord Bishop in the chair.

The customary prayers were said by the Very Rev. the Dean of Toronto.

REPORT ON CERTIFICATES OF LAY DELEGATES.

The Rev. J. H. McCollum, M.A., presented and read the following Report of the Committee, appointed to examine the Certificates of Lay Delegates, and moved (seconded by Dr. Hodgins), that it be referred to the Court on Contested Seats:—

The Committee appointed by the Executive Committee to meet at least two days before the meeting of Synod, to examine the Certificates of the Lay-Representatives, beg leave to report that the Certificates of the Lay-Representatives, whose names are in the official list of members, herewith submitted, appear to be correct and regular, with the following exceptions:—

1. Cases in which the Chairman does not appear to certify that the representatives chosen and named below were duly qualified as communicants: Gore's Landing—C. Thompson, H. Bovell, Thomas Bailey. Note by Incumbent at foot of certificate states, "These gentlemen, being residents of Toronto, will furnish certificates from their own clergy."

Georgina—John H. Delamere, John J. Vickers, Peter D. Conger. Note by Incumbent at foot of certificate states: "I cannot certify that the delegates above named are communicants."

Vespra—James C. Morgan, H. P. Savigny, George Sneath. Note by incumbent at foo: of certificate states: "Mr. Sneath has not communicated three times, clergyman being in Deacon's orders."

2. Cases in which the certificate is correct, but names do not appear in the official list, the assessment being either wholly or partially unpaid: Albion and Mono, Markham, Port Perry, St. Anne's, Toronto.

Grace Church, Toronto—On May 3rd, 1876. Rev. Mr. Jones, the incumbent, furnishes the regular certificate that II. S. Alexander, Joseph Bickerstaff, and John Hayden were elected delegates for the parish of Grace Church. At a meeting held on the 25th April, 1876, a minute of which is signed by C. A. Brough as chairman, it is certified that Clarence W. Ball, J. H. Delamere, and Charles Allan Brough were elected as delegates for the parish of Grace Church. The assessments accompanied both certificates. Afterwards Mr. Delamere resigned, having been elected for another place.

There has been no return from the following:—Otonabee, St. John's (Toronto), Uxbridge.

BISHOP'S ADDRESS.

The Bishop then delivered his Annual Address, as follows :-

REVEREND BRETHREN, AND BRETHREN OF THE LAITY,—We have to day come to the renewal of our duties and responsibilities as the Synod of the Diocese, and I trust that all are fully persuaded of their importance and gravity.

OBITUARY.

A year cannot be expected to pass without the loss of some who have earnestly and efficiently united with us in the discharge of these duties; and, on this occasion,

I have to recall to you the name of one who was a long a zealous and useful member of our body, the Reverend Dr. Beaven. He came to this country early in the year 1843, as Professor of Divinity in King's College in this city, the duties of which office he faithfully discharged until the suppression of that Institution in 1850. Upon this disheartening event in our provincial ecclesiastical history, it is not necessary or advisable that I should dwell. Although transferred to another sphere of educational work, it is well known what a hearty and assiduous share Dr. Beaven took in every project for the advancement of the interests of the Church in this Diocese, and how steadily he devoted himself to practical ministerial work, wherever the opportunity was offered, in or out of this city. In the immediately neighbourhood of this city two churches were built through his efforts, and a parish organized which has ever since had its regular services. In another direction, north of this city, he formed two congregations, and succeeded in having two churches built, and these for many years have become part of a large and prosperous parish. All know, too, that while his ministerial services were thus earnest and persevering, his life was an exemplary one, devout, unassuming, single-minded, and without guile, he died as he had lived, full of faith and peace.

We have also to lament the death, very recent and unexpected, of another Presbyter in this Diocese, rich in good works for Christ, and of unblemished life, The Reverend Edmund Baldwin. Ordained in 1849, he entered vigorously upon his ministerial duties. These, with the exception of a few months at Niagara as assistant to the Incumbent, were discharged in this city in connection with the Cathedral Church of St. James. He was an earnest and impressive preacher, but it was in his daily quiet pastoral work that he was most effective and engaging, the bedside of the sick, and in converse with the suffering and sorrowing, none could be more sympathetic than he, none touched more tenderly and successfully those sensibilities which needed to be soothed or invigorated. He differed from many of his brethren in his theological views, but he was always courteous and kindly in his intercourse with them, never allowing it to be felt or thought, that he condemned what he did not approve. His Christian philanthropy was a comprehensive and expansive one, and he honoured sincerity and zeal in work for Christ, even in those who, he believed, pursued it in an irregular direction His cheerful disposition and bright geniality endeared him to all classes and all persuasions, and no one was ever borne to the grave with a larger company of genuine mourners.

STATISTICS.

We have experienced during the past year, the usual transitions in respect to the loss and gain of clergymen, by removal on the one hand and immigration on the other. During this period four have left us, one for the neighbouring Diocess of Niugara, one for the United States, and two for England. There have come to us during that period, five from the Diocess of Niagara, one from Huron, one from Montreal, one from New Brunswick, and one from Ontario, being nine in all.

Since the last meeting of Synod, I have held four Ordinations, three in this city, and one in the town of Burrie. At these, five were admitted Deacons, and seven were advanced to the Priesthood; two churches in that interval have been consecrated.

Some decrease in the number of candidates for confirmation during the past twelve months, as compared with former announcements, is a necessary consequence of the separation from us of the six populous counties which now compose the Diocese of Niagara. As these supplied, at the latest average, 650 candidates per annum, our relative progress in this respect will be found to have been fairly maintained. Confirmations have been held at eighty-four places, and there have been admitted to that rite, since the last meeting of Synod, 516 males, and 727 females, in all 1243.

BIENNIAL MEETINGS OF SYNOD.

The project I suggested in my address to the Synod last year, which could not then be constitutionally acted upon, namely, that they should be held once in two years, instead of annually as at present, is, I am g'ad to perceive, now to be taken up Having, on that occasion, stated what I believed to be the advantages of the arrangement proposed, I need not repeat them now. Without imperilling, by its adoption, the fiscal interests of the Diocese, but rather improving them, it is of importance to have the opportunity of discussing as a body what may conduce to

the spiritual growth of the Church, and to the increase and spread of personal religion. It would help us, I trust, to work with more efficacy in the attempt to arrest the terrible and revolting

INCREASE OF CRIME AND MORAL DEGRADATION.

Which we are daily pained to hear, and read of. The liceuse of opinion upon vital truths, into which so many, professing themselves Christian believers, are drifting, has without doubt largely conduced to this lowering of the moral sense, and loosening of restraint upon the selfish passions and evil inclinations of men. The effects that were meant to follow such statements as these, "By the terrors of the Lord we persuade men," "After death the judgment," are being most seriously weakened by he discussions in the secular papers and otherwise that have recently been pursued, in reference to man's future destiny, and what is to be the condition and the duratien of it.

Nothing can be more distinct and decided than our Lord's own words upon a future recompense to the righteons, and retribution to the wicked; and that this should in each case be everlasting. We are not furnished except in a brief and figurative manner, with any statement of the character of that future punishment or reward. Similitudes are drawn from what ourselves know and can comprehend of the happiness of the saved and the sufferings of the lost. The revelation from the Lord himself, followed by his Apostles, can scarcely be misunderstood. That man obtains his final and enduring happiness by his recovery through Christ of the lost image of God in which he was at first created; and that he is doomed, as a necessary consequence, to eternal remorse and make through his neglect or refusul to employ the means by which that holiuess is recovered that fits him for heaven.

The revelations of Christ are, in fact, repetitions of what have been the instincts of mankind in every age; instincts, we must believe, implanted by Him who made afterwards positive announcements of the truth to which they point. We cannot, for instance, read in ancient poets pictures of the life that exists after death, without feeling that the idea was not simply a poetic fancy, but an implanted conviction, running on from the date of man's fall, and obtaining confirmation from the Saviour c. the world in the fulness of time. It appears to be as old as the idea of propitiatory sacrifices, so universally entertained and acted upon throughout the world. Either of these would be a most unlikely human invention; their introduction would be unaccountable, unless as having come by revelation from God.

From the earliest period in the world's history, there was no doubt a cause for this general and deeply implanted persuasion. It could not fail to prove the most effectual restraint upon licentious living, and criminal acts; it would be the surest preventive of the fall of man into the lowest depths of moral degradation. The brute creation are moved to violence and cruelty, through hunger and other natural incentives; in man there is a power to continue wickedness, and devise cruelties, which brutes do not posess. In man, then, there must be implanted motives of restraint proportionate to his power of doing evil. This would be necessary for the protection of his fellow-men, and for maintaining a due sense of the moral government of God.

It would be easy to adduce evidence from the history of the world, both ancient and modern, that morality has been lowered, and crime increased, wherever the belief has prevailed that there is no future, much less eternal, punishment, When heathen philosophers, a little anterior to the Christian era, gave currency to the opinion that the apprehension of future punishment from their gods was a groundless one, and infused doubts as to the existence of any God at all, it is stated by Roman writers, and confirmed by St. Paul in his epistle addressed to that people, that the met disast ous consequences followed. Trust and faith were discarded, perjury practised without shome, and every excess of licentiousness, wantonness, and cruelty was recklessly indulged.

The same results were apparent in England in the latter part of the seventeenth century, in the reign of Charles the Second. Amongst the efforts of the sceptical writers of that day, there was the attempt to emancipate the minds of men from the appreheusion of divine punishment in a future world. Along with contempt of religion, the grossest licentiousness prevailed, affecting even the highest ranks. The same was observable in France during the Revolution in the latter part of the

eighteenth century, the frenzy of excitement which drove so many of the people into the most terrible excesses of crime, was studiously fostered by the denial in high and influential quarters, of the existence of God, and contempt of the idea that any future retribution was to be apprehended from such a Being. We seem to have fallen upon such evil days ourselves, and nothing will prove an effectual check to the spreading calamity, but a firm, honest maintenance, and promulgation, of the revealed truth that the punishment of the wicked, as well as the reward of the righteous, shall be everlasting.

To assert any other belief, would be to strike at the root, and destroy the foundation and purpose, of Christianity itself. The great fact that the Son of God came into the world to make atonement for the sins of its people by the sacrifice of himself, would be shorn of its significance if the opinion we are protesting against could be allowed a place beside it. We could not permit ourselves to think that a e so vast, so tremendous, would have been made unless to avert from man a colamity in some degree commensurate with the cost at which it was to be removed. To imagine that an atonement so inconceivably great and precious should have been made merely to heighten the well-being, or lessen the ills of man during his sojourn upon earth, this would be an unworthy, a fatal conception We could not conceive the need of such an atonement, if this was to be the limitation of its purpose; if it were to have no bearing upon man's immortal life. It is not for us to speculate with a dangerous and irrevent freedom upon the heavenly revelations touching this momentous subject. Here, we are reminded, we "see through a glass darkly"; it were vain, as well as presumptuous, to aim at perfectness of vision as respects the mysteries of the world after death; we are not, it is certain, to possess it while on earth. "Clouds and darkness are round about" the Almighty; it is not meant that we should penetrate those shadows; neither the full glory, nor the gloom of the eternal world shall ever be unveiled to us in this our transition state. We have the fact of both conditions revealed to us, let us be centent with this, and not attempt solutions of which we are incapable,

Having felt myself called upon to offer a few thoughts on this momentous topic in consequence of the unhappy discussions it has recently awakened, and the disturbance perhaps in many cases, of old and settled convictions. I proceed to some remarks on a subject of great local interest and importance, the due and suitable

SUSTENTATION OF THE CLERGY.

In viewing the state of our Mission Fund, as compared with its condition twelve months ago, we are not without grounds of satisfaction and hope. In many instances, there has been an improvement in the amount of contributior; there has been a more general effort to come up to the amount of assessment for this object submitted to the several parishes of the Diocese. We must confess, nevertheless, that the work which is dependent upon the existence and growth of that Fund, is being seriously crippled. Some special, vigorous effort must therefore be made to raise it to such a condition that, not only should all deficiencies be made up, but a surplus be at our disposal for the extension of our missionary work. An appeal on this ground, to the sympathies and obligations of churchmen at large, I mean a special appeal independent of the ordinary annual claims, could scarcely fail to obtain a general and liberal response. If a fitting machinery for this purpose were put in motion, with energetic and assiduous workers, why should we not say within three years, raise the amount of ten thousand dollars?

At the same time faithful and generous churchmen are led more and more to lament and deprecate the existence of any rival movement or organization for the sustentation of the Clergy, as weakening the ability to meet the increasing demand for the ministrations of the Church, and keeping is more injurious prominence the spirit of party, division, and strife. With tenderness to every conscience, and respect for the varieties of religious thought and persuasion which prevail, we cannot but feel that, with the most charitable concession to such differing sentiments, a way might be found for the judicious and usefus expenditure on missionary work of any separate funds obtained for that object in narmony, and certainly not in conflict with the established organizations of the Diocese. It would be sad and painful to observe that, from such separate accumulations, no strength or expansion is being given to our missionary efforts; that while tacre is a withdrawal from the means of the one

side, there is no aparrent employment of them for their intended purpose on the other side.

