

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

17. What new Rules are now made.

by virtue of his office, be a member of the Conference fellowing the one over which he presides.

2. The Secretary of the Conference shall, for the future, be the Greneral Committee Delegate to the Conference following the one of which he is Secretary.

3. That question 14th, of the Historical account of the Stations, shall henceforth read as follows:—How many Officials are on your Station? and how many of them are total abstainers from all intoxicating drinks?

4. In future, Stations are allowed to give to per cent in books to Juvenile Collectors for our Missionary Society, when the authorities believe such distribution of prizes will encourage the Collectors.

5. The legislation from Hamilton District, respecting the formation of a Church Extension Fund, shall be referred to a Committee, who shall prepare a scheme, and submit it to the February Quarterly Meetings of our Stations, and report to the next Conference. The Committee shall be Brothers Markham, Herridge, Bee, R. Walker, and I. Crompton, who shall be Convener.

6. The above named fund shall be called "The Loan and Grant Fund."

PROBATIONERS' EXAMINATION.

7. The appointment of the last Conference, respecting the Examination of Ministerial Probationers, is hereby cancelled, and the following regulations are substituted for it.

(x.) There shall be a Central Bramming Committee of act fewer than six Ministers, who shall prepare a first of questions on the books of study for Ministerial Probationers; and they shall meet for this purpose in the month of August.

(2.) The questions shall be sent to the Superintendents of the Probationers, or the nearest Superintendents in full connexion who may be their tutors, to be submitted to the

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probationers, at some place where they determine on, the first Tuesday and Wednesday in April. Two days only shall be allowed for the Examination.

(3.) The answers to the questions shall be given in writing, under the supervision of the Superintendents, and without the aid of books.

(4.) The Superintendents shall send the manuscripts to the Central Committee, in time for the meeting of the Committee.

(5.) The Central Committee shall meet on the second Wednesday in April, to examine the manuscripts; and shall send the result of their examinations to the District Meetings to which the Probationers are amenable; and the District Meeting shall deal with the Probationers, respecting their studies, as their cases may require; and report to the Conference.

(6.) The expenses of the Examination shall be met by each, as apportioned by the Central Committee.

RELIEF FUND.

8. The rules touching claimants on this Fund shall be rescinded, and the following substituted:

(1.) There shall be no allowance granted in any case for the first two weeks of sickness.

(2.) There shall be no allowance made on behalf of any preacher's sickness during the first two years of his probation

(3.) The Station applying for aid from this Fund must show the amount of hired help that has been employed on the Station; and if such help has not been obtained, must show how the appointments have been supplied.

(4.) The Stations which may have claims on the Fund shall pay the sick preachers their allowances, and the Stations shall apply, according to rule, for their claims on the Fund.

(5.) The time allowed for a probationer being on the Fund shall not be longer than six months; and that of a preacher in full connexion shall not be more that 15 months.

SALF OF PROPERTY.

- 9. The application of Bowmanville Circuit authorities to sell their church property at Kirby, shall be granted; and the proceeds of the sale shall be devoted to parsonage purposes on the Circuit.
- 10. The application of Brampton Circuit, for permission to sell the site of an old church on Lot 9, Con. 3, Toronto Township, be granted.
- 11. The application of Etobicoke Circuit, for permission to sell Carmel church property, be granted.
- 12. The application of Orangeville Circuit, for permission to sell Zion Church property, be granted.
- 13. The application of Guelph Mission, for permission to sell church property in Nassagawa, be granted, and the proceeds be applied to Guelph Church debt.
- 14. The application of Guelph Mission, for permission to sell Galt church, be granted, and the proceeds shall be loaned to Guelph Church Trustees, at a small rate of interest.
- 15. The application of Barrie Mission, for permission to sell their lot in Barrie, be granted; as they have purchased a more eligible one, on which to build a church.
- 16. That the application of Brant Mission, for permission to sell the acre of land deeded to them for Missionary purposes, be granted; and the proceeds to be applied to the Missionary Society.

METHODIST UNION.

17. That however desirable in some respects an amalgamation of all the Methodist churches in the Dominion is, yet in view of the action of some of the Methodist Bodies on this subject, and the relations we sustain to the Home Body, and which relations we wish to retain, we deem such amalgamation at present impracticable.

VOTES OF SYMPATHY.

18. That we sympathise with Brother Cheetham in the circumstances which lead to the necessity of his seeking

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superannuation, and hope that he may be spared to labor in another sphere.

