VOTE FOR PROHIBITION JULY 10TH ELECTION INFORMATION

The Act in Brief—

The present Prohibition Act legislates against the sale of intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes, and only allows it for manufacturing, sacramental, and medicinal uses. The Act also provides for enforcement of the law and penalties for violation.

We Know Its Faults—

The Act is weak in that it allows too much latitude in the case of Doctors, Druggists and Vendors who have practically the dispensing of liquor within their own hands.

Further Legislation Depends on You—

Application has already been made by the Temperance people to have the Act amended in regard to recognizing weaknesses and the Government is sympathetic—BUT NOTE THIS—The Government put off the granting of these improvements to make the Act more effective, until the result of this election PROVES that the people want Prohibition, and by the majority of the vote the Government will know just how badly the Electors do want it.

Are You Aware of This?—

In 1919 an Act Passed the House, providing that the Government shall take over the entire liquor business within the province, for the three purposes contained in the Act, and also giving them more stringent control over the sale of extracts, essences, and tinctures—But mark you, the Government has refused to take action on this amendment, until the voice of the people has been heard at the coming election.

Stop Importation Our Next Move—

Authority to Prevent the Importation of Liquor into the Province does not rest with the Provincial, but with the Dominion Government, which has already stated that a vote may be taken on the question in New Brunswick, on the recommendation of our Legislature. If the result at the coming election satisfies them that the people actually want Prohibition—we are sure to get it!

What Your Ballot Can Do July 10th—

First Provide the way for necessary Amendments to the Act that will make it really effective. Second Show the Government that the people demand Prohibition, and want the laws enforced. Third Hasten the election that can shut out the importation of liquor into the Province.

WOODSTOCK'S CUT IN THE TAX RATE. At a meeting of the town council on Friday night R. F. Armstrong, the town manager, announced that the tax rate for Woodstock this year, as arrived at by the board of assessors, who have just completed the compilation of the valuation, is \$1.70 on \$100, a reduction of twenty cents on each \$100 compared with last year when this town had the lowest rate of any town in the maritime provinces of equal population.

WOODSTOCK'S CUT IN THE TAX RATE. We also learn that the rate arrived at was chiefly made from the sworn statements presented to the assessors as provided by the new assessment law that went in force this year, consequently

there will be no fault-finding on the part of the ratepayers. Real estate was placed at full value. The sum of \$600 was deducted from the salary or income of each ratepayer, and the balance over that amount is taxed. From the personal property of each ratepayer was deducted the indebtedness, if any, a sworn to in the statement, and the remainder was taxable.

Although the lowest taxed people of any we know of, the town gives its residents very much for the money they are asked to pay. Woodstock is not a possibility or a probability, it is a certainty. A man putting money into a new town is dependent on the success of that town. There is nothing speculative about Woodstock; it was settled over a century ago; its growth was slow but sure, but it is showing a prosperous present, with prospects of a bright and glorious future.

**LIVED IN REIGNS OF SIX SOVEREIGNS**

William Henry Best of River Glade, a Former Resident of Millstream, Dead, Aged 102 Years and 4 Months.

(Sussex Record.)

William Henry Best of River Glade, who passed away about a fortnight ago, had the distinction of being one of the oldest men in the province. He was 102 years of age on Jan. 24, 1920, and therefore was in his 103rd year, or to be absolutely correct, 102 years and four months old when he died. He was a native of Kings county, but for the past sixty-five years had been a resident of River Glade.

The deceased was a son of Richard Best, a native of Cornwallis, N. S., but who settled at Millstream, Kings county, and carried on the occupation of a farmer. His grandfather was Rev. Richard Best, Church of England clergyman and chaplain in the British army. The Rev. Mr. Best came out to this country at the time of the revolutionary war. His destination was to have been the United States, but he and his party got no farther than Halifax, when the war came to a close and their services were not required in the United States.

William Best was seven years of age when the Miramichi fire occurred and he remembered the event well. His father at that time was engaged in digging potatoes on his farm; they could see the smoke and the wind carried to their home in Kings county burnt leaves from the Miramichi district.

