CANADA'S MONEY

Takes Up About One-Half of the \$10,000,000 Loan.

THE GREATEST FINANCIAL ACHIEVEMENT.

Means That Canadians Have Confidence in the Future of the Dominion.

The Loan is the Best Ever Floated by the Canadian Government—More Than Double the Amount Asked for Was Tendered—Rates Will Yield to the Investor About 2 1/2 Per Cent. While British Consols, the Highest Public Security, Return 2 1/2 Per Cent—Canada Has Lots of Money to Invest—A Favorable Comparison—Probable Effect on the Money Market.

The new Canadian loan of £2,000,000, the subscription books of which closed in London yesterday, was a great success. The applications for the loan aggregated over £4,000,000, or more than double the amount asked for.

Canada's Get Her Bonds. Toronto capitalists were not much behind their Montreal friends in tendering for this loan. We understand that a number of them joined forces and tendered for between \$2,500,000 and \$3,000,000 worth of these bonds.

The prices bid ranged from £1 2/3 to £3, and it is stated that 42 per cent. of the bonds were allotted at £1 2/3 and the balance at £3. To yield the investor 2-3/4 per cent. the price would be 93.23.

More than half the amount of the loan was called for by the Dominion Bank, which has been the largest subscriber to the loan.

Greatest Financial Achievement. This is the greatest achievement in the history of Canadian finance. It is the first loan of importance to be raised in Canada.

Money is Dearer in Britain. When we take into consideration the present state of the money market, the success of this financial operation. For some months past the London money market has been gradually rising.

Effect on the Money Market. A question of some concern is how this purchase of \$5,000,000 worth of bonds by Canada will affect the money market here.

He Denies All Knowledge of That Slip of Paper

WHICH CARRIED THE KEY IMPRESSIONS

But He Got Badly Tangled Up Regarding His Personal Accounts.

Evidence for the Prosecution in the Preliminary Trial All In—Mr. Young of the Taylor Safe Works Gave Evidence to Show That the Locks Had Been Broken Off the Compartments of the Safe—Mr. Porter Says No Evidence, but Magistrate Daly Says He is Not Trying the Accused, and Thinks a Prima Facie Case Has Been Made Out—Ponton in the Box Again To-Day.

Napanee, Oct. 15.—(Special.)—The crowd that packed the court room this afternoon expected to see the end of the preliminary trial in the Ponton case, but the end is not yet. When the prisoner was called upon to explain some of the evidence against him he was received with applause that was almost instantly subdued by the officials, but he made a cross-examination when he was being examined by Mr. Madden regarding his financial condition at the time of the robbery.

David M. Young, a safemaker, employed by J. & J. Taylor, has been at the business 22 years and he said his firm has manufactured the safe and vault door. He described how the locks and material of the safe are made, and how they are put together.

It took two and a half hours to open the vault door, and there was no evidence of violence. It would be necessary to have numbers of the combination of the vault to open it.

Witness here identified the locks exhibited. He continued: "The lock on the lower compartment was found at the bottom of the safe. The screws with which it had been fastened were also on the bottom of the safe."

The upper compartment of the safe was opened first on the right side and then on the left. The door was bent in good order and still fastened to the bottom of the safe.

On the vault door the lock was rather out of date, but on the safe it was good as anyone would want. When the safe was opened the keys of the combination were also lying in the bottom of the safe.

Mr. Young Cross-Examined. Cross-examined by Mr. Porter: "Would you so far as to say it can't be done, or that you think it can't be done?" Mr. Porter.

Mr. Young said that for all he knew Mr. Porter might be perfectly legitimate. He said it would be utterly useless to try to get into the safe without the combination. Mr. Porter asked that after

All Gotham in a Fever of Excitement.

HARD WORK IS NOTICEABLE

In the House to House Canvass as Well as the Huge Mass Meeting.

George and Dayton Will Travel Together. A Choice Phrase Used by Mr. A. B. Gardner, Which is Likely to Cut a Figure in the Contest—How Will the German Vote Go?—Crocketers Say the Fight Will be Between Van Wyck and Tracy—George Wants a Joint Debate.

New York, Oct. 15.—As election day draws near, sensational surprises in the political contest grow scarcer and hard work, extending from house to house canvass to the huge mass meeting, becomes more noticeable.

The acceptance by Mr. Dayton of the Jeffersonian nomination for comptroller was discounted by his evident intention prior to the official announcement.

It is announced that Messrs. George and Dayton will campaign together, speaking from the same platform.

Comment on the oddity of this is not wanting, as Mr. Dayton has not, and his friends may not, endorse the more peculiar tenets which are believed to make for the popularity of the single-taxer and free trader.

A Choice Phrase. "The hell with reform," used by Col. Asa Bird Gardner, Tammany's candidate for district attorney in his mass meeting speech, has been much quoted and variously commented upon.

