MINERS' LIVES SHORTENED

Expert Medical Testimony Given Before the Anthracite Coal Arbitration Commission.

NINETY-NINE PER CENT. ANAEMIC

One Physician Knew of a Man Coughing Up Coal Dust Nine Years After Leaving Mines.

Scranton, Pa., Nov. 20.—The economic and sociological features of the anthracite coal industry and the effect upon the health of the mine workers were the principal subjects brought before the arbitration commission today by the attorneys of each side to the controversy.

The afternoon session was particularly interesting because it brought out much expert testimony on the question of the health of the mine workers. Three physicians who have practiced in Scranton or Wilkes-Barre took the stand for the miners and in substance testified that the occupation of a mine worker was "very unhealthy" and shortened his life.

One physician, Dr. Frank P. Lennahan of Wilkes-Barre, who says he has had a long experience among mine workers, testified that fully 99 per cent of the men who work in the mine are anaemic. Their health is impoverished, and their general condition is feeble. The principal illness suffered by the miners, the physician testified, were the miners' asthma, rheumatism, lumbago and sciatica. The miners' asthma comes from coal dust, powder smoke and other dusts.

Marconi Tells of Success

Longest Ever Transmitted by New Telegraphy, Received Without Any Difficulty—Can Send Forty Words a Minute—Great Progress Made.

Hull, N.S., Nov. 20.—Mr. Marconi, in an interview at Sydney today, said: "Any remarks that I might make now regarding my experiments would probably prove misleading, and I prefer to wait until my work is finished. The station here is really not completed yet. A portion of the machinery has not been adjusted, and some of it has not even been installed. The message received in Sydney harbor by the Carib Alberto from Cornwall is the longest ever successfully transmitted by wireless telegraphy. It was received without any difficulty, but I can say no more about it, as my agreement with the Italian government provides that they are to make public the result of all the experiments made on the Carib Alberto. "Since I came to Table Head a few improvements have been made in the sending and receiving apparatus, and we are now able to send at a rate of forty words a minute while a year ago our best speed was sixteen or seventeen words a minute."

New York, Nov. 20.—Mrs. Carrie Nation broke loose at the Horse Show this afternoon. She denounced the multitude on the evils of overdress, attempted to break a bottle of champagne and finally was ejected from the building by the police.

Mrs. Nation entered the Garden quickly and took a seat in the tier. She had been there only a few minutes when her gaze rested on the box where the Vanderbilts were sitting. She descended to the promenade, stationing herself in front of the Vanderbilt box she delivered a tirade on overdress.

In the box were seated Mrs. Alfred G. Vanderbilt, Rosalind Vanderbilt and Miss Nelson. Alfred G. Vanderbilt was leaning against the rail of the promenade and did not see Mrs. Nation approach. "You ought to be ashamed of yourselves," the woman screamed at them. "You ought to be ashamed to wear such disgraceful clothes. Take them off, take them off at once and attire yourselves more modestly."

Alfred G. Vanderbilt hastily left his position on the rail and came over, holding her forehead with a handkerchief.

RESCUED BY SIR ARCHIBALD

Emperor William's Horses Became Frightened and Postillions Lost Control of Them.

Edinburgh, Nov. 20.—Emperor William, on his way to embark on board the Imperial yacht Hohenzollern, lying in the Fifth of Forth, arrived at Dalmeny today and was met by Lord Rosebery.

As His Majesty's carriage was leaving the station the horses attached to it became frightened at the waving of the colors of the detachment of the Black Watch, forming the guard of honor. The postillions lost control of them, and they got mixed up in the crowd.

An accident was only averted by the assistance of Lieut.-General Sir Archibald Hunter, who seized their heads and managed to control them. After lunch the Emperor boarded the Hohenzollern and sailed for Kiel.

GOOD RELIABLE VOTERS NEEDED.

Milling Company of Minneapolis Bonded in \$50,000 to Use Only Our Wheat.

OATMEAL TO BE MADE OF OUR OATS

Great Saving in Expense of Transport to Europe Will Thus Be Made.

St. Paul, Minn., Nov. 20.—The Washburn-Crosby Milling Company of Minneapolis bonded its Humboldt mill today for an indefinite period, to grind nothing but Canadian wheat. The bond demanded by the customs officials and given today is for \$50,000. The custom heretofore prevailing was to ship the grain of the Canadian westward to New York, and thence to Liverpool. The grinding of the grain in Minneapolis instead of in England would make a great saving in the expense of transit to Europe. A bond of \$30,000 was also given at the customs house today by the Great Eastern Elevator Company of Minneapolis for the storage in Minneapolis of Canadian oats. The company in this State by some mills yet to be designated and used entirely for export business.

BLUE HERON STOPS TROLLEYS

Short-Circuited Wires and Suspended Traffic in Mohawk Valley.