Mr. Best lived under six sovereigns and he well remembered and often talked of Queen Victoria's accession to the throne and the leading historical events following. He could readily recall the years that the British Empire had been engaged in during the last century.

Mr. Best came from Loyalist stock on his mother's side. His mother was a Miss Belding; her parents owned a large farm, well stocked, somewhere between Washington and New York. During the war their stock of cattle was all seized and slaughtered to make food for the American army. The male members of the Belding family were then told that they would have to join the American army or leave the country, and as they were Loyalists they did the latter and came to Sussex, N. B. Residents by this name in different parts of Kings county are descendants of these people. The grandfather, Jas-



Now Planning Tour For Prince of Wales To India LORD CROMER TO BE HIS CHIEF OF STAFF ON THAT VISIT

London Comment on Prospect of Break in High Living Cost—Change in the Shilling—Burglary Season in Full Swing in the Empire Metropolis.

(From Our Correspondent.) London, May 27.—I learn officially this week that arrangements for the Prince of Wales's Indian tour are already well advanced, many of the details lacking only the formality of royal sanction. Except in the matter of essentials, this will naturally be reserved until the prince returns after his present voyage. The great event of the Indian tour will be the opening, by His Royal Highness, of the new Indian Council, to be set up under the bill recently piloted through the House of Commons by Mr. Montagu, and representing another step forward in the self-government of India. The programme also includes some big game hunting in the magnificent preserves of the ruling prince of the northern provinces.

The last occasion of a similar visit was that in which the Crown Prince of Germany—now numbered among the royal "exs"—figured rather unappetizingly. Lord Cromer will be chief-of-staff to the prince during his Indian tour. This will be a popular appointment in India as well as here at home, for Lord Cromer is exceeding well liked in both places. Lord Cromer is presiding over a small committee, which is holding frequent meetings to settle the details of this interesting royal tour.

The general public is keenly interested in the prospect of a break in the excessive prices now obtaining for almost all the necessities of life. I am told by those who should be able to speak with some certainty on this engrossing topic that the hope is well founded. It is apparent in many directions that a slump in prices is imminent and is now actually in progress, in spite of powerful attempts to resist the natural process by artificial means.

The main credit for this happier prospect is Mr. Chamberlain's, in spite of the abuse that has been heaped upon that minister. In fact I am told that much of this abuse, in the press and outside it, is due to just this initiative on the chancellor of the exchequer's part. His action in persuading the banks to withhold unlimited credit to speculators who are holding on to stock for a profit has caused a general untidiness which is mainly the cause of the slump in prices.

The public is also playing its part by refraining from purchasing anything except absolute necessities at present prices. And another factor of real importance is the falling off in the foreign demand for goods of a certain character at exorbitant prices. So we may hope for more normal and healthier conditions, which, in the long run, will be good for trade, as well as for the general body of consumers. It does not tend to make for increased production always, or even often.

The price of a bottle in London is to be somewhere in the region of £4, we are now assured by the inevitable chortling journalists. It will not seriously affect very many people nowadays, though there are to be sure, a considerable number of individuals who use the liquor medicinally, as well as some joyous souls who still quaff it for sheer pleasure.

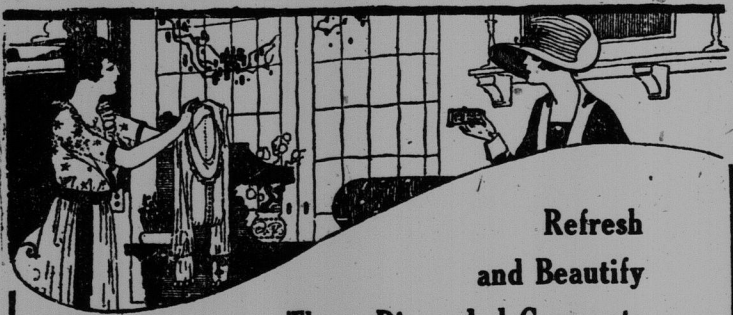

TEXTILES FROM POTATO LEAVES

The recent discovery of the adaptability of potato leaves for textile purposes is commented on at length in the Hamburgischer Borsen-Halle. Should results justify expectations, Germany will be rendered independent to a large extent of foreign textiles, since 40 per cent of the cotton imported by her before the war will be done away with. When it is realized that the yearly sum total of 6,000,000 marks apportioned for that purpose would, under present exchange conditions, constitute as many millions, the significance of the new invention becomes apparent.

