NEWS OF THE SHIPPING.

General Canal Repairing—Opening of the Welland Canal—General Notes. There was quite a rush of vessels to get through the Welland Canal yesterday at 10 o'clock when the Port House locks were opened. The schooner Herbert Dudley was the first to break through and a large fleet of tug-boats, propellers and barges followed. The propeller Persia will clear for the south shore on Saturday. Mr. Wright's steam yacht Eclair will be put in commission on Saturday. Water in the harbor remains an inch or two above zero. Island residents are taking possession of their summer homes. The propeller Shickuna will clear tomorrow for Fort William, to load grain for this port. Mr. C. H. Hatch of Kingston, traveling passenger agent of the R. & O., left yesterday for Montreal. Many Hamiltonians came down on the Macassa yesterday. The Macassa's new wharf is being cut down to allow easy access to the boat's gangway. Repairs to the Cornwall Canal will be completed in time for the opening on Monday next. There will be a double set of lock gates at each lift for use in case of accident, and many other needed improvements have been made. The S.O.E. lifeboat is being overhauled, preparatory to going into commission. The schooner Sir C. Van Straubenzelle, Capt. Williams, left yesterday for Sargent Point, Georgian Bay, to load lumber. Yesterday the schooner W. Y. Emery brought 300 tons of coal from Oswego. On Monday the favorite steamer Hamilton of the R. & O. line will be in for weekly service, leaving at 8 p.m. for the Bay of Quinte, Montreal and intermediate ports. All the regular passengers have already been booked.

WAS HE JACK THE RIPPER?

Feigenbaum's Lawyer Believes the Man Electrocuted at Sing Sing Really Was. New York, April 28.—William S. Lawson, who has assumed the name of Feigenbaum, the murderer who was executed at Sing Sing prison yesterday, made a statement to the effect that Feigenbaum was a murderer of the Jack the Ripper type, if indeed he was not the Whitechapel murderer. Lawson revealed many secrets of Feigenbaum's life and said he did so in the interests of science and the public welfare, now that the man was dead, and there was no longer any necessity for remaining silent. He said Feigenbaum told him that he had got into trouble solely because he was the victim of a mania, which was beyond his control, and which led him to mutilate women. Yet the murderer never directly admitted that he killed Mrs. Juliana Hoffman, nor did he ever deny it to his counsel.

MRS. DYER SEES TO HANG.

The Reading Coroner's Jury Brings in a Verdict of Wilful Murder. London, April 28.—The coroner's jury at Reading to-day returned a verdict of wilful murder against Mrs. Dyer, overwhining woman who was charged directly connecting the woman with the numerous cases of infanticide, the bodies were wrapped in cloth, which witnesses identified as having belonged to Mrs. Dyer, and in many other ways a clear case was made out against her. The woman prisoner, who is charged with the murder of a number of infants, has made a written confession, admitting the murders of which she is accused. It is probable that insanity will be her defence when her case comes to trial.

HOW THE SEEDSMAN WAS SWINDLED

Clever Trick Exposed, Whereby Imaginary Seed Was Being Sold for. Arthur Lebar of St. Catharines, Ontario, appeared in the Police Court yesterday charged with the theft of \$73.95 from J. A. Simmers, a dealer in seed. The scheme which these two men are alleged to have worked is a new and cleverly devised one. Arthur Lebar was head shipper for Simmers. His brother, Edward, who has already had some experience in the police, was the go-between for the shipper and an outside confederate. Edward would procure from the shipper a sample of clover seed. This was turned over to the confederate, who posing as a farmer, would show it to some farmer, Lebar then made out a receipt for a lot of eight or ten bags, which he claimed to have in a wagon at one of the farmers' hotels. As the sample was always up to the mark, a deal was soon made and Mr. Simmers drew from Lebar the shipper, whose duty it was to receive the goods, that he had made the purchase. Lebar then made out a receipt for the bogus farmer, for so much seed. This receipt would be presented at the office of the concern, and the imaginary money paid for, and then a "divvy" made.

It is not yet known how long this alleged game has been worked, but it is thought the amount stolen will be considerable. Detective Duncan worked up the case.

Arms for the Cubans.

Jacksonville, Fla., April 28.—The filibustering steamer Bermudez left Jacksonville yesterday. The number of men she carried out is variously estimated at from 200 to 500. The commander of the expedition is said to be the veteran General Vida, with General Torres second in command. The Bermudez's papers were filed at the Customs House this morning to comply with the law. They show that she is carrying arms for the "Central American Fruit Company," at Puerto Cordoz, Honduras.

Grand Trunk Changes.

Buffalo, N.Y., April 28.—The G.T.R. changes that have the greatest interest are the retirement on May 1 of Thomas D. Sheridan, district passenger agent, with headquarters in this city, and the placing of the Buffalo and Niagara Falls district under the care and supervision of James D. McDonald, who is probably of city passenger and ticket agent. Mr. Sheridan has represented the Grand Trunk in this city since 1883.

The case was adjourned until Thursday.

The Queen's Own Rifles have several invitations for the Queen's Birthday from different places, the last being from Kingston, where a military demonstration will take place on May 26. The question of accommodation for the boys is green, and the Mayor of the City is under consideration, but nothing can or will be decided until this evening.

Montreal, April 28.—(Special.)—The Dominion liner Vancouver, the first ocean arrival of the season, will be here to-morrow morning.

WITH INTENT TO KILL HIS WIFE.

The Shooting Charge Against Edward Thompson Parly Heard at the Assizes Yesterday.

