SIR MAX AS A TARIFF WORKER FOR KINGDOM

Bonar Law and Lieutenant to Fix it All up While in France

HIS LEADER'S CHOICE

Best Financial Judgment of Any of Present Generation of Unionists is the Way it Reads—Drastic Legislation Dealing With Private Banks

(Canadian Press) London, Jan. 30.—The Daily News says during their stay in the south of France, Bonar Law and Sir Max Aitken, will frame a scale of the suggested tariff for the United Kingdom. Sir Max Aitken has been specially asked to assist because of his considerable experience of tariff in his native Canada, and because he is generally believed to have the best financial judgment of any of the present generation of Unionists.

London, Jan. 30.—The government will introduce a drastic banking measure in the forthcoming session of parliament. It will deal with private banks. The bill provides for the deposit of ample securities with the government in the case of new banks, and a deposit of ample securities with the government in the case of existing banks. Marketed at Winnipeg Monthly in Excess of Last Year

Winnipeg, Jan. 30.—Some 76,128,000 bush of grain have been marketed on the P. R. this year against 52,128,000 bush for the same period last year. Of the total, 61,700,000 bushels are wheat and 14,428,000 other grains, while of the 48,000 bushels, 43,007,000 bushels were wheat and 5,000,000 other grains. Saturday the company marketed 899 bushels of wheat and 62,000 bushels other grains.

FIRST SHOT IN THE STRIKE IS FIRED

Only One But it is Effective in Labor Trouble in Lawrence

Massachusetts Mill City Practically Under Martial Law—Militia Force Strikers to Disperse at Point of Bayonet

(Canadian Press) Lawrence, Mass., Jan. 30.—In repelling an attempt of a body of strikers to cross the Merrimack River into the mill district early this morning the militiamen fired their first shot of the strike. No one was injured, and when a patrol crossed the bridge a few minutes afterward, they found no one near the scene. Soldiers on guard saw a body of men gathering on the other side of the river, presumably preparing to cross the river, as it had been rumored they would. One of the strikers fired his rifle and the shot was effective in driving back the strikers. In the plains district, when a body of strikers attempted to form a parade about the time the mills were opening, the militia forced them to disperse at the point of bayonets. Several strikers are said to have been hurt. The strikers showed much feeling and were slow in retreating when the order was given by the military officers.

CONSERVATIVE CHARGED AS BREAKER OF THE PLEDGE HE ENDORSED

Hon. Mr. Graham's Campaign in South Renfrew is Opened—Mr. Low Gives the Facts

Edmonton, Ont., Jan. 30.—Hon. George P. Graham, former minister of railways and canals, and now candidate for election to the House of Commons from South Renfrew, opened his campaign here last night. A feature of the meeting was an explanation by Thomas Low, ex-M.P., of the steps leading up to his resignation in the spring of 1908, and his subsequent election to the House of Commons from South Renfrew. Mr. Low charged Dr. McEwen with breaking the pledge in the 1908 election by announcing his own candidature.

ST. JOHN INCLUDED IN SCOPE OF THIS MEETING

Executive of Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers in Session in Toronto

Toronto, Ont., Jan. 30.—The executive board of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, having jurisdiction over the territory between Chicago and St. John, N. B., met in Toronto yesterday for their business session and election of officers. Daniel Cameron, of Allandale, Ont., chairman of the organization, said the matters under discussion had been of a nature purely internal to the brotherhood, and nothing had come up in any way affecting relations with railroad companies.

COLD WEATHER GOOD EXCUSE TO BREAK LEASE

Montreal Judge's Decision of Interest to Landlords and Tenants

Montreal, Jan. 30.—There is no longer need for tenants to remain in uncomfortably cold houses, no matter what the length of the lease. Judge Charbonneau declared in the practice court yesterday, that cold weather was a sufficient excuse for breaking a lease. Michael McBearty lived above a vacant and unheated store. His water and gas pipes became frozen, with the result that the supply of both commodities was on several occasions, cut off. The court ordered the cancellation of the lease, freeing the plaintiff from all obligations thereunder.