In 1914, potatoes were cultivated to the extent of 2,800,000 hectares. The average yield per hectare in potato leaves is 15-2 cwt., and the collective figure 5,000,000 tons. About 80 per cent of this weight is moisture in the leaves. The amount of textile fibres that will be extracted from the remainder is estimated at 280,000 tons, or nearly half of the cotton imports of 1913. ECONOMIC EFFECTS OF PROHIBITION

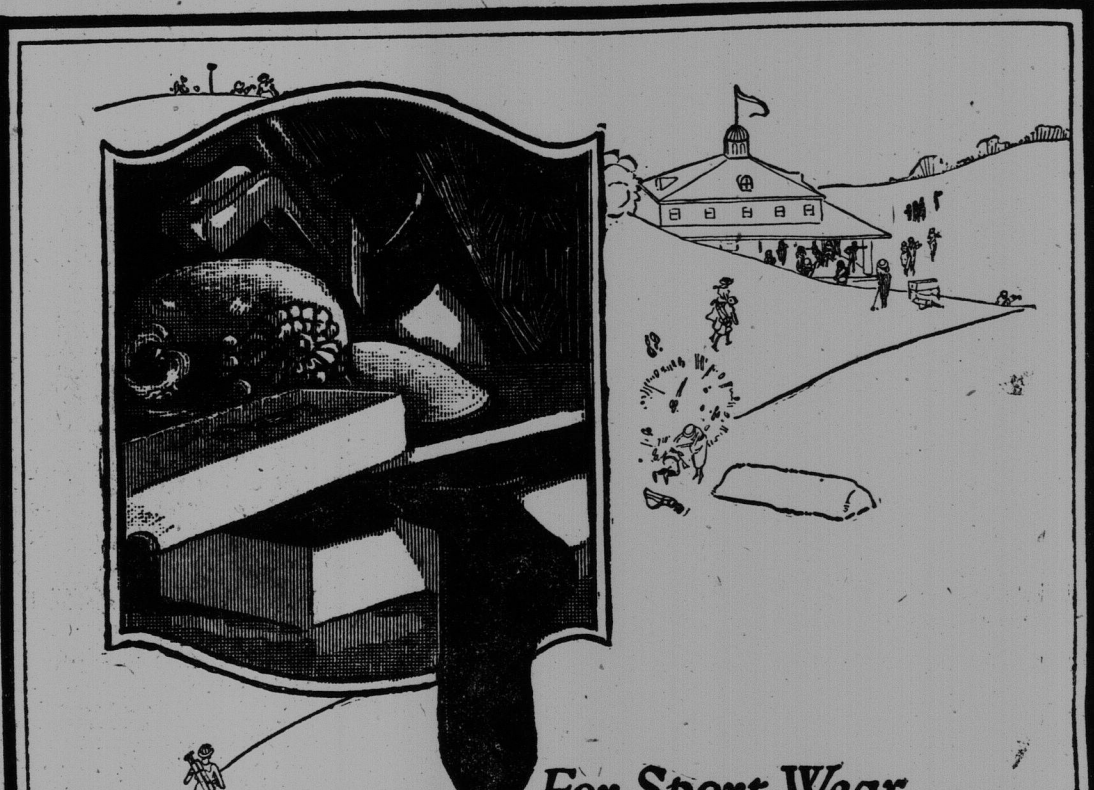
(Christian Science Monitor.) Duluth, Minnesota—Large savings have been effected in Duluth and neighboring territory through the operation of prohibition, which practically went into effect in this city three years ago this month as the result of a referendum. Daily arrests are not much over half what they were in license times. The county workhouse with its 1,000 acres of land has become a perplexing problem to the commissioners. The inmates have been so few in number in the past three years that half the farm has been leased to other interests rather than allow the land to return to a wild state. At Coleraine, a mining town on the Mesabi range, the jail has become so unnecessary that the town council has decided to transform it into a municipal club-room and present it to the Coleraine Club. The council has arranged to equip the building with shower baths, reading rooms, recreation rooms and other accessories of a modern clubhouse. In order to fulfil the demands of the law a very small section will be reserved as a jail. The Duluth police and officials have been very active in enforcing the prohibition law with the result that arrests for violations have steadily diminished in the last few months. Banks in Former Saloons. St. Louis, Missouri—Four former saloons in New Orleans, Louisiana, are now branch houses of the Hibernia Bank and Trust Company, according to an article published in the "Mid-Continent Banker," which says: "One thing that was not stipulated in the prohibition amendment was what disposition should be made of saloons,

