- There will be four Eclipses this year: two of the Sun, and two of the Moon.
- I. The first will be a Total Eclipse of the Sun, on Tuesday and Wednesday, May 1st and 2d days, visible here.
 - II. The second will be a Partial Eclipse of the Sun, on Tuesday, May 15th day, visible here.
 - III. The third will be a Total Eclipse of the Moon, on Thursday, October 25th day, visible here.
 - IV. The fourth will be a Partial Eclipse of the Sun, on Friday, November 9th day, visible here.

MORNING AND EVENING STARS OF 1855

The Planet Venus (♀) will be Evening Star till Oct. 1st; then Morning Star to the end of the year.—Mars (♂) will be Evening Star till April 10th; then Morning Star to the end of the year.—Jupiter (♃) will be Evening Star till Jan. 30th; then Morning Star till Aug. 1st; then Evening Star to the end of the year.—Saturn (♄) will be Evening Star till June 10th; then Morning Star till December 18th; then Evening Star.

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LIGHT HOUSES.

Board of Commissioners for the several Light Houses in the Bay of Fundy.—Robert W. Crookshank, John Ward, Isaac Woodward, Hon. W. F. W. Owen, John Wilson, Lieut. Charles Hare, E. N. and John James Robinson, R. N., Esquires.

Isaac Woodward, Esquire, Surveyor of those Light Houses in the Bay of Fundy belonging to New Brunswick, and also of those belonging to Nova Scotia which are partly supported by this Province.

Cape Sable Seal Island Light.—The first Light in approaching the Bay of Fundy, is on the South Point of the Seal Island. This is a plain white Light, elevated about 80 feet above high water mark, and may be seen in approaching the Island from any point of the compass. A very dangerous rock, under water, but upon which the sea always breaks, called *Blonde Rock*, lies about 3½ miles S. by W. by compass, from the Light House. Between this rock and the Island, there are some dangers—the ground is rocky throughout, and large vessels, therefore, ought not to attempt passing between them.

Brier Island Light.—In advancing up the Bay, the next Light is situated on Brier Island, about half a mile N. E. from the N. W. point thereof. A plain white light.

Digby Gut Light.—The next light on the coast of Nova Scotia is placed on the west side of Digby Gut—from Brier Island North Eastward. The coast is very bold and not indented, the Light is therefore chiefly intended as a guide into Digby Basin—A white Light.

Gannet Rock Light.—This Light is intended to warn vessels of their approach to a very dangerous range of shoals and ledges, which extend from the Old Proprietor to the Seal Islands off Machias, a distance of about twenty miles. It is a flash light—white—twenty seconds dark and forty light in each minute. The Light House is painted in stripes, vertical, black and white.

Bearing, and Distance by Compass from the Gannet Rock Light House.—This Light bears from the Light house on Brier Island, N. N. W. ¼ W. 22 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the Old Proprietor, S. distance 7 miles.
From the Gannet Rock to the Black Rock, or White Head Island, N. E. ¼ E. 7 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the South West Head of Grand Manan, N. N. W. 6½ miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the Northernmost of the Murr Ledges, N. W. ¼ N. 2½ miles.

To the Southernmost of ditto, called Saint Marr's Ledge, W. S. W. 2 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to Machias Seal Island, W and by N ¼ N. 12½ miles.

NOTE.—Between the Northernmost and Southernmost of the Murr Ledges, there is a range of dangerous rocks and shoals, many of them always above water, and which extend Westward from the Light House about four miles; from this range, farther Westward, about six miles from the Gannet Light, lies a dangerous Shoal called the Bull. This may be avoided by keeping three remarkable headlands near the S. W. end of Grand Manan, open.

From Brier Island Light to the Old Proprietor, N. and by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W.
12 $\frac{1}{2}$ miles

The Blonde Rock from the Southernmost point of the Cape Sable
Seal Islands S. and by W. 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ miles distant.

Machias Seal Island Lights.—There are two fixed white lights upon
the Machias Seal Islands, elevated about forty-five feet above high
water, and bear from each other E. S. E. and W. N. W. distant about
200 feet, by which circumstances of two Light Houses at the same
station, they will be immediately distinguished from all other lights
upon the coast, (British or American) Both the Buildings are
painted white. The following are the bearings from them, viz:

To the Southernmost Murr Ledge, (St. Mary's) E. S. E. easterly.

Gannet Rock Light E. by S. $\frac{1}{2}$ S. 13 miles.

Southern Head of Grand Manan, E. by N. $\frac{1}{2}$ N.

Northern Head of Grand Manan, N. E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E.

N. E. Rock, distant 2 miles, N. E. by N.

Little River Head, N. by W.

Libby Island Light House, (American,) N. W. by W.

Vessels standing to the Northward, between these Lights and the
Gannet Rock, should tack or haul off the moment they bring these
Lights in one, as they will not then be more than three fourths of a
mile from the Murr Ledges, if more than five miles to the East of the
lights.

[It is recommended that the Ship's Compasses should be well compared and
adjusted (particularly in new ships), before they leave Partridge Island, as se-
rious errors have frequently occurred from want of attention on this point; and
as the variation in the Bay of Fundy is seventeen degrees Westerly, or (14 points)
it will be found by the latest published Admiralty Charts, that the course from
Partridge Island down the Bay (South Channel) between the Old Proprietor, and
N. W. Ledge, is S. W. $\frac{1}{2}$ S., but the course to be steered must depend on the di-
rection of the wind on leaving Partridge Island.]