CREW PICKED UP AT SEA

Devonport, Eng., Jan. 30.—All members of the crew of the British brig Bellarosa from Macao, Brazil, for St. John's, Nfld., have been picked up by the French bark Valparaiso from Iquique for Dover. The report does not give details as to what happened to the Bellarosa.

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Quiet Again in Bahia Rio de Janeiro, Jan. 30.—Order has been completely restored in Bahia which had been in a state of virtual anarchy for several days since the withdrawal of the former Governor, Aurelio Viana, who took refuge in the French consulate.

ECHOES OF McNAMARA CASE HEARD

Looks Like Probe Into Expenditure of the \$225,000 Expense Fund

JURY CALLS WITNESSES

Secretary of Labor Federation and Cashier of Bank Will Produce Trunks of Records—Story of the Indictment of Darrow for Bribery

(Canadian Press) Washington, Jan. 30.—Frank Morrison, secretary of the American Federation of Labor, and Henry H. Fletcher, cashier of the Riggs National Bank, which is the depository of the federal funds and also for the McNamara defense fund, have been subpoenaed to appear on February 1 before the federal grand jury in connection with the investigation of the dynamite plots. The records for which the grand jury asks will fill two large trunks. The subpoena directs Morrison to produce cancelled checks and records of all receipts and disbursements made by the federation or by himself, between April 23, 1911, and January 30, 1912.

San Francisco, Calif., Jan. 30.—The San Francisco "Call" prints today a special dispatch from Los Angeles stating that Mr. Morrison intends to produce the grand jury a confession of the McNamara defense fund. FORMER GOVERNOR OF NEW BRUNSWICK DEAD IN LONDON

London, Jan. 30.—Baron Stanmore died here today in his 84th year. He was one of the most prominent British colonial officials. He held the position of lieutenant-governor of a large number of British colonies, including New Brunswick, Trinidad, Mauritius, Fiji, New Zealand and the Cape of Good Hope. He was born in London, although he took very little part in politics.

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MORE BOMB THROWING IN CHINA

Conditions Appear to Be Growing Worse; Life is Not Safe

HOMES BEING RAIDED

(Canadian Press) London, Jan. 30.—Bombs were thrown early this morning at the residences of the viceroy and the commanding general at Tien Tsin, but the attempts to destroy the houses, with their occupants, among whom were several important officials, were unsuccessful. According to a news agency despatch received this morning several arrests were made and it is believed the would-be assassins are among the prisoners.

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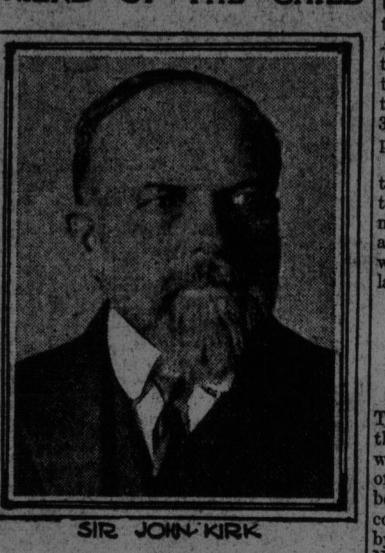
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SIR JOHN KIRK

A GREAT CONGRESS

The spirit which animated the conference of members of the St. John and Fredericton boards of trade in this city yesterday is the spirit which will build up New Brunswick. It was well expressed by President Jennings of the Fredericton board when he said that the different localities must set aside all sectional feeling, work together to develop the province and each take its share of the fruits of that development without jealousy or discontent.

In that spirit the conference yesterday decided to call a great provincial congress at Fredericton, while the legislature is in session, and to invite representatives of boards of trade, towns and municipal councils, farmers' associations, transportation companies and the editors of the newspapers in the province. The movement is entirely non-political, and is heartily supported by men of one party as well as of another.

