London has had no real alarm from invasion since the Dutch vessels in Charles II.'s reign entered the Thames, sailed up the Medway, and the sound of their guns was heard at the Tower of London, two hundred and thirty years ago. Napoleon the Great in 1804 assembled at Boulogne 160,000 troops, 10,000 horses and a flotilla of 1300 vessels manned by 17,000 men. The British nation fesponded by enrolling 430,000 volunteers, and the coasts of Kent and Sussex

Contributions to the outing fund have increased from \$32 in 1897 to \$719.59 in 1902. The Dorcas Society contributed 5780 garments. The missionaries made 2826 visits to homes, and had 0878 interviews. Mr. Hall quoted a statement showing that one-fortieth of the population of London, Eng., were confined in jails, hospitals, and other places of refuge, and that one in every four deaths occurred in these places. Mr. Hall referred to the vafious phases of the work, all of which showed satisfactory progress.

A resolution was passed testifying to the sense of deep appreciation felt by all connected with the Toronto City Mission at the hearty support given during the past eleven years by Dr Geikie as president, and expressing high satisfaction with his untiring energy in that long period of service.

QUIT THEIR LAIRS. John Redmond, M.P., Speaks of Conspiracy in Party.

Dublin, Nov. 20 .- Mr. John Red mond, M.P., reached Dublin yesterday on his return from attending the convention of the Irish League of America in Boston. He received an enthusiastic welcome, being met at the station by William O'Brien, M.P., number of his colleagues and members of the Irish League and an enornous crowd.

The Lord Mayor of Dublin drove in the carriage with him to the League's offices, in Sackville-street. A torchlight procession in a double line escorted the party. Continuous cheering greeted the progress of the pro

ing greeted the projess of the procession.

Mr. Redmond, in response to the ovations, addressed the crowd from the balcony of the League's building, and said that the magnificent reception given him showed that Dublin understood and appreciated the work he had done on his visit to the United States. He promised his hearers that their exiled brethren would stand at Irelands back as long as a courageous front was shown to her enemies at home. He desired to record his appreciation of the splendid work that the Irish party had accomplished during his absence, and to reaffirm that he was fully responsible for the tactics they had adopted, which were decided upon at a meeting of the

tactics they had adopted, which were decided upon at a meeting of the Irish parliamentary party held before his departure.

It appeared that under the guise of safeguarding Catholic interests some of the enemies of the Irish League. were seizing the opportunity to quit their lairs and attack the unity of the party. The men concerned in this conspiracy, however, concluded Mr. Redmond, were men who could never claim the confidence or support of any section of the Irish people.
