London, Dec. 31.—The Duke of Devonshire, Liberal-Unionist, has issued an important election manifesto in which he virtually advises the free traders and protectionists alike. On the other hand, he says there is no ambiguity about the Chamberlain propaganda, which is avowedly protectionist.
The manifesto contends that the Unionist party organization has been captured by the protectionist wing, and that should the party be re-elected the Chamberlain wing will be either real dealer to free trade or the prospect of the exclusion of the Unionist party for an indefinite period from either power of influence.

coming more determined to preserve them as a permanent and increasing source of revenue.
 Not the least marked and certainly the most satisfactory movement of public opinion during 1905 has been the growing favor extended to the principle of public ownership. There is no question upon which so much substantial unanimity exists, and it is at the present moment of urgent practical importance. Equally applicable to the Dominion, to the provinces and to the municipalities, the preservation of franchise monopolies for the benefit of the people who create them, is a policy which commends itself. But powerful agencies are at work for the purpose of defeating the right of the citizens to control and operate the public utilities and franchises. Steady progress is, however, being made, and the outlook in this direction is brighter than ever before.

Another hopeful sign of increasing toleration and breadth of view was given in the closing month of the year by the formation of a new fraternal organization among the Presbyterian, Methodist and Congregational churches of Canada. In this endeavor to consolidate some of the independent Protestant organizations the Dominion is leading the van of progress with good prospects of ultimate success. This and the no less gratifying circumstance that Canada was the birthplace of the new conception of the imperial relationship which has commanded general assent among the British self-governing states, testify to the greater political and religious world. All these varied activities cannot but reflect beneficially on the growth of the nation, increase the sense of responsibility and heighten the conviction that a place second to none has been reserved for this people.

THE CITIZENS' COMMITTEE REPLIES TO THE CLERGY

Stigmatizes Their Letter as a Roorback—The Bishop Had the True Statistics Before Him, But Ignored Them.

His Lordship Bishop Sweetman and a number of the Anglican clergy of the city have published, over their signatures, a letter urging the citizens to vote for the license reduction bylaw. They say they are moved to this step by two reasons: (1) Because the observation of some of them—not all of them, be it noted—shows that drunkenness is increasing out of proportion to the increase of population. (2) Because the universal experience of temperance workers shows that reducing the number of places where liquor is sold will diminish drunkenness. Without any desire to be disrespectful we must take exception to this letter for two reasons: (1) It is based on a roorback. (2) It is based on a roorback.

Had knowledge to the contrary. CANADA AND ONTARIO IN 1905.

Yesterday the first pentad of the twentieth century closed. Great events have marked its course, and not the least momentous of its years is that, the echoes of whose rumblings are still sounding in our ears. Bound together as the nations of the world now are by those triumphs of modern invention, which all but annihilate space, nothing which befalls one can be indifferent to any. Never has there been keener interest taken in happenings everywhere which bade fair to direct the course of history, to alter the order of its coming or to sway the destinies of the peoples. Nor has this been accompanied by any lack of interest in the public affairs which immediately concern particular peoples. Cosmopolitanism does not destroy individualism—it only gives the wider vision necessary to view circumstances aright, to set them in a true perspective, and to find for besetting problems a more adequate solution.

Canada, during the year which has passed away, saw no faltering in her advance along the way Providence appears to have shaped for her. The Dominion from sea to sea is pulsing with that effervescence of buoyancy and exuberant enthusiasm which comes only from the path of a nation, when it is concerned with the origins of all that is to make it great, distinctive and enduring. Errors and mistakes committed now cannot be easily retrieved, for nations as they only live in time must expiate their delinquencies on earth. And with all the striking developments in trade, industry and commerce which have come to Canada during 1905 not a little has been done to sow the seeds of future discord and trouble. In federal politics this is especially true. Early in the year Sir Wilfrid Laurier introduced his famous—or rather infamous—bill, constituting the two new provinces of Saskatchewan and Alberta. By them he proposed to deprive the provincial legislatures of the right to decide upon their own educational systems by making the establishment of separate schools a fundamental condition of their constitutions. As originally drawn the legislatures would not even have possessed the right of efficient control, but this was too strong a pill for some members of the Liberal party to swallow, and the clauses were ultimately modified. But none the less the measures meant the abandonment of the old principles of the Liberal party and involved an apostasy unprecedented in Canadian history.