The house of commons has adopted a resolution to the effect that the government should speedily inaugurate a better immigration and development policy with respect to the maritime provinces. This is another step in advance.

A Conservative caucus is to be held at Ottawa tomorrow to discuss the government programme for the session. This is the first intimation that there was any real programme, except head hunting and appointing commissions and keeping Mr. Bourassa quiet.

Hon. Robert Maxwell said last night that the policy of the government was not so much to bring immigration as to keep our own young men on the farms. In this a hint that the roads are to be improved, or a warning to the immigration congress?

The St. John business men who proved last year that there was money in potato culture, and who will demonstrate that there is money in commercial orchards, will also endeavor to prove that there is profit in sheep-raising in New Brunswick. Good luck to them. They are doing spade work for the good of the whole province.

Premier Fleming said some time ago that \$20,000,000 would be spent in development work in New Brunswick in five years. He now places the figure at \$25,000,000. If the developments at St. John are carried out in full, the Times believes Mr. Fleming is still below the mark.

This is the growing time for New Brunswick, and it will not be confined to St. John and the St. John valley.

The news comes from England that Sir Max Aitken has been chosen as the tariff expert of the Unionist party, because of his experience in tariff matters in Canada. No doubt Sir Max knows the duty on cement, and he may have a copy of the Canadian tariff concealed about his person. It may also be that there is no problem in the United Kingdom or the Empire which he cannot solve off-hand; but it may also be that Sir Max is becoming a bit of a joke.

The death of Baron Stammers recalls the stirring times just before confederation. As Arthur Hamilton Gordon he was governor of New Brunswick from 1861 until 1868, the year before the union of the provinces. He was born in 1820, and was the fourth son of the fourth Earl of Aberdeen. Educated at Oxford, he became private secretary to the British prime minister in 1852, and from 1854 till 1857 was a member of parliament. In 1858-59 he was secretary to a special mission to Cuba, and in 1861 came to New Brunswick. He was governor of Trinidad from 1866 till 1870, Mauritius, 1871-74; Fiji, 1875-80; New Zealand, 1880-82; high commissioner and colonial general in the Southern Pacific, 1883-85; governor of Ceylon, 1888-90.

Among his writings were Wilderness Journeys in New Brunswick, 1864; Story of a Little War, 1879, and a Life of Lord Aberdeen, 1881. He was created Baron Stammers in 1883.

Washington, Jan. 30.—Senator Brewster, of Kansas, yesterday introduced a bill, the enactment of which he contends would restore the American merchant marine and establish competition between ocean and rail traffic in the coastwise trade by way of Panama.

The bill would reduce the Isthmian Canal Commission from seven to three members on January 1, 1913, and have the three commissioners control the operation of the canal and the zone government. The bill would fix a toll of 81 a net registered ton for all ships; fifty cents a ton for all American vessels, the owners of which agree to permit their use as auxiliary cruisers in war, and twenty-five cents a ton to all coastwise craft on the same conditions.

The bill would prohibit railroad ownership of any ships using the canal and any combinations between rail and water lines.

The appointment of W. W. Gray as permanent engineer at \$720 a year was recommended.

The director's recommendation that W. J. Blackhouse & Son be allowed \$1,200 a year instead of \$800 for maintaining the ambulance and patrol wagon was rejected on the grounds that it would be unfair to the other tenderers.

On motion the chief of police was instructed to be present at all meetings of the safety board.

W. F. Barnhill's application for twelve acres of land in Lancaster for \$2,500 was ordered filed.

The application of Randolph & Baker for certain lots at Greenhead and of Beverly Stevens for several lots on the Mahogany Road were laid over for further consideration.

The director recommended that the Union Ice Company's offer of \$1,500 for four lots on the west side, valued by the assessors at \$400 a lot, be accepted. Several votes were taken on this offer.