Head Harbour Light.—Next in order after passing Grand Manan
and the plain white Light, (American) on West Quoddy Point, is
Head Harbour Light. This is placed on the North East extremity of,
Campo Bello, and is a guide to vessels entering the main Channel to
West Isles, Moose Island, and the inner Bay of Passamaquoddy; it
enables vessels also at all times to enter Head Harbour—it is a fixed
white light. The building is painted White, with a red cross on it.

Point Le Preau Lights.—Upon this projecting head land two lights
are placed, one above the other, in the same house, and distant 28
feet—Both lights can be seen from every point of the compass, where
they may be useful—both are fixed and white. The Light House is
painted red and white, in stripes of five feet broad each, horizontally.

Partridge Island Light.—This light at the entrance of the River and
Harbour of Saint John, having been established upwards of forty
years, requires no particular notice, further than that it is a fixed white
light, and that the Light House is red and white, in vertical stripes.

Beacon Light.—Within Partridge Island, and upon a Spit or bar
which extends about half a mile S. S. E. off Sand Point, and which
dries at two-thirds ebb, stands the Beacon Tower. Upon this Tower
a light is established, which is eminently useful to the coasting trade
of Saint John, and to all other vessels having pilots on board, as it en-
ables them to enter the harbour at all hours of the night. A fixed
light. The House is white and black, in stripes vertically.

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Quaco.—A revolving white light is placed on a small rock off Quaco Head, showing twice full and twice dark in a minute. This light can be seen from any quarter where a vessel can approach. The Light House is painted white and red in horizontal stripes.

Cape Enrage Light.—On the point of that name, in Westmorland, nearly opposite Apple River Harbour, N. S. A plain white light. The House is painted white, and is about 120 feet above tide mark.

West Quay Light.—This is an American Light, and is placed on the West side of the entrance into the Saint Croix by Lunenburg and Eastport.

Cape Forchu Light.—On Cape Forchu, on the western side of the entrance to Yarmouth (Nova-Scotia), in lat. 43, 39, N. long. 66, 5, W. It exhibits a plain revolving light—visible one minute and a quarter, and invisible half a minute. The building is painted white, and is elevated 135 feet above the level of the sea.

An Iron Ball Buoy (painted red) was laid down off this Harbour on the 28th September, 1852, similar in all respects to the Ball Buoy of the Port of Liverpool, G. B. It bears from Partridge Island Light House S. S. W. by compass 1 1/2 miles.

The Buoy is anchored in 74 fathoms, low water, spring tides. The Bell is 19 feet above the water.

SIGNALS.

Displayed at Partridge Island, on the approach of Vessels to the Harbour of Saint John.

- One ball close, for one square-rigged Vessel.
- One ball half hoisted for two ditto.
- Two Balls close, for three Vessels.
- Two Balls separated, for four ditto.
- A Pendant of any colour, for five ditto.
- A ditto under a Ball, for six ditto.
- A ditto over a Ball half hoisted, for seven ditto.
- A ditto under two Balls close, for eight ditto.

A ditto between two Balls separate, for nine ditto
 A Flag of any colour, for ten or more ditto
 The above are displayed at the East or West yard arm, according to the direction in which the Vessels are at first observed, and as soon as their use can be distinguished, descriptive Colours will be hoisted at the mast head, in the following order:
 A Union Jack for a Flag Ship, with or without a squadron.
 " with a Red Pendant over, for a two-decker
 " with a Blue Pendant over, for a Frigate
 " with a white ditto, for a small armed vessel
 A blue Pendant for a Merchant Ship
 A red ditto, for a Merchant Brig
 A white and blue ditto, for a Foreign Vessel
 A white ditto, [without a ball,] for a Topsail Schooner or Sloop.
 A blue Flag pierced white, for a steamboat from Saint Andrews or Eastport.
 A Red Flag pierced white, for a Steamboat from Digby
 A Red Flag with a white square, for a Steamboat from Boston
 A Ball at the mast head, Vessel is on Shore or in distress

RATES OF PILOTAGE,

Established by a Law or Ordinance of the Common Council of the City of Saint John—passed 3d August, 1848.

Five Shillings per foot, for bringing any Ship or Vessel into the Harbour of Saint John, and mooring her into a safe place or berth, or securing her alongside of one of the Wharves; and Five Shillings per foot for removing and taking any Ship or Vessel out of the Harbour.

In cases where Pilots shall be detained on board of Vessels, under and by Virtue of the Quarantine or Health Laws of the Province, they shall be entitled to demand and receive from Masters of such Vessels, the sum of Ten Shillings per day, for every day of such detention, in addition to the allowance aforesaid.

Coasting Vessels, going from one part of the Bay of Fundy to another, British Steam Boats, or British Vessels drawing under six feet of water, are not compelled to take pilots; when employed, they are to be paid according to the rate above mentioned.

For removing Vessels from any mooring ground to any Wharf, or from one Wharf to another Wharf, and seeing them properly moored or secured, the following rates: For Vessels not exceeding One Hundred Tons, Seven Shillings and Sixpence; for Vessels over One Hundred and not exceeding Two Hundred Tons, Ten Shillings; for Vessels over Two Hundred and not exceeding Three Hundred Tons, Fifteen Shillings; and for all Vessels over Three Hundred Tons, the sum of Twenty Shillings.