THE YEAR FINANCIALLY.

Fortunately the year 1905 was eminently satisfactory in Canada from a financial standpoint. A year ago prospects were much divided as to the prospects for the new year. The crop of 1904, particularly in our Northwest, was anything but satisfactory. The wheat output was severely curtailed, and in other parts of the Dominion the crop was not so good. The United States and the United States' a poor sample. Optimists took cognizance of the large prospective increase in farming operations, and were not dismayed by the small grain yield of the immediate past. During the early months of the year credit required considerable nursing on account of this agricultural set back, but no extreme measures had to be adopted by financial institutions, and as the crop season wore on the wisdom of these measures was amply rewarded in the growing prospects for a record harvest. History in other parts of the world is a standard in agricultural production. That it may remain so only until the results of the present year are known, is the wish of everyone to-day who can greet his neighbor with the salutation of "A prosperous year!" The increased demands made upon our banks by the commercial and agricultural expansion of the year were provided for without the monetary disturbances so often a factor with our republican neighbors. Whatever opinions may be held as to the composition of the Canadian banking system, its flexible currency has many commendable features, and without which the last few months of the year must have brought a money stringency with disastrous results. Canadian bankers have long been seized of the need for a wider field of credit in the Dominion, and an attempt to meet this has been made by increasing the capital of existing institutions, and by the establishment of new banks, three of which are at the moment in embryo form. The statement of the Canadian chartered banks at the end of November last shows an increase in capital of nearly \$5,000,000 within a year. Circulation, based on the capital of the banks, reached a record both in amount and percentage relation to capital during last fall's demands. If the country's progress is to be unimpeded, it is at once apparent that more banks will readily find openings for business. Under the conditions as now known the past year could not fail to be a prosperous one for the banks; the annual statements recently made public show how thoroughly this was the case.

THE YEAR FINANCIALLY.

Canada is not run by her government. In India the viceroy governs. He is checked, but not controlled, by the secretary of state. Lord Curzon resigned because Mr. Brodrick, the least efficient secretary for war for many years, who was promoted to the India office for no reason in particular, insisted that Lord Kitchener, the Indian commander-in-chief, should have his way. Thorough imperialists see with apprehension military dominance in the land where three hundred millions of uneducated people are managed with a quiet confidence such as no subject race enjoyed since history began to be recorded. Lord Minto must get along with Lord Kitchener. In the seat of power in London sits John Morley, a fervent apostle of the subjection of the soldier to the civilian. From Canada we shall watch a quiet war between Lord Minto's efforts to get along with statesman whose general views he overmasters with a soldier whose overmastering ability he must envy, and possibly dread.

Japan Arrives.
 Canada is doubly interested in the success of Japanese arms on land and sea. At New Year's, Port Arthur capitulated; in March Mukden was taken from the Russians; in May Admiral Rozhkovsky's fleet was destroyed in the Korean Straits; in August peace was signed on the New Haven coast; and in the first half of this winter Russians have been busy killing Russians in the streets of their enemies in pitched battle abroad.

Not so long ago Britain was the greatest naval power in the Asiatic seas. Admiral Togo has become the modern Nelson exactly one hundred years after the immortal Trafalgar. Ten years ago Europe's attention was attracted by the Russian victory over the Manchurian peninsula, refusing to allow them to reap the fruits of their victory over China and of their first capture of Port Arthur. The arrogance of Russia, her assumption that she was the mistress of the East, and that none dare question or dispute her, has been overtaken by a terrible misadventure.

