Reports from the winter wheat belt continue discouraging, showing little improvements under growing conditions. The market here was dull and professional for most of the day. Near the close there was some good buying by parties who were prominent when wheat was around these prices a week or two ago. Bradstreet's report came out, showing the world's decrease as 1,040,000 bush Northwest receipts were large, 641 cars, against 540 cars a year ago. Corn and oats—There is a moderate movement in the country, and shipping demand from east is fair, but the general cash demand here is not large.

Provisions—Packers were moderate sellers. Stocks of lard and ribs are estimated to show a large increase on the first of the month, but of pork there will probably be an increase of not over 4000 barrels. The consumptive trade is just about up to the average for the season. Short interest has decreased. Some of the strong traders taking the long side on the theory that there will be some good in the market before long.