 She returned later on February 6, 1911, the lawyer said, there was a violent scene. Durieux had lost heavily at the gambling tables. The police had to be called in to establish peace in the house.
 Counsel explained that although when the present suit was started, no alimony had been asked, Mme. Durieux now asks \$1,000 a month, because of the manner in which the case has been conducted. She saves the question of provision for her children to the discretion of the courts.
 Durieux's counsel made no contradiction of the facts alleged by the plaintiff. He pleaded only that if the court obtained a country into the facts, due weight should be given to the circumstances that there had been a reconciliation meeting before the trial judge, who had decided in favor of the plaintiff.

R.VIVE SHEEP RAISING IN NEW BRUNSWICK
 Local Capitalists Have Conference With Dominion Expert

W. T. Rich, dominion government sheep raising expert, met a group of local capitalists and others interested in sheep farming, last evening in the offices of Wm. Thomson & Co. and discussed with them the establishment of sheep ranches in this province along modern lines. The local men will furnish more exact data regarding local conditions and on further investigation Mr. Rich will report more definitely on the amount of profit that could be made on the money invested. It is expected that this movement will be the beginning of a revival of this business in New Brunswick.
 Mr. Rich is very enthusiastic about the possibilities of the province for sheep raising. He says that the climatic conditions are ideal for raising the best mutton and the highest quality wool and that the situation gives New Brunswick a unique position for taking advantage of the world's markets. He criticizes the methods that have been in use in this province in the past and insists that the most intelligent care must be devoted to the care of the sheep. With proper handling, he says that it should be the most profitable branch of farming here although requiring very little capital and very little labor.

LATTER DAY ADVANCES IN AERIAL FLIGHT
 English Aviator Tells of Progress Being Made—The Silent Journey Through Air

London, Jan. 29.—"People are afraid of aeroplanes, but while the aeroplane is flying frequently from town to town silence will become imperative. So says Lorry O'Garra, superintendent of the army aeroplanes factory at Farnborough, who has turned out the new all-British 'silence' aeroplanes that the experts have been demanding.
 "As a matter of fact," he says, "silence is very easy to attain. It means a slow little step in advance."
 "As far as I know, this is the first absolutely silent aeroplane. It is silent to this extent, that when the wind is blowing strongly from it toward you, you cannot hear it."
 "A military aviator who was present remarked that there were other machines with which he was acquainted which it would not have been able to get up in, considering the wind that was blowing. I see no reason why every aeroplane which does not employ a rotary engine should not be silent. It is a very simple matter. The reason why it has been put in the background hitherto is because other matters have required more attention, but everyone knew that the moment for silence could be given—all events—on a large class of engines."
 "There is a certain loss of power in silencing, but there is no difficulty about it beyond just a careful study of the engine propulsion. Silence will become very important when the confidence that will come as soon as the 'shudders' have left aeroplanes has arrived."
 "You can imagine, for example, that it might be worth a man's while, instead of taking a special train, to be carried along what might be called the postal aeroplane, over land and Liverpool. He comes from the continent and wants to get to America, and on such a route as that silence would be a very big advantage."
 The extent to which the weather delays or controls the doing of an aviator depends largely on two things—the speed of his machine; the greater the speed the less he is affected by the relative fluctuations in the speed of the wind. The other thing is that his means of control of his balance shall be very powerful in response to a small effort on his part, and by making a small effort he shall obtain a large result."

MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRES

The Chinese imperial army yesterday met with a crushing defeat at Kuangshing, according to a London news despatch. Kuangshing is about 120 miles north of Nanking.
 Mayor W. A. Dismore of St. Stephen is expected to be appointed mayor tomorrow by Coun. J. R. Polley. He has been thirteen years on the board, eleven as councillor and two as mayor.
 F. T. Osgood, ex-M.P. for the Yukon arrived in Ottawa yesterday from Dawson City bringing with him unique and valuable gifts from the people of the far northern country to Sir Wilfrid Laurier. He says the gifts were subscribed to regardless of politics, for the people in the far north of Canada have a sincere affection for Sir Wilfrid and his "Grand Old Man."
 An Italian woman was shot, Policeman Oscar Benoit stabbed, and several persons injured in a riot between the police and the strikers. The police were getting the worst of it from the mob when the militia arrived and at the double quick charged with fixed bayonets. It is thought many of the strikers were badly injured. Governor Ross has ordered more troops to the scene.