But the lesson of Japanese victories is not for her alone. After the Boxer rebellion and the seizure of Peking by the Chinese, the partition of China by benevolent Westerners, has passed into the voluminous catalogue of vain ambitions. It is only a matter of time before the political watchdog of the far East will be barking at the gates of China, under the tutelage of Japan or the international arena in a new garb with a new spirit, and with a marvelous accession of muscular strength. The year has indeed brought to the notice of power among the peoples who gaze eastward over the Pacific, and for Canada, perhaps more than for England, the possibilities of commerce with enormous and thickly-peopled territories hitherto practically unknown to white traders are enough to produce a new wave of enterprising missionaries of industry.

Poor Russia has everybody's sympathy. You cannot sum up the place of Russia in world-progress unless you realize that she must be judged by criteria other than those of western standards. The children of the Little Father are more heterogeneous even than those who show allegiance to our own sovereign lord. They are not segregated by stormy wastes of water; they are illiterate, and accustomed to the world's disadvantages of man's inferiority to man, and of a corrupt and incompetent system of government, and their ears is of all her leaders the least like a czar.

The issue of the hideous upheaval of which we only receive meagre accounts no man can foresee. Violent revolutions are a new phase of the world's progress, and an immediate success, Russia is too big, too untutored, too short of men accustomed to govern honestly and in concert for the convulsion of to-day to produce an immediate overthrow of the ancient regime. When the smoke has cleared, and blood has been shed, the aftermath of revolution is out of the way, there must come an accession of democratic strength to Muscovy, and the internal development of a vast empire of vast resources will proceed on normal and unexciting lines.

REVIVAL OF WAR RUMORS: FRANCE IS MAKING READY

Franco-German Issue Over Morocco Produces Most Alarming Rumors.

Paris, Dec. 30.—Despite the improvement in the relations of France and Germany occasioned by the submission of the Morocco controversy to a conference, there is a distinct revival of war rumors and a considerable element of the people are taking an exaggerated form, but all tend to stimulate the public apprehensions.

Despatches from Belgium say the authorities there are adopting precautionary measures anticipating that the German resisters have been summoned, and other despatches, graphically describe the activity of French and German forces along the frontier and their extensive works and defenses.

These reports, it is said, are the outcome of the recent French-German issue over Morocco and the approach of the winter, to which the issue will be referred. The agitation has produced two distinct elements, one holding that the government desire war and the other, the necessary concessions that Germany has insisted upon to avoid it.

The pessimistic element is just now foremost and its sentiments are reflected in a series of alarmist reports. The government is naturally holding aloof, but the measure extends to official circles. Thus far the alarm has not reached the bourgeoisie and remains steadily French. EVERYWHERE WAS BLOOD: IN TRAIL OF COSSACKS

Sad Remnants of Russian Slaughter Arrived in New York Tell of Scenes of Horror.

New York, Dec. 30.—Scenes of horror, revolting almost beyond belief, are told by many of the 1800 Russian refugees who arrived here Friday on the Hamburg-American steamer Graf Waldersee. Children were torn from their mothers' arms, and their little bodies rent and torn. Mothers and fathers were struck down in the midst of their families, children were tortured and killed.

These two children are all that remain of a family ten persons, who were eight having been killed by Cossacks in Moscow. Hirsch Kieff, who was a storekeeper in Kieff up to four weeks ago, told of his flight from that city after the Russian revolution.

"I left Kieff three weeks ago last Sunday," he said. "On the Friday before the day occurred the great massacre in the Jewish market place. Four thousand bodies afterward were buried in trenches in city streets. On Friday there were 6000 Jews and Russians gathered in a market square. Four streets led to this square. One holding a bugle sounded two blocks distant. A second, first, and then the other, hundreds of horses' hoofs, and the Cossacks pell-mell through the streets leading to the market place, and upon the market men and the women and children there.

Paris, Dec. 30.—With the new year the Catholic Church in France enters a new epoch. The first sign of the change is the list for the president's reception, which does not contain the names of any prelates.

The great question now is what action the bishops will take at the meeting of the cardinals Thursday, which is the first to be held in a century. It is looked upon by the bishops as an attempt on the part of the cardinals to assume a sort of cabinetship of the church, and the question which the bishops hold for other purposes up to the present time it has been seen that the majority of them favor peaceable acceptance of the principle of the separation of church and state.