Although there has been no direct recal of the rash accusation made nearly two years ago, that the great body of the Clergy who are assisted by the Mission Board, are unfaithful to the genuine principles of the Church as understood at the Reformation, and embraced in the formularies of the Church, we cannot but feel persuaded that the number of those must be extremely few, who can seriously believe that such accusations are well founded, and tower still who would venture to designate the individuals to whom they would attach this reproach. I am persuaded that the Clergy generally of this Diocese have an intelligent and hearty conception of the great vital doctrine of justification by faith, and make it a prominent topic of their I have a confidence that there is no holding back of the fundamental truth thus expressed in our eleventh article, that "We are accounted righteous before God, only for the merit of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ by faith, and not for our own works or deservings." But while they maintain and promulgate this fundamental tenet, they must not be accused of violating its letter or spirit, if the, insist upon the manifestation of its fruits and results in the individual life. The Apostle St. James is explicit and argent in insisting upon the "good works" which should He shows how unprofitable such a follow the acceptance of that vital truth. profession of faith would be without its consistent influence upon the daily life, how, without such fruits the justification could not be complete.

And the cordial reception of that leading tenet should incite to, rather than dissuade from what is termed a "Sacramental Religion," not in the reproachful sense in which it is often adduced, but in its true and evangelical meaning. It is faith in the justifying merits of Christ which incites his followers to a reverence for, and the use of his own instituted Socraments; to that one, preeminently, which places so significantly and impressively before us his great sacrifice on the cross for the sins of the world. The Christian feels that in his commemoration he brings himself closer to the Saviour who died for him He is thereby more deeply stirred to repent of, and forsake the sins which made that atonement necessary. this striking remembrancer of the Saviour's love, he is impelled more strongly to the thankfulness which shows itself in loving works for him. It rouses him in lassitude, it renovates him in weariness, it gives him courage and strength in spiritual trials. And uniting him thus in more close communion with his Lord, it aids him in his strivings for the holy mind and pure example of that Lord. It helps to realize what Bishop Jeremy Taylor, in his Holy Living, so beautifully represents, "As those creatures that live amongst the shows of the mountains, turn white, with their food and conversation with such perpetual whitenesses, so our souls may be transformed into the similitude and union with Christ by our perpetual feeding on him, and conversations not only in his courts, but in his very heart, and most secret affections, and incomparable purities." If this be a Sacramental religion, then it owes itself to a full and deep appreciation of the Saviour's great atonement. It is evolved, as we may say, from a thankful, dutiful contemplation of the way and means by which he effected our justification before God; it is an evidence of the faith by which we lay hold on that boon,

While we must regret and deprecate ill-timed and ill-considered discussions upon a subject so sacred, we shall hope that a clearer perception, and higher appreciation of the duties that flow from it, will after all be entertained and extended. It has been a subject of congratulation that, in the awakened carnestness of members and ministers of the Church during the last forty years, communions have become more frequent, and communicants have been very largely increased. This has helped to render the public worship of God more of a reality. It is removing the impression, long so wrongfully entertained, that we go to the house of God to be hearers rather than worshippers, that the prayer and praise which are the essentials of that worship are of less importance and benefit than preaching. This happy change has widely affected our Canadian Dioceses. More stress is now being laid upon a devout, enruest, elevating service, reaching the soul and improving the iifo, than upon the richest eloquence of the human preacher. Not that even "the foolishness of greating" is to be undervalued. It is a powerful auxiliary to the exercises of God's house of prayer; it is especially so, if it aids to produce the conviction that no human utterances of exhortation or of warning can, in their influence upon the

soul, bear comparison with those services of the Church which bring us into nearer communion with our God, and Saviour, and Sanctifier, and surround us with the atmosphere of heaven.

These remarks naturally lead to some words upon the duty of the Clergy to be conscientiously strict in their

OBSERVANCE OF THE DIRECTIONS OF THE CHURCH

in the manner of performing its services. No one has a right to slight those requirements, either by introducing what are obvious incongruities, or dispensing with what is manifestly essential to the completeness and editication of the Service In visiting Churches throughout the Diocese, I notice occasional irregularities which can be adverted to with a total absence of the spirit of censure or rebuke. As an instance, I may affirm that it was never meant that, in the Invocations of the blessed Trinity at the commencement of the Litany, the people should repeat the words after the minister, as they would in the Lord's Prayer, or General Confession; but that the people are to wait until the minister has finished, before repeating themselves those humble addresses to the Trinne Deity. Would the response, it is natural to ask, be inserted separately, if it were not to be repeated separately? This may possibly be regarded as a matter little worthy of notice: but nothing is to be so regarded that is obviously an infringement of the directions of the Church; which is likely to be viewed as a novelty and innovation, and is calculated to disturb the minds of many earnest and pious worshippers.

If all, too should be careful not to shew indifference to the solemn declaration, that they "will conform to the Liturgy as it is by law established," it must be left to the consciences of those who have made this declaration, how far they are violating it, when, after the alms and oblations of the congregation are laid upon the holy table, they full to repeat the prayer that specially asks of God the acceptance of those alms and offerings.

In my address to the Synod in 1869, Indverted in earnest terms to the duty of solemnizing marriages in the place in which we are explicitly desired to do so. This service is appointed to take place, not in any private dwelling; not at the residence of the bride's father or mother, as its frequently announced; but in the house of God. To separate the ceremonial from an association so holy, is practically to deny that matrimony is itself holy, as our Prayer Book declares it to be It is to treat as without significance, the comparison an apostle makes of it with the Church as the spouse of Christ. It is a fact, indeed, not to be disputed, that a clergyman is not faithful to the requirements of the Church, if he should solemnize holy matrimony in any other place than the house of God. Should peculiar exceptional cases present themselves, -and doubtless there will be such -in which he should consider a relaxition of that rule to be necessiry, he would discover it to be a prudent and satisfactory course to communicate with his Ordinary on the particulars of such cases, before committing himself to the irregularity which has become so frequent, and is proving so injurious.

I shall not, my brethren, trespass any longer upon your time than to state briefly the increasing claims upon our sympathies and help of

FOREIGN MISSIONS.

We have felt deeply the obligation in the case of the Diocese of Algoma, and I trust that our efforts to meet it will be crowned with success. We have done something for Rupert's Land; but the appeal, about to be placed in the hands of the members of the Synodtrom the Bishop of that territory, pleads for further and continued assistance. By its clear and persuasive statements we cannot fail to be affected; all that is required is to take action upon them. The sum a-ked from us would be but a mite each from the individuals of the Diocese, and but a small amount from each of our parishes; and if these do not anticipate us in assessing themselves for a proportionate offering, they would receive, I am persuaded, with grace and favour any practical suggestions on this point from the Committee on Foreign Missions which has recently been organized in this city. Nor would this Committee fail to act for another claimant,—the Diocese of Saskatchewan; whose energetic Bishop is suing for aid to introduce Gospel light and privileges to so many

benighted ones within the area of his allotted oversight. To all such reasonable, and justifiable appeals, there should be a ready response from those who have never themselves been without those privileges; whose lot it never has been to live in that darkness and shadow of death in which so many of the Indians of this Continent are placed.

Ilaving brought my words to a conclusion, I have now to express my hope that this session of our Synod will prove a pleasant and a prosperous one. Such will assuredly be the issue, if all its members shall address themselves faithfully and honestly to its work, with the love of Christ, and love of the brethren constraining them; with the hearty determination to make all their deliberations and acts conducive to the maintenance of unity and peace. May the Holy Spirit so move and direct us, that of this Synod it may be felt and said, that it laboured dutifully and earnestly for the harmony and union, and the edification and happiness, of all those members of God's Church whose spiritual well-being it was appointed to promote.

That the election of Delegates to the Provincial Synod, and of the elective Members of the Executive Committee, shall take place between the hours of 1 and 3 o'clock on the second day of the Session, the ballot closing at 3 o'clock, and that during this time no other business shall be transacted.
- 2. That the Bishop be respectfully requested to appoint, at each meeting of the Synod, two Assessors, one Clerical and one Lay, whose duty it shall be to assist the Bishop in maintaining the observance of the rules of order.—Carried.

READING AND ADOPTION OF REPORTS.

The Rev. J. Langtry, M.A., read the Report of the Special Committee on Religious Instruction in the Public Schools, and moved its adoption; the motion was seconded by Dr. Hodgins and carried.

The hour of Six o'clock having arrived, the Benediction was pronounced by the Bishop and the Synod adjourned.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CANON FOR ENFORCING CHURCH DISCIPLINE.

The Hon, Cierical Secretary read the Report of the Special Committee on the Canon for enforcing Church Discipline. See Appendix L.

The Rev. Rural Dean Cooper, B.A., moved its adoption, seconded by the Ven. Archdeacon of York.

The Canon was then read clause by clause, as follows:-

" OF THE DISCIPLINE OF THE CLERGY.

"Section I.—Every Clergyman duly licensed by the Bishop, or holding any charge under the jurisdiction of the Bishop of the Diocese, or receiving any allowance whatever under the authority of the Synod, shall be amenable for offences committed by him to the Bishop, in the manner and according to the provisions set forth in this Canon of Discipline."—Carried.

"Section II.—There shall be a Standing Committee of Discipline appointed every third year at the annual meeting of the Synod, consisting of the Dean and Archdeacons, ex-officio, and of six Clergymen of at least ten years' standing in Priest's orders, and of six Laymen, three of such Clergymen to be appointed by the Bishop, and three to be elected by ballot by the Clergy, and three of such Laymen

to be appointed by the Bishop, and three to be elected by ballot by the Lay members of Synod, and from this Committee the Board of Triers, as hereinafter provided, shall be taken; and such election shall be next in order after the election of Delegates to the Provincial Synod; provided always that if two or more vacancies occur, such vacancies shall be filled up respectively, by the Bishop or by the Synod, as the case may be, at the next meeting of the Synod."—Carred.

After the reading of Section II., it was moved by the Rev. Rural Dean Lett. D.D., seconded by the Rev. C. J. S. Bethune, M.A.,—

That the Report on the Canon of Discipline be re-committed to a Committee to be appointed by the .ord Bishop of the Diocese, and that the Report of the said Committee be printed and circulated among the members of the Synod at least one month before the next meeting of the Synod.— Carried.

ADMISSION TO SEATS.

On motion of the Rev. Rural Dean Allen, M.A., seconded by the Rev. Dr. O'Meara, the Rev. James Bovell, M.D., of the Diocese of Barbados, was admitted to a seat upon the floor of the house; and, on motion of the Ven. Archdeacon of York, the Rev. Canon Read, D.D., of the Diocese of Niagara, was also admitted to a seat.

CANON ON DISTRIBUTION OF COMMUTATION TRUST SURPLUS.

Dr. Snelling moved, seconded by Mr. J. R. Armstrong,-

That Section 8 of the above Caron as amended by the Synod last year be confirmed. -Lost.

CONSIDERATION OF MOTIONS.

It was moved by the Ven. Archdeacon Whitaker, M.A., seconded by Col. Boulton,-

REPORT OF COMMISSIONERS TO DIVIDE FUNDS WITH THE DIOCESE OF NIAGARA.

Mr. A. H. Campbell then read the Report of the Commissioners to divide the Funds with the Diocese of Niagara, and moved the following Resolution, seconded by Hon. V. C. Blake:—

That the Report of the Commissioners, now read, be adopted.

That they be continued in office, with power to divide the Widows and Orphaus', the General Purposes, and the Sustentation Funds in the proportions and in the manner mentoned in the Report, and to pay over and transfer to the Synod of Ningara the moneys and securities coming to that Diocese in respect of the above funds, and also in respect of Rectories and endowments of Parishes situated within its bounds, on procuring such acquittances and discharges as the commissioners may consider necessary, but after respayment or deduction of any balance, due by the Synod of Niagara to this Synod, on any open account.

And, further, with authority to continue the negotiations with the Synod of Ningara, in regard to a fair and equitable settlement of the Commutation Trust Fund—to take advice as to the powers of the Synod in regard thereto—and, if necessary, steps to obtain authority to make a division of the Fund—Carried.

It was then moved by Ven. Archdeacon Whitaker, M.A., seconded by Rev. Rural Dean Lett, D.D.,—

that this Synod distinctly recognizes the moral claim of those Clergy who had been licensed to Missions within the Diocese of Algoma, before the erection of that

Diocese, to be regarded in respect of any privileges connected with the Commutation or the Widows and Orphans' Fund as Clergy of the Diocese of Toronto as it existed before the separation of the Diocese of Ningara, thereby calls upon the Synod of the Diocese of Ningara to assume its due share of the responsibility which will be incurred by the recognition of this claim.—Curried.

CONSIDERATION OF MATIONS.