19. That we deeply sympathise with Brother Matthews, and trust his health will be so restored as to enable him to resume ministerial labors.

-20. That we also offer Brother Boyes our sympathy in his continued affliction, and hope that he may yet be restored to the active work of our ministry.

21. That we deeply sympathise with our friends on the Kirkton Mission, in the pecuniary difficulties connected with their parsonage, and as soon as the funds will allow, one hundred dollars shall be advanced to them.

ENGLISH REPRESENTATIVES.

22. That our President, the Rev. S. Antliff, and Councillors Robson and Johnson, be our Representatives to the English Conference of 1872; and that Rev. Wm. Antliff, D.D., and J. Beckworth, Esqr., and Captain McCulloch, be their Vices.

FRENCH CANADIAN MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

23. That as a Conference we re-affirm our confidence in the French Canadian Missionary Society; are thankful for its success, commend it to the sympathy and support of our membership; and are obliged to the Rev. T. Byrne for presenting its claims to us.

TRAVELLING TO CONFERENCE OF 1872.

24. That to meet the case of extra travelling expenses to the next Conference, each person entitled to expenses paid shall go short of his actual expenses such a sum as will be necessary to prevent a larger expenditure than the next year's income of the Conference Fund.

INSTITUTE DEBT.

25. Those Stations which have not raised their quota towards the debt of the late Institute are required to do so at once, and forward the amount to the General Secretary.

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RELIEF FUND.

26. That in tonsequence of the low state of the Fund, and the many claims upon it, all our Ministers are requested to collect what money they can on behalf of it.

EDITORSHIP OF " CHRISTIAN JOURNAL."

27. That we tender our warmest thanks to Brother Crompton for the very efficient manner in which he has conducted the "Christian Journal" during the past five years; and trust that he may be long spared to serve the Church.

That Brother W. Rowe be the Editor of the "Christian Journal."

VOTES OF THANKS.

28. That we record our thanks to the Grand Trunk, Great Western, and Northern Railway Companies, and also to the Canadian Inland Steam Navigation Company, for allowing our Ministers and Delegates to travel to Conference at reduced fares.

- 29. That we express our gratitude to the inhabitants of Brampton, for their liberality and generosity in entertaining the Ministers and Delegates composing the Conference; and also to Brother Herridge, for his exertions in this matter.
- 30. That our thanks are hereby given to the Rev. J. R. Swift, for his excellent Ordination Address.
- 31. That as a Conference we cannot separate without expressing our warm esteem for our President, the Rev. S. Antliff; and tender him our hearty thanks for the excellent sermons and addresses he has delivered at our public services, and the high administrative abilities he has displayed as our Presiding Officer.
- 32. That we record our thanks to the Vice-President, the Secretary, and his assistants, for the faithful manner in which they have discharged their duties.

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Report of the Temperance Committee.

- 1. That we recognize in the liquor traffic one of the greatest evils (if not the greatest) in existence; and that we consider the drinking usages and customs of society a great barrier to the spread of the gospel.
- 2. That while all our Itinerant Ministers are total abstainers, yet some of our Local Preachers are not, a matter which we deeply deplote; and we recommend that question No.11, on Historical Account of Stations, be so changed, that Conference shall be informed how many Local Preachers on the Station are total abstainers from all total toxicating drinks; as we consider that every Preacher in our Church, both Itinerant and Lay, ought to be true to the Temperance question.
- 3. Your Committee recommend the formation of Temperance Societies in connection with all our Churches and Sabbath Schools.
- 4. We heartily recommend to the support of the members of this Conference the "Prohibitory League" recently formed in Toronto.
- 5. We pledge ourselves, as a Conference, to help to the utmost of our power the efforts of all good men who desire and labor to mitigate the evils of, or altogether to suppress, the Liquor Traffic:

Report of the Committee on Sabbath Observance and Sabbath Schools.

Your Committee beg to report that they have received a lengthy and earnest document on the important subject of Sabbath Observance, from Dr. Mair, Secretary of the Kingston Sabbath Reformation Society. This communication calls attention to the alarming increase of Sabbath desceration upon the railways, canals, and wharves of this Pominion, and asks the co-operation of this Conference in checking the growth of this advancing evil. It further proposes that a Convention of Ministers and Laymen, representing the various Evangelical Religious Bodies of the country, be called at an early date, to adopt measures for the suppression of the above-mentioned evil.