First Distance.—From Partridge Island to Musquash Cove Head, bearing North West, Five Shillings per foot.

Second Distance.—From Musquash Head to Point LePrenau, bearing North West, Six Shillings and Threepence per foot.

Third Distance.—From Point LePrenau to North Head of Grand Maian, bearing North West—or North Channel, bearing South East, Seven Shillings and Sixpence per foot.

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Fourth Distance.—From the North Head of Grand Banks, or North Channel as aforesaid, to Michias Sea Island, bearing South, or Brier Island bearing South South East, Eight Shillings and Ninepence per foot.

Fifth Distance.—Any where outside the aforesaid distances, Ten Shillings per foot.

HARBOUR MASTER'S FEES.

On Vessels of 30 Tons and under 50, 2s. 6d.; Vessels of 50 Tons and under 75, 3s. 9d.; 75 and under 100 tons, 5s.; 100 and under 150 tons, 6s. 3d.; 150 and under 200 tons, 7s. 6d.; 200 and under 300 tons, 10s.; 300 and under 400 tons, 12s. 6d.; 400 tons and upwards, 15s.; Decked Vessels, under 100 tons, owned and registered at Saint John, and all British Vessels under that tonnage trading within the Bay of Fundy, or arriving from Ports to the Northward of Cape Cod, or the Westward of Cape Canso, or from any Port in Nova Scotia, to pay annually as follows: Under 30 tons, 3s. 9d.; over 30 and under 50 tons, 5s.; over 50 and under 75 tons, 6s.; over 75 and under 100 tons, 10s.

RATES OF WHARFAGE, established by Act 5 Vict. cap. 49, in the City of Saint John and Parish of Portland.—For every decked vessel, or wood boat, of the burthen of 40 tons and under 1s. 6d. per day; above 40 tons, and under 50, 1s. 9d.; above 50, and under 60, 2s.; above 60, and under 70, 2s. 3d.; above 70, and under 80, 2s. 6d.; above 80, and under 90, 2s. 9d.; above 90, and under 100, 3s.; above 100, and under 120, 3s. 6d.; above 120, and under 150, 4s.; above 150, and under 180, 4s. 6d.; above 180, and under 200, 5s.; above 200, and under 220, 5s. 6d.; above 220, and under 240, 6s.; above 240, and under 260, 6s. 6d.; above 260 and under 280, 7s.; above 280, and under 300, 7s. 6d.; above 300, and under 320, 8s.; above 320, and under 340, 8s. 6d.; above 340, and under 360, 9s.; above 360, and under 380, 9s. 6d.; above 380, and under 400, 10s.; above 400, and under 450, 11s. 3d.; above 450, and under 500, 12s. 6d.; and 1s. 3d. for every additional 50 tons.

RATES OF SLIPPAGE AT THE CORPORATION SLIPS.

All Decked Vessels, same rates as for Wharfrage; Wood Boats, and other Boats, or undecked Vessels, having standing Masts, and all Scaws, and not lying at the wharves on either side of Slips, to pay the following rates:

Every Woodboat of sufficient burthen to carry 10 Cords of Wood, 1s. 6d.
ditto ditto upwards of 10 Cords, and not more than 15, 2s. 6d.
ditto ditto upwards of 15 Cords, and not more than 20, 3s. 9d.
ditto ditto upwards of 20 Cords.

The above to be paid each day, and if any such Vessel remains over six days, an additional duty to be paid of from 2s. 6d. to 5s. daily, according to the burthen. Other Boats and Vessels without decks, and having fixed or standing masts, and all Scaws, to pay 1s. 6d. each trip and 1s. 6d. additional per day, if suffered to remain over three days.

RATES OF FERRIAGE ACROSS THE HARBOUR OF ST. JOHN.—Foot passenger, 2d.; Child under twelve years, 1d.; Horse, 3d.; Ox, or other large animal, 3d.; Elephant or Camel, 1s. 3d.; six-

gle Waggon, not loaded, 2d.; single waggon, with horse and one man, 6d.; single waggon, with horse, load and man, 7d.; double waggon, not loaded, 7d.; double waggon, with horses and man, 9d.; double waggon, with horses, load and man, 1s. 3d.; barrel, 1d.; bag, containing two bushels, 1d.; firkin, keg, or box of the same size, 1d.; cask of lime, 2d.; pipe, hoghead, or puncheon, whether in waggon, cart, sled, or other vehicle or not, except containing molasses, vinegar, rice, or sugar 9d.; every cwt. of iron, steel, or copper, whether in waggon, cart, or other vehicle or not, 1d.—Carts, sleds, drays and carriages, same as waggons.

RATE OF TOLLS FOR CROSSING THE SAINT JOHN SUSPENSION BRIDGE.—For every foot passenger, (excepting children under five years of age,) 1d.; horse, mare, gelding, mule, ass, ox, cow, or other large animal, 3d. each; elephant or camel, 1s. 3d.; carriage, sleigh, waggon, cart, sled or other vehicle, drawn by one horse or beast of draught, with one person, with or without a load, 6d.; horse or beast of draught, more than one, with a carriage or other vehicle, 3d. each; sheep, calf, hog, or goat, 1-2.