The discussion of the Archdeacon of York's motion respecting biennial sessions of Synod was then resumed and considered at considerable length; but, with the consent of the Synod, the original motion was withdrawn, and the Archdeacon moved in place thereof, seconded Hon. V. C. Blake,—

That it be an instruction to the Executive Committee to make provision at the next meeting of the Synod, for holding on the several evenings of the days on which the Synod is in session, meetings of a Diocesan Conference, and to arrange and give sufficient notice of the subjects to be discussed at the several meetings of the Conference.—Carried.

Moved by the Archdeacon of York, M. A., seconded by Rev. Rural Dean Lett, D. D.,

That the Lord Bishop be respectfully requested to appoint a Committee to amend the Canon respecting the distribution of the surplus of the Commutation Fund, in accordance with the resolution now adopted, recognizing the moral claims of clergymen of the Diocese of Algoma, to report such amendment to the Synod during its present session.—Carried.

Committee appointed by the Bishop, Rev. Rural Dean Lett, D.D., Rev. Rural Dean Cooper, B.A., and A. H. Campbell, Esq.

Moved by Hon. G. W. Allan, seconded by Hon. V. C. Blake,

That it shall for the future be the duty of the Executive Committee to present to the Synod, as a part of its Report, a list of names recommended by them to serve ou the several Standing Committees for the ensuing year.—Carried.

CONSIDERATION OF MOTION.

Moved by Rev. E. H. Cole, M. A., seconded by Rev. Canon Brent, M. A.,

That application be made to the Legislature of Ontario at its next session for an Act to amend the Act incorporating the Synod of the Diocese of Toronto, so as to give the said Synod power to sell, mortgage, or exchange any lands held for Church purposes, in who assoever the title thereto may be vested.

After considerable discussion the motion was withdrawn. The hour of six o'clock having arrived, the Bishop pronounced the Benediction.

THIRD DAY.

TORONTO, June 22nd, 1876.

The Synod assembled in St. George's Church for Divine Service at 9.30 a.m. Morning Prayer was read by Rev. Rural Dean Allen, M.A., and the Lessons read by Rev. Dr. O'Meara.

On re-assembling in the School House, prayers were said by the Hon. Clerical Secretary. The Minutes of yesterday's proceedings were then read and confirmed.

CORRESPONDENCE.

The Hon. Lay Secretary then read a communication from Miss Maggie Smith, Secretary of the Toronto W. C. Temperance Union on the subject of Total Abstinence.—(See Appendix.)

REPORTS.

At the request of the Bishop, the Rev. Rural Dean Allen, D.D., read the Report of the Mission Board,

Moved by the Rev. Rural Dean Allen, M.A., seconded by Dr. Hodgins,

That the matter of the assessment of the Mission Fund be referred to the General Purposes Fund Committee, with a recommendation to reduce the charges for managing the said fund —Carried.

Aoved by the Rev. Rural Dean Allen, M.A., seconded by the Rev. A. J. Broughall, M.A.,

That the Report of the Mission Board be adopted .- Curried.

Moved by the Rev. Septimus Jones, M.A., seconded by the Rev. Rural Dean Allen, M.A.,

That Missions hereafter placed on the list be referred by the Board, at their discretion, to one of the following schedules:

- Schedule A. to receive a grant for ten years, \$200 for the first three years, reduced by \$25 every subsequent year, thus leaving the grant of the tenth year only \$25.
- Schedule B. to receive a grant for seven years, \$200 for the first three years, reduced by \$40 every subsequent year, thus leaving the grant for the seventh year only \$10.
- Schedule C. to receive a grant for five years, \$200 for the first three years, \$125 for the fourth year, \$50 for the fitth year.
- Schedule D. Exceptional cases not mended under the above, in which the reduction shall be in similar proportions.
 - Travelling Missions shall be maintained at the discretion of the Board at an annual grant not exceeding \$600.
 - Missions already on the list may be subjected, from July. 1877, to reduction at the rate of schedule A., B. or C., or to such reduction as the Board may deem expedient.—Carried.

THE BISHOP OF SASKATCHEWAN.

During the debate upon the Report of the Mission Board, the Lord Bishop of Saskatchewan entered the Synod, and was conducted to a seat upon the platform beside the presiding Bishop.

REPORTS.

The Rev. Rural Dean Cooper, B.A., read the Report of the Widows and Orphans' Fund, and Theological Students' Fund Committee, and moved, seconded by the Rev. Septimus Jones, M.A.,

That it be adopted .- Carried.

STANDING COMMITTEES.

The Ven. Archdeacon Wilson, M. A., presented the Report of the Executive Committee on the Standing Committees of Synod, which on his suggestion was read by Rev. J. H. McCollum, M.A., Secretary of the Committee.

The Synod adjourned at 1 o'clock.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

REPORTS.

On re-assembling at Two o'clock, Mr. Crombie read the Report of the General Purposes, Statistics, and Assessment Committee, which, on motion, was received.

Mr. Crombie then moved, seconded by Rev. C. W. Paterson, B.C.L.,—

That the General Purposes, Statistics, and Assessment Committee having revised and abbreviated the list of questions (Parochial Statistics), and having considered that the enforcing the answering of the same would be best effected by the Clergy being required to answer them but once in three years, and having resolved to submit such their opinion to the consideration of his Lordship the B shop of the

Diocese; and his Lordship, having expressed his opinion as follows, "I think a return every alternate year would be sufficient, but would not object to once in three years, if it be the general recommendation of the Committee. I approve of the abbreviations": Be it therefore resolved, that the suggestion of the Bishop be adopted, and that the statistical report from the Clergy and Churchwardens be required every alternate year; and further, that the Synod do appoint a Special Committee to devise some effective means of making the answering of such questions obligatory.

On consideration the words "every alternate" were changed into the word "third" by consent of Synod, and the motion as thus amended was carried.

It was then moved by Mr. Crombie, seconded by Hon. V. C. Blake,— That the sum of \$49.88 paid to the General Purposes Fund as the assessment Synod expenses for the year 1874 on moneys contributed to the Shingwank Home, be refunded, and the same carried to the credit of the said Home.—Carried.

Mr. Crombie, M. A., moved, seconded by Mr. D. B Read, Q.C.,—

That on page 277 of the Canons (Constitution of Vestries for Free Churches) after the words "England and Ireland" the following be added: "and to have attended at least one-third of the regular Sunday services in such Church during the preceding twelve months (unless prevented by sickness or other unavoidable cause), and to have contributed according to their ability, and as God hath blessed them, to the support of that Church, and to have taken no part in any vestry meeting in any other parish during the year. And no member of such congregation shall be allowed to take part in the business of the vestry meeting unless he shall have complied with these requirements, and the said declaration shall be signed annually at the Easter meeting; and being so formed," &c.

Moved in amendment by Dr. Hodgins, seconded by Rev. H. C. Cooper, B A.,—

That on page 277 of the Canons (Constitution of Vestries for Free Churches) after the words "England and Ireland" the following be added: "and to have attended at least one-third of the ordinary morning and evening Sunday services in such Church during the preceding twelve months, or since his residence in the parish during the year, unless prevented by sickness or other unavoidable cause), and to have taken no part in any vestry meeting in any other parish duri ;) year. And no member of such congregation shall be allowed to take part in the business of the vestry meeting unless he shall have complied with these requirements, and the said declaration shall be signed annually at the Easter meeting; and being so formed," &c.

Moved in amendment by Mr. Cartwright, seconded by the Archdeacon of York, M A.,—

That on page 2-7 of the Canons (Constitution of Vestries for Free Churches) after the words "England and Ireland" the following be added: "and to have communicated at said church at least three times during the preceding twelve months, and to have taken no part in any vestry meeting in any other parish during the year. And no member of such congregation shall be allowed to take part in the business of the vestry meeting unless he shall have complied with these requirements, and the said declaration shall be signed annually at the Easter meeting And being so formed," &c —Carried.

THE REV. B. S. HOSKEN'S MEMORIAL.

The Rev. Canon Morgan presented the Report from the Committee on Rev. B. S. Hosken's Memorial, and it was read by Mr. D. B. Read, Q.C.

MOTIONS.

Rev. Rural Dean Lett's motion, of which notice had been given,— That the election of Lay Representatives in the several Parishes and Missions be held on the system of rotation,

was left as a Notice of Motion for next Session.

It was then moved by Rural Dean Cooper, B.A., seconded by Rev. Canon Morgan,—

That in view of the present urgency of the inadequacy of the Widows and Orphans' Income Fund to meet the payments to the several annuitants on the 1st of October next, the amount required for that purpose and to repay the balance that will be overdrawn on the 1st of July next be borrowed from the Special Appeal Fund, such amount to be refunded by annual repayments as the income may admit of, and to be treated as an annual charge upon the income till the sum so borrowed shall have been repaid, the Synod pledging itself to make good the amount so taken from the Special Fund.—Carried.

Moved by the Rev. Septimus Jones, M.A., seconded by Mr. A. H. Campbell,—

That the report upon Loans for Church Building be referred to a Committee to report, as to the action advisable to be taken thereon.—Carried.

Committee appointed by the Bishop as follows:-

A. H. Campbell, Esq., Dr. Kertland, James Graham, Esq., C. J. Campbell, Esq., William Ince, Esq., Rev. Septimus Jones, M.A.

In absence of the Rev. H. B. Owen, F.R.S., the Rev. Septimus Jones, M.A., (at his request) moved, seconded by Lt.-Col. Grierson,—

That all Clergymen having cure of souls, shall on removing from their Parishes, deliver to the Churchwardens the Register of baptisms, marriages, and burials of the said Parish, obtaining a receipt therefor, which receipt shall be exhibited to the Bishop before the issuing of a new license to him, or in the case of intended removal from this Diocese, before the granting of a hene decessit: and that the non-production of such receipt shall be a bar to the issuing of such license or bene decessit, unless for reasons satisfactory to the Bishop.—Carned.

Moved by Mr. Knight, seconded by the Rev. Canon Morgan,-

That the Executive Committes be requested to consider the propriety of commencing the Synod in future with Evening Service on Monday, consisting of Evening Prayer and Sermon, and having Morning Prayer and celebration of Holy Communion on Tuesday, and that they take such steps as are necessary for carrying out the same — Withdrawn.

Moved by the Hon. G. W. Allan, seconded by the Hon. V. C. Blake,—

That from 1st July next the following sums be allowed, in accordance with the recommendation made in the Report of the Executive Committee, for the discharge of the duties of the Synod office:—

J. D. Cayley, M.A., Rev. Septimus Jones, M.A., Rev. Dr. O'Meara, S. G. Wood, LL.B., H. W. M. Murray, M.A.—Carried.

The Synod adjourned at 6 o'clock to meet again at 8 o'clock.

EVENING SESSION.

On resuming business at 8 p.m., the Hon. Lay Secretary announced the following as the Committee appointed by the Bishop on the Canon on Church Discipline:—

The Rev. Septimus Jones, M.A., (in the absence of the Provost), read the Report of the Sunday School and Book and Tract Committee (Appendix G.) and moved, seconded by Rev. C. C. Johnson,

That it be adopted ... - Carried.

Moved by Clarkson Jones, Esq., seconded by Rev. Canon Brent, M.A.,

That the Committee on Discipline be instructed to consider the question of the advisability of requiring all evidence brought before the Court to be taken upon oath, and, should it be necessary, to take legal advice or to apply to the Legislature for such powers as may be considered requirite.—Carried.

Moved by Rev. Septimus Jones, M.A., seconded by S. G. Wood, Esq., LL.B.,

That the Committee be instructed to consider in the proposed Canon the case of Clergymen residing in the Diocese, though without a cure; also the discipline of the laity.

Moved by Rev. J. Langtry, M.A., seconded by Rev. Canon Brent, M.A.,

That the Synod hereby directs a Petition to be prepared and presented to the Provincial Legislature at its next meeting praying that the Public School Law may be so far amended that when application is made by the authorized minister of any religious body for permission to give religious instruction, the Trustees be required to make provision for such instruction being given either by shortening the hours set apart for secular instruction on one day in the week, or by arranging that such minister may instruct the children of his own church for one hour, on one day in the week, at the same time that the secular instruction of the school is going on.

Moved in amendment by Rev. Dr. O'Meara, seconded by Mr. Tully, C. E.,

That a deputation from this Synod, to be named by the Lord Bishop, do confer with the Hon. the Minister of Education to ascertain whether means cannot be devised to divote a portion of time during each week to the religious instruction of the children of the Church of England attending the public schools throughout the country.—Carried.

Deputation named by the Bishop:

Moved by Dr. Hodgins, seconded by the Hon. Clerical Secretary,

That the Report of the Committee on Rev. B. S. Hosken's Memorial be adopted — Carried.

Moved by the Rev. C. C. Johnson, seconded by Mr. Blomfield,

That this Synod hereby expresses its grateful appreciation of the kind hospitality of the members of the Church in this city, and its thanks to the ladies for having provided them with such an excellent lunch.—Carried.