Your Committee submit for your adoption the following Resolutions:—I. That we approve and recommend that a Committee, as proposed, consisting of Ministers and Laymen, be called together.

- 2. That, if possible, this Convention be held at the time and place of the approaching Provincial Sabbath School Convention, the day before the Sessions of the above-mentioned gathering, of the day after.
- 3. That we urge upon all our Ministers the importance of preaching occasionally on the subject of Sabbath Observance.

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SABBATH SCHOOLS.

Your Committee having examined the position of our Sabbath Schools, are glad to be able to report progress in this department of our work. The increase for the year is as follows:—Two Schools, trenty-seven Teachers, and one hundred and sixty scholars. We are thankful to God for this advancement; but believe that by continued and earnest effort our success in this interesting field of Christian labor may become still more satisfactory.

We recommend that addresses be delivered to our schools as often as practicable, and also to the friends and patrons, by all our Ministers. We further recommend that Circuit Sabbath School Conventions be held in all our Circuits and Missions annually or semi-annually. Arrangements to be made by the Circuits and Missions for the above mentioned meetings.

We also earnestly call attention to the importance of supplying our Sabbath Schools with sound literature; and this, we think, can and should be found at our own Book Room.

Report of the Ordination Committee.

The brethren were also examined on Theological subjects, and on the polity of the Connexion, and the answers given were on the whole commendable.

We have pleasure in recommending these brethren to full Connexional standing in our Ministry; and hope they will, with increasing devotion, give themselves to the work of saving souls, and building up the church of Christ.

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Report of the General Committee.

The General Committee beg to Roport :- 1. That at the first Quarterly Meeting of the year they made the necessary arrangements for placing the Probationary Preachers under Tutors, as recommended by the last Conference. They appointed the time when the collections on behalf of the Educational Fund should be made, and instructed Brothers Goodman and Herridge to apportion among the Circuits of Toronto and Brampton Districts the sums those Districts should raise towards the indebtedness of the late Institute. Farther on in the year, they arranged for the Examination of Probationary Preachers, according to the requirement of last Conference. The first or semi-annual Examination was held on the last day of November and 1st of December, in Toronto. The Committee also appointed the Rev. Dr. Antliff, of Sunderland; Mr. Councillor James, of Derby; and Mr. Councillor Robson, of Hull, to be our Representatives at the present Conference. Several of the Stations not having paid their portion of the indebtedness of the Institute, the Committee called npon them to do so.

- 2. A dispute having arisen between Orangeville and Albion Stations, respecting the single Preacher of the first Station being returned by that Circuit to Albion, the Committee decided that the Preacher had not failed in his pledge.
- 3. The Rev. Wm. Cook being superannuated by the last Conference, applied for his removal expenses, and the Committee not knowing what fund these should be paid from, have referred the matter to the Conference to decide.
- 4. At the February Quarterly Meeting, Rev. W. C. Allen applied for permission to accept the Agency of the Ontario Sabbath School Missionary Union, and the Committee finding that his Circuit Quarterly Meeting were willing for him to accept the Agency, the Committee believing he would be useful in that work, granted the application.
- 5. At the same meeting, the Toronto Circuit applied for permission to make the Eastern part of it into a Branch, to be called "Toronto East;" and the Committee believing it would prompt that part of the Circuit to make efforts to become self-sustaining, gave their consent.
- 6. In the month of April, Brother Swift applied for a Home Station, and the Committee forwarded the application to the Home Committee; at the same time regretting that Brother Swift had felt it his duty to return to England.
- 7. The Rev. S. Antliff, the English General Missionary Secretary, being appointed to visit this Conference, as the Representative of our Home Conference, informed the Committee that it would not be possible for him to leave England so as to be here at the time the Conference usually assembled, and asked, if possible, that the Conference usually assembled, and asked, if possible, that the Conference usually assembled is the conference usually assembled.

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ference might be postponed for one week. The Committee, feeling how greatly our Church would be advantaged by the presence of Mr. Antliff, decided to postpone the Conference, looking to that Court for justification of their act.

8. The Committee gave permission to Brother Hughan to visit England, for three months. Other items of business were attended to by the Committee, which are too numerous, and not of sufficient importance to detail here.

Trusting this Report is satisfactory, it is now respectfully submitted. WILLIAM ROWE, Secretary.

Yearly Report of the General Missionary Committee to the Conference of 1871.