MORNING LOCALS

Already \$10,000 has been raised by friends of Mount Allison University to fund a St. John chair at the institution, which will be the first of its kind in the province. The National Council of Women of Canada is holding a meeting in Ottawa, and the officials at Ottawa explained that statistics proved that women live longer than men, hence the larger fee is necessary.
 "Our annuities pay the fee (85c. a week or more) and take a choice of plan, or 25c. The business is transacted between the person and the government through the nearby post-office.
 Under plan "A," in the event of death before the first payment of the annuity falls due, the total amount which the annuitant has paid in, with three per cent compound interest, will be refunded to her or her legal representative. Under plan "B," where the same annuity is obtainable for smaller payments, there will be no return in the event of death before the annuity becomes due.
 The government is responsible for the cost of the working machinery. No deductions are made from payments, but all expenses of whatever kind are borne by the government wholly without charge, and every cent paid, with compound interest thereon, at four per cent, is placed to the credit of the purchaser of an annuity. No medical examination is required, and there are no lapses or penalties.
 A parent may start an annuity for a child of five years, which gives the child the benefit of the annuity at greater earning value. The practice teaches the child in later years the habit of saving, induces thrift, checks idleness, and promotes temperance; and it has been provided by statute that no person or law can deprive the man or woman of the annuity.—The Canadian Magazine.

DUKE OF FIFE IS DEAD

Was Brother-in-law of King George—A Disaster Voyage

Assuan, Upper Egypt, Jan. 29.—The Duke of Fife died at 6 o'clock this evening.

The Duke of Fife who has just died of pleurisy and congestion at Assuan, Upper Egypt, was a nephew of the late King Edward, whose daughter, the Princess Louise Victoria, Alexandra Dagmar, he married in 1889. He succeeded his father as sixth Earl of Fife in 1879 and was created duke on his marriage.

He was born Nov. 10, 1839, and was educated at Eton. He afterwards took a great interest in business and was a partner in the London banking firm of Sir Samuel Scott & Company, as well as vice-president of the British South African Company.

He was a colonel of volunteers and deputy lieutenant of the Scottish Counties of Aberdeen and Banff. He was a Liberal member of parliament from 1874 to 1879. He leaves two daughters.

The duke's death will cause the curtailment or modification of all projected arrangements at Portsmouth and London for the reception of King George and Queen Mary on their return from India. It is probable that all the festivities will be shorn of military display and state ceremonial. The court functions in the early spring also will be modified.