Moved by Rev. Rural Dean Allen, M.A., seconded by Dr. Turner,

That the thanks of this Synod are due and are hereby tendered to the proprietors of the Mail and the Dominion Churchman newspapers for their kindness in supplying members with copies of their journals gratuitously during the present session of Synod.—Carried.

Moved by the Rev. C. J. S. Bethune, M.A., seconded by Rev. F. Tremayne, M.A.,

That the usual allowance of thirty dollars (\$30) be made to the authorities of St. George's School House for its use during the present meeting of the Synod.——Carried.

Moved by Rev. A. G. L. Trew, M.A., seconded by Rev. Rural Dean Cooper, B.A.,

That the thanks of the Synod be tendered to the Venerable Archdeacon Whitaker, M.A., for the valuable and timely counsel contained in the sermon preached by him at the opening services at St. James's Cathedral.—Carried.

The usual vote of thanks to the railways was also passed.

The day's minutes were then read and approved.

THE DIOCESE OF SASKATCHEWAN.

His Lordship, the presiding Bishop, introduced the Bishop of Saskatchewan, who was warmly received.

The Bishop thanked the Synod for the hearty manner in which he was received. He stated he had a Diocese of 800 miles square, and if he divided it by a line into two equal parts it would be found that on the eastern side the Church of England had three missions to the Indians, one in the East River District and the others in theSaskatchewan District. On the western side, passing from Carlton, there was a square of 300 miles of country containing the heathen Crees, many thousands of whom were in darkness. And he pointed out that although there was a mission at Carlton, the missionaries of the Church of England had not been able to go farther to reach these Indians. The only Protestant missions there-and they were carried on vigorously and successfully-were those of the Wesleyan Methodists. That was a bad position for the Church of England to be in, as the Indians were anxious for opportunities to hear its ministers. The Mounted Police Force had done its duty properly, and life and property was as safe there as here, and it was the intention of the Government to collect the Indians together to place them on reserves and endeavour to reach them. With such an opportunity he thought the Church should endeavour to reach them. He had travelled among the Indians to a great extent, from the boundary line of his Diocese to a point 300 miles north of the Saskatchewan and 750 miles north of Fort Garry, and he had spent among the Indians some of his best missionary experiences. It was his intention as soon as possible to establish a theological college for the training of native clergymen, for he believed a religion would never take deep root among the people while it was taught by foreign teachers. So far he had been successful, and had trained his natives to be renders, and he hoped in a short time that he would ordain some deacons. In conclusion he urged upon his hearers the requirements of his Diocese.

Rev. Rural Dean Givins assured his Lordship that the clergy of this Diocese felt fully the demands of the Canadian missions among the Indians upon them, and they were prepared to assist the Diocese of Saskatchewan by means of the Society for Promoting Canadian Missions.

CLOSE OF THE SYNOD.

The Lord Bishop of Toronto then closed the Synod. In doing so he congratulated the members on the arriving at the conclusion of their labours, to which they had applied themselves heartily and sincerely. At the opening of the Synod he expressed his hope that the session would be both pleasant and profitable. Although his expectations on that point might not have been fully realized, he felt that what-

ever differences of opinion there were were, not intended to prevent the harmony and union in the great work of promoting the interest of the Church. He trusted that they would be approaching closer and closer to the sentiment prevailing in primitive times, of being of one heart and one soul.

The Benediction was then pronounced by the Bishop, and the Synod adjourned.

Report of the Executive Committee for the year ending 30th April, 1876.

The Executive Committee beg to report, in respect of a resolution (moved at the last meeting of the Synod by the Rev. John Fletcher, M.A., and seconded by Dr. O'Meara, and carried.) to the following effect:—"That a memorial be presented to the Provincial Parliament, praying that the powers conferred by the Act 29-30 Vic. chap 15, on the Provincial Synod (relating to the Church Temporalities Act), or powers to the same effect, be conferred on the Incorporated Synod of the Diocess of Toronto, and that the Executive Committee be empowered to carry out the subject of this resolution":—

That the Committee did not consider it expedient to memorialize the Provincial Legislature on this subject.

The subject of the reduction of the expenses of the Synod Office, in proportion to the reduction of the ircome of the Synod by the erection of the Diocese of Niagara, has been brought before the Executive Committee.

The present expenses are as follows:—Secretary's salary, \$1.400; allowance for book-keeper, \$800=\$2,200. The present messenger being paid by the Secretary.

It is proposed to pay the Secretary \$1,400, and to allow for Book-keeper \$200, and for Messenger \$200=\$1,800, making a reduction of \$400, which is in the opinion of the Committee, the largest reduction which can be made consistently with the efficient discharge of the duties of the Synod Office.

APPENDIX B.

Report of the Clergy Commutation Trust Committee, for the year ending April 30th, 1876.

The Clergy Trust Committee beg leave to report as follows:-

Schedule A. exhibits all the first-class securities held by the Trust.

Schedule B. gives an approximate estimate of the present condition of the Fund.

Schedule C. gives an approximate estimate of the charges on the Fund.

No arrangement having been effected with the Synod of Ningara regarding that portion of the Fund claimed by them, the Committee have treated the accounts in the same manner as if no division of the Toronto Diocese had taken place, but they cannot refrain from expressing their regret that it should be necessary so to do, as until such arrangement is made, the state of the Fund and the question of surplus cannot possibly be settled.

During the past year the Committee have made some progress in winding up the outstanding assets of the Trust, increasing the Schedule A., and diminishing proportionately some of the items formerly appearing in Schedule B. By last year's report the amount of first class securities belonging to the Trust was \$492,196.96—it is now \$508,283.23. The total amount of the Fund in 1875 was \$501,011.26—it is now \$570,078.77.

On account of the Farmer and de Blaquiere loan the Committee have been able to realize from the Macqueen mortgage, by the sale of the property covered by it, \$6,500. From the sale of other lands and from the Hamilton property, have been realized \$3,013.37, leaving still outstanding lands and mortgages valued at \$4,500 and the \$500 balance on timber cut, which, with Mr. Cameron's debt, complete the amount of the Fund.

The Committee are under the painful necessity to report that no portion of Mr. Cameron's indebtedness has been paid during the past year. He has given a bill of exchange, payable in London, which, when discharged, will recoup the premiums on his life policies, which have been advanced by the Committee. On the 1st January last the arrears of principal on his bond amounted to \$9,000, and of interest to \$7,264 54.

The Committee found it necessary in November last to transfer to the Court of Equity, the suits which they had instituted against him in Law; and they hope that this long-pending matter will be drawn to a close without further delay.

The lamented death of the Rev. Canon Baldwin will remove a charge of \$486.67 on the Fund from October next, when the last payment under the by-law will be made to his widow.

The income for the ensuing year, for the Diocese of Toronto and Niagara, is estimated at \$29,559, whilst the claims as at present existing, with expenses, will amount to \$27,896.92, leaving a surplus of \$1,692.08, and the Committee would have been very glad if it had been possible to appropriate this sum; but until the claim of Niagara Synod was adjusted, they did not feel themselves in a position to do so, as the heavier payments required from Toronto, might have absorbed the whole of the income falling to their share.

The Act of 1866 having been accordingly amended by the omission of the clause which enacted that the power of sale thereunder should be exercised within ten years from the passing of the Act (15th August, 1860), there is now no limit to the time within which the Rectory Lands still unsold may be disposed of.

APPENDIX D.

Report of the Mission Board for the Year Ending 30th April, 1876.

During the past year the receipts from collections, subscriptions, donations, and interest on debentures amounted to \$3449.94, and from Parochial guarantees to \$16,350.79. The grants to Missions during the same period amounted to \$9364.32, and the expenditure on account of Parochial guarantees, to \$16,512.20.

On the 30th April, 1875, the Mission Fund was overdrawn to the amount of \$2875.31. By reference to the detailed statement of receipts and expenditure, appended hereto, it will be found that on the 30th April, 1876, that overdrawn belance had increased to \$6,836.90; subject, however, to reduction by the amount of the debt due by the Diocese of Niagara, \$3110.24, with interest from 1st May, 1875.

The state of the Mission Fund has engaged the anxious consideration of the Mission Board during the past year.

A Committee having been appointed in August last to ascertain what proportion might be expected from the different congregations of the Diocese towards the support of the Missionary work of the Diocese and to report to the Lord Bishop, his Lordship, at the request of your Board, issued the following Pastoral letter on the 7th October last, based on the report of that Committee—it having been ascertained that in order to pay off the indebtedness existing at that date and to meet the expenditure of the then current year, a sum of \$13,500 would be required:

- "I feel assured that you share very deeply with me in the anxiety experienced from the present condition of our Mission Fund, and in the desire that means should! e devised, and acted upon as promytly as possible, to restore it to such a rosition that its embarrassments may be cleared away, its present work maintained, and aid afforded for its steady extension.
- "At the Quarterly Meeting of the Mission Board on the 13th of August last, this subject was fully and carnestly discussed; and the result unanimously arrived at was, that a Committee should be appointed to fix an amount of assessment upon each Parish, fairly and equitably calculated, which would meet all these obligations of the Board. And in communicating to you the amount for which your Parish is assessed, for the year commencing with this date, it is to be understood that it is intended to comprehend the two established annual Collections in January and July, the Collection on the Day of Thanksgiving after Harvest, and the collections from house to house throughout the Parish. On comparing the amount fixed upon by the Committee with what has been from all these sources remitted in past years, it will not, in many instances, be found much to exceed what has formerly been contributed. Where it does exceed the remittances of past years, it is believed that the Parishes thus assessed will consider that neither their means nor their good-will have been over-estimated.
- "We shall have to rely much upon your individual co-operation in this effort; by your bringing the subject of our Missionary work and its claims zealous; and practically before your congregations, and by your affording such personal advocacy and aid in the collection of funds as you may be able to render. A united and hearty effort in this behalf cannot fail to realize our best hopes; and, with the generous maintenance of our present staff of Missionaries, afford us the means of steadily increasing their number."

As the response to the above appeal will not be complete until after all returns are made on account of the collection to be made during next month, your Board are not yet in a position to report how far the assessment has been made up; but while some of our Missions have already sent in more than they were assessed for, the larger number have fallen short—some having not, as yet, made any response at all.

At the regular quarterly meeting on the 12th of May last your Board made its annual revision of the Mission Fund Pay List, and adopted the same as follows,—for the year beginning 1st May, 1876:—

A sub-committee having, at the same meeting, been appointed to consider a scale by which grants to missions may be gradually reduced, your Board begs to submit to the Synod the following proposal presented by the sub-committee, and adopted by the Board:

That Missions hereafter placed on the list be referred by the Board, at their discretion, to one of the three following schedules:

- Schedule A. to receive a grant for ten years, \$200 for the first three years, reduced by \$25 every subsequent year, thus leaving the grant of the tenth year only \$25.
- Schedule B. to receive a grant for seven years, \$200 for the first three years, reduced by \$40, every subsequent year, thus leaving the grant for the seventh year only \$40.
- Schedule C. to receive a grant for five years, \$200 for the first three years, \$125 for the fourth year, \$50 for the fifth year.
- Schedule D. Exceptional cases not included under the above, in which the reduction shall be in similar proportions.
 - If in any instance the original grant be were than 8200, the annual reduction shall be in proportion.
 - Travelling Missions shall be maintained at the discretion of the Board at an annual grant not exceeding 8600.
 - Missions already on the list may be subjected, from July, 1877, to reduction at the rate of schedule A., B. or C., or to larger reduction, as the Board may deem expedient.

Appended to this Report will be found detailed statements of receipts and expenditure for the year ending 30th April last, on account of the Indian Mission Fund, the Algoma Mission Fund, and the Day of Intercession Collection.

In regard to the Diocese of Algoma, your Board adopted the following resolutions at their meeting in August, 1875, viz.:

"That this Board would respectfully recommend his Lordship the Bishop to order at some favorable time a special collection, in order to raise the proportion due by this Diocese for the stipend of the Missionary Bishop of Algoma; and that meanwhile the Secretary-Treasurer be instructed to continue the payments on this account." Also, "That the Secretary be instructed to inform the Bishop of Algoma that, in the opinion of this Board, this

Diocese can undertake no more than its just proportion of the expenditure actually incurred for the support of the Missionaries in his Lordship's Diocese, as a part of this Ecclesiastical Province."

In accordance with the above recommendation, the Lord Bishop, on the 16th of May last, issued the following appeal to the Clergy of the Diocese:-

After careful and anxious consideration of the means for meeting the obligations of this Diocese to the Diocese of Algoma, it has been decided that our speediest and simplest method would be to meet the amount of our quota for the current year,—which will extend to 1st May, 1877,—by a general collection throughout our parishes and missions on Whitsunday next, being the fourth day of Jane.

The quota our Diocese has to supply, since the separation from us of the Diocese of Niagara, is \$1400 per annum; and to assure this sum, the amount required from the several parishes is apportioned as equitably as possible.

That appeal, it is believed, has been answered by the whole Diocese, and the returns are now being sent in to the Synod Office.