In presenting you with their Annual Report, your Committee beg

to notice :-

1. The Resignation of Agents who have been under the supervision of the Committee .- At the November Quarterly Meeting, Rev. J. H. Stonehouse resigned his position amongst us as a Minister. This act of Brother Stonehouse caused the Committee considerable trouble; and had it not been that the Rev. J. F. Parker, who had arrived from England, and who was intended to supply Woodstock, was able to go to Chatham, the Mission would have suffered considerably. Committee regret Brother Stonehouse's conduct, as he had promised to continue in charge until this Conference. At the January Quarterly Meeting, Brother Monkman gave in his Resignation, and expressed a wish to be relieved from his charge as soon as possible, as he wished to engage in secular business. The Committee accepted the Resignation, but informed Brother Monkman they could not then relieve him; and the Committee wish to record their gratification with the conduct of Brother Monkman, in remaining at his post until this Conference. At the same meeting, Brother Gavin, who had married while in probation, was retained as a hired Local Preacher, until a supply could be procured for his Station. The Committee regret to report that Brother Gavin did not pay that attention to his work which its necessities demanded, and at last left the Mission to do the best it could. The resignation of Brother Jolly took effect at the May Quarterly Meeting, agreeably to a notice he sent to the Committee.

2. The Illness of Missionaries .- The very week after the last Conference, Brother Chectham informed the Committee that his continued illness prevented him from attending to Woodstock, and he has been unable to resume ministerial labor for the whole year. The Committee supplied Woodstock as best they could; but as these supplies could only remain during Sabbath, the Mission suffered considerably. In January, however, the Rev. J. E. Lidstone, who had been sent out from England, was sent to Woodstock, thus relieving the Committee from considerable anxiety. The Committee are

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thankful to record, that Brother Hassard, with God's blessing on the means employed, so far recovered his health as to be able to resulte his labors. Brother Hassard' being one of the Committee's laboriou and useful Agents, makes his recovery the more gratifying.

3. During the year, considerable correspondence has taken place between your Committee and the English Committee, respecting brethren to be sent out from England, to supply our work; and the Committee are pleased to report, that in addition to Brothers Willis and Waits, who received appointments from the last Conference, but who did not arrive until just before the August Quarterly Meeting, Brothlers Portèr, Lidstone, Bryant, and Thompson have been sent to us. The expenses of these brethren have been paid by the Home Committee to Quebec, except those of Brother Lidstone, which have been paid by your Committee, The Secretary also corresponded with the Rev. T. Guttery and the English Committee, respecting Mr. Guttery's coming to this country. The Committee have pleasure in reporting that this correspondence was successful, and that Brother Guttery being willing, the English Committee consented to his coming out.

4: Removal Expenses. The expenses connected with the removal of Missionaries have been unusually heavy, and have somewhat taxed the ability of the Committee to pay them in full. It would be well if some measure could be devised by which Missions should bear a portion of these expenses, as yearly they appear to increase, and the large sum appropriated to pay them prevents the grants from being increased as the Committee would like. Numerous applications for assistance to procure furniture have been received by the Committee during the year, and in most cases the Committee have voted sums on condition that the Missions should ruise certain amounts. It would appear as if Mission officials considered, that when furniture was required for their Preacher's residence, all they had to do was to apply to your Committee for the amount needed. It should be understood, that when the Committee furnish a house on a Mission, all renewals of such furniture should be provided by the Mission authorities.

5. The Committee have been applied to for help in the way of additional Preachers, but two only of these applications the Committee deem worthy to bring under your notice, and these cases refer to Kincardine and Durham. The Committee, could they have found suitable Agents, would have sent them to those fields of labor, believing such act necessary, from the representations made to them. As it is, they have promised to influence the Conference to send help to them.

6. Rev. H. S. Matthews. The extraordinary circumstances connected with the resignation of this brother, and which only came to the knowledge of the Committee after the last Conference, were such as to induce the Committee to consider they were justified in bringing them under the notice of the President of the Conference of the Body which accepted his services. A sub-Committee was appointed

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of labor, to them. letters, etc., in the possession of the President of the Wesleyan Conference, but cannot report what action that Officer has taken in the 7. The Secretary has, under the direction of the Committee, visitcase. ed several Missions during the year; and they consider these visits have not been in vain. Were it possible, the Committee are of opinion that such visits more frequently mode would be productive of great good: indeed, the looseness with which business is conducted on some of the Missions, makes the Committee consider these visits more than desirable—absolutely necessary.

