The Government does not count on making any money out of it. The service is merely given for the accommodation of the population in Gaspe, and expenses are reduced to the minimum. Earnings on the Intercolonial Railway have failen off within the last few weeks. The authorities of the Railway Department account for it by the fact that other roads in Central Canada suffered depression earlier in the year, and the conditions now prevalent down east are but a continuation.



BOXING DAY.

RENTED

The day after Christmas is generally known in England as boxing day, from the fact that on this day Christmas presents or Christmas boxes are collected. The custom is essentially English, The tradesman presents his customer with something and the customer returns the compliment by tipping the tradesman's boy. The practice of giving Christmas presents had become so irksome that in 1836, the British Secretary for Foreign Affairs sent a circular to the different embassies, requesting a discontinuance of the practice of making gifts to Foreign Office messengers and other Government servants. English people are, however, very conservative in their customs and the practice still continues. The housekeeper is expected to tip the postman, lamplighter, turncock, scavenger, policeman, newsboy, his servants, and all his tradespeople's assistants and the employer has generally to give Christmas boxes to his clerks. The practice has sometimes been considered a serious social nuisance. The custom is referred to in the following extract from a poem on "Christmas":