The first case called by Justice Ferguson at the Criminal Assizes was that of Edward Thompson, charged with shooting at his wife, Nellie Thompson, with intent to kill. J. K. Kerr, Q.C., acted as prosecutor for the Crown, and the prisoner was defended by John King, Q.C. Mrs. Thompson, the first witness, swore that they had been married in Belleville, about five years ago, but only lived with her husband about a year. She came to Toronto to earn a living for herself, as her husband was about to lose his situation. Since coming to Toronto she had been employed in a number of laundries, had taken part in a walking contest there, and had been cook on the boat running from St. Catharines to Port Arthur. She denied ever having been intimate with men, or keeping company with any characters. She admitted having adopted a child and taking it to her husband at Belleville, telling him it was his own. She did in hopes that it would make him a better man, as he had been drinking and was an abusive man. On Jan. 25 last, Mrs. Thompson said her husband called on her at 82 Portland-street, where she boarded with Thomas Dickey. It was about 2.30 when he called. He (Thompson) asked his wife to go and live with him again. She refused, telling him that she was earning her own living and was getting on all right by herself. He said, "If you do not come and live with me you will die." He threatened to shoot her, and said he would go and get a revolver. He returned in about three hours, and after talking to his wife for a few minutes, he drew the gun and pointed it at her. She jumped to one side, and grasped his wrist. The revolver was discharged at that moment, the ball passing close to her head.

Thomas Dickey swore that on the afternoon of the shooting, Thompson called on him at Fox's lumber yard and showed him a revolver, at the same time stating that he intended shooting his wife that night. Dickey denied having told the prisoner that Mrs. Thompson had been an inmate of a house of ill-fame, or ever having seen or heard anything detrimental to her character.

Mrs. Dickey gave Mrs. Thompson an excellent character and expressed the baby she had. Mrs. Dickey had received a note from one, to the effect that Mrs. Thompson had the baby to Belleville, where it died in three weeks.

P. C. Craig testified that Thompson gave himself up, and said he had been shooting. He had no intention to shoot his wife, "because she loved her and her only." Thompson had been drinking and did not act sane.

This closed the case for the Crown. Mr. King called Mrs. Spotton for the defence, who stated that Thompson was always kind to his wife. Mr. Weeks, for whom Thompson had worked, said that he worried a great deal over his wife's conduct, and he thought she would not live with him. Thompson was jealous of his wife, and did not think she was living a proper life.

THE CASE WAS NOT FINISHED.

Belleville, April 28.—The City Council has requested a reward of \$100 for the arrest and conviction of two men who attempted to set fire to Harris & Walworth's cash factory early yesterday morning.

JAMES DAVIDSON OF SHANNONVILLE WAS THROWN FROM HIS WAGON WHILE ON ROUTE HOME YESTERDAY BY BREAKING OF A LINCH PIN AND HAD ONE OF HIS LEGS BROKEN.

James Davidson, aged 25, who had been a telegraph operator at the Montreal stock yards, Point St. Charles, was thrown from his wagon while on route home yesterday by the breaking of a linch pin and had one of his legs broken.

SWEENEY'S ALIBI FAILED.

The Prisoner Sent Down for Six Years at the Welland for Highway Robbery. Welland, April 28.—At the second and closing day's court held here to-day before Chancellor Boyd, Charles Sweeney was tried for highway robbery. The charge being that he had, with one Shep. Smith, held up and robbed Customs Officer Young, who was returning from his office at night on Aug. 28, 1895. Smith was convicted in December and is now serving a sentence in Kingston. Sweeney positively swore that he was in Buffalo when the offence was committed, but Customs Officer Young swore positively that Sweeney was the one who held the revolver to his head. The jury found the prisoner guilty and the Judge sentenced him to six years in Kingston Penitentiary.

TERRIFIC DYNAMITE EXPLOSION.

Four Tons of the Explosive Did Deadly Work on Douglas Island. Port Townsend, Wash., April 28.—The steamer Willapa, which arrived from Alaska last night, brings news that on the night of April 16 the powder magazine of the Treadwell Mining Co., on Douglas Island, containing four tons of dynamite, was destroyed by a terrific explosion. The watchman, Win. Cot of Spring Valley, Cal., was blown to atoms. Every pane of glass within a radius of ten miles was broken and a hole over 15 feet deep now marks the site of the magazine. Several buildings in the vicinity were badly damaged.

The Wyanoke Snak.

Fortress Monroe, Va., April 28.—The old Dominion Line steamer Wyanoke, while leaving her dock at Newport News last night, fouled the cruiser Columbia, which was lying out on the stream taking in coal, and sunk to-day. The crew and passengers were all saved and taken ashore. The Columbia sustained some damage above the water line, and will repair at Norfolk.

THEIR ANNUAL SCRUTINY.

Second Day's Session—Delinquent Shop License Holders Clear Themselves—Transfer Granted.

The License Commissioners continued their session yesterday and discussed the renewal of licenses to bona fide hotelkeepers who have no "stars" against them. Business went along smoothly and those hotelkeepers who have kept to the narrow path during the past year have no cause for uneasiness. Over 90 per cent of the list passed the first reading.

The four delinquent shop license holders appeared before the board and exonerated themselves from the complaints that were against them. Morton's application for a transfer from Albert-street to Queen-street west, was granted. There are a few hotelkeepers under the ban, but with that generality which characterizes the License Commissioners the offenders will be allowed a few months to regain the reputation they have lost. It looks as if Brown's Hotel, at Simcoe and Wellington-streets, will have a hard job getting a renewal unless there are some radical changes made in the management. There are a number of complaints against the present mode of running the house.

Regarding the transfer of the McHenry license from Queen and William-streets to Parkdale, legal representatives of the petitioners based on the board, but the matter has not been definitely decided. The board will not meet again till to-morrow.