8. Several Missions have applied to the Committee for assistance, either to build parsonages, or reduce the debts existing on some which have been erected; but in no case could these applications be granted. To appropriate any money would have been to take it from the grants, and this the Committee did not feel warranted to do, as they consider the grants should in all cases be paid in full, if at all

*possible.

Report of the Finance Committee.

Your Committee have carefully examined the state of our different Connexional Funds, and, with two exceptions, find them to be in a healthy state; the exceptions referred to are the Mission Fund and the Journal Fund. The Mission Fund reports a decrease of \$150 00. This is very much to be regretted, because it is from this fund the grants are made to Mission Stations; and when there is a decrease in this fund, the grants must necessarily be less. The Journal Fund accounts show a balance against it, in consequence of subscribers falling to pay their dues. The accounts of the Book-Room, submitted by Brother Rowe, are satisfactory, and show the Book-Room to be doing a good business. The following recommendations, touching our different funds, are presented for your consideration and adoption :-

1. That the salary of the salesman in the Book Room be \$312 00 for the next year, and that no percentage on sales be allowed.

2. That the percentage on sales, so far as the Book Steward is concerned, be also discontinued, and that his salary for the future be \$550 00.

3. That the Book-Room pay, from its profits, \$25 00 next year to the Children's Fund.

4. That all the Preachers who are indebted to the Book Room be required to pay their debts, according to rule.

5. That all those Stations which have not paid their apportionments to the indebtedness of the late Institute, be required to do so

6. That to meet the increasing demands of the Children's Fund, there be an increase of assessments on the Circuits of \$4 00; on Branches and Missions \$2 00.

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8. That efforts be made to secure the payment of subscriptions to the Journal in advance.

9. That all Ministers be allowed 20 per cent. discount on all subscriptions owing to the Journal over two years, which they may collect.

10. That any Station that does not take up the Connexional Collections, as appointed by Conference, be not allowed to have any Representative at the following District Meeting and Conference.

 That the Conference decide how long a probationary Preacher draw assistance from the Relief Fund.

12. That care be taken in the removal of Preachers, so as to lessen the removal expenses as much as possible.

13. That should the Mission Fund be favored with an increase of \$500 00 during thh ensuing year, \$50 00 each be allowed to Walpole and Walsingham, for Parsonage aid.

14. That the rule on assistance to parsonages, page 12 of the Minutes of Conference of 1867 be rescinded, as the funds will not allow of such help being given.

15. That nothing can be allowed for deficiencies, except in the case of Muskoka. To this Mission we recommend the sum of \$50 00 to be granted.

16. In reference to the sum which can safely be used as grants to the Missions, we submit the following statement:—

Three-fourths of the Missionary Revenue for this year being appropriated by the last Conference, leaves a balance at the disposal of this Conference of \$1840 00 Extra Grant from English Conference of 1870 400 00 Probable English Grant for 1871 2000 00 Three-fourths of the supposed income for the next year 5523 00

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Prospective Expenditure for the year ending July, 1872 :-	
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This sum has been exceeded by \$800 00, in consequence of appropriations being made by Conference. We must therefore have an increase of \$800 00 in our Missionary moneys this year, to be in a sound state, especially as the English Grant has been reduced by \$500 00.

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on the shape Assist is ple school cessfu REMARKS:—1. The above figures show that we have \$70 00 less to dispose of this year than last. This is owing to there being a decrease of £154 00 in the Missionary income of this year, and the next year's income being supposed to be the same as this year.

2. The \$600 00 allowed for exigencies last year has been entirely disposed of, by \$185 00 more being paid for travelling expenses than was allowed for last year; by the expenses of Brother Lidstone, from England; by additional for board; and by Reach having been made into a Mission Circuit by the last Conference, after the appropriations were made by the Committee on Grants; and by appropriations being made by last Conference to different persons.

3. The English Book-Room Steward has notified the General Secretary, that he will not be able to recommend the English Conference to grant us more than £400 sterling next year, in consequence of the increased expenditure caused by the Book-Room enlarging its

4. If the removing expenses could be kept within \$200 00, and the furniture allowance not to exceed \$100 00,—\$200 00 more might be appropriated by the Committee.

Report of the Book Room.