RATES AT THE PUBLIC WEIGHING MACHINES.—Every load not exceeding One Thousand Pounds Weight, One Shilling; and One Penny for every additional Hundred Weight; payable, half by the seller, and half by the purchaser.

HACKNEY COACH FARES.—For conveying one passenger from any public stand to any part of the City, or from any one part of the City to any other part thereof, 1s.; and for every passenger exceeding one, 6d. additional; and if any driver of any Carriage or other vehicle, shall be detained at any place by any passenger, or shall make any agreement for carrying any passengers by the hour, he shall be entitled to ask, and receive the following rates, viz:—For any time not exceeding half an hour, 1s. 3d.; and in that proportion for every half hour that such Carriage, or other vehicle shall be detained or employed. Provided always, that in case any driver shall be required to cross the Ferry to Carleton, he shall, in addition to the foregoing fares, be entitled to demand and receive the ferriage for himself, his carriage and horses, both going and returning.

PUBLIC PORTERS AND HAND CART MEN.—For loading carrying, and housing any goods, or any other article on any Hand Cart, from the Market Slip in King's and Queen's Wards, or from any other place within the limits of the first district, to any other place within the said several Five districts, the rates of prices are as follow:—For the first district 3d.; second district 3d.; third district 4d.; fourth district 4d.; fifth district 5d.

MARKET TOLLS.—Beef, per quarter, 2s.; Calf, Sheep, Hog, Goat, Lamb, Kid, or Shout 2d.; Tub, Pail or Jar of Butter, 1d.; Firkin, 3d.; every 10 lbs. of Roll Butter, 1d.; Cheese, 1d.; load of Potatoes under 15 bushels, 3d.; ditto over 15 bushels, 6d.; load of Oysters in shell or tub, 6d.; Turkey, Goose, or dozen of Pidgeons, 1d.; pair of Ducks, Fowls or Partridges, 1d.; bag of Flour, Meal, Oats, Peas, or Beans, 1d.; Ham or Shoulder, 1d.; Eggs, per 10 dozen, 1d.; and all other articles in like proportion.

FISH MARKET DUES.—For every Salmon, 1d.; Codfish, Pollock, Bass, or Shad, each 1d.; Halibut, not exceeding 20 lbs. 1d.; exceeding 20 lbs., and for every 20 lbs., 1d.; every Lobster, 1d.; dozen of Haddock, 1d.; every 100 of Gasperaux, Alewives, Herrings, or other small fish, 1d.

TIME FOR GOING THROUGH THE FALLS.—(near Saint John.)—The Falls are level or still water at about three and a half hours on the flood, and about two and a half on the ebb, so that they are passable four times in twenty four hours, about ten or fifteen minutes each time. No other rule can be given, as much depends on the floods in the River Saint John, and the time of high water or full sea, which is often hastened by high winds, and in proportion to the height of them.

AGRICULTURAL.

Education forms and perfects the mind. It commences with the first dawn of intellectual light, and is not completed till the senses are paralysed by age or destroyed by death. The early instructions of parents, the influence of associates, the accomplishment of labor, and the observations and experiences of daily life, all help form the individual character and educate the man. A small part of the sum total of education is derived from books; it is received from all sources where the senses communicate.

The early education of children is under the direction of their parents, who are naturally their teachers. As is the parent, so to some extent will be the child. He forms the same habits, adopts the same ways of thinking, has the same kind of ideas and the same opinions. If the parents are unlearned and stupid, thinking little and reasoning less, there is but little prospect of the child being otherwise. Early teachers and associates exert a powerful influence, and according to the effects of such influence will be the child's future destiny. In this sense "the boy is father of the man."

"A man is known by the Company he keeps," and equally as well by the paper he takes, or the book he buys. We do not expect to find an intelligent family where there are no papers or books, neither do we expect that farmer to keep up with the times, who does not read his agricultural journal. The various agricultural books and papers now published, have a wide spread influence, and may be considered as great and efficient helps in acquiring an education, and as such, are not to be neglected.

NUMBER OF PLANTS EATEN BY DIFFERENT ANIMALS:—It has been calculated that the Cow eats 276 plants, and rejects 218; Goat eats 449, and rejects 126; Sheep eats 387, and rejects 141; Horse eats 262, and rejects 212; Hog 71, and rejects 271.

WHAT TIME SHOULD EWES YEAN?—The period of pregnancy in the sheep is five months. For flocks which are kept chiefly for wool, it is generally preferred to have the lambs dropped about the time the grass starts, so as to afford sheep a "good bite." The advantage of this is, that grass causes the ewes to give a supply of milk for the lambs, (which Merino sheep will not have without grass, unless great attention is paid to their feeding,) and the lambs are reared with more certainty and less trouble. Where lambs are designed for the butcher, it is best to have them dropped as early as March; and by feeding the ewes with good hay and plenty of sufficient food, as carrots, turnips, &c., the lambs will grow rapidly.

BONES AS MANURE.—The use of bones as manure was commenced in England, about 1776. It was then common to apply from 60 to 70 and even 100 bushels to the acre, they being coarsely broken by hammers. Experience has proved, however, that so large a quantity, does not produce effects in proportion, and 10 to 12 bushels are now thought to be sufficient in most

cases. The annual value of bones used in England for manure, is estimated at £880,000 or \$1,400,000.

