





New York, June 20.—Referring to the settlement of the West African troubles the London correspondent of The Tribune says:
"Credit for the West African settlement is allotted here to Mr. Chamberlain, and for that reason the convention is regarded as a satisfactory and honorable compromise. Mr. Chamberlain is popularly regarded as the sharpest statesman in public life, consequently the convention which he virtually made is accepted as a sensible arrangement for England; if he could not drive a good bargain, who could? The points upon which he has insisted all along have been the French abandonment of Boussa and all places on the Lower Niger as far as Ito. These he has carried. While the French are excluded from the navigable Niger, they are allowed to round and consolidate their West African empire. The convention is an ingenious example of give and take negotiations." Little Better Than Trails.

A century ago the roads of Ontario, such as existed, and they were very few. were mere trails. To-day, notwithstand ago the amount of money and labor placed on them, the majority are little better than trails. The populous districts of Canada are covered with networks of steel, while other lines are being projected wherever opportunity prevents itself. But while capital has exhibited so much enterptise in providing the great lines of commerce, the lesser routes have been overlooked and neglected. Common highways, while less in extent and cost, are not one whit less in importance. Over them must pass all the freight which feeds the greater roil-ways, and it is this first cost of transportation which so enormously increases the cost of production and lessens our ability to compete in the markets of the word. At three per cent. the annual loss to the province represents a capital of \$651,573.

There was a large decrease on passage, 1,680,000 bushels, making total amount afloat at present 44,480,000 hushels. The Engish visible decreased in the American visible of 303,000 bushels. This latter was less than expected, considering the very light receipts and large exports last week, but taking the statistical news on a whole, it was not unfavorable to holders. The best selling around the opening came from the Northwest and the seaboard. The demand was slack until prices declined, when shorts became very large buyers. There was also fair demand for the Southwest, accompanied by a few crop damage reports. The local feeling is not in sympathy with a very large advance, which will likely cause free selling again on any further buige. It would not be out of order, however, for the market to sell up to 70c. There should also be a reaction in the foreign markets. Liverpool has shown even a greater decline than Chicago, and as it has been aimost continuous a few days of strength might cause uncasiness among shorts and cause buying for long account.