bars, cafes, et cetera. This apparently was left to local option.

"But down in New Orleans," the Hibernia Bank and Trust Company has made four decisions on this question, namely, four branch houses or banking institutions which formerly were wet goods retail stores. And so in the year 1 A. P. (meaning the first year after prohibition) these four trust emporia have been converted into substantial up-to-date banking offices. Thus the Hibernia Bank is answering in a very practical and constructive manner the age-old question which prevailed B. P.

(before prohibition)—What will become of the real estate now occupied by saloons if prohibition succeeds? Is a well-appointed banking house preferable to a saloon? The Hibernia Bank says yes! Jail Used by County Agents. Chicago, Illinois—Two county jails in Pennsylvania, practically depopulated because of the operation of prohibition, are being used to the economic advantage of the agricultural interests of the state, according to an article in the National Stockman and Farmer. One county agricultural agent has established his office and headquarters in a county jail emptied by prohibition while another county jail, also depopulated by the dry laws, has been taken over by a county agent as a home for himself and family. Jail Inmates Disappearing. Sacramento, California—For the first time in twenty years there was not one white prisoner in the city jail on May 17. There has been a gradual drop in the number of arrests since the advent of prohibition. At the county jail it is reported that the percentage of inmates has dropped at least 40 per cent since the nation went dry.

**WORST DAY YET

Only 261 Cans Came in on Sussex Train — Looking to Northumberland and Moncton.

The milk situation in the city is worse this morning than it has been since the recent strike by the Kings county farmers, and although the dairies were able to supply most of their customers, they fear the surplus will not last much after noon today. The hospitals, orphanages and other institutions were supplied the regular amount and the dairies hope they will be able to continue this supply in spite of the existing conditions. There were only about 261 cans of milk sent to the city this morning, about 100 less than yesterday. It is expected, however, that a supply of milk will be brought into the city this afternoon from Northumberland county and in the vicinity of Moncton, as the source here is limited. The dairymen made another visit to Kings county last evening but they were not met with any success, so that the farmers would yield. A limited supply is being obtained from St. John county and many customers are being supplied by individuals from the county, which helps to relieve the situation.

**QUEBEC G. W. V. A.  
CONVENTION OPENS**

(Canadian Press.)  
Quebec, June 19.—The first annual convention of the Great War Veterans' Association, provincial command, opened here at the Drill Hall, yesterday afternoon.

The delegates were greeted by their local conferees and the city authorities and proceeded to the drill hall, where the feature of the session was an address delivered by the president, Lieut. Col. A. MacKenzie Forbes.

Last evening the city of Quebec tendered a dinner to the delegates attending the convention, at Kent House, Montmorency Falls.

Thirty-two branches of the G. W. V. A. are represented at the convention.

**KILLED BY TRAIN.**  
Halifax, June 19.—While crossing the railway tracks at Richmond tonight, Thomas Brown, an aged citizen, was struck by the engine of the Halifax and South Western train and received injuries which resulted in his death a short time after. He was hurried to a hospital and died within an hour. Mr. Brown was about seventy years of age.

**FUNERALS TODAY.**  
The funeral of Mrs. Henry Lowe will be held this afternoon from her late residence, St. Sheriff street, to St. Luke's church, where service will be conducted by Rev. R. P. McKim. Interment will be in Greenwood cemetery.

