New Fraternal Insurance Must Be Carried on According to the National Fraternal Congress Table of Mortalities---New Basis of Investment-Heavy Penalty for Rebating.

SOME POINTS OF PROPOSED BILL

The powers of the government are enlarged and broadened. By the new bill, the minister may, for any violation of the act, suspend, withdraw or refuse to renew license.

Power is given to make special audits, appoint valuators, or inspect the books at the head offices of United States or foreign countries. Trust funds of foreign companies must be placed under the trust of a Canadian trust company.

The surplus on dividend policies shall be distributed every three

The expense of new business must be shown separately from the

Only agents may be paid by commission. Officials at head offices shall not be permitted to receive commissions in any shape or form.

No salary of \$5000 or more may be paid without having been specially voted by the board of directors. Publicity for salaries and commissions larger than \$4000 in the insurance report is demanded.

The agent who gives a rebate, and the man who receives it, are liable to a fine of \$100 each. If the director or manager knows of it, he is liable to a fine of \$1000.







adopted by a standing vote at quite a large meeting of ladies in the Canaa large meeting of ladies in the Canadian Institute. Mrs. Torrington, president of the Local Council of Women, was in the chair, and the ladies present included Lady Edgar, Lady Moss, Miss Hill (one of the vice-presidents), Mrs. Willoughby Cummings (the secretary), Mrs. Huestis, Dr. Helen MacMurchy, Mrs. Arthur VanKoughnet, Mrs. A. Laird, Miss Fitzgibbon, Mrs. (Dr.) Oldright, Mrs. John Kay, Mrs. Robert Hay, Miss C. R. Boulton and Miss K. O'Brien.

Miss K. O'Brien. Mrs. Torrington read the resolution passed by the local council, and subsequently endorsed by the meeting, and added: "We women of Toronto, I am sure, wish to emphasize our interest in this important and vital ques-

terest in this important and vital question."

Mrs. Huestis, convener of the local council health committee, laid emphasis on their great need, as house-keepers, of having a supply of pure water, as from 26 to 30 millions of gallons of deadly sewage at present passed daily from the city out into the lake, polluting this great gift of God to the city.