In conclusion, the Mission Board beg respectfully to represent to the Synod that the experience of past years greatly discourages them in the attempt to make arrangments for a Missionary Meeting during the Session of Synod, and that they have consequently abstained from doing so this year, and would request the Synod to reconsider the resolution which has imposed this duty upon them.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

APPENDIX E.

Report of the Widows and Orphans' Fund and Theological Students' Fund Committee, for the Year ending 30th April, 1876.

The Statement of Receipts and Expenditure appended to this Report, renders it unnecessary for the Committee to do more than draw attention to the general condition of the Fund, which, they regret to be obliged to say, is anything but satisfactory.

The income of the past year shewed a falling off of about \$467 from that of the previous year, and was insufficient for the demands upon the Fund; for while the total expenditure to be met was \$5,434.98, the total receipts were only \$4,792.99, leaving a deficiency, or verdrawn balance, of \$642.

In addition to this, the payments on account of pensions on the 1st July will be \$1.242, by which the indebtedness of the Fund will be increased to \$1,884. Such being its position, the Committee felt themselves compelled, however reluctantly, to notify the annuitants that, while the payments due on the 1st July would be mide in full, seeing that the seven weeks between the May meeting of the Committee and the 1st July did not afford sufficient notice of a reduction, no payments could be made on the 1st October unless some provision for the same should be made by the Synod.

The amount required for the present year will probably not be less than that of the last, viz., \$5.291, augmented by re-payment of the above overdrawn balance (\$642) to a total of \$5.933. The proportion of this to be borne by this Diocese will be about \$3600, as six of the widows and five families of orphans will be transferred to Ningara.

It should be understood that the present Report has reference to the Widows and Orphans' Fund of this Diocese as constituted previous to the separation of the Diocese of Ringara, the Fund being still administered by this Diocese, your Committee not having been yet notified by the Commissioners of the amounts to be retained by this Diocese, and transferred to that of Ringara. The invested and productive capital of the Fund stands at—

Your Committee report, in accordance with the requirements of the Widows and Orphans' Fund By-Law (Section 3), that the following Clergymen have omitted to make the October (1875) collections for the Widows and Orphans' Fund, viz: Reverends C. Ruttan (Berkeley and Chester), George I. Taylor (Brock and Benverton), Robert Rooncy (Cameron), Thomas G. Porter (Hastings), G. A. Anderson (Penetanguishene), W. S. Westney (Streetsville), Richard Harrison (St. Mattins, Toronto), J. H. M'Collum (St. Thomas's, Toronto), and W. Henry Jones (Grace Church, Toronto.)

In the Diocese of Niagara the following Parishes have not made returns, viz.: Amaranth, Beamsville, Beverley, Louth and Port Dalhousie, Milton and Hornby, Minto, Oakville, Christ Church (St. Catharines), and South Walpole.

Theological Students' Fund.

The whole available income of the year just closed compares unfavourably with that of the previous year, being \$\$46,50 for the last year, and \$1173.96 for the preceding period; but as the income of 1875 had been increased by a re-payment of \$120 from one of the Exhibitioners, the actual falling off has been \$207.46.

The balance in hand to meet the payments, amounting to \$280, for the present, or Easter, term, is only \$134.22; consequently the account must be overdrawn to the amount of \$145.78, or the payments for the term be proportionately diminished. Since the meeting of the Synod, in June last, two students have been ordained,

Since the meeting of the Synod, in June last, two students have been ordained, viz., Mr. Ledingham, in October last, to the mission of West Mulmur, and Mr. Hanna, in January, to that of Perrytown.

APPENDIX F.

Report of the General Purposes, Statistics, and Assessment Committee, for the Year Ending 30th April, 1876.

The General Purposes, Statistics, and Assessment Committee, beg leave to report as follows:-

GENERAL PURPOSES FUND.

The fund at the disposal of your Committee during last year amounted to the sum of \$7,017.61 (including a balance from the previous year of \$338.20 and the sum of \$215.27 repaid by Synod Assessment Account), and the expenditure has amounted to \$6,686.15, leaving a balance to the credit of this fund of \$331.46.

The sum of \$200 has been expended in grants to churches and a school house, particulars of which will be ascertained on reference to the detailed statement of receipts and expenditure appended hereto.

SYNOD ASSESSMENT ACCOUNT.

The funds at the disposal of your Committee during the past year on this account amounted to \$757.21 (including a balance from the previous year of \$275.71, and the sum of \$163.95 received on account of the assessment for the current year), and the expenditure has amounted to \$623.26, which includes a sum of \$215.27 repaid the General Purposes Fund for arrearages due the same on account of previous assessments, leaving a balance to the credit of this account of \$163.45 as that portion of assessment received up to 30th April, 1876.

Your Committee invite the attention of the Synod to a resolution which your Committee adopted during the present year:—

"It appearing that on the 1st of February, 1870, there was a balance of 833 .29 to the credit of the assessment account, and that a further sum of about \$300 will be required for the expenses of the coming session of Synod in June, 1876, and it further appearing that the present Synod assessment on the basis fixed in 1875 produces from the present Diocese of Toronto a sum of \$617 10: Resolved, that the Synod assessment for the current year be one-half of the said assessment as so fixed for 1876, and that all new parishes be assessed—in the country for \$1, and in the city of Toronto at the rate of the lowest city assessment—no assessment to be under \$1."

SHINGWAUK HOME.

Your Committee having received a communication from the Rev. E. F. Wilson, in which he protested against the assessment for Synod expenses of moneys received on account of the Shingwauk Home, and stated that he failed to see how the Missionary Diocese of Algoma could in any way come within the laws made for the Diocese of Toronto; and having taken the matter into consideration, suggest to the Synod that the sum of \$49.88, paid to the General Purposes Fund as the assessment for 1874 on monies contributed to the Home, be carried to the credit of the said Institution.

CANON ON CONSTITUTION OF VESTRIES OF FREE CHURCHES.

At the last session of Synod (see pages 178-179 of Synod Report), it was moved by the Rev. C. W. Paterson, B. C. L., and seconded by Rev. Rural Dean Allen, M. A:—

"That the following addition be made to Section 1 of the Canons of the Synod of the Diocese of Toronto (page 277 'Constitution of Vestries of Free Churches,') That after the words 'habitually attending worship in such church,' the following be added: 'And that such person has contributed the sum of at least five dollars during the past year toward the support of the said church;' and the words 'habitually attending worship in such church,' shall be taken to mean attendance (unless prevented by sickness or some other unavoidable cause) at one-half, at least, of the regular Sunday services of the said church during the previous twelve months. And no member of such congregation shall be allowed to take any part in the business of the parish, unless he shall have complied with these requirements. And the said declaration shall be signed annually at the Easter meeting."

And it was moved in amendment by Dr. Hodgins, and seconded by the Clerical

Sceretary :-

"That the resolution of Rev. Mr. Paterson be referred to the General Purposes, Statistics, and Assessment Committee, with a request that the Committee report, if possible, at the next meeting of Synod, some practical measure of relief from the evils complained of."

The amendment having been carried, this subject has, during the recess, occupied the continued and anxious consideration of your committee, and they beg to report the following as, in their opinion, the proper amendment to be made to the

Canon :-

"That on page 277 of the Canons, after the words 'England and Ireland,' the following be added: 'And to have attended, at least, one-third of the regular Sunday services in the said church during the previous twelve months (unless prevented by sickness or some other unavoidable cause), and to have contributed according to their ability and as God hata blessed them to the support of that church, and to have taken no part at any vestry meeting in any other parish during the year—and no member of such congregation shall be allowed to take part in the business of the vestry meeting unless he shall have complied with these requirements—and the said declaration shall be signed annually at the Easter meeting—and being so formed," &c.

PAROCHIAL STATISTICS.

The list of questions (Parochial Statistics) has been revised and amended by

your Committee during the recess—several questions being omitted.

in regard to the possibility of adopting some means to enforce the answering such questions it was considered by your Committee that the same could be best effected by the clergy being required to answer them but once in three years, and they resolved to submit such their opinion to the consideration of his Lordship the Bishop of the Diocese. His Lordship forwarded to your Committee his opinion as follows:—

"I think a return every alternate year would be sufficient, but would not object to once in three years, if it be the general recommendation of the Committee. I approve of the abbreviations." And thereupon your Committee passed the follow-

ing resolution:-

That the suggestion of the Bishop be adopted, and that the statistical report from the Clergy and Churchwardens be required every alternate year; and your Committee would further suggest that the Synod appoint a special Committee to devise some effective means of making the answering of these questions obligatory."

All which is respectfully submitted.

I have the honour to state for the information of the Synod, that the Synod Books of Account show a balance of \$5,833.29 to the debit of the General Purposes Fund Account, which arises from the fact that the Commissioners appointed to divide the funds between the Dioceses of Toronto and Niagara, have thought fit to re-transfer to this account a sum of \$6,164.6 which appears in the ledger balance sheet, 30th April, 1875, to the debit of "Profit and Loss," and which, I am informed, represents the amount prawn from time to time from the General Purposes Fund during past years on account of the Durlington Endowment.

APPENDIX G.

Report of the Sunday School and Book and Tract Committee.

Sunday School Business.

The Committee regret that, during the past year no Sunday School Convention has been held, except in the Deanery of East Simcoe, of which they beg to communicate the following report. The Clergy of the Deanery assembled at Orillia on Wednesday and Thursday, the 12th and 13th of January. On the former day a Ruridecanal meeting was held, with Divine service in the evening, and on Thursday, at 10 a. m., a Sunday School Convention was held by the Clergy in St. James's Parchial School House. After prayers by the Rural Dean, Canon Morgan, in the absence of the appointed essayist (Mr. French,) delivered a practical address on the

subject of Sunday School Training. The discussion was well kept up by the clergy. Mr. Anderson and Mr. Fletcher urged the importance of preparation by the teach-Mr. Bradshaw spoke on the advantage of special services for children. French having just arrived, delivered his address on Sunday School Training. He showed himself master of the subject, having had a long experience in England. Mr. Harris spoke of the importance of teaching the children to respond as a means of producing heartiness in Divine worship. The Chairman then requested any of the teachers who were present, to take part in the discussion, on which Captain Mc-Namara illustrated the difficulty of answering many of the questions asked by the scholars, and requested the names of books which would be useful in assisting teachers to prepare themselves for their work. The Rural Dean strongly condemned the neglect of due discipline in respect of children, and urged on Sunday School teachers the importance of endeavouring to counteract this evil. Mr. Bradshaw recommended a book to be kept in which the name, age, residence, &c., of each child is recorded, on its entrance to the school. Mr. French stated that the plan suggested, was generally adopted in England. The Rural Dean closed the meeting with prayer. At 7 p.m., a service for the children of the Sunday School, was held in St. James's Church, well attended by persons of all ages. All the clergy present again took part. A sound and practical sermon, addressed to the parents, teachers, and children, from St. John xvi. 15, "Feed My Lambs," was delivered by Mr. A pleasing feature of the service was the singing of several appropriate hymns by the children of the Sunday School. The manner in which they performed their part, reflects great credit on their teacher, Miss Stewart. The Rural Dean then closed the service and series of exercises with the Benediction. part of the service was ably sustained by the choir, under the management of Mr. Armstrong-Miss C. Stewart presiding at the organ. The responding was very good, especially on the second evening, and added greatly to the heartiness of the service, which was further increased by the beautiful decorations with which the church was adorned. These latter reflect great credit upon the taste of the designer, the deft hands by which they were executed, and the sound church teaching of the incumbent of which they are undoubtedly the reflex. Altogether the services were such as it is rarely our privilege to enjoy. The unusual number of clergy, each cheered by the presence of his brethren, the hearty response that arose from all sides of the church, the exquisite service of song so ably performed by the choir, and the beautiful decorations, so symbolical of sound Church doctrine, all combined to give a heartiness and solemnity to the services, which cannot fail to leave a lasting impression upon those who were privileged to take part in them. We rise from such services under the thorough conviction that after all there is such a thing as "beauty of holiness," and it is fitting that God should be worshipped therein.

The Committee would express again, as in former years, their strong conviction of the great importance of such gatherings; and their opinion that they will be found to be of far greater service if they are held in the several deaneries of the Diocese, than if they were confined to Toronto; the object being to make them accessible to as many of our Sunday School teachers as possible. At the same time they would recommend that a meeting like that which was held some years ago in Toronto, should again be held in the autumn of this year; and that the duty of making arrangements for it, should be entrusted to a special committee of this Synod.

The Committee have not thought it desirable to make any arrangement for a meeting of the Diocesan Sunday School Association during the present Session of the Synod. The experience of last year was discouraging, and the Committee shrink from inviting gentlemen to come from a distance and prepare papers at the risk of appearing before so mengre an audience as was then assembled; the scanty numbers being not only discouraging to those by whom the papers were prepared, but also preventing any animated and useful discussion of the subjects handled in them.

The Committee are moreover of opinion that, even under more favourable circumstances, the time which can be allosted to a meeting of this description during the Session of the Synod, is by no means adequate to the purposes for which it is held.