THE PRESERVATION OF MANURE.—I am fully of the opinion that Manure ought to be well rotted, to be applied to the greatest advantage on sandy soils. For that purpose, therefore, the Manure of the farm should be secured, either under sheds for the purpose, or in yards so planned as to prevent loss by drenching rains, or leaching off, and made one year to be applied the next. The heaps should be covered with dirt or plaster of Paris, in order to prevent the escape of ammonia.

PLOWING SANDY SOILS.—So far as my experience goes, I have found six inches the best depth to plow sandy soils and loams. I am aware it is very fashionable to say "plow deep," and I think this is said too much, without any discrimination. In clay soils, there is little fear of going too deep, but there seems to me no reason in plowing a soil to a great depth, that is already too porous. Even sandy loams are not benefitted by too deep plowing, and as to subsoiling any light soil, except, perhaps, for the purpose of raising root crops, I think it ruinous.

SEED POTATOES.—In communications in the November and January numbers of the *Cultivator*, on the subject of seed potatoes—the first by Mr. Murray, of Ohio, the other by Mr. Gold of Connecticut—it is claimed that those of the smallest size are equal, if not superior to large ones for seed. Now this is a subject, as Mr. Murray says, of great importance to the farmer; for if from small and indifferent seed, can be produced fair and large potatoes, as he remarks, it is time it was known.

There is no crop the farmer raises, that requires so much seed, or the seed of which costs so much to an acre, as potatoes, ranging from eight to twenty bushels, the difference being one quarter in large or small seed; or if it takes sixteen bushels, which is about the average of fair sized potatoes, to plant an acre, the same might be done with four very small ones, making a difference of twelve bushels; no small item at present prices, or fifty cents per bushel, which would be six dollars in favour of small seed in planting one acre.

Not doubting the correctness of either of your correspondent's statements, for I have heard similar ones, from respectable sources, I still am in doubt as to any good resulting from the practice; on the contrary, my experience and observation having led me to a different conclusion. For six years I have planted both large and small seed, sometimes from necessity, but have always carefully noted the difference, which has been uniformly and decidedly in favour of large seed.

I will specify two cases. In the spring of 1849, I planted two acres of potatoes, a portion of which was planted with small seed. Where I planted large seed, I had good potatoes, but where the small seed was planted I had very small, poor potatoes, the whole being new ground.

The past season I planted the same number of acres, but re-

served a quarter of an acre, which I planted with small seed, from the size of a walnut up to that of a hen's egg. The result was as all former crops had been with me, they were all small and worthless, besides being more affected by the rot than where large seed was used.

The difference in the vines, was perceptible as far as my potato patch could be seen. Those vines where I planted small seed, being not half the length of the others, besides having a slender and sickly appearance from the time they were out of the ground till they were harvested.

ANIMAL HEAT.—The necessity of a certain degree of heat in animals, in order that life may be supported, is well known; but the process by which this heat is produced, and the importance of supplying the materials for its production, is not sufficiently known and regarded. The cause of animal heat may be said to be the same as that which is called into play in ordinary combustion, that is a union of carbon and oxygen. All animal food must contain carbon, and after the food has undergone a proper change by the action of the digestive organs, the carbon is carried by the blood to the lungs, where, by the process of respiration, it is united with oxygen, and produces heat.

DESTRUCTION OF THE GREEN FLY IN PLANT HOUSES.—The fumigating of plant houses and frames is a troublesome matter, especially to amateurs, and hence the following plan, which we have practised lately, may prove interesting to some.

Provide a strong solution of nitre in water, in which soak some sheets of strong brown paper, and afterwards dry it slowly, and cut into lengths of convenient size, the largest eighteen inches by twelve inches; then get some strong tobacco and strew it thinly over the paper, and with a coarse pepper box, dredge in a good coat of common Cayenne pepper; wrap the whole up loosely like a "cigarette," paste the end over, and when dry it is fit for use.

Two or three of these suspended by a wire under a green-house stage, and lighted at each end, will quickly settle the accounts of the green fly and thrip, and that with comparatively little trouble. Indeed, if a quantity of these "cigarettes" are kept ready made, a few plants may be put into a pit or small room, and be cleaned, at least have their insect pests destroyed in a very short time. By using Cayenne much less tobacco is required, and the two combined is most deadly, for as the "cigarettes," will burn for a considerable time, say an hour or more, it is impossible for insects to live in an atmosphere so thoroughly impregnated with elements of suffocation.

GERMINATION OF CLOVER SEED.—It is a well known fact that with old lands which have undergone a continued course of cultivation for a number of years, grass seed, especially clover, is not apt to take well. To remedy this, take a very light one-horse iron toothed harrow with the teeth protruding about three inches below the under side of the frame or bars; let this follow directly after the sower. The frame should be made as light as possible

with the teeth a little closer than the ordinary large harrow. It should be hinged in order to avoid scraping or rubbing out the wheat on the ridges and also to lap in the furrows. There need be no fear of injuring the wheat, but on the contrary it would be of benefit to it.

NEW MODE OF PLANTING APPLE TREES.—A horticulturalist in Bohemia has a beautiful plantation of the best apple trees, which have neither sprung from seeds nor grafting. The plan is, to take shoots from the choicest sorts, insert them in a potato, and plunge both in the ground, having put an inch or two of the shoot above the surface. The potato nourishes the shoot while it pushes out roots, and the shoot gradually springs up and becomes a beautiful tree, bearing the best fruit, without requiring to be grafted.