**CONVENTION OF  
POLICE CHIEFS**

The Canadian Police Bulletin for June has much information concerning the Chief Constables' Association meeting in Moncton on June 29 and 30 and July 1. It expresses the hope that every police chief in Canada may be able to attend. One line says: "Remember Moncton, New Brunswick—it's a fine city." Chief Ridout and the citizens of Moncton are making elaborate arrangements for the convention. The courtesies of the Moncton Club are extended to the visitors. The Bulletin presents excellent large photos of Hon. P. J. Byrne, attorney general and Hon. C. W. Robinson, with these remarks:—

"A Man You Will All Like.

"One of the personalities delegates to the convention will become acquainted with is the Hon. P. J. Byrne, attorney general of New Brunswick. He has evinced keen interest in the convention arrangements. He is the kind of man it does one good to know. In addition to the abilities which he has displayed in private and public life, one of the results of which has been attainment to his present high office, Mr. Byrne has the gift of a fine presence, the gift of oratory combined with a deep and persuasive voice, and an earnestness of manner that bespeaks conviction and carries it too. It is said of him that he has brought his department of government up to a high standard of efficiency because one of the guiding rules of his life may be summed up in the words: 'Whatever is worth doing at all is worth doing well.' Mr. Byrne was born in King's County, Ireland, and was educated in the public schools and in the University of St. Joseph and Dalhousie University, and took his degree of L.L.B. at Ann Arbor University, Michigan. His home is in Bathurst, N. B., where he has a large law practice.

First elected to the New Brunswick legislature in the general elections of 1915, he was appointed attorney general in the Foster cabinet upon its formation, and was re-elected by acclamation after assuming office.

"Meet Hon. C. W. Robinson.

"The Hon. Clifford William Robinson, member without portfolio in the New Brunswick government, who sits for Moncton, is another of the men of that province who has used his influence toward making the coming convention a success. Mr. Robinson has had a long and active career in public life, is able, energetic, companionable and a good speaker. Born in Moncton in 1866 he was educated in the public schools and at Mount Allison Academy and Mount Allison University, graduating from the latter with the degree of B. A. in 1892 and being called to the bar of his native province in 1893. He was first elected to the New Brunswick legislature in 1899, re-elected in 1899, 1903, 1908 and 1917. He was speaker of the assembly for the period 1901-1907 and was a member of the government without portfolio in the latter year. In the same year he became provincial secretary. He held office until 1911 when he resigned. He has been an alderman of the city of Moncton, a member and mayor of his native city, a member of the county council and president of the board of trade. He was again elected to the legislature in 1917, as stated, and is a member of the government without portfolio."

**For Fewer  
Resident  
Engineers**

Hon. J. D. Reid Announces Intention of Government — Lack of Work Given as the Reason — Dredging and Bridges.

(Canadian Press.)  
Ottawa, June 18.—The house divided its attention today between the bills imposing the new forms of taxation announced in the budget and the estimates. Estimates of the public works department and the mines department were under consideration.

The bill to amend the special war revenue act, 1915, which is the measure that imposes the luxury sales and the entertainment taxes, was put through the committee stages. Amendments offered by Sir Henry Drayton, minister of finance, were accepted, but the bill was not carried.

On the suggestion of the minister, the exemption from taxation made in favor of wedding rings, was limited to those of plain gold. He said that it was becoming customary to have wedding rings of platinum set with stones at fashionable weddings. It was not intended to exempt these.

Items under the roads and bridges estimates which were passed included: \$24,200 rebate for the international bridge over St. John river, and \$81,000 for bridge repairs at St. Leonard's, N.B. The total rebate for bridges this year is \$278,650 while the total estimate is \$384,000.

**Fewer Engineers.**  
A rebate of \$600,000 for the maritime provinces and \$450,000 for Ontario and Quebec for dredging was passed. It is reported by Charles Macleod of Banaventure, Hon. J. D. Reid said that it was intended to reduce the number of registered engineers by approximately one-half on account of lack of work.

A. B. Copp, Westministerian, discussed the length of the dismissal of J. K. Scannell an engineer of the public works department in St. John, N. B., while on detention service.

