OTTAWA, May 8 .- While it is not anticipated that the appointment of a successor to Judge Mabee on the railway commission will be made in any hurry, possibly not for a month, the list of probable, candidates is growing large. Many of the rumors so far have connected various politicians with the position, but it is quite likely that the appreciated work carried on so successfully by the late chairman

may necessitate a departure from the political routine. There is every indication that the government regard the matter as beyond the field of politics and are looking for a big man for the big position. The latest name to receive mention and one of the most probable is that of Sir Thomas J. Tait, well known in Canada, and for several years chairman of the Victoria State railway commission in Australia. He was in Ottawa yesterday and it seems likely that the matter has been discussed. The actual discussion, however, awaits the return of the minister of railways.

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



One set of bacteria busy themselves in converting ammonia found in the soil into nitrous acid.

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QUEBEC NOMINATIONS SHOW CONTEST IN EVERY SEAT

However, Some Gladiators May Quit Before Day of Battle on May 15-Conservatives Making Determined Effort to Rout Cabinet Members-Liberals Pin Faith to Gouin's Record.

MONTREAL. May 8.—(Car. Press.)—The nomination of candidates for the provincial election, which will be held on May 15, took place to-day.

Candidates representing both the Liberal and the Conservative parties have been put up in every riding te-day, tho it is hardly likely that they will all remain in the fight until election day. Sir Lomer Gouin, the premier, was nominated in both Portneuf and St. John's, while Hon. Charles Devlin, minister of colonization, is to run in both Nicolet and Timiskaming.

Armand Lavergne, alde de camp of Henri Bourassa, will contest Montmagny and Montmorency, while another praminent member of the opposition, Jean Prevost, will attack Terrebonne and L'Assumption. Strong Conservative candidates have been put against all the members of the Gouin cabinet. Hon. J. M. Tellier, leader of the opposition, is running in Joliette.

Insuces Involved.

The Liberals are making their appeal on the strength of Sir Lomer Gouin's careful progressiveness in fluance and the good roads, education and temperance policies. The Conservatives claim that the good roads policy is not popular, and that the government has been extravagant.

In the city, the Conservatives have all spoken in favor of autonomy for Montreal, holding that the rest of the Province of Quebec merely milks this city. Confidence prevalls on both sides, and the fight, as a ruic, has been conducted with a complete absence of the spectacular. Assistance has been given the Conservative candidates from time to time by Hon. L. P. Pelletier, postmaster-general at Ottawa: Hon. B. Nantel, minister of inland revenue, and Hon. C. J. Doherty, minister of justice; while the Liberals have received support from Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux, former postmaster-general.



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



MONSTERS OF THE DEEP.

Some idea of what has become of the Titanic's accessories, which now les at or near the bottom of the Atlantic, is gained from the fact that the ocean water at depths of a mile or more is so dense, and its pressure is so great, that glass bottles forced down into it are crushed to powder. and tubes of metal are twisted and flattened out of shape. Yet living creatures inhabit these dense and heavy depths. From the under-world of the sea. where the pressure is two

and one half tons to the square inch, the explorers' dredges bring up curious flahes, with bodies constructed with special reference to this environment of weight. Their bony and muscular systems are not fully developed; the bones are burneated with porcs and fissures. The alcareous matter is at a minimum, nd the bones of the vertebrae are leined together so loosely that the seing lifted out of the lifted out of the water. The

tive tissues seem almost wanting. Yet these fishes are able to dart about and opture their prey.
It is another interesting fact that o light penetrates these ocean abysses—all below twelve hundred feet being total darkness—and this necessitates another adaptation of the deepsea inhabitants. They carry lanterns.

One of the largest of these deep-sea arers is a fish six feet long, with a tail dorsal fin extending nearly the entire length of the body. Along the sides of the body is a double row of luminous scales. One of the most feroclous of these deep-sea forms has a mouth full of teeth that protude in a most forbidding manner. 

Rudder Post of Largest Ship

"As big as a barn door" can no longer serve as a comparison. The atandard of measurement should be the rudder of a great ocean liner. The stern post, or hinge, on which the largest rudder in "A world will turn, is shown in the accompanying phototograph. The casting is a detail of the largest ship in the world, the S. S. IMPERATOR, of the Hamburg-American Line.

Line.

The figure standing at the lower left of the casting is not a Liliputian, as might be supposed, but a workman of average size. The huge casting, which is fifty-three feet four inches in height, or rather higher than an ordinary house, serves as the stern post of the great liner. The casting is in two parts and weighs 100 tons. The lower section is the stay in which two of the four screw or propeller shafts turn. The rest of the ship is, of course, proportionately large. The Imperator measures 900 feet in length, 96 feet in width, and has a tonnage of 50,000. She towers nine decks above the waterline, a veritable skyscraper, accommodating 4,250 passengers, and a crew of 1,000. The Imperators will be launched at Stettin, Germany, in May, entering the transatlantic service the following spring.