PRIZE METHOD OF CURING HAMS.—The Hams of Maryland and Virginia have long enjoyed a wide celebrity. At the last exhibition of the *Maryland State Agricultural Society*, four premiums were awarded for Hams. We are informed by those who had the opportunity of examining them, that they were of first-rate quality. The following is the *Recipe* by which the Hams were cured that obtained the *first premium*.

To every 100 lbs. of green Hams, take 8 lbs. of ground *Alum Salt*; 2 lbs. brown *Sugar*, (or *Molasses* equivalent,) 2 ounces *Saltpetre*; 2 ounces *Pearlash*, and 4 gallons *water*. Dissolve well, skimming off the skum arising on the surface. Pack the Hams compactly in a tight vessel or cask, rubbing the fleshy part with fine salt as you put them down, and be sure to stand them on the *small end*, when you place them in the barrel. In a day or two, pour the above pickle over the meat, taking care to keep it *covered with the pickle*. In four to six weeks, according to the weight and size of the Hams, (that is to say, the longer period for heavy Hams,) hang them (hock up) to dry. Let them remain for three or four days, and then smoke with *green hickory wood*, or *corn cobs*. Smoke, until the rind becomes a dark brown. The meat should be perfectly cool before packing.

WASH FOR SORE EYES IN ANIMALS.—Take of *White Vitriol*, two Scruples; *Sugar of Lead*, one Drachm; *Water*, one Pint. Mix. Wash the eye with this twice a day.

THE HORSE—CURE FOR STIFFNESS AND LAMENESS.—It is stated by a correspondent of the *Farmer and Gardener*, that a horse made stiff and lame by driving on the roads; may be cured or prevented, by washing it with brine.

A horse, says this writer, that is driven on hard roads is liable to get stiff in his joints. In 1833 I had an animal, after driving three or four days, got quite lame. An old Baltimore teamster told me to wash the mare's legs with a tolerable salt brine, which was done accordingly three times a day for the balance of the journey. The stiffness disappeared in a few days, and I drove the mare 1,400 miles afterwards, and there was no more trouble on that account. What pleased me most was, that the mare had a very poor foot to hold a shoe, when I started. It was very

brittle and hard, and would break out whenever a nail was put in; but it grew together at every shoeing. A blacksmith in New England remarked to me that her foot had a singular appearance; when he cut it, it was soft and tough. I account for it in this way; salt will attract moisture from the atmosphere, which keeps the foot moist all the time; and salt has nearly the same effect that grease has on the foot or a piece of timber. The drippings of salt on the floor, if continued long, cannot be got off; the wood becomes moist and tough.

EXTRAORDINARY COW.—The Hereford cow which won the first prize at the last Birmingham show, was slaughtered a few months since, and her weight, as given in an English paper, was as follows: Live weight, 2,356 lbs.; Dressed weight, four quarters, 1,695; tallow, 198; hide, 85; total, 1,978 lbs. The heart weighed 7 lbs., and the head 32 lbs.

SHANGHAI FOWLS.—We have received from Dr. E. Wight, of Boston, a pair of these fowls, bred from stock imported by him from Shanghai. They are entirely white, and of good size. Dr. W. informs us that though they are not quite a year old, the cock weighed, a few weeks since, nine pounds.—*Cultivator.*

HYDRAULIC RAM.—J. J. Conet states in Moore's New Yorker, that he erected a water-ram which sends water 62 rods, at the rate of 15 gallons per hour, to his house and barns, elevating it 100 feet.

STRENGTH OF A BULL.—The Massachusetts Plowman states that a Bull, three years old, drew a cart loaded, up a hill, with three tons of stone, and fifteen men on the top of it, the whole equal to four tons two hundred and fifty pounds. It was a load on which the working oxen had been tried, which were exhibited at the show of the Essex county Agricultural Society. The bull was hitched to the end of the tongue.

MISCELLANEOUS.

MEN OF LEARNING, PATRIOTISM AND GENIUS.—Many of the most eminent have risen from the plough. David Rittenhouse, the American Astronomer, was a ploughboy; so was Burns, the Scottish Poet; and William Cobbett, the head of the Spencer family, was a farmer and blacksmith. Ferguson, the Astronomer, was a shepherd; so was Professor Leslie of Edinburgh; and Sumpter of South Carolina. Gov. Rinnet, of Pa., was a wagoner; Henry Clay, bred to farming; Lord Chancellor Hardwick, a fishmonger; Bishop Hall, a farmer's son; Niebuhr, the traveller, a peasant; Bishop Latimer, James Buchanan, of Pa.; Daniel Webster, Marcus Morton; President Monroe, and Levi Woodbury, General's sons; General Morgan, of the Compens, was a driver; Cardinal Alberoni, a gardener's son; General Kleber, and Marshal Anspersau, sons of laborers; General Humbolt was a tinner.

dealer; Murat, King of Naples, kept a country tavern, as did Bishop Philpots' father and the fathers of President Van Buren, and B. F. Butler; the brave General Huche's father kept the French king's hounds; John C. Calhoun was a planter's son; Andrew Jackson's father was a small farmer.