Dr. Reid explained that there were good reasons for Mr. Scannell's dismissal. He would give Mr. Copp information on the point if it was applied for.

**MARINE NOTES.**  
Word reached the city yesterday of the probable loss of the three-masted schooner Eva A. Dannenbower, owned by C. T. White & Son of Sussex. The schooner struck on the southern part of Cape Cod at Sagamore. The crew was saved by the coast guard. Nagle & Wismore are the local agents of the Eva A. Dannenbower, which was in this port only recently with a cargo of coal. It is not as yet known whether or not she can be refloated.

SEES NO DANGER OF BEEF FAMINE

Dr. Mohler Deprecates Alarmist Reports

U. S. Federal Bureau Chief Says 1,200-Pound Steer Can Be Raised in One Year.

Washington, June 19.—"Though meat is not so plentiful in this country as it used to be, I can see no menace of the beef famine that has been predicted so frequently within the last few weeks," said Dr. John R. Mohler, Chief of the Bureau of Animal Industry of the Department of Agriculture, when he was asked for a statement of his views on the food problem. Dr. Mohler deprecates the alarmist stories that have appeared from time to time concerning the menacing shortage of meat products in the United States, and believes that they are grossly exaggerated.

Among the current exaggerations he cited the statement that it will require seven years to replace the 600,000 head of cattle lost to the herds during the past year, or, in other words, that the beef supply cannot regain its 1919 status until 1926. It is also reported that dairy cows have been going to the shambles in large numbers, that our exports of beef fell off 50 per cent in the last year, that the country will soon have to depend on other nations for its meat supply, and that leather may become so scarce that the wooden shoe of the European peasant will find a place in the United States.

Even bankers have taken up the cry of beef famine and are urging their clientele to invest their savings in cattle loans in order to stimulate production.

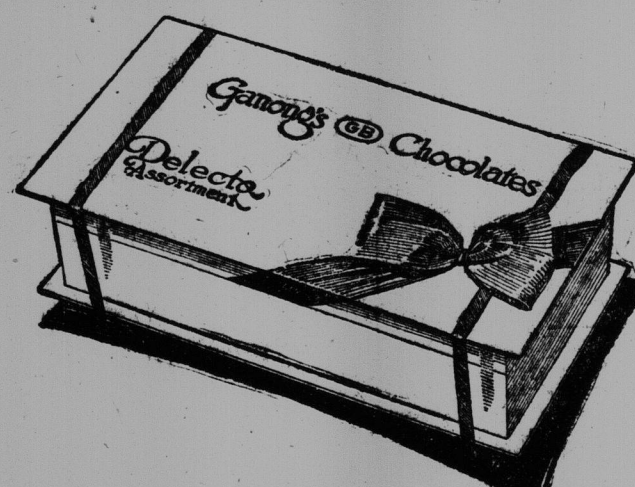
Must Keep up Production.

"When these various stories are subjected to careful scrutiny," said Dr. Mohler, "they are found to rest upon a very frail foundation. We all know that meat is scarce and prices are high. Most of us, indeed, have almost forgotten the taste of sirloin steak. At present, however, I do not feel that a real meat famine threatens the country, but if we are to continue to supply our own needs it is important that our beef production should be kept up and increased to meet the demands of a growing population."

Dr. Mohler took up these stories one by one and proceeded to explode them. He showed that instead of requiring seven years to produce a beef animal, the stockmen of the West, with improved breeding and feeding methods, can now raise a 1,200-pound steer for the market in twelve months. The average time required to produce a marketable beef animal has been reduced nearly one-half within the last two decades. This means, he said, that a given number of cattle offers a potential meat supply of nearly double the former yield. A falling off in numbers therefore, does not necessarily mean fewer pounds of beef.

It may be true that some dairy cows have been slaughtered, as reported, he said, but the statistics compiled by the Department of Agriculture show that within the last year there has been a distinct gain in the numbers of this particular type of animal. It is also true that there was a considerable slump in the exports of beef from this country in 1919 as compared with 1918, but the exports of 1918 were abnormally large on account of the war demand. While the exports of beef fell from 700,000,000 pounds in 1918 to 300,000,000 in 1919, the shipments in the latter year were still eight times as great as those in 1918.

