GEN. KUROPATKIN WILL COME BACK

He Will Be Recalled From the Front Altogether --- No Torpedo Boats Seen Today --- Czar Reviews Young Officers at Tsarskoe Selo.

ST. PETERSBURG, May 6. --- The rumors of the approaching return of General Kuropatkin from the Far East seem to be definitely confirmed and it is said that General Zarembo, commander of the fourth East Siberian corps, will succeed him. Failing health is assigned as the cause for Kuropatkin's coming back to St. Petersburg.

MOSCOW, May 6. --- The investigation of the charges of bribery of recruiting officers in connection with the liberation of reserve men has resulted in the arrest and trial by court martial of a recruiting officer named Staus, his assistant and his secretary.

FREDERICTON, N. B., May 6. (Special)---The remains of the late Mrs. J. Gordon Dunlop, who died recently at Wood Grove, Manitoba, arrived here today and will be taken to her former home at Kingsford for burial.

FRENCH POLITICS

PARIS, May 6.---Owing to renewed reports that foreign minister Delcasse intends to resign as a result of differences with Premier Rouvier over foreign affairs, the foreign office today made a specific statement to the effect that the best relations exist between M. Rouvier and Delcasse and that the latter has not at present any purpose of resigning.

THE LIBERALS IN MANITOBA

TORONTO, May 6. (Special)---In various quarters, which should be well informed, says a Winnipeg special to the Globe, there are statements circulating that it is the intention of the Roblin government to seek for dissolution late in July or early in August. Whether the lieutenant governor complies with the request is of small moment to the government. If he complies--well and good; if he refuses, the government will resign, and their resignation will compel a general election, the result of which, on incomplete lists, will, they are confident, be a foregone conclusion, returning Mr. Roblin and his colleagues triumphantly for another term.

CHARLOTTETOWN, P. E. I., May 6.—Prof. Prince, Dominion fishery commissioner, and J. A. Macdonald, fishery inspector, have come into recent notice in Dr. A. B. Gillis, a native of Hartfield. He has been appointed to the faculty of Williams University, Salem, Oregon. There are eighteen other professors on the staff, among the few graduates of McGill receiving this year the degree of M. A. are Lemuel Robertson, B. A., of Maranville, P. E. I., A. D. McKinnon, B. A. of Hartfield, P. E. I., Mr. Robertson graduated in 1888 as the gold medalist in classics of his year, and during last season has been distinguished himself as a lecturer on classical subjects in McGill. Mr. McKinnon graduated in 1894 with honors in his degree in the Faculty of Arts. During last season he continued his studies at McGill, he taking courses in "Modern Philosophy," "The History of Philosophy," "Some Relations of Ethics to Political Philosophy." Mr. McKinnon has also successfully completed his second year in Theology in the Presbyterian College, heading his class with honors and winning the David Morice Scholarship.

Poole, the well-known lumber dealer, formerly of the firm of Poole & Lewis, lately of L. M.