The attitude of the Germans in this campaign may be learned when the ballots are counted—it cannot be accurately stated now—in short, the German-American vote in Greater New York, which many think will reach at least 125,000, is likely to be split on the lines of personal preferences.

Between Van Wyck and Tracy. It is noteworthy that those who acknowledge Mr. Dayton as leader insist that the main contest is between Van Wyck and Tracy, while those who are generally known as the "reform" party reverse the names but not the belief, and contend that the real contestants are Tracy and Van Wyck.

George Wants a Worthy War. Henry George is out with a challenge to all the other majority candidates to meet him in a public debate. The Campaign Committee of the Democracy of Thomas Jefferson will make every effort to bring these forensic combats about.

Archbishop Lopez of Senora, Mexico, Renounces Against the Order. Nogales, Arizona, Oct. 15.—A sensation has been sprung on the adjacent State of Sonora, Mexico, by an ecclesiastical edict from Archbishop Lopez, the seat of whose archdiocese is at Hermosillo, the capital of the State.

Was Forgery Proven? Yesterday afternoon the Court of Sessions and W. K. Smyth decided the points of a reserve case which recalls the Hawkins and Griffin trial. These two were sentenced to Kingston for defrauding Shadrach Hawkins of Toronto property by persuading him to execute his real estate for worthless certificates in the Rockford, Rock Island & St. Louis Railway.

Information Wanted. Gladsloe Will Not Intervene. New York, Oct. 15.—A special cable from London to an afternoon paper says Mr. Gladsloe has declined to accede to a request that he intervene to bring about a settlement of the engineers' strike. The Australian marine engineers have voted \$2500 in aid of the strikers.

A BAD GANG CAPTURED.

Chicago Detectives Have Struck a Regular Klonkide of Thieves, Yankee and Canadian.

Chicago, Oct. 15.—Chief of Detectives Collier and four of his men have captured four of the most successful and daring burglars of the United States and Canada, and \$25,000 worth of stolen property is in the hands of the police awaiting identification. The men under arrest are: "Shenney Joe" Rubenstein, the leader and brains of the gang; Harry Rogers, James Flaherty and James Williams. Letters in the men's possession, which have been passed between them, showed they had been talking a flying trip from coast to coast, robbing right and left. These letters also showed they agreed to meet in New York City Oct. 1, and then go to St. Louis, where the goods would be disposed of. Evidence was found on their persons indicating that they had committed robberies at New York, San Francisco, Denver, Rome, N.Y., Rochester, Dunkirk, Buffalo and Troy, Cleveland, London (Ont.), Quebec and other Canadian cities.

"Shenney Joe" and Harry Rogers alias "The Dip" are Canadian thieves, and Flaherty and Williams are American crooks. All have criminal records as safe-breakers and all-round crooks. Their photographs adorn the rogues' galleries of almost every city in the country. The police of the entire country have been searching for the men for six months past. All are young men, none being over 30 years of age.

BASIS MUST BE GOLD.

Canadian Banking Association Heavily Endorses All Opposition to Bimetallism Measures in England.

London, Oct. 15.—A special to The Evening Post from London says: The Canadian Banking Association, in view of the action here in memorializing the Chancellor of the Exchequer on the silver question, has cabled at great length to the chairman of the London clearing banks, heartily endorsing all opposition to bimetallism measures. The resolution as cabled concludes thus: "They finally reiterate their conviction that a double standard of gold and silver is desirable and impracticable; that of the two standards gold is incomparably the more desirable, and that the Dominion of Canada, having as its obligations, public, private and corporate, resting on, and being so long and honorably established on, the most solid basis, any attempt to disturb the same or any measure having a tendency in that direction should be met with strenuous resistance."

SPAIN WILL GIVE IN.

Cuba Will be Relinquished, According to a New York Herald Article.

New York, Oct. 15.—The Herald this morning prints a long article on the Cuban situation, in which it says it has come into possession of important facts which tend to show that Spain will eventually grant independence to Cuba on the payment of an indemnity of \$150,000,000. Prospecting has Only Begun—No Pit Has Yet Been Sunk—Over Ten Feet—Big Quartz Veins are Numerous, But There is No Placer Gold—Professor Believes Careful Prospecting Will Pay.

The Ontario Bureau of Mines will today issue in bulletin form a preliminary report on the Michigan mineral district, prepared by Prof. A. S. Wilcott, the geologist of that department.

After stating that the district contains about 8000 acres of land and extends 103 miles east and west by 64 north and south, Mr. Wilcott proceeds to submit some very valuable points as to how success is had to the region.

How to Get There. The northeast corner of the district, he notes, is traversed by the C. P. R. by Carry Shilling to near Amyot Station, a distance of about 60 miles.

Another way in. The third canoe route is down the Magpie River from a point five miles east of Grasset, on the line of the railway, or a slightly roundabout route may be taken from a point one mile east of the station.