There was a steady increase in the

number of beef cattle in the United States from 1913 to 1918 when the peak of production for the past decade was attained. In this five-year period the number grew from 85,555,000 to 45,085,000, an increase of 26 per cent. During the past year, however, there was an absolute decline of 400,000 head, or slightly more than 1 per cent. According to Dr. Mohler, such a small decrease does not justify sounding the alarm of an approaching meat famine, especially when it is noted that the number of cattle at the beginning of the current year was about 24 per cent greater than in 1918. He believes that some decrease after the war was to be expected.

Discussing the statement that the United States will soon have to look

elsewhere for its meat supply, Dr. Mohler called attention to the fact that during the past ten years, with the exception of 1914, exports of beef from this country have exceeded its imports. "We have not yet reached the point where we have to depend on imported meats," he said, "and if the American people learn to overcome their prejudice against mutton they can satisfy their appetite for meat for a long time to come without drawing upon the resources of other countries."

There is a strange dislike for lamb and mutton in the rural districts of this country, said Dr. Mohler. Only in the Eastern States, and particularly in the metropolitan areas is there a good demand for this article of food. This condition is ascribed to habit or prejudice,

which, it is believed, may be overcome by a campaign for education. The output of pork can be greatly increased also, and this may be expected when conditions forport including exchange rates, become more favorable. The number of hogs decreased about 5,000,000 in the last year, following the slump in their prices in the summer of 1919.

Few Dairy Cows Reported.

As evidence of the popular misunderstanding of the meat problem, Dr. Mohler referred to the outcry which was raised last year when it was announced that several thousand head of dairy cattle were to be exported to France. Fear was expressed that the domestic stocks were being depleted for the benefit of foreign countries. The total number shipped, said Dr. Mohler, was only 11,000 and constituted an infinitesimal portion of the American herds.

"There has been a marked improvement in the quality of cattle produced during the past ten years," Dr. Mohler added, in summing up the live stock situation. "Still greater improvement can be made by the more careful selection of breeding stock, both male and female. The better sires movement, now under way, encouraging the use of high class sires on our farms and ranges, will increase the production of beef. By adopting improved methods of breeding a marketable beef animal can be produced in two years, instead of three of four years, which means greater production even though the total number of animals in the country remains essentially the same. Other factors that will increase our beef supply are better methods of wintering our breeding and feeding stocks and the utilization of all suitable farm roughage."

Rotary Clubs Encourage Singing.

Many Rotary Clubs are incorporating singing as a fixed and vital part of their weekly luncheon. Speaking with one of the leading officers in a club that has made much of the musical side of its meetings, he thus explained to the Toronto Globe, their stand on music:

"Ever think of the value that comes to Rotary and radiates from Rotary through the singing that enters so largely into the unity and enthusiasm of its members at their meetings?" he said.

"The happiest, most generous, most responsive people on earth are the singing people; therefore, the why of Rotary—why it enthralls, energizes and accomplishes—Imagine a club meeting without singing; can you conjure in your imagination anything more dreary? Eliminate the song feature of Rotary and the gloom would be so thick you could cut it with a plate. Abandon song enthusiasm and club guests would not take away with them any of the large impressions that they have of the spirit of Rotary, of its power for accomplishing things and its power for service."

"Have you noticed the public influence that the spirit of the song service in Rotary is having in the community? Haven't you noticed in other organizations, business and social, how singing is more and more featured in gathering after the example from Rotary?"

"But it is among the Rotarians where the great value of the song spirit in Rotary comes home to each of us individually. Two hundred members of our club are singing at their dinner each week, who for years had forgotten to sing, or who, laboring under the impression that they could not sing, have found out differently. There may be lacking something of the technical or cultural, but the songs of the club are the best music in the world, for they come in a care-forgotten spirit of relaxation and associated fellowship that stay with us all through the days that follow. When in the busy afternoon or in the morning after I hear in the corridors of our office building someone