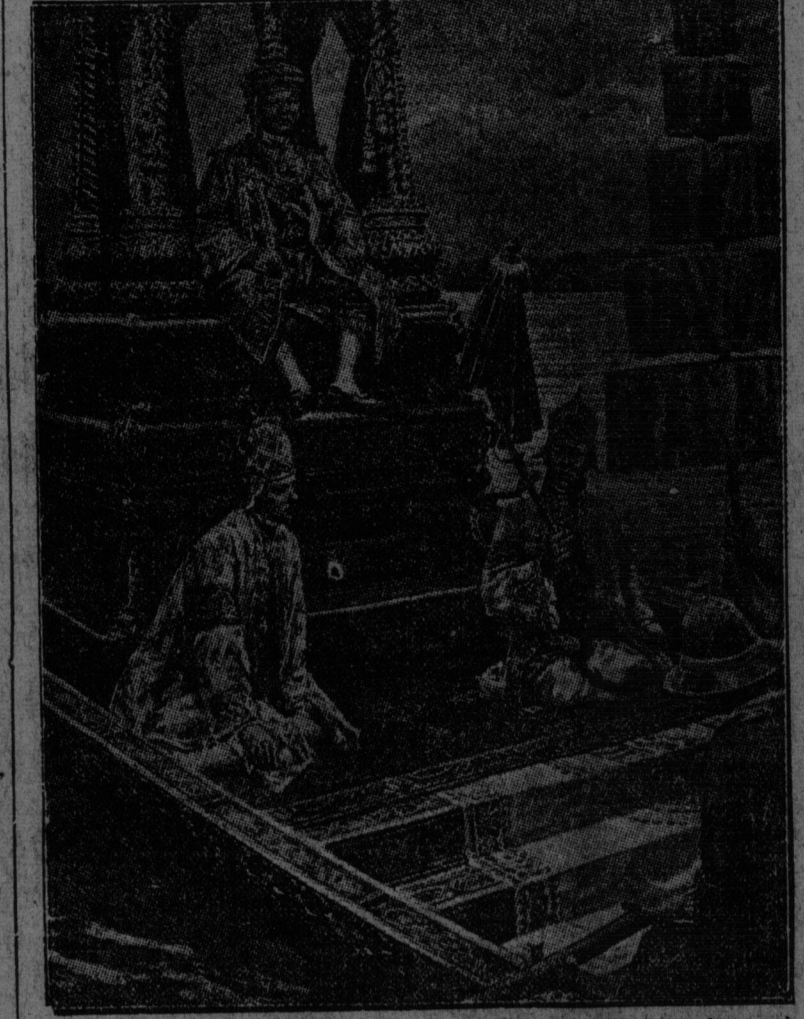

PROVINCIAL POLITICS

Premier Fleming and Hon. John Morrisey on Platform—No Party Lines The Plea

Newcastle, N. B., Jan. 29.—Premier Fleming and Chief Commissioner Morrisey met a representative gathering of their followers in town hall this afternoon. Ald. Clark in the chair, with George McDade as secretary.

Premier Fleming expressed a desire to have the local government independent of federal issues. Provincial interests should be paramount. He would accept support from all who favored the provincial government asking no questions as to their federal affiliations.

He said the province was in line for great development. The St. John Valley Railway and Albert County shall indicate would cause the expenditure of \$20,000,000. New Brunswick would develop as fast as the west.

Hon. Mr. Morrisey, D. P. McLachlan and T. W. Platt spoke along similar lines. Mr. Platt urged a new railway from Newcastle to Tracadie. Ald. Butler spoke in glowing terms of this province's agricultural capabilities.

J. M. Falconer wanted more industries established.

T. W. Platt asked why wool for pulp mills should pay more stampage than other lumber of the same quality.

The premier said it would be rectified. Messrs. Platt and J. W. Meresseau enquired about bridge matters. The chief commissioner said that soundings had been taken and he would recommend to the government a new bridge between Newcastle and Nelson to take the place of the present bridge over the Southwest.

Mr. Morrisey highly complimented Premier Fleming and Hon. Mr. Hagen and urged the early holding of a local government convention in this county to line up for emergencies.

Messrs. Beta, Meresseau, Weldon, O'Brien, of Rogersville, and Philip McIntyre were appointed a committee to enquire into the advisability of holding a convention. The meeting adopted their report and voted to hold a convention here on Feb. 13 at 3 o'clock.

The premier then outlined the government's policy, which favored developing of the lumber industry, building the Valley Railway, encouraging mining and other industries and demonstrating orchards. The government, if any company bought land for an orchard, and planted trees, would take over and run said orchard free for six years and hand it back to the company ready to bear fruit. St. John, Moncton and Woodstock had taken the offer.

Ald. Butler said he would accept the offer of a Northumberland orchard for Newcastle.