Neither they who trust in wealth, nor the man of p. verty, can redeem life from the grave. It is the place appointed for all the living. There the indolent and the voluptuous find a couch, and the weary and heavy laden a resting place. 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POISONS.—Vessels of copper often give rise to poisoning. Though the metal undergoes but little change in a dry atmosphere, it is rusted if moisture be present, and its surface becomes covered with a green substance—carbonate, or the protoxide of copper, a poisonous compound. It has sometimes happened, that a mother has, for want of knowledge, poisoned her family. Sour-kroust, when permitted to stand sometime in a copper vessel, has produced death in a few hours. Cooks sometimes permit pickles to remain in copper vessels, that they may acquire a rich green colour, which they do by absorbing poison. Families have often been thrown into disease by eating such dainties, and may have died, in some instances, without suspecting the cause.

MUSTARD PLASTER.—Mustard Plasters often fail of doing any good, by not being made right. The proper way to make them is as follows: Scald some *Corn Meal* in a pan, or cook it a little, so that it will not crumble, then spread it of the required size upon a cloth. Grease the surface of the poultice with a little lard, and sprinkle over it powdered *Mustard*, then apply it *directly to the skin*. After it has been on for fifteen or twenty minutes, if it does not burn or redden the skin sufficiently, remove it, and sprinkle on more Mustard. If it acts too sharply, lay a thin cloth between the poultice and the skin. You should spread the poultice at least *half an inch thick*.

CHOLERA MORBUS, DYSENTERY, BILIOUS COLIC, &c.—Take best *Turkey Rhubarb Root*, powdered; *Sal Æratus*, or *Bicarbonate of Polash*, pulverised; *Peppermint* plant, pulverised, and ground *Cinnamon*, of each one teaspoonful. Put upon them half a pint of *boiling water*, and steep in a covered vessel one hour or more. Strain well, and add sufficient *Loaf Sugar* to sweeten. When cool, if there is no fever, add two tablespoonful of best *French Brandy*. Of this preparation give a tablespoonful every hour, until the passages are changed in their appearance and consistence.

If there is much pain, griping, or bearing down in the bowels, the following *injection* may be administered: Take one tea-cupful of mucilage of *Slippery Elm*, or thin *Starch*, and add to it one teaspoonful of *Laudanum*, Mix, and let it be introduced warm, and as often as the patient complains of pain.

Where there is much vomiting, in addition to the above remedies, apply strong *Mustard Plasters* to the pit of the stomach. When the pain, and vomiting, and urgent symptoms are somewhat relieved, administer a small tablespoonful of *Castor Oil*, combined with twelve or fifteen drops of *Laudanum*.

ASIATIC CHOLERA, THE SUN'S RECEIPT.—Take *Laudanum*; Tincture of *Cayenne Pepper*, (treble strength); Tincture of *Rhubarb*; Essence of *Peppermint*, (treble strength); and Spirits of *Camphor*; of each one teaspoonful, shake it well before using. *Dose*: From five to thirty drops, repeated every ten or fifteen minutes until relief is obtained.

The above receipt was first published in the *N. Y. Daily Sun*, during the Cholera season of 1849, and has probably been the

means of saving more lives, than all other prescriptions of the same nature put together. When given as soon as the person is first attacked, it may be said to be an almost infallible cure.

If the patient has *cramps*, or is in much pain, he should be rubbed vigorously with *Camphur Spirits*, and flannel cloths wrung out of hot *vinegar and pepper*, or hot *whiskey and pepper*, should be applied warm to the abdomen and extremities, and hot bricks put to the feet. A large bag of *Hops* steamed in *Vinegar* may be laid hot over the bowels. The patient may drink warm *Mint Tea*, *Slippery Elm*, or *Flax Seed Tea*, and hot bricks or jugs of water may be placed around the body, to get it in a warm perspiration. By commencing in this manner, and then calling in a Doctor as soon as possible, every one will be safe that may be attacked.

ADDITIONAL RECEIPTS FOR CHOLERA, &c.—Take *Spirits of Camphur*, *Spirits of Turpentine*, and *Laudanum*, of each four teaspoonful; *Oil of Peppermint*, fifty drops. Shake it well before using. *Dose*: One teaspoonful in some hot Brandy and Sugar every half hour, for four or five times in succession, or until the patient is relieved. Or, Half a pint of best *French Brandy*; twelve drops *Oil of Peppermint*; twenty-four drops *Laudanum*. *Dose*: A tablespoonful every ten minutes, until relieved.

These two last receipts are not considered as effectual as the foregoing, because what will cure one, will not always cure another; and if the former fail, these may be tried. We wish to put every family in possession of that information, which will enable them to act promptly in cases of emergency, and thus save the lives of their households. For often, when a Physician is called in, it is too late to do any good.

BLACK SALVE—A most excellent *Salve for Burns, Scalds, &c.* Take of *Olive*, or *Sweet Oil*, One Quart; of common *Rosin* and *Beeswax*, each one Ounce. Melt these articles together, and raise them almost to boiling heat; then gradually add of pulverized *Red Lead*, three-quarters of a pound, if it be in winter, and a little more if it be in summer. In a short time after the *Lead* is taken up by the *Oil*, and the mixture becomes brown, or a shining black, remove it from the fire; and, when nearly cold, add of finely pulverized *Camphyr*, one and a third Drachms.

It should remain on the fire, until it forms a proper consistence for spreading, which may be known by dipping a knife in it from time to time, and suffering it to cool.

It should be spread thin, on a piece of linen, and renewed once or twice a day.