Utica, Nov. 20.—The local trolley system was put out of business for five hours last night as the result of a peculiar incident. A large blue heron alighted on a wire carrying power from the Trenton Falls station to one of the local stations of the Utica and Mohawk Valley Railroad Company, and shortly thereafter the bird's bill came in contact with another wire, immediately the current was short-circuited, the fuses at the sub power station burned out, the wires broke, the power stopped and the 22,000 volts that were carried, wrought havoc with the bird. The trolley cars on the Utica and Mohawk Valley were stalled, and for five hours all electric traffic in the Mohawk valley was suspended. A somewhat similar incident occurred two years ago when a cat short-circuited the wires.

GERMAN DAY OF PRAYER.

All Theatres Closed and No Papers Issued on Wednesday.

Berlin, Nov. 20.—Yesterday was the national day of penitence and prayer here. The Germans, who are liberal every other day, were respectively closed all their theatres and forbade any kind of public amusement. They even prohibited playing any music, except sacred music, in private houses. Leopold's Armoured Auto

Bars Against Anarchists

First One Ever Built is for the King of the Belgians—Monarch Makes a Speech in Which He Does Not Know How Long He Will Be Allowed to Live.

Brussels, Nov. 20.—King Leopold has ordered an armored automobile constructed for his special use. It will be the first one ever built. The King of Belgium is greatly alarmed at the recent attempt upon his life and as he is not troubled with an embarrassing amount of bravery, yet covets the pleasures of his daily spins with his horseless vehicles, he has decided to get an automobiling under a protecting steel cover. The King was recently fired at while on his way to a memorial service in honor of the late Queen. Afterwards it was officially stated that he was not really fired at, but that three shots were fired into the air to attract attention to the miserable condition of the man who fired them. This explanation is not believed.

NOAH HALE FOUND DEAD.

Sault Ste Marie, Nov. 20.—Some parties while out hunting northeast of the town came upon the body of Noah Hale who murdered his son Frank on October 3 last. Judging from appearances parties finding body say death must have taken place some time ago, and are inclined to think the cause was exposure and want of nourishment rather than suicide. HOW MINISTERS WILL VOTE

The World Asks Members of Ontario Cabinet Their Intentions as to Liquor Act.

BUT THEY ARE NOT TALKATIVE

So Far the Premier is the Only One Who Has Said "Yes" to the Question.

Premier Ross—Yes. Hon. E. J. Davis—Nothing to say. Hon. John Dryden—As his conscience directs. Hon. Richard Harcourt—Refused to say. Hon. J. R. Stratton—Declined to be interviewed. Hon. F. B. Litchford—Could not be seen. Hon. J. M. Gibson—Could not be seen.

The World on Thursday interviewed the members of the Ross government in connection with their position on the referendum. The question put to each one was: "Will you, following the lead of the Premier, state whether you will or will not support the Liquor Act?"

In every case the answer was practically the same. They were all as dumb as the proverbial oyster and refused point blank to give any information as to the attitude they would take.

Hon. E. J. Davis, Commissioner of Crown Lands, sought for a moment, and then informed The World that he was always very pleased to give any information he could, but in this case he had nothing whatever to say one way or the other.

Hon. John Dryden, Minister of Agriculture, replied to the question by asking another. "What is the ballot for?" he inquired. "Is it not for the purpose of giving a man the privilege of privately expressing his opinion and of voting honestly and to the best dictate of his conscience? Well, then, that is what I intend to do—to vote on the question as my conscience prompts me." Further than this Mr. Dryden had nothing to say, and was rather inclined to think that the question was out of place, although it was pointed out to him that answering embarrassing questions was one of the disadvantages of being a public man.

Hon. Richard Harcourt, Minister of Education, was just as non-committal. He would not say how he would vote on the Liquor Act.

Hon. J. R. Stratton, Provincial Secretary, was out of town, and accordingly could not be seen.

INHERITANCE OF \$1,000,000 INVOLVED

Autism Court Declares a Marriage in U.S. Null and Void.

The courts declared today that the marriage was null, because of the Austrian law prohibiting the marriage of persons of different religions. An inheritance of \$1,000,000 was involved in the decision.

TRAGEDY IN FRANCE.

St. Lo, France, Nov. 20.—A double suicide and triple murder occurred here today. A beggar named L'Honneur and his wife locked themselves and their three children, aged respectively 7 years, 5 years and 6 months in a room and turned on the gas. All were asphyxiated.

SHOULD RAISE THE BOYCOTT.

Schenectady, N.Y., Nov. 20.—The machinery builders' section of the Trades' Assembly, representing at least two-thirds of the local trades' union men, met to-night and by a practically unanimous vote decided that the assembly, at its next meeting, raise the boycott against the Schenectady Railway Company. This practically guarantees the boycott being called off.

He is manager of the Smelter-Union Mining Co. and was in the billiard room when the shooting occurred. It is believed that several men were killed. He is an Englishman.