THE FORESTRY CONVENTION

Ottawa, Jan. 29.—Gifford Pinchot, president of the American Conservation Association, and formerly chief forester of the United States, is to be the chief speaker at the Canadian Forestry convention here on Feb. 7 and 8. This gathering, in which the government shows its interest by allowing it to be held in the railway committee room of the parliament buildings; and to the delegates of which the railways have granted special rates, will be one of the most important of this nature ever held in Canada. It will be attended by cabinet ministers, parliamentary leaders, bankers, manufacturers, lumbermen, forest administrators, heads of universities and by the representatives of that new profession, forest engineers.

The principal men interested in forestry in Canada, and many from the United States will attend. The subject discussed will be how to get the most out of Canada's forests today, while leaving them in the best shape for future production. A social function will be a banquet on Feb. 7, which prominent men from all over Canada have signified their intention of attending.

The Seed Growers' Association will meet in the same week, so that delegates to the Forestry Convention can take in the most important sessions of that body if they so desire.

STEEL REVISION BILL PASSED

Washington, Jan. 29.—The steel revision bill reducing the duties of the Payne-Aldrich act from 25 to 30 per cent, passed the house late this afternoon. The Democrats had difficulty in shutting off a constant flow of amendments from the Republican leaders, but at 3.30 p. m. secured a record vote of the previous question. Then came another delay and another roll call when the Republicans moved to recommence the measure to await a report of the tariff board.

The bill was passed by 210 to 109, twenty insurgent Republicans voting with the Democrats.

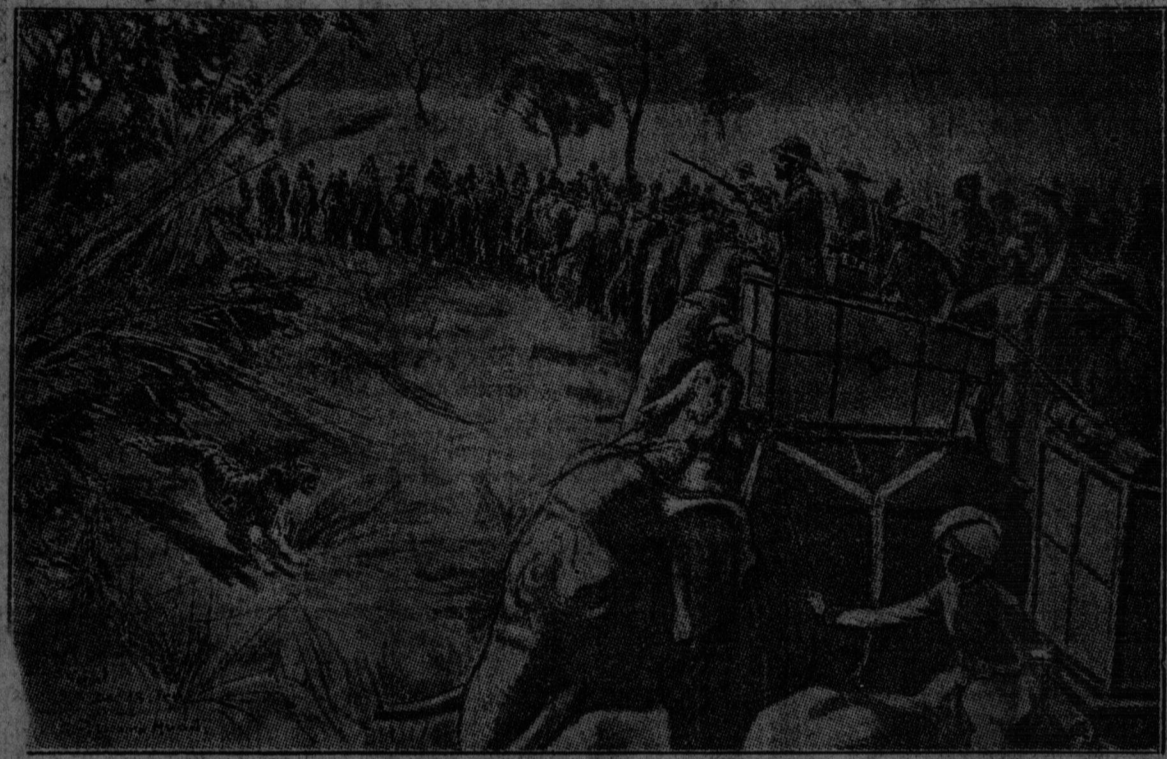

ANOTHER NEW OPERA

New York Hears Versieghel By the Metropolitan Forces. It is well received. Melodious and Pleasing—Cadalki Triumphant in Principal Part—Hammerstein's London Venture Not All Plain Sailing.