Book and Tract Business.

The number of parishes and schools aided during the year was 32.

The numbers of the several kinds of books granted (not including Sunday School libraries, catechisms, and miscellaneous books and tracts) were as follows:

For Churches and Stations:

Nine octavo Bibles.

Twelve octavo Prayer-books.

For Sunday Schools and for Distribution:

Two hundred and fifty-six Prayer-books, forty-six Bibles, and thirty-two Testaments.

About ten thousand copies of the "Sunday School Scheme of Lessons for 1875-6," have been sold throughout the several Dioceses in the Dominion of Canada, and the United States.

as being excellent in its mode of pointing and moderate in price.

The whole edition (of 5,000 copies) of the "Chant and Tune Book," issued some years ago, having been entirely disposed of (as stated in last year's Report) and the demand for it still continuing, it becomes necessary for the Committee to take steps for the adoption or publication of a chant and tune book suitable for use in the Diocese. The balance on hand available for such purpose is \$63,55.

Their attention has also been called to the want of a table of chants appropriate to the Canticles and Psalter, which they propose to supply in the ensuing year.

Your Committee would suggest the propriety of issuing the Gazette at still longer intervals. By a judicious condensation of the printed reports, statistical tables, &c., the Journal of Synod could be brought into a smaller compass, and money wisely saved.

APPENDIX L.

Report of the Special Committee on Canon for enforcing Church Discipline.

PROPOSED CANON.

OF THE DISCIPLINE OF THE CLERGY.

Section I.—Every Cleagman duly licensed by the Bishop, or holding any charge under the jurisdiction of the Bishop of the Diocese, or receiving anyal low-ance whatever under the authority of the Synod, shall be amenable for flences committed by him to the Bishop, in the manner and according to the provisions set forth in this Canon of Discipline.

Section II —There shall be a Standing Committee of Discipline appointed every third year at the annual meeting of the Synod, consisting of the Dean and Archdeacons, ex-officio, and of six Clergymen of at least ten years' standing in Priest's orders, and of six Laymen, three of such Clergymen to be appointed by the Bishop, and three to be elected by ballot by the Clergy, and three of such Laymen to be appointed by the Bishop, and three to be elected by ballot by the Laymembers of Synod, and from this Committee the Board of Triers, as hereinafter provided, shall be taken; and such election shall be next in order after the election of Delegates to the Provincial Synod; provided always that if two or more vacancies occur, such vacancies shall be filled up, respectively, by the Bishop or by the Synod, as the case may be, at the next meeting of the Synod.

Section III.—Cf offences for which the Clergy may be tried: Every Clergyman shall be liable to trial for any crime or immorality, or for any scandalous or disorderly conduct, for teaching or maintining doctrines contrary to the teaching of Holy Scripture, as set forth in the Litzrgy and Articles of the Church of England, such teaching or maintaining being by way of writing, printing, preaching, teaching, or otherwise disseminating, unsound doctrines; for holding service in any other Clergyman's Church or Parish without his consent; for irregularity or indecorum in the performance of divine offices; for contumacy or disrespectful conduct towards the Bishop; for the introduction of innovations or novelties in the performance of divine worship; for schism or separating himself from the communion of the Church, for neglecting the exercise of the Ministry without lawful cause; for exercising any lay profession or occupation inconsistent with his sacred calling; for living in the habitual disuse of public worship, or of the Holy Communion, or for the wilful violation of the constitutions or Canons of this Diocese or of the Provincial Synod.

Provided always, that no proceedings shall be instituted under this Canon unless the same be commenced within six months of the time when the offence complained of was brought to the knowledge of the person or persons making the complaint; provided that no such complaint shall be entertained under this Canon, after two years from the time of the alleged commission of the offence. Nevertheless, when proceedings are taken under this Canon, in respect of any matter which has been the subject of inquiry and adjudication in a court of justice, the proceedings under this Canon may be commenced against a Clergyman in respect of the same matter, or of any matter arising out of the same or connected therewith, within three months of the period when the knowledge thereof shall have reached the Bishop, or the person or persons complaining to him.

Section IV.—1. The trial shall be on a presentment in writing addressed to the Bishop of the Diocese, specifying the offences of which the accused is alleged to be guilty, and defining with reasonable particularity the time, place and circumstances, which presentment nay be made by any three members of the Church, of whom one at least shall be a communicant, or by any three Presbyters, or whenever the Bishop shall have reason to believe, from information otherwise laid before him, that any Clergyman is under the imputation of having been guilty of any offence or misconduct, for which he is liable to be tried, and that the interest of the Church requires an investigation. The Bishop shall then nominate five mem-

bers of the Committee of Discipline, not being parties to the presentment, as a Board of Triers, and cause a list of their names, together with a copy of the charges, to be served on the accused, who shall, within fourteen days after such service. have the right, if he so desire, to object to any three of them, and notify their names in writing to the Bishop; and upon his objecting to one or more, then the Bishop shall name one or more of the said Committee of Discipline, as may be required, and those so selected shall form a Board for the trial of the accused, and shall meet at such time and place as the Bishop shall direct, and shall have power to adjourn from time to time, and from place to place as they shall think necessary. Provided always, that any Clergyman who is charged with any offence under this Canon shall have the privilege of a preliminary investigation, should he so desire, and signify such desire to the Bishop, in writing, within ten days after the notice of such trial; and in such case the Bishop shall direct any three of the Board of Triers as above constituted to examine the case privately in such manner as they may see fit, and report to the Bishop whether, in their opinion, there is good ground for proceeding to trial. A written notice of the time and place of their first meeting shall be served, at least fourteen days before such meeting, on the accused, and the persons making the presentment shall be duly notified thereof. 4. If a Clergyman presented, shall confess the truth of the allegations contained in the presentment, the Bishop shall proceed to pass sentence; and if he shall not confess them before the appointment of a Board for his trial, as before mentioned, he shall be considered as decying them. 5. If a Clergyman, presented after having had due notice, shall not appear before the Board appointed for his trial, the Board may, nevertheless, proceed as if he were present. 6. When the Board proceeds to the trial, they shall hear such evidence as shall be produced, which evidence shall be reduced to writing and signed by the witnesses respectively. If, on or during the trial, the accused shall confess the truth of the charges as stated in the presentment, the Board may dispense with hearing further evidence, and may proceed at once to report to the Bishop. 7. Upon the application of either party to the Board of Triers, and it being made satisfactorily to appear to them that any material witnesses cannot be procured upon the trial, they may appoint a commission to take the testimony of any such witness: and both parties may attend and examine the witness, and the examination shall be reduced to writing and signed by the witness, and shall be in the words of the witness as far as possible, and in the first person, and certified by the commissioner, and enclosed under his seal and transmitted to the Board, and shall be received by them as evidence. 8. The Board having deliberately considered the evidence, shall declare in writing their decision, or that of a majority of them, on the charges contained in the presentment, distinctly stating whether the accused is guilty or not guilty of such charges respectively, and their decision, together with the evidence, shall be delivered to the Bishop, who shall pronounce such Canonical sentence as shall appear to him to be proper. 9. Before pronouncing any sentence, the Bishop shall summon the accused, and three or more members of the Court to meet him at such time as may, in his opinion, be most convenient, in some Church of the Diocese, which shall for that purpose be open at the time to all persons who may choose to attend, and the sentence shall then and there be publicly pronounced by the Bishop, or by some person commissioned by him. notices and papers contemplated in this Canon may be served by a summoner or summoners, to be appointed for the purpose by the Bishop, and whose certificate of such service shall be evidence thereof. In case of service by any other person, the facts shall be proved by such person. A written notice or paper delivered to a party, or to some grown-up member of his family, shall be deemed a sufficient service of such notice or paper. 1!. The defendant or presenters may have the privilege of appearing by counsel.

Section V.—If, at the time appointed for the first meeting of the Board of Triers, the whole number of five shall not attend, then those who do attend, being not less than three, shall proceed to the trid, and a majority of those attending shall decide all questions. They shall appoint a secretary, who may be one of their own number, whose duty it shall be to keep a record of all the proceedings had before the Board. And they may at their discretion call to their aid some barrister-at-law of at least ten years' standing at the Bar of Outario, to act as their assessor, and advise them on all questions of evidence and procedure; and where such advice is sought, the Triers shall be governed thereby.

Section VI.—Suspension, Pendente Lite. In every case in which, from the nature of the offence charged, it shall appear to the Bishop, after due inquiry, that scandal is likely to arise from the Clergyman accused continuing to perform the services of the Church while such charge is under investigation, the Bishop shall cause a notice to be served on the accused at the same time with the service of the copy of the charge, or at any time pending the proceedings, inhibiting the accused from performing any services in the Church until the matter shall have been finally decided; and the Bishop may make provision for the service of the hurch during the period of suspension, which suspension shall not exceed three months.

Section VII.—The proceedings upon a trial shall be open to the members of the Church, unless, in the opinion of the majority of the Board, with the concurrence of the accused, the circumstances of the case require that the trial should be private.

Section VIII.—Every Clergyman, whose case may have been disposed of and decided adversely to him, and who shall make it appear that new evidence, having an important bearing on the case, has been discovered since the trial, of the existence of which he was not aware at the time of the trial, may petition the Bishop for a new trial, or a rehearing of the case, either upon objections to be taken to the decision upon the facts, or because the judgment is not sustained by the laws and canons of this ecclesiastical province, or of the Diocese, or for other cause or causes; or he may apply by petition to the Bishop for an arrest of sentence or judgment, upon causes to be shown; and in either case the Bishop shall, upon receiving such petition, refer the same and the whole subject, together with the evidence and the report made by the Board of Triers, to the whole Committee of Discipline; and their decisions on the above question shall be final in so far as this Diocese is concerned, reserving to the accused the right of appeal to the Court of the Metropolitan.

Section IX.—The Triers to whom the examination or trial of any accused person shall be committed, shall be bound to secrecy as to any communications between *hemselves relating to the trial.

Section X.—The following sentences may be pronounced, and punishments imposed upon offending Clergymen, viz.:—Admonition; suspension from the exercise of his office; withdrawal of license; deprivation or removal from his charge in the Church; deposition or degradation from his sacred office.

Section XI.—For the offences set forth in the first column hereafter written, the sentences set forth opposite to the same in the second column, and none others, shall be passed by the Bishop or person commissioned by him, upon any Clergyman found guilty thereof.

FIRST COLUMN.

UPON TRIAL AND CONVICTION.

- 1 .-- For crime or immorality.
- 2.—Scandalous or disorderly conduct.
- 3.—For irregularities in the performance of Divine offices, or for the introduction of innovations or novelties in the performance of Divine Worship; or for permitting unauthorized persons to officiate in the Church.

SECOND COLUMN.

1.—Suspension, withdrawal of license, deprivation or deposition.

 Admonition, suspension ab officio for not more than one year, nor less than three months; withdrawal of license, deprivation or deposition.

3.-Same as No. 2, except deposition.

- 4.-For schism, or separating himself | 4.--Suspension for one year, withdrawal from the Communion of the Church.
- 5 .- For contumacy; for disrespectful and disobedient conduct towards the Bishop.
- 6. For discontinuing the exercise of the Ministry without sufficient cause or leave of the Bishop.
- 7.-For exercising any lay profession or occupation inconsistent with the performance of the duties of his sacred calling.
- 8 .- For living in the habitual disuse of . Public Worship, or of the Holy Communion, or for violation of the constitution or Canons of the Church in Canada, or of this Diocese.
- 9.-Habitually and advisedly maintaining or affirming doctrine contrary or repugnant to the Word of God, set forth in the Formularies and Articles of Religion in the Book of Common Prayer.

- of license, deprivation or deposition.
- Admonition; suspension ab officio for not more than one year.
- 6.- Admonition; suspension; withdrawal of license or deprivation.
- 7.-Same as No. 6.
- 8 .- Admonition; suspension ab officio for not more than one year; withdrawal of license; deprivation or deposition.
- 9 .- Admonition; inhibition from the performance of clerical functions; withdrawal of license; deprivation or deposition.

Section XII,-When sentence is pronounced in accordance with the above Schedule, it shall also be specified upon what terms, if any, the disability shall cease. When the penalty of suspension is inflicted, the Clergyman shall not exercise the functions of his Ministry in his own congregation or elsewhere, on pain of deprivation or deposition; and during such suspension the Bishop may appoint another Clergyman to supply the place of the suspended Clergyman, and may apply a part of the income or emoluments of the parish, mission or cure to the payment of such substitute.

SECTION XIII.—When the sentence of deprivation or deposition is pronounced, the connection between the minister so deprived or deposed and his parish or congregation shall be ipso facto severed, and all offices, rents, issues, profits and emoluments which he may have held by virtue of such office or ministry from which he has been removed, shall wholly cease and determine.

SECTION XIV .- Whenever a Clergyman is so deposed or degraded from the Holy Ministry, the Bishop who pronounces the sentence shall, without delay, cause such sentence to be publicly read in the several congregations of the Diocese, by the respective ministers thereof, and shall also give notice to all the Bishops of the Dominion, and to the presiding Bishop of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States.