For very slight burns, this *Salve* alone is sufficient to remove all the pain and inflammation. Every family should keep it by them in the house. It is useful for all kinds of bad sores.

TO PREVENT SWELLING FROM A BRUISE—Immediately apply a cloth, five or six fold, dipped in cold water, and now dipped when it grows warm. Or, immediately apply *Moleasses* spread on brown paper, or flannel, and bandage to prevent swelling.

Remedy of each year of success. Wait till will stand.

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REMEDY FOR WORMS.—Take *Spirits of Turpentine* and *Honey*, of each a tablespoonful. Mix them well, and give to a child 3 years old, a teaspoonful of this mixture, for three mornings in succession. Then, on the fourth day, give a dose of *Caster Oil*. Wait three days; and if necessary, repeat the above course, which will almost always be successful.

AN EXCELLENT PILE OINTMENT.—Take of pulverized *Opium*, two Drachms; of clean *Tar*, one Ounce. Mix them thoroughly, and anoint the Piles with it twice a day. Or,

Take pulverized *Nutgalls*, two Drachms; *Hog's Lard*, one Ounce. Mix thoroughly, and use as above.

WARTS.—Dissolve as much common *Washing Soda* as the water will take up. Wash the hands or warts with this for a minute or two, and allow them to dry without being wiped. This repeated twice a day, for a few days in succession, will gradually, but *certainly* destroy the most irritable warts.

SORE THROAT.—Take twenty drops of spirits of turpentine on loaf sugar every night till cured. Black currant jelly hastens the cure.

FRENCH ROLLS.—One ounce of butter, one pound of flour, one gill of home-made yeast, one egg, milk enough to make a dough. Rub the butter through the flour, beat the egg and stir in, then add the yeast, milk, and a little salt. Knead the dough, when it is light mould it out into large biscuits, and bake them on tin.

TO KEEP PRESERVES.—Apply the white of an egg with a suitable brush to a single thickness of white tissue paper, with which cover over the jars, overlapping the edges an inch or two. No tying is required. The whole will become, when dry, as tight as a drum.

TRAVELLER'S BISCUIT.—Two pounds of flour, three-quarters of a pound of sugar, a quarter of a pound butter, one teaspoonful of dissolved saleratus, milk sufficient to form a dough. Cut up the butter in the flour, add the sugar, and put in the saleratus and milk together, so as to form dough. Knead it till it becomes perfectly smooth and light. Roll it in sheets about the eighth of an inch thick, cut the cakes with a cutter or the top of a tumbler. Bake in a moderate oven.

LIQUID GLUE.—A strong liquid glue, that will keep for years without changing, may be made by placing in a glazed vessel a quart of water and about three pounds of hard glue. This is to be melted over a gentle fire in a glue-pot, and stirred up occasionally. When all the glue is melted, drop in gradually a small quantity of nitric acid, when effervescence will take place. The vessel is then to be taken off the fire and allowed to cool. Liquid glue made in this manner has been kept for more than two years in an uncorked bottle, without any change. It will be useful for many trades, where a strong glue is required, without the trouble of melting.

THE MERCHANT.— Commerce shows the usefulness of union among the nations by the advantages it confers upon society. It enlarges human intercourse, maintains peace, builds ships, makes canals, satisfies human wants, prevents satiety by new desires, rewards the diligent, advocates freedom of opinion, tends to abolish the inequality of ranks, and ceases to mark with distinction the idlers' incapacity. In the dark days of superstition, trade was left to the Jews, "and the priesthood carried on a very lucrative stock-jobbing, derived premiums from the fear of hell, sold the church soil to the dead, taxed the early days of marriage, and made a profit of sins chiefly of their own invention." Trade has done much toward the downfall of gaint superstitions, which the Roman tax-gatherers were among the first to contend against.

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A TABLE

For Foretelling the Weather through all the Lunations of each Year forever.

FORMED BY DR. HERSCHELL, AND REVISED BY DR. ADAM CLARKE.

This table and the accompanying remarks are the result of many years actual observation, the whole being constructed on a due consideration of the attraction of the sun and moon, in their several positions respecting the earth, and will by simple inspection shew the observer what kind of weather will most probably follow the entrance of the moon into any of its quarters, and that so near the truth as to be seldom or never found to fail.

If the new moon, the first quarter, the full moon, or the last quarter, happens	IN SUMMER.	IN WINTER.

Observations.—1. The nearer the time of the moon's change, first quarter, full and last quarter, are to *midnight*, the fairer will be the weather during the seven days following.

2. The space for this calculation occupies from ten at night till two next morning.

3. The nearer to *midday* or *noon*, the phases of the moon happen, the more foul or wet weather may be expected during the next seven days.

4. The space for this calculation occupies from ten in the forenoon to two in the afternoon. These observations refer principally to the summer, though they affect spring and autumn nearly in the same ratio.

5. The moon's change, first quarter, full and last quarter, happening during six of the afternoon hours, i. e. from four to ten, may be followed by fair weather; but this is mostly dependent on the *wind*, as is noted in the table.

6. Though the weather, from a variety of irregular causes, is more uncertain in the latter part of autumn, the whole of winter, and the beginning of spring, yet, in the main, the above observations will apply to those periods also.

7. To prognosticate correctly, especially in those cases where the *wind* is concerned, the observer should be in sight of a good *case*, where the four cardinal points of the heavens are correctly placed.