(Times Special Correspondence) New York, Jan. 27.—The Metropolitan is busier than the proverbial bee in presenting "first-time" operas. Although the season is only half finished a third production has been made the newest and shortest yet heard. This opera is a one-act affair called "Versieghel" (Sealed Up) by Leo Blech, first conductor at the Berlin Royal Opera. Like the two previous new operas—"Lobentanz" and "Les Danaes Oublies"—already heard at the Metropolitan this year—it is humorous.

Though it may seem strange, "Versieghel" is not modern in musical construction, nor does any page in the score breathe with the dissonance which the composer of today is so fond of using. On the contrary this charming little piece is melodious at all times, and though the orchestration is masterful and filled with color it is never heavy. This is largely due to the fact that Blech rarely uses the brass instruments.

NEW BRUNSWICK AT SPORTSMEN'S SHOW

The forests and streams of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, their game and game fish and quail will have a strong representation in the 1912 Sportsmen's Show which will open on March 1 at Madison Square Garden, New York. The New Brunswick government will have space in the garden and various organizations will be represented including the Provincial Guides' Association and the Provincial Tourist Association. The general supervision of the combined New Brunswick exhibit will be in the hands of W. H. Allen of Fredericton, N. B. one of the most experienced men in hunting, fishing and camp life in the province. The New Brunswick friends in the public and their New York friends in a typical log cabin, decorated with trophies of the hunt, will be an attractive feature of wild animals in captivity including deer, bear, cougar, porcupine, beaver, mink, otter and sable. Some of the New Brunswick exhibits will arrive in New York ahead of the Sportsmen's Show opening to attend a dinner on February 26 given by the Canadian Club at the Hotel Astor. The possibility of having a large number to roam over the artificial mountains on the big stage where the trap shooting and fly casting tournament will be held is being considered by an enthusiastic New Brunswicker.

THE NEW SPORTING ANNUAL

The best little sporting reference book of the year is the "Police Gazette Sporting Annual" for 1912 published by Richard K. Fox. It is a compilation of best performance in all branches of sports; ably compiled and edited by Sam C. Austin, well-known sporting writer and critic. The athletic records are the records of the Amateur Athletic Union, officially accepted by that organization; the rowing, yachting, racing, trotting, punting, automobile, bicycling, football, aquatic and swimming records, made all over the world, are of officially correct. The baseball statistics were furnished by the National Baseball Commission, and include the details of the world's championship series. The main feature of the book, however, is the pugilistic records, and includes the history of every boxer of prominence in the world. This excellent book is made doubly attractive by its high-class illustrations and photos of the champions. It is authentic and reliable, and stands out as an authority on the subjects upon which it treats. The price is ten cents; postage two cents extra.

BECAME WELL KNOWN

The "Black Watch" was raised in 1720 and consisted of six companies; three companies consisted of 100 men each and other three of seventy-five men each. To distinguish them from royal troops they wore tartans of a dark color, from which they derived the name of the "Black Watch." In 1730 the government determined to add to their number, which was raised to 1000 men, who ministered for the first time near Edinburgh, between Aberfeldy and West Perthshire. Up to this period each company was dressed in tartan selected by its commander, but as the companies were now to form a regiment it was necessary to have a uniform dress. The first colonel, Lord Crawford, being a Lowlander, and having no tartan of his own, a new tartan different from any other was manufactured for the whole regiment. This ultimately became the well known "black" or "Black Watch" tartan, which is composed of various shades of black, green and blue.