Section XV .- All the proceedings of the Triers, when approved by the Bishop, as well as the sentence in each case, shall be kept recorded by the Secretaries of the Synod in a book to be provided for that purpose.

Section XVI .- The expenses connected with the carrying out of the Canon on Discipline shall be paid out of the Synod Assessment.

SECTION XVII. - In all cases of suspension of a Clergyman by the Bishop, pendente lite, a trial (except in case of confession and submission) shall be proceeded with, within three months of such suspension, or the same shall be null and void.

APPENDIX M.

Report of the Special Committee on Loans for Church Building.

After mature consideration your Committee reports:

- 1. That owing to the rapid growth of our church membership, there is an ever-recurring necessity to provide increased church accommodation.
- 2. That in view of the rapidity of this increase of population, prudence demands that such church accommodation should be in advance of our present requirements.
- 3. That in a new country where the people have everything to do for themselves and where funds for church purposes, including the stipends of ministers, &c., have to be raised by private contributions, the strain upon our members is very heavy.
- 4. That a large proportion of this additional church accommodation is required for immigrants from the old country, who have never been accustomed to sustain the church by voluntary offerings, and who for many years after their arrival do not for the most part feel able, even if they are willing, to contribute largely for this purpose.
- 5. That the burden of providing church accommodation and the services of the ministry for such new comers is thus thrown upon those who have already had to provide themselves with churches and ministers, and whose energies are heavily taxed in order to meet their own wants.
- 26. That in order to provide funds for such present and prospective needs, it becomes necessary that a considerable proportion of the money should be borrowed.
- 7. That the security upon which such loans have to be raised consists of: 1st, Mortgages upon the property; 2nd, chiefly of the personal guarantees of those members of the church who are already bearing a fair share of her burdens.
- 8. That the accumulated capital in Canada being comparatively small, this money can be raised only at rates of interest practically ranging from 8 to 12 per cent. per annum.
- 9. That this heavy charge for interest greatly aggravates the burdens of those church members who, from time to time, voluntarily assume the work, and cripples their energies in other fields of church labour.
- 10. That many wealthy members of our communion in the Mother country lend money for the building of churches, parsonages, &c., at low rates of 3 or 4 per cent. per annum, and in some cases even without interest.
- 11. That it is reasonable to hope that funds might be borrowed on similarly favourable terms here as well as in England, to aid church extension in Canada, and that an effort in that direction ought to be made.
 - 12. That at present no machinery exists for that purpose.

Your Committee advises, therefore, that a society be formed with a capital stock, (which society should act independently of the Synod, but in harmony with its views,) authorized to receive donations, legacies, and deposits, with or without interest, and to distribute the fauds thus entrusted to them by making loans for building churches, parsonages, &c., at the lowest possible rates of interest and under the fallest guarantees for repayment.

Your Committee leaving to a future Committee the settling of details, would suggest that :—

- Ist. Beginning with the Diocese of Toronto, the usefulness of this proposed society might be extended to all the Dioceses of the Province of Ontario, and ultimately of the Dominion of Canada.
- 2nd. That the patrons of the Society be the Lord Bishop of Toronto and the other Bishops of the Province of Ontario and of the Dominion, according as their several dioceses adopt the proposed scheme.

3rd. That the affairs of the Society be managed by a President, and five or more Directors, all to be laymen, who shall appoint a Secretary-Treasurer, and any other necessary officers or agents.

4th. That a special charter from Parliament be applied for to empower the

Society-

- (i.) To receive subscriptions for Stock to the amount (say) of \$500.000 —said stock to be issued either to carry dividends or not, as may be agreed upon with the several subscribers.
 - (2.) To limit the dividend on such stock. (3.) To receive donations, legacies, &c.

(4.) To borrow to the extent of \$250,000, either by receiving deposits, or issuing debentures at such rate of interest as the directors determine upon.

(5.) To lend money for building churches, parsonages, &c., situated within the several Dioceses whose Synods may hereafter adopt the proposed scheme and at such rates as the directors may see fit.

(6) To make by-laws for the election of Directors, and for the general govern-

ing of the Society.

(7.) And generally to obtain such powers as may enable them to carry out the

purpose contemplated in organizing this Society.

Your Committee feels that such a Society might be so constituted as to command respect and confidence, both in Canada and in England, and materially assist churchmen in fulfilling more perfectly the apostolic injunction, "Bear ye one another's burdens."

All which is respectfully submitted.

APPENDIX O.

Report of the Special Committee and Sustentation Fund.

Whereas it has been held to be desirable that a fund should be formed from which pensions may be granted to Clergymen of this Diocese, when incapacitated by age or infirmity, and a Committee was appointed at the last meeting of the Synod to report the mode which might appear to them most practicable for providing the same, the Committee most respectfully beg to report as follows:—

- I. That every Clergyman, desiring to secure for himself the benefit of such fund, shall pay the sum of five dollars annually to the same; such payment to begin within six months from the passing of a Canon establishing the fund, or within six months of the ordination of such Clergyman, or of his being licensed or instituted as a Clergyman of this Diocese.
- II. That a collection shall be made annually for the purposes of this fund, the minimum of such collection being fixed, in rural congregations at two dollars, and in town and city congregations at five dollars.
- III. That all payments, collections, subscriptions, and donations to the fund shall be invested from time to time, as well as all surplus revenue thereof; the interest of the same only to be employed in granting pensions, except that, in case of necessity, the annual collections from congregations may be so employed.
- IV. That the management and administration of the fund shall be entrusted to the Committee on the Widows and Orphans' Fund.
- V. That no grant shall be made from this fund without the sanction of the Bishop, nor to any Clergyman who shall not have served ten years in the Diocese, or who shall not have complied with the requisitions above stated, or who shall be in possession of a private no-me of not less than \$400 per annum, or who shall be in receipt of any stipend, pension, or allowance from the Commutation Fund.
- VI. That every application shall be accompanied by a certificate from the Bishop, stating that the applicant has, with his approval, resigned his charge in the Diocese, and also by a medical certificate to the effect that the applicant is incapacitated for further duty by age or infirmity.
- VII. That the Committee on the Widows and Orphans' Fund shall report to the Synod, at every ordinary meeting thereof, on the condition of the fund, and on the pensions granted therefrom.

The Committee, having given their best attention to the subject, are of opinion that the above regulations are expedient in the event of a Superannuation Fund being formed; but bearing in mind to how very great an extent the purposes of such a fund are even now met by the Clergy Commutation Fund, and that in a comparatively short time that fund will meet every case which the proposed Superannuation Fund could benefit; and further recognizing the inexpediency of making, unnecessarily, new claims upon either congregations or individuals, and thus enfectbling their efforts on behalf of other objects of acknowledged importance to which at present inadequate support is given, they are not prepared to recommend to the Synod the enactment of any Canon based on the provisions above stated.

APPENDIX P.

Report of the Special Committee on Religious Instruction in the Public, Schools.

The Committee appointed to confer with the authorities of the various Protestant religious bodies with a view of ascertaining whether a common basis of action cannot be agreed upon with regard to religious instruction in our public schools, beg leave to report:

That a Conference was held in the Synod Rooms, York Chambers, on the 14th of March last, at which most of the leading denominations were represented either by some of their members or by letter.

The subject was discussed at some length; and as there was considerable variety of opinion expressed, it was thought better not to determine upon any course of

action until the question had been submitted for more general consideration. The following resolution was therefore unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That a circular be prepared and laid before the several Synods, Conferences, Assemblies, and Unions, &c., of the various Protestant religious bodies, at their next Annual meetings, inviting them to consider the expediency of addressing the Provincial government, with a view of obtaining a shortening of the Public School hours in the afternoon of one day in the week, in order to give opportunity for the imparting of religious instruction; and also asking them to give some expression of opinion as to the manner in which they think the said religious instruction should be imparted.

A Circular embodying this resolution, has been forwarded to the various bodies indicated, inviting them to give the matter their earnest consideration.

The Rev. J. LANGTRY gives notice that when the Report on Religious Instruction comes up for adoption he will move:—

That the Synod hereby directs a Petition to be prepared and presented to the Provincial Legislature at its next meeting that the Public School Law may be so far amended that when application is made by the authorized minister of any religious body for permission to give religious instruction, the Trustees be required to make provision for such instruction being given either by shortening the hours set apart for secular instruction on one day in the week, or by arranging that such minister may instruct the children of his own church for one hour, on one day in the week, at the same time that the secular instruction of the school is going on.

APPENDIX Q.

Report of the Commissioners to divide Funds with the Diocese of Niagara.

At the meeting of Synod of this Diocese in June, 1876, the following resolution was carried: "That a Commission be appointed with full powers to make arrangements as to the division of the various funds and estates in which the Diocese of Ningara claims a share, and to carry out such division thereof as to them may seem fit."

In accordance with this resolution the Commissioners have held frequent meetings, both amongst themselves, and with Commissioners appointed by the Synod of the Diocese of Niagara, but, the Commissioners regret to say, without any finally satisfactory result.

The funds in which Ningara claims to share are:

THE RECTORY LANDS AND ENDOWMENTS.

THE GENERAL PURPOSES FUND.

THE WIDOWS AND ORPHANS' FUND,

THE SUSTENTATION FUND.

THE CLEBGY COMMUTATION TRUST FUND.

With regard to the first of these, no difficulty arose, it being agreed that the securities belonging to the various parishes in Niagara Diocese should, with the consent of the beneficiaries, be transferred to the Synod of that Diocese, and the Synod of Toronto be discharged.

Of the amount of the General Purposes Fund, it was agreed that one-third should be paid over to Niagara, but a difference of opinion exists as to whether a sum of \$3,300, known as The Burnside Bequest, should form part of this fund. The Commissioners of Toronto consider that this Synod is the trustee for the appropriation of the income arising from the fund, in terms of the will of the tectato. and that even if it had the power to divest itself of, or delegate the trust to others, there is

no good ground for asking it to do so. The object of the bequest is to aid "in the erection and improvement of churches in remote partsor places in Upper Canada," and there is nothing to confine the expenditure to any particular section of country, all being entitled to bring forward their claims; the duty of the managers being simply to decide upon the applications presented, and give the assistance in the localities which may appear to them to have the strongest claims upon them.

The Widows and Orphans' Fund it was agreed to divide in the proportion of 57 to Toronto and 16 to Niagara. In addition to this, Niagara to receive \$2000, the amount of the Niagara District Fund (of which account has been taken in calculating the proportion for division,) and \$332.36 subscribed by residents in that Diocese towards the Special Appeal for \$10,000 made in 1874; the balance remaining here.

Of the Sustentation Fund, it was agreed that Niagara should receive one-third.

The Commutation Trust Fund, which is the largest and most important fund of the Church, has caused the Commissioners much anxious thought, and (owing to the imperfect record of arrangements made when Toronto Diocese was divided) much trouble.

When that event took place, a reference was made, and an award dividing the Fund between Toronto, Huron, and Ontario, pronounced by the late Bishops of Toronto and Huron, and the late Sir James Macaulay.

Without entering into details the Commissioners would simply state that this award appears to them to have been intended as a finality, and that, whatever this Synod may in its wisdom decide to do, it looks as if no further division of this Fund was contemplated; but that after meeting the claims of the Commuters, this Synod was at liberty to deal with the surplus in whatever way the members decided to be best. It is more than questionable, if any obligation rests on the Synod to make any division of, or change in, the management of this Fund; although it might be considered right, that with regard to non-commuters, service in the Diocese of Niagara should count in obtaining precedence, in the same way as if it had been performed within the bounds of the present Diocese of Teronto. The commissioners would not have brought forward this view of the case, had they considered that the commissioners for Niagara took an equitable view of the relative positions of the two Dioceses; but as claims have been advanced by them, which the commissioners do not feel justified in admitting, they consider it their duty to submit it to the Synod.

The basis which was proposed for division was the residence of the commuter at the date of commutation. Owing to no record appearing on the Minute Book of the Trust, at the time of the appropriation to the Diocese of Huron, and exchanges having been allowed of which no entry was made, it became difficult, in some cases, to decide to which Diocese certain sums should be appropriated. Lists, however, were prepared, which your commissioners believe to be substantially correct, and which, with some reservations, were accepted by the commissioners for Ningara. These reservations are, however, important, and if allowed would materially reduce the amount of the Fung remaining to Toronto.