It is gratifying to report that the sales during the past year have amounted to \$6,265 35, being nearly \$800 00 more the year previously. This is owing in part to the preachers purchasing more theological works at the Book-Room than in previous years, and partly to a certain liue of books the Book Steward has been successful in bringing into notice. In consequence of these efforts, and the keeping down of expenses, and there being no appropriations made by the past Conference from the Book-Room proceeds, there is a balance in favor of the Book-Reom. The Book Steward cannot help calling attention to the debts of some of the preachers to the Book-Room, and hopes, that as the preachers receive 15 per cent. on all books other than Connexional, they will endeavour to lessen their indebtedness as much and as soon as possible. It is hoped that the brethren will do all they can to benefit the Book-Room, by securing for it the custom of the Sabbath Schools on their Stations. All requisites for Sabbath School work, in the shape of literature, can be procured from our own Establishment. Assistance has been afforded to two or three poor Schools, and it is pleasant to know that we can at times render help to struggling schools. Hoping that this year's operations will be even more successful than the past, this Report is submitted.

PASTORAL ADDRESS.

The Annual Address of the Primitive Methodist Conference to the Members of the Church.

DEARLY BELOVED IN THE LORD :

At the close of another annual gathering of your Representatives, it becomes our duty and privilege to address to you a few words of greeting and counsel. As your Representatives, we recognize your right to expect from us an account of our doings; and though these will be given you in the published Minutes, yet we have pleasure in referring to them now. The Sessions of Conference have this year been of more than ordinary interest. For the first time in our his tory as a people in this country, we have been favored with the presence of a Representative of the Parent Church in England. Agreeably with the expressed wishes of former Conferences, the authorities of the English Denomination determined to send one of their principal brethren to visit our land, and spead a short time in visiting our principal Stations. Their selection of the Rev. Samuel Antliff has been a happy one. His ripened experience, matured judgment, scholarly attainments, and sanctified eloquence proved him to be eminently fitted to represent a Body which has in its Ministry and Communion many whom God delights to honor. As our President, Mr. Antliff did us good service. His sermons and addresses on public occasions were of the highest order, and the crowds which gathered to hear him evidenced the acceptability of his minist: ations.

Among the many questions which claimed our attention, none perhaps was greater than the one referring to the proposed amalgamation of all the Methodist Churches in this country. After a day and a half spent in a more than ordinarily free and unreserved expression of views on this subject, it was resolved, by a large majority, that such amalgamation was impracticable. While desirous of cultivating the most brotherly feelings towards all branches of the

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Methodist family, yet we felt the amalgamation could only be affected by our giving up many of our most cherished rights; and this we did not feel we were called of God to do; neither could we feel the time had arrived when we should sever our connexion with the Home Body, which has done so much to help us in the past. We believe our action in this matter will be acceptable to you, for we are persuaded you do not wish the old landmarks to disappear. Numbers are not always to be considered an evidence of prosperity. We must be careful not to be caught by a name, while the reality is overlooked.

It was a cause of thankfulness to find that God had blessed our labors during the past year, and that we were able to report an increase of 61 in our numbers. We confess this increase is not such as we might expect, considering the extent of agency employed; but when we reflect on the many drawbacks to our prosperity during the year, it is such as to inspire us with the belief, that when all our energies are employed in the great work of winning souls to Christ, we shall be favored with much larger increases.

It was gratifying to us to find there was a great improvement inour ordinary annual income. At no former period in our history was so much liberality displayed in supporting the Ministry; and, as a consequence, never were deficiencies in Ministers' salaries, as a whole, less than this year. We believe in this good work you will abound yet more and more, and will be increasingly careful to see that those who minister to you in word and doctrine shall be liberally sustained. We know, that as your own temporal circumstances improve, your Ministers' incomes will improve; and in this respect they require nothing more. In the erection of new churches, and the enlargement of others, we have had further proofs of your liberality and prosperity; and we cannot refrain from impressing upon you the necessity of paying increased attention to the erection of Houses of Prayer—Houses which shall be consecrated to the worship of God alone.

In the increase of our Sabbath Schools, Teachers, and Scholars, we have the evidence of increased zeal and attention on your part to the work of imbuing the youthful minds of our country and church with those scriptural principles which will benefit both the church and the world. It is one of the most hopeful

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signs of the times in which we live to see so many Christians of all classes, devoting themselves to the spiritual tuition of our youth; and we are warranted in expecting, when the injunction of the Good Shepherd, "Feed my lambs," is faithfully observed, to see produced the most blessed results.

