ENTOMBED ALIVE Husband Shows Marks of Fight, But Denies Brutal Crime Near Cleveland.

Cleveland, Oct. 80 - Mrs. Hazel Burns, aged twenty-nine, whose badly nutilated body was found buried in a shallow grave near Painesville on Wednesday, died from suffocation and strangulation, so Lake County authori-

strangulation, so Lake County authori-ties announced following a postmortem examination of the body. Mrs. Burns was not shot, but was beaten with the butt of a small calibre revolver, then buried alive in a shallow grave in a marsh, the authorities de-clared. The marks at first believed to be bullet wounds, were made by the butt of a pistol, physicians said. The examination was made while Prosecutor Ralph M. Osttander and Sheriff Spink were grilling the slain woman's husband, Harry Burns, in the prosecutor's office at Painesville. 

The old Cheka has been abolished, and in its stead there has come up the organization known as the Politi-cal Police. The latter does not inter-fere in men's private lives, but in politics they are as omnipotent as ever. At one time the political police could shoot people first and try them afterward. Today the method is to have a court trial first and then carry out the execution or to send suspects into exile without trial. To foreigners in Russia the leaders make no effort to conceal their policy. They are not ashamed. They have confidence in the policy of doing wrong that good ultimately may come, and they apparently are succeeding, slowly and painfully, in reconstructing Rus-sia, but along their own lines, and without any important sacrifice of principle. Superficial Activity. The evidences of reconstruction in the land is more superfical than reafly repaved, buildings reconstructed, and railroad passenger traffic is becoming normal. Industrial plants, however, if in no worse condition than a year ago, certainly are in no better shape. These plants need foreign capital, but lacking this on terms to which the Communist can consent, the government is ready to wait until it has a surplus of ex-ports from agriculture. This it hopes for in 1923, and then and thereafter it sees money with which it will be able to establish industries itself. In the meantime, with evidence at hand of enough food to feed practical-ly the entire population; with a fuel supply exceeding that of last year, and with textile works producing a con-siderable amount of clothing, the gov-ernment expects the population to be fed, and warmed, and clad, not neces-sarily very well, but still well enough to weather another year without foreign loans. To feed the few hundred thousands of people who still suffer from the Russian famine, the government still looks to foreign aid. This will per-mit it to devote most of the available fa





This xceedingly important item in the con-truction of a wooden ship is described is follows in the current American Foras follows in the current American For-estry: "A ship knee is a right-angled wood-en brace used to give strength to the framing, and is fashioned from the nat-ural crook of a tree formed by a heavy, shallow horizontal root and a section of the trunk. Knees when finished are sometimes as much as six or seven high. "The tremendous impetus to wooden shipbuilding brought about by the war has resulted in the establishment of a awmill at Portland, Ore., designed exusively for the finishing of ship knees. Cusively for the mining of simp inters. The timber preferred is second-growth Douglas fir, found growing in shallow soil, so that the roots turn off at right angles to the trunk and thus give the proper shaps. 


from cutting the throats of game to bleed it. The question which I would ask myself if I were working on this case is this: Who, if any one, among the possible suspects is a practiced hunter?

But do not think that the answe

hunter? But do not think that the answering of this question would necessarily solve the mystery. It is no crime to be an experienced hunter. Probably there are a thousand such in New Bruns-wick. This third deduction and its consequences are merely a working theory, something to go on in looking for other facts. We must not forget, either, that the whole basis of this deduction is cir-cumstantial and that, like all circum-stantial evidence, it may be wrong. Perhaps the victims were first stunned or drugged and then shot at close range, obviating the need of good marksmanship. Perhaps there was a formal execution, with the victims tied or held. Perhaps the bodies were left by the actual murderer where and as they fell and all the pageantry of their laying out was accomplished later by some half-wit who found them—and left them again—and who himself has not been found. All these things are possible. I do not believe them probable. As a work-ing theory I would try, at first, the three deductions which I have set down:

First—This was a jealonsy murder, jealousy of Mrs. Mills. Second—The bodies were carefully laid out afterward. Third—The actual murder and the laying out are the work of two differ-ent personalities, though conceivably of



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