The amount of commutation received from the Government on account of the late Bishop of Toronto and the Archdeacon of York was \$50,334.07, but as under the award, the sum of \$47,854.66 had already been paid out of the Fund to the Dioceses of Huron and Outario, to form incomes for their Bishops and Archdeacons, your commissioners reduced their claims to \$33,333.33, the amount ordered by the award to be set aside for ever to provide an income of \$1600 per annum for the Bishop of Toronto, and \$400 per annum for an Archdeacon. Notwithstanding this large reduction, the commissioners for Ningara claimed, that as this amount had not been taken out and set apart as awarded, it should not share in the division of the profits on the fund, although it had just as much as any other amount, contributed to create these profits. They also objected to Toronto claiming the commutation money from which the Bishop receives \$400 per annum to aid in the outfit of newly-ordained clergymen. They further objected to Toronto claiming for \$2,690 received by the fund to represent \$200 per annum paid to the late Rev. T. S. Ken-

nedy, a clergyman of Toronto, as representing the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, and which really formed part of his income as Secretary of the Church Society, and naturally falls to this Synod. A further claim is for \$6,000.60 commutation of the Rev Dr. Townley, who appears, at the date of commutation, to have been resident in Niagara Diocese, but which amount was unquestionably paid overto the Diocese of Huron in the settlement with it.

A further, and-in the opinion of your commissioners, if possible, an even more inequitable—claim is, that a sum shall be set apart, and paid over, to provide an income for the Bishop of Niagara.

Whether this was to be taken out of the Commutation or the Episcopal Endowment Fund, the commissioners for Niagara declined to indicate, and your commissioners need only refer to the distinct disclaimers on the floor of this House, of all intention on the part of the supporters of a division of the Diocese, to interfere with the Bishop's income, as an expression of their opinion, of the propriety of this demand.

Early in the negotiations, your Commissioners agreed that the amount paid into the fund, on account of the Theological Chair at Cobourg, and in respect of which no income has ever been drawn by his Lordship the Bishop of Toronto, in whose name as Theological Professor, the commutation was made, should be merged in the surplus of the Fund, and be shared by Niagara; but it remains with the Synod now to say, whether they will sanction this, or claim the amount as part of Toronto's capital.

Your Commissioners were desirous of awarding to the Diocese of Niagara, all that it seemed to them, could in reason be demanded; but when that Diocese insisted upon such a share of the Commutation Fund, as would prevent the Diocese of Toronto from fulfilling the obligations to the clergymen therein, now on the Fund, your Commissioners felt it necessary to resist the claim thus insisted on.

The claims of the Missionaries in the rew Diocese of Algoma, to share in the Commutation Fund, were considered by the Joint Commissioners, and it was decided that no legal claim could be established: thus leaving it to each Diocese, to adopt such course in future, as might seem just and reasonable, any moral obligation which existed in the one case, being equally binding in the other.

Your Commissioners are of opinion, that under the present Canon, a clergyman can only be placed on the list of Annuitants, in respect of service performed within the actual Diocese of Toronto; and also that his claim ceases upon his leaving that Diocese. Special legislation would therefore be required, to enable any clergyman now in Algoma, or removing there from this Diocese, to obtain credit for past and future service in that Diocese.

That they be continued in office, with power to divide the Widows and Orphans', The General Purposes, and The Sustentation Funds in the proportions and in the manner mentioned in the Report, and to pay over and transfer to the Synod of Niagara the moneys and securities coming to that Diocese in respect of the above funds, and also in respect of Rectories and endowments of Parishes situated within its bounds, on procuring such acquittances and discharges as the commissioners may consider necessary, but after re-payment or deduction of any balances, due by the Synod of Niagara to this Synod, on any open account.

And further, with authority to continue the negotiations with the Synod of Niagara, in regard to a fair and equitable settlement of the Commutation Trust Fund—to take advice as to the powers of the Synod in regard thereto—and, if necessary, steps to obtain authority to make a division of the Fund.

APPENDIX R.

Report of Committee on Memorial of the Rev. B. S. Hosken.

To the Lord Bishop and Synad of the Diocese of Toronto:

The Report of the Special Committee to whom was referred the Memorial of the Rev. B. S. Hosken, beg leave to report:—

- 1. That the Committee have been only able partially to consider the matter of the Memorial referred to your Committee, owing to the disinclination of the Rev. Mr. Logan, as explained in his letter to the Reverend the Chairman of your Committee, and hereto annexed.
- 2. Having heard the statements of the Rev. B. S. Hosken, however, ex parte, the Committee can not but express their regret that he should have used expressions in his memorial toward a brother elergyman not warranted by any facts he has brought before us.
- 3. The Committee find that the principal matter in difference is with reference to a balance of salary which the Rev. the Memorialist claims he ought to have received from the congregation of St. John's Church, Cartwright (or out of the income of the endowment thereof). This balance of salary is claimed as due from December, 1871, to March, 1872—originally not due to the Rev. Mr. Hosken, but to the Rev. Mr. Logan, the former incumbent of St. John's Church Parish in Cartwright, who, it is said, accepted the same quarter's salary from the Fenelon Falls Parish, and which ought to have gone to the Rev. Mr. Hosken, and in lieu thereof, by arrangement between these two clergymen, an arrangement which no doubt did exist.
- 4. Whether, as a matter of fact, this quarter's salary has ever been paid to any one, your Committee have not been able to ascertain. As a matter of fact, the papers produced by the Rev. Mr. Hosken shew that the congregation referred to have only been discharged of their liability to the Rev. Mr. Logan up to the end of the year 1871, and not the year 1872, or first quarter thereof, and the same is still outstanding as a liability to the Rev. Mr. Logan, and by him in an informal manner assigned to the Rev. Mr. Hosken.

5. The vestry of the Church of St. John, however, contend they have been discharged therefrom.

6. Without reference to the arbitration papers referred to in the letter of the Rev. Mr. Logan hereto annexed, your Committee are not able to determine whether or not the whole matter has not been determined by that award; as the parties thereto and arbitrators differ as to whether or not the matter of salary was brought before them and adjudicated upon, or is still an open question.

7. If the matter is still open to be discussed, the amount really in dispute is less than \$100, so far as your Committee can make out from the Rev. Mr. Hosken, the only party before us.

8. Your Committee are unable, without the assistance of the Rev. Mr. Logan, to make any final report in this matter. He stands on his legal rights under the award. If the matter was before the arbitrators and awarded on, that is the end of it. If it was not before the arbitrators, it is entirely a matter of pecuniary claim on the part of the Rev. Mr. Hosken, and as between him and the Rev. Mr. Logan, and which this Synod can not deal with.

9. There is nothing brought before your Committee which would justify the language of the memorial of the Rev. Mr. Hosken.

(THE REV. W. LOGAN'S LETTER.)

To the Rev. Mr. Morgan: Toronto, June 23r1, 1876.

DEAR SIR,—In answer to your note of last evening, I have to say that I admit no claim against me or the Fenelon endowment on the part of Mr. Hosken, and I only send you this as a matter of courtesy.

The matters that were in discute between Mr. Hosken and myself have been twice settled already—once in a friendly way between ourselves, and once by arbi-

tration. The first settlement was broken up, and application was made by him to the Bishop for a commission of arbitration to settle all matters in dispute between us, which was granted and cordially agreed to by me. He chose as his arbitrator the Rey. Mr. Belt, then of Oshawa, and I chose the Rev. Dr Smithett, of Lindsay. They chose Deputy-Judge Hudspeth as the third party. The commission met as Lindsay, and appointed Mr. Knight, the gentleman who seconded Mr. Hosken's motion for the appointment of a Committee, as sworn recorder of the proceeding. The matters were gone into with great deliberation and care, and the greater part of three days occupied in the investigation. A bond of \$1,000 was signed by Mr. Hosken and myself. I refor the Committee to the arbitration papers, the original draft of which is in the hands of Dr. Smithett, and the bond is in the hands of Mr. Hudspeth, by whom I am advised as my solicitor.

I had intended to have made this statement at the time the resolution was moved, but I was not in the Synod at the time, being then engaged in the Court on contested seats. I intend to make the statement on a question of privilege when the Committee brings in the report.

I fall back on the bond, and allow nothing to come behind it.

A Letter was read from the solicitors with reports on the various matters in their hands.

A proposition from the Hou. J. H. Cameron with a view to a final settlement of his indebtedness, was referred to a special Sub-Committee.

Endowment of See, Rectory Lands, and Land and Investment Committee.

Present.—The Rev. Canon Brent (appointed Chairman for the current year); the Dean of Toronto, Revs. J. H. McCollum, William Logan, W. H. Clarke. Messra. Farncomb and Magrath.

Fenelon Endowment—Rev. W. Logan was authorized to deal with the Victoria Railway Company in regard to the purchase of laud required for the right of way through the Church property at Fenelon Falls.

Peterborough Glebe—Offer accepted from Mr. Hatton to purchase Park Lots 15 and 16 in the Township of Monaghan, for \$250 an acre.

Grafton Endowment—Offer accepted from Joseph Hickson to purchase lot 2, con. 6, Ops., for \$3,500.

Church Lands in Cardiff—Twenty acres, parts of lots 12 and 18, in 12th concession, Township of Cardiff. This land having been vested by the Crown in certain trustees, the Synod is now asked to accept a surrender of the trust. The Committee being of opinion that this cannot be done, recommend the Church people in Cardiff to buy the remainder of the lot at the nominal price fixed by the Government, and obtain a new patent for the whole; such patent to be made directly to the Synod.

Mission Board.

Present—The Lord Bishop in the Chair; the Archdencon of York, Revs. Dr. Lett, A. Stewart, Canon Morgan, T. W. Allen, I. Middleton, H. D. Cooper, Septimus Jones, F. Burt, E. H. Cole, S. Givins, Canon Osler. Professor Wilson, Hon. C. J. Douglas, Mr. A. R. Gordon.

The Secretary presented the quarterly financial statement, showing the Mission Fund account overdrawn on the 1st August, \$6,399.77, subject to deduction by the amount of the debt due by the Diocese of Niagara, \$3,110.24, with interest from 1st May, 1875.

New guarantees were received and accepted from the following Missions: Credit, \$600; Stayner, \$250; Batteaux and Singhampton, \$300; Ashburnham and Otonabee, \$600; Allistown and West Essa, \$350; Waverly, \$100.

Letter was read from the Rev. Rural Dean Smithett, and a statement made by the Bishop in regard to the new mission of Apsley, and the work now being done therein by Messrs. Harding and Gander.

Resolved—That the sum of \$50 be granted to Rural Dean Smithett for Mr. Harding, for services as lay-reader for six months ending July 1st, 1876.

Resolved—That \$200 be granted by the Board for the maintenance of a travelling mission at Apsley and parts adjacent, dating from any time from which a clergyman shall be appointed to it.

Resolved—That the Mission of the Credit be replaced on the List of the Mission Board for one year from July 1st, 1876, and that the amount of \$200 per annum be granted to it.

Resolved—That a Committee be appointed to arrange the Mission Board Pay List, in accordance with the by-law passed at the last meeting of Synod, and report to this Board in November.

Widows' and Orphans' Fund, and Theological Students' Fund Committee.

Present.—The Rev. H. C. Cooper (appointed Chairman for the current year), and Rev. J. S. Baker. Hon. V.-C. Blake, Capt. Blain, T. A. Agar, H. W. M. Murray.

The Secretary presented the Quarterly Financial Statement shewing the income account overdrawn on the 1st August, \$1,080.73.

Resolved—That City of Toronto debentures for \$1,120, and those of the Township of Tay for \$1,150, be sold by transfer to some other Synod Fund, to pay the overdrawn account and the October pensions.

A Sub-Committee was appointed to ascertain the number of widows and orphans to be maintained by the present Diocese of Toronto, and to make the necessary assessment on the several paristrs and missions. The attention of the clergy to be called to the fact that the approaching October collection will be made only in the Diocese of Toronto, and that the proceeds must be applied as well towards repairing the capital account as to the payment of the widows and orphans. That in all cases Churchwardens be requested to collect the amount which is short after the collection to be taken up on Sunday.

Letters were read from Messrs. Ker and Geoghegan, withdrawing their applications for Divinity Exhibitions.

Other applications were laid over till next meeting, there not being any funds at present available.

General Purposes, Statistics, and Assessment Committee.

Present—Marcellus Crombie, Esq., (appointed Chairman for the current year);

Revs. Thomas Ball and John Vicars. Messrs. F. A. Ball, D. B. Read, and A. R. Boswell.

The Rev. A. Henderson, of Orangeville (Diocese of Ningara) having made his application in proper form for a grant in aid of the proposed purchase of a Wesleyan Meeting House, in the Township of Mono, the Committee decided that under the circumstances disclosed it was not competent for them to grant the application.

A grant of \$50 was made in aid of the new church at Westwood, payable as soon as the title to the site is vested in the Synod, and the building so far finished as to almit of service being regularly held in it.

A grant of \$50 was made in aid of the new church at Midland, on condition that the regular form of application be completed and forwarded to the Secretary.

The Rev. L. H. Kirkby (Batteaux) having asked whether—with reference to a proposed new church at one of his stations (Singhampton), which is situated on the boundary line between Huron and Toronto-a church site in the Diocese of Huron, bur with part of the worshippers in the Diocese of Toronto, could be deeded to the Diocese of Toronto, so that a grant might be obtained from the General Purposes Fund: The Committee decided that they could not grant funds in aid of a church built outside the Diocese of Toronto.