We regretted to find there was a small decrease in the Missionary fund; and though the cause for this may be easily accounted for, in the efforts which have been made on several Stations to support their Ministers, yet we trust you will not overlook the fact, that this is one of our most important funds. From it, assistance is rendered to those who, though conscientiously attached to our ordinances, are yet not sufficiently strong in numbers nor means to support entirely their Ministers. If we would keep page with our increasing population, and extend our operations, we must freely and liberally sustain the Mission Fund. We commend this Fund to your sympathy and notice, and confidently believe, that at the result of this commendation, it will secure an enlarged revenue this year.

The report of the Book-Room was very satisfactory, showing as it does, its business is enlarging; and that it has been well sustained by our Ministers and Schools. The importance of providing our Schools with sound, moral, and religious works cannot be too highly estimated. A great part of the literature of the present day is of a character, making it both unwise and dangerous to place in the reach of our children. It therefore becomes of importance to those who have the care of our Schoole, but whose time is limited, to have an Establishment from which they can select good, healthy, and reliable works; and such an Establishment we conceive our Book Room to be. We bespeak for it your continued custom, and appeal to your denominational patrictism to render it all possible help.

It would have been satisfactory to us, to find our denominational paper, the "Christian Journal," in a more favorable financial position than its report exhibited. That the indebtedness of many of our members to it is so large, and has existed for several years, has awakened our grave concern; and we trust this reference to the subject will be sufficient to induce them to discharge, without delay, their pecuniary obligations. We have appointed our Brother

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the Rev. Wm. Rowe to the Editorship of the Journal, and trust more his management it will become increasingly prosperous. We may be a substance in procuring for it an enlarged circulation; and wenture to hope it will speedily find its way to every Primitive substances in the Dominion.

Several brethren from England have this year joined our Ministry, and we cannot but feel under obligations to the Parent Body for sending out these brethren to our help. We have also called to the limistry of the Word some of our own young men, and trust they fill become acceptable laborers in the vineyard. Some of our wethren have been compelled by affliction to withdraw for a season from the active work of the Ministry, and one has been superannuated. These brethren have our deep sympathy, and we trust they will be Divinely supported in their affliction.

We would impress upon you the necessity of increased spirituality of mind, and holiness of heart. In this day of worldliness, and race for wealth, amusement, and position, there is great danger of too little attention being paid to the cultivation of all holy affections. You may be tempted to be satisfied with a mere name in the Church-to live in the credit of your past experience, and to be at ase in Zion. Resist these temptations. To yield to them is death. Strive to reach a higher state in the Christian life. Keep near the Cross and the Throne. The true secret of spiritual power is " walking with God." You will become mighty in doing good, just in proportion as you are fully given to Christ. Seek therefore to have "Holiness to the Lord" written on every thought, feeling, and faculty of your hearts and souls. Regard yourselves as be;ng consecrated to God. Shun conformity to the world and its fashions. Do not forget that the love of vain amusements, dress, style, and wealth is incompatible with the love of God. Oh! reach to something higher than a Be living epistles. Let the mere profession. Put on Christ. world read in your lives the blessedness and power of religion. But to do this, you must make use of the means; therefore, forget not the closet, nor the reading of God's word. If Christians can find time for mere amusements, and the reading of light literature, they can find time for private communion with God, and the study of His book. Attend regularly the public services of the sanctuary, and those social means of grace which are the peculiar characteristics of As heads of families, have an altar in your households, and around it, both morning and night, regularly gather you families and domestics; and by prayer and supplication make know their wants to God. Aim at doing good: do not be satisfied with doing it by proxy: do it yourselves. God asks you to work for him Support every movement that seeks to elevate your fellow-men. As a people, we have for years past identified ourselves with the Temperance Reformation. Let it live in your affections. Encourage with your contributions the Bible Society, in its noble work of circulating the Scriptures. Help all Societies whose object is to bring the good old gospel truths home to the hearts and consciences of your fellow-men. Your time for doing this is short. It is more than probable that some of you who are now in fellowship with us will not be dwellers on the earth when we send forth our next Pastoral Letter. Work then, beloved, while it is day.

And now we pray "that our Lord Jesus Christ himself, and God even our Father, which hath loved us, and hath given us everlasting consolation and good hope through grace, comfort your hearts, and stablish you in every good word and work."
